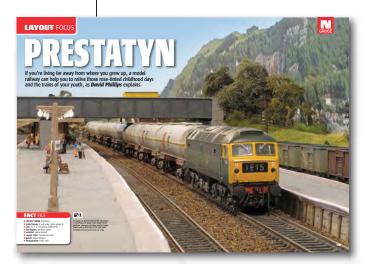

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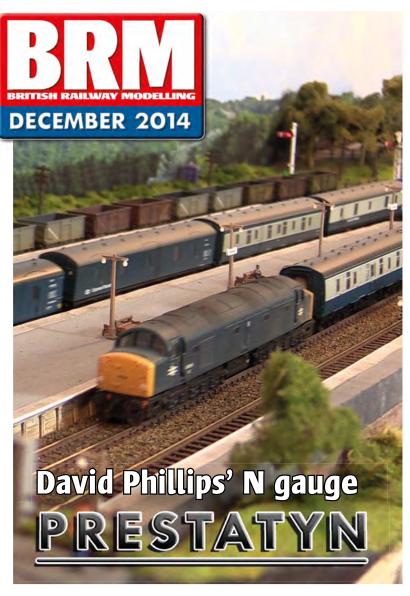

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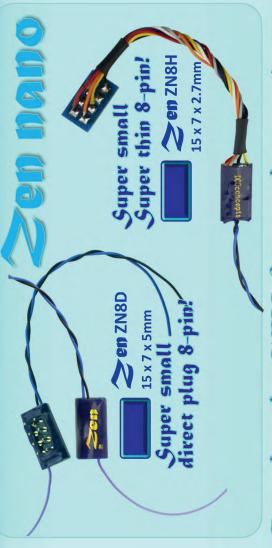
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WELCOME

s this issue reaches you, we'll be gearing up for our annual visit to the Warley NEC show. For the BRM team, and all the traders, manufacturers, layout owners and demonstrators who attend, it's a frenetic weekend, but one that has gained a unique and well-deserved place in the calendar over the last two decades.

As well as being the UK's best-attended model railway exhibition, it's also become the event of choice for companies looking to launch new products or announce new models. This year's show will be no exception, with plenty of announcements expected and one or two surprises that I'm not allowed to talk about yet! We'll bring you more details via **RMweb** and in our comprehensive Warley show report next month.

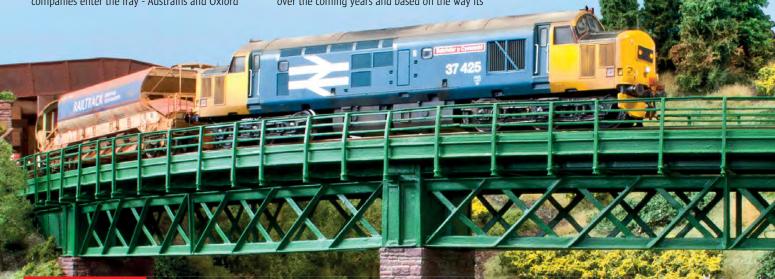
I mentioned last month that the current volume of new RTR announcements was unprecedented, even by the exceptional standards of the last few years but since then we've seen two further companies enter the fray - Austrains and Oxford Rail - plus the promise of further range extensions from existing suppliers, including some exciting and much-requested subjects, to be revealed at the NEC.

Austrains, an established name in the Australian RTR market, is working with an as-yet unnamed British patron to develop a OO gauge model of a Midland Railway Kirtley double-framed o-6-o. It's a brave choice, especially as these Victorian relics barely made it into the key post-1948 era. Is there enough demand for such a machine? How will it compare price-wise when it is released in 2016? Austrains wasn't saying much when **BRM** enquired, but we'll bring you more on this story as it develops.

The other new entry into the OO RTR market is far better known, but for die-cast road vehicles rather than anything rail-mounted. Oxford Rail is the new venture from Oxford Diecast, and has beaten other interested parties to the punch with its SR Adams 'Radial' 4-4-2T. Sources suggest that it has big plans for a range of several locomotives over the coming years and based on the way its

die-cast range has grown over the last decade, who would bet against it becoming a major player here too?

At a time when the established manufacturers are experiencing major supply issues, it's remarkable that others are prepared to wade in to a volatile and uncertain marketplace with a relatively small target market. None of the companies that have promised to come in and 'shake up the British model railway market' have really done so yet, but perhaps 2015 will be the year these new firms make their mark. Interesting times.

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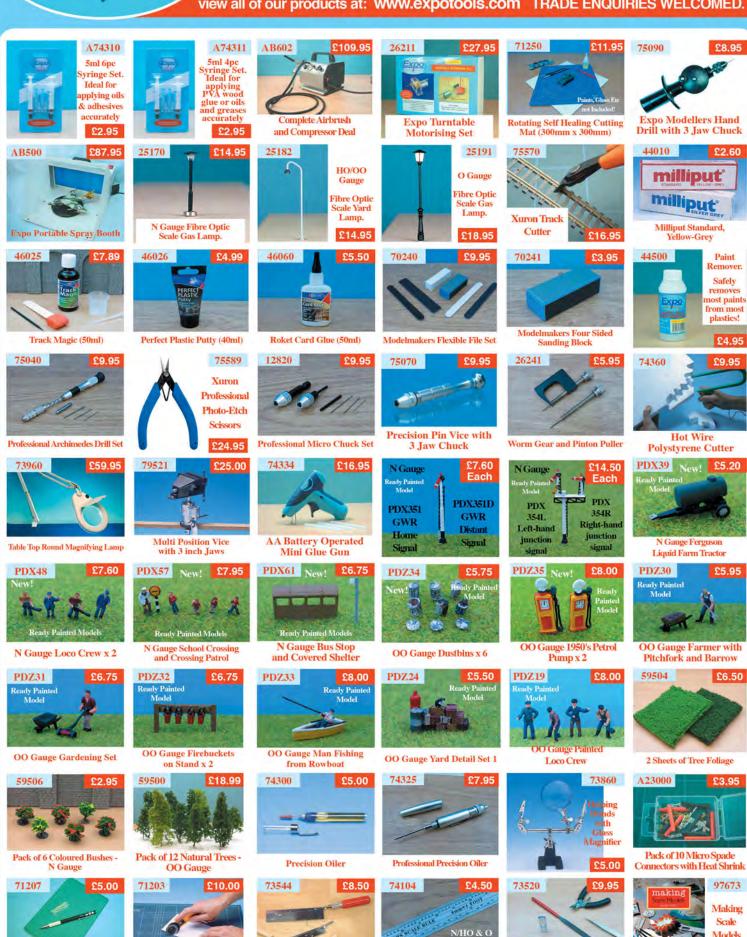
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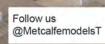
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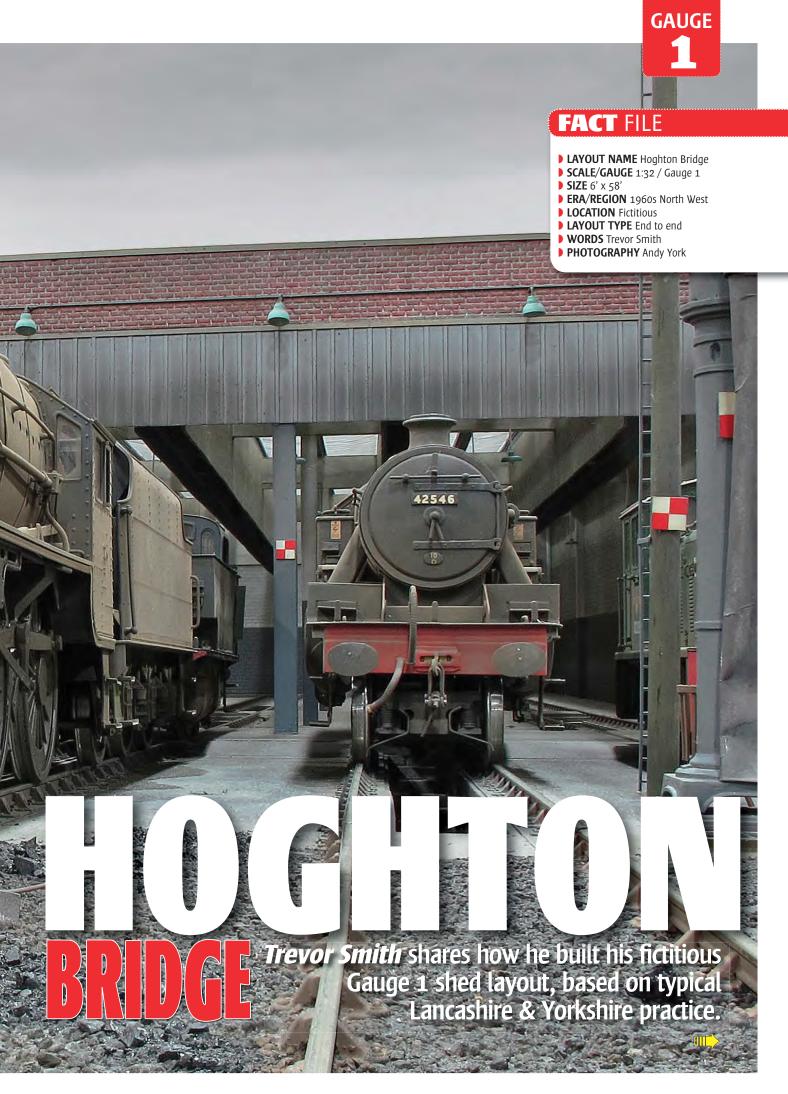

came back to railway modelling in 1980 and enjoyed OO gauge for almost ten years, even building my first exhibition layout in that scale. One day I recall being very impressed by an O gauge layout at an exhibition and with a leap of faith decided to change scale.

I sold all my stock and purchased a CCW kit for a Stanier 2-6-4T. I have to say that I did this with a feeling of trepidation as the investment was significant and I'd never attempted anything so large and complex. The kit went together well and gave me confidence to commence a building programme of locomotives and rolling stock from kits.

During almost 20 years of O gauge modelling I constructed some 50 locomotives, a large number of wagons and three large exhibition layouts, 'Todmorden', 'Lostock Hall' and finally 'Heyside'. I thoroughly enjoyed O gauge and I would recommend it to anyone who enjoys the modelling side of the hobby. However, having exhibited 'Heyside' at such diverse locations as Orleans, Brivela-Gaillarde, Hazel Grove and Blackburn I was ready for something different.

TIME FOR A CHANGE

A change of scale is less dramatic in the popular scales of N and OO as both are very well catered for by the trade, and many components are (within reason) similarly priced. In the time I spent modelling O gauge I saw great progress in the availability of material and this continues to be the case with an ever increasing number of ready to run prototypes. It can be argued that you need less stock but, if like me, you enjoy seeing a range of locomotives operating, one little shunter pushing a couple of wagons just won't do. It's a case of horses for courses.

In the months before I disposed of 'Heyside' I became aware of the availability of some Gauge 1 models. It happened that a 'Black Five' was one of them and while exhibiting at Warley in 2008 I was able to view (and upon liking what I saw) purchase one. Within a couple of months I had sold all my O qauge material and could embrace the new scale.

PLANNING AHEAD

I decided to model a motive power depot because I have always been fascinated by their function. As a

trainspotting schoolboy, they provided a concentration of motive power at close hand. Furthermore, a modest depot could accommodate what I anticipated would be a limited number of locomotives for this scale that was new to me. As for a location, it had to be loosely based on what I grew up with in the North West.

To contemplate an exhibition layout in Gauge 1 initially requires a reality check. It had to be built within the constraints of portability and accommodation, whilst allowing access over a period of time for the building of all the detail involved. I am fortunate in this respect as I converted an old stable building to become my railway room. Although it measures 38' x 16', it is not large when planning in Gauge 1.

I settled on a fictitious small motive power depot based on ex-Lancashire & Yorkshire Railway (LYR) practice set in the early-1960s with a four road stone-built engine shed and coal hole. The shed would portray an example which had been re-roofed in the 1950s and in common with the practice at that time, the replacement upper works would be executed in brick. Plants for the drying of sand and disposal of ash would also feature.

MAKING A START

A trackplan was formulated to accommodate the above features and work commenced on the baseboards. As the layout was intended for the exhibition circuit I decided a fiddle yard to fiddle yard system would be most appropriate.

To achieve the required depth needed, not only for the trackwork serving the shed, but also the passing lines, I employed two sets of baseboards running in parallel (for portability) giving a maximum width of 1.66m (5' 5") near the shed building. This means that the boards are bolted together not only at their ends but also their sides.



KEY DETAILS TRACKWORK



The trackwork on a shed layout is concentrated and obviously involves numerous sets of points, so I decided to build the entire track from components produced by Cliff Barker. A well thought out and fairly comprehensive range of rail profiles and various chair types is available to enable the modeller to design the trackwork. I took the easy option of buying a set of scale point plans of different radii and glued



these to the baseboards. I then made the various components for the points from lengths of rail, fitting the appropriate chair types as I went along and glued them to the trackplan, using a track gauge.

The running lines are similarly constructed, but using Cliff's sleepers which can be purchased with the chairs moulded on. They are threaded onto the lengths of rail with sleepers spacers to ease assembly.

For the footbridge I again turned to the 'Oldham Loop' and based my model on the most attractive one I could find - a lattice type which once stood at Milnrow.

LARGER STILL?

As work progressed I thought the layout would benefit from a small station and I added a further baseboard for it. This took the form of a typical L&Y stone-built main building similar to one at Royton junction, whilst on the opposite platform, a wooden style building based on the one at Black Lane station was added. For the footbridge I again turned to the 'Oldham Loop' and based my model on the most attractive one I could find - a lattice type which once stood at Milnrow.

ROLLING STOCK

Running in parallel to the layout build was a programme of rolling stock construction. I'd bought kits for two Stanier 2-6-4Ts, two Ivatt 2-6-2Ts and an ex-LMS 0-6-0T dock tank, but also Chinese produced RTR prototypes including a Jubilee, a Jinty, two 8Fs and a Class 04 diesel.

I should explain at this stage that Gauge 1 has two different scales running in parallel, namely, 10mm:1ft and what is referred to as 1:32 scale. There is a tradition of producing stock to 10mm especially in live steam, but the models produced by Bachmann are built to the truer scale of 1:32. There is a visible difference when stock from each of the scales is placed side by side. Taking this into consideration, I decided to scratchbuild all my freight stock to a scale of 1:32. The kit-built locomotives are all to 10mm:1ft scale.

BUILDING THE ARCHITECTURE

I approached the construction of the buildings on the layout with the same system I had used on my last layout with the exception that as the buildings would be significantly larger I would employ a shell of 5mm ply where necessary. The engine shed itself is a large structure measuring

170cm x 85cm (5' 7" x 2' 10"). I marked out the floor plan on the baseboards and commenced with a shell of 5mm ply for all the walls. All the door and window openings were cut out slightly oversize to allow for the later fitting of door and window frames. The workshops alongside the building increased the rigidity of the adjoining wall as they effectively became a series of boxes. The long wall on the other side of the shed was braced at the front by the fascia and by two internal beams of 10mm ply, clad in plastic card and anchored to the interior of the opposing wall.

I then started making the exterior cladding using dépron (a French foam board material) and on this building I used 3mm thick sheet for both exterior and interior walls. The desired effect involved engraving some 5,000 stones and 10,000 bricks. The sheets were then glued to the

ply using a non-solvent glue. The chimneys were made from 6mm dépron which is quite robust when formed into a box section.

The foreman's office and workshops had to be detailed before the roof sections were glued on and I made a range of work benches, a pillar drill, vices, and hand tools to adorn the worktops and furniture for the foreman's office. The windows and doors were cut from plastic card and fitted with clear plastic glazing. The stone and brickwork was then painted using artists acrylic paints, gradually changing the shade with each coat. The workshop roof sections were then glued on, firstly with a sheet of 5mm ply with holes cutout for the glazing where appropriate and then layers of slates made from 0.010" plastic card.

The main shed roof was formed using 3mm ply for the smoke channels in conjunction with the previously mentioned cross beams to form a rigid structure onto which the glazing could be laid. The lighting cables for the interior were hidden under the roof gutters allowing the lamps to hang over the walkways below. The remaining features on the roof such as glazing bars and smoke vents are all in plastic card. Finally, the downspouts and gutter details were glued on.



KEY DETAILS COAL HOLE

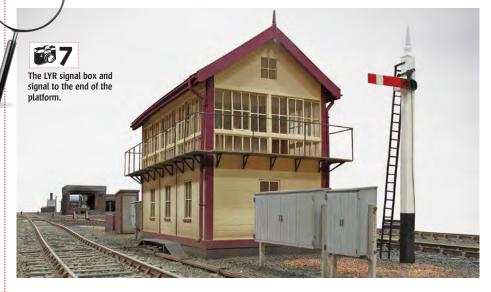
Following the shed, the next largest building on the layout is the coal hole and this is based on the general style of the structures which survived on many smaller depots until the end of steam. I had never built one with the ramps still in place and thought it would be visibly more interesting. The main structure of the model is almost completely made from 6mm dépron engraved like the shed, but the water tank is made from lengths of thin wooden beading with one edge chamfered along its length enabling, in this case, two lengths to be glued together to achieve the distinctive curve top and bottom. The ramps were made from dépron supporting a layer of plastic card onto which the track was glued.

KEY DETAILS SIGNALS





The signalling on the layout is a recent development and is far from comprehensive. The two signals at the station end of the layout were made from laminated plastic card tapered with a file and the tall signal is from a brass tube with all the boards cut from 10thou. brass. The signals and all the yard lamps are equipped with ladders which again, are made from plastic card to the profile I wanted as no alternative was available commercially. The lamps are illuminated by LEDs using tinted plastic for the lenses.

The other main features of the shed are the ash plant which is all plastic card and based on one at Lostock Hall. The depot is served by four water cranes, two of the L&Y type and two of the later style fitted to many sheds undergoing improvements. After considerable thought on the subject of how best to capture the tapering appearance of both types in a material sufficiently stable, but workable, I eventually turned them in wood on the lathe. I then filed laminated plastic card for the pipework and in the case of the LYR versions, added the distinctive operating mechanism in brass.

AN ATMOSPHERE OF '60S STEAM

The lamentable condition of many depots in the final years of steam is well recorded in the hundreds of photographs taken by enthusiasts, myself included, and I have tried to capture some of this atmosphere on the layout. To that end I have added

some clutter such as steel barrels and discarded tools. I have also represented a diesel fuel point in the form of two converted tank wagons but I have avoided placing things just to fill a space. The same applies for the station where a study of period photographs of the area reveals how remarkably tidy platforms were being devoid of clutter and, sadly, passengers allowing the Beeching axe to fall.

THE FUTURE

It will be obvious from this article that Gauge 1 will continue to attract a small number of modellers for the reasons listed above. I imagined that the scale would become more evident on the exhibition circuit with the arrival of so many electric ready-to-run products, but although many are being purchased, they do not appear at mainstream multi-scale exhibitions and only see light at the association member's gatherings.

By the time this article appears in print that 'Hoghton Bridge' will have made its one and only exhibition appearance at Accrington at the Blackburn & East Lancs MRC show in September.

In recent months I have been negotiating the sale of my Gauge 1 stock which is now complete. I did not want to bring the layout back to France and as part of the negotiations I have donated it to a group of modellers in the south of England.

I have enjoyed my six years' modelling Gauge 1 but guess what? I have decided a change of scale is due and a new project beckons in OO Gauge! **BRM**

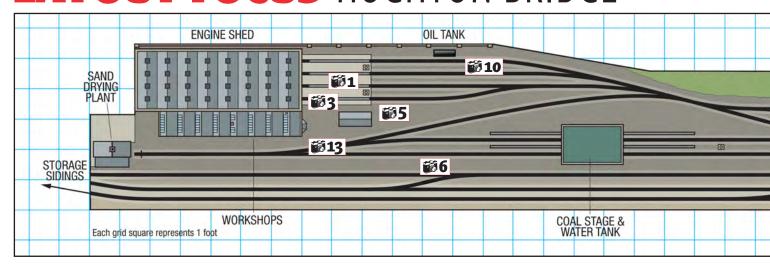

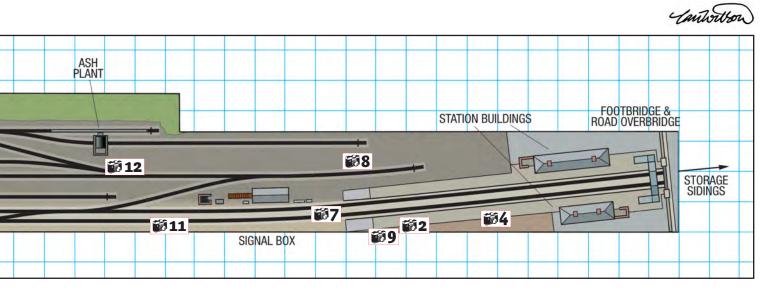

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In Pursuit of Excellence



DIYORRE

Are ready-to-plant models expensive? Is it always cheaper to build things yourself? **Phil Parker** compares the relative merits of two ways to add buildings to your layout.



fter recent price rises, many modellers are looking to reduce the cost of the hobby. Some have suggested that this might lead to a reverse of the recent trend towards buying items for a layout rather than building them yourself. The big question is, does this really save you money?

To test the theory, I've taken one of Bachmann's simplest ready-to-use resin buildings, the 1:76 scale Red Star parcels office (44-191) and built a copy.

I timed myself and then worked out the price of all the materials used in construction to work out how much it would cost if I charged for both.

As it turns out, this little square structure isn't as simple as it first appears.

While the roof is flat, there is plenty of fiddly and time-consuming decoration around the top edge. Also, the design needs to be kept clean and tidy so work needs to be neat and precise. Sometimes this means throwing away parts that aren't quite right once they have been cut out.

Bachmann has an advantage here in that it can make use of etched windows. These will be nice, square and most importantly, all identical. Just below the bargeboards

are two different sizes – six of one and four of another. Cutting these out of plastic sheet is a fiddly job and I'm sure mine aren't as good as the metal versions.

I've built my model entirely from plastic sheet. It's easy to work with and available in a wide range of

thicknesses from most model shops It's cheap enough that you don't need to worry too much if the first attempt at any part isn't quite right and has to be made again. If you cut a bit too much off, you can usually paint it with liquid glue, push the parts together and after a few minutes the join will be invisible.

The ready-built model is made of resin; it weighs 95g as opposed to the copy at 29g. That doesn't sound like much but if you are building a portable model, then this sort of saving on all the buildings might make a difference when you have to hump the thing out to a car.

After all my work, I produced a pretty convincing copy of the original model. The time it took to do this was far greater than I'd expected. My initial thoughts had involved a couple of hours, in the end it was over three times that. If I'd been in a hurry I could probably knock an hour off this but we're not in a race.

I suspect for most people it's going to come down to how much you enjoy making things. I do, so the time spent is a pleasure. If you just want the end result then the instant gratification of taking a finished model out of a box will be more appealing. In my case, I don't consider the time an 'expense' and have calculated a cost just for the purposes of this exercise. So, ready-to-use or build it yourself? Which is better? You decide. BRM

PRACTICAL

This representation of Bachmann's building made use of common modelling construction materials. Below is how it was made.

STEP-BY-STEP **GUIDE**



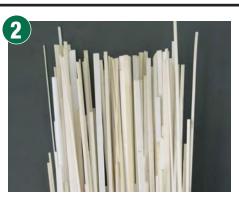
My model is made from plastic sheet. Sold in A4 sized sheets in various thicknesses, I am using 10, 20 and 60thou (thousandths of an inch), plus some embossed brick sheet. 40 thou is roughly 1mm.



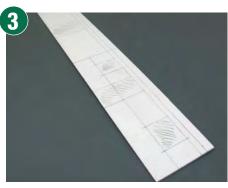
Under the roof edge is a set of grooved barge boards. The easiest way to make these is to score some 20 thou sheet with an Olfa plastic card cutter. It removes a sliver of material as it's dragged along the plastic. An alternative is to mark a line with a knife blade and then run a file along it.



bricks are painted with Humbrol No. 121 to give a mortar-like colour. This needs to dry fully before the brick surfaces are rubbed with brown pencil crayons. Build up the colour with these by working over the surface several times with different shades.



For detailing, strips of plastic are available. You can either buy specific sizes or a pack of mixed ones as shown here. When working with plastic, it's handy to have some of this around for all sorts of jobs, including gap filling.



Copying the dimensions from the Bachmann building, the 60 thou sheet is marked out with a sharp pencil. All the walls are lined up, so I only have to mark the height and main horizontals once and they will be consistent.









I'm not sure what colour Bachmann uses for the doors and bargeboards on its building, so I tried Railmatch BR maroon. It's too dark, but not unattractive. At least two coats are required to build up the depth of colour. I used wire for the door handles on my building.



Glazing is cut from old plastic packaging and fixed in place using a solvent-free general purpose glue. The upper windows are simply painted gloss black as you can't see through them.

Using liquid solvent applied sparingly, the brick sheet are fixed to the walls. Windows and doors will be cut out after this has dried in a minute or so. A 1mm square strip along the top edge will go on next.



The corners are made using a square and liquid solvent is brushed both inside and outside the join. Once fully dry, the brick sheet and top strip are trimmed back to make a perfect join.



The doors and windows are cut from 20 thou sheet. The frames around each door are built up with square strip to match the resin ones. Each door takes about 25 minutes to make! At this stage, the plastic parts tend to look a bit mucky but all of this will disappear under the paint.



The finishing touch is the Red Star Parcels sign. A search online quickly found something suitable that was printed on glossy photo paper, cut out and stuck in place.

THE VERDICT

I used about a quarter of each plastic sheet — around $\mathfrak{L}1.50$ worth of material, plus three lengths of 1mm strip and 2 from the assorted packet (cost 50p). In addition there is paint, glue, photo paper and a knife blade to the tune of $\mathfrak{L}2.50$.

The final bill for materials comes in at £3.00.

HOW TO...

BACHMANUS BACHMANN'S PORTHOLE STOCK

Released recently to much acclaim, these LMS-designed coaches can still benefit from a little extra work, as *Tony Wright* discovers.



Attention to individual detail is incredible. On the left is a Composite and on the right a Brake Third. Note the different end profiles, the more bulbous tumblehome being unique to the CK. I've fitted the bits supplied by Bachmann to the BTK - gangway end cover, screw shackle, vacuum brake pipe and steam-heating pipe. I also fitted a Springside tail lamp by the simple expedient of drilling a hole in its base so that it would fit over the lamp bracket – yes, that last detail is a separate fitting, not just moulded on! The printed-on detail is exemplary and much crisper than anything achievable by transfers.

ith each successive new release of coaching stock from

the RTR manufacturers, the bar seems to be raised a little bit higher with regard to accuracy and fidelity to prototype. Such is the case with Bachmann's latest LMS-designed 'Porthole' stock.

This type, earning its epithet by the characteristic round windows in the lavatories/outer end of corridors, was the final manifestation of LMS carriage design. They were of all-steel construction and the majority was built post-Nationalisation; the originals entering service in LMS maroon but with BR numbers at the left-hand end. BR carmine and cream quickly became the standard, then BR maroon, with just a few survivors finally receiving corporate BR blue/grey. As brand-new, front-line stock, the type formed many of the LMR/ScR principal expresses of the 1950s, though BR Mk 1s quickly replaced many of them from the middle of that decade.

Five types have been produced by Bachmann; a 57' Corridor Third (39-450), 57' Corridor First (39-455), 57' Corridor Brake Third (39-460), 60' Vestibule First (39-475), 60' Corridor Composite (39-465) and 57' Corridor Brake First (39-470), all in BR carmine/cream. As an aside, the latter type was

at the southern end of eight-car 'Caledonian' sets in BR maroon, the rest being Mk 1s, with an ex-LMS catering vehicle.

These latest examples of Bachmann carriages are outstanding models, beautifully finished and represent superb value for money.

So, what is there to do to make them suitable for my model railway? Outstanding though they are, I didn't think they'd be of use to me because of their still front-line status in the mid-1950s (the period depicted on the Midland & Great Northern Joint bit of my 'Little Bytham' layout).

Clearly, they would have been very unusual on the East Coast Main Line proper and the east-west MR/M&GN line seemed to have more antiquated stock in its sets. But, a glance at Express Publishing's two books on M&GN operations revealed pictures of two 'Porthole' carriages on the system - one in an East Coast to Leicester train (a Composite, I think) and the other a Corridor Brake Third in a King's Lynn-Nottingham three-set (BTK/CK/BTK). So, despite their relative youth, I easily found two

examples of these types on the M&GN - one in an express, the other in the most humble of services. Surely, there must have been more from time to time? I discounted the all-Firsts, because no M&GN services seemed to have those of any type (a CK being the most accommodation for the more well-off) and looked at using the BTK, TK and CK. And, there really isn't much to do, as the following pictures show. **BRM**

Though already seen before, this is what my coupling system looks like from 'ordinary' viewing angles. The concertina corridor connectors join the two gangways perfectly. I only ever use one (Evo-Stik onto the towed coach), the distance apart being governed by the curves to be negotiated.

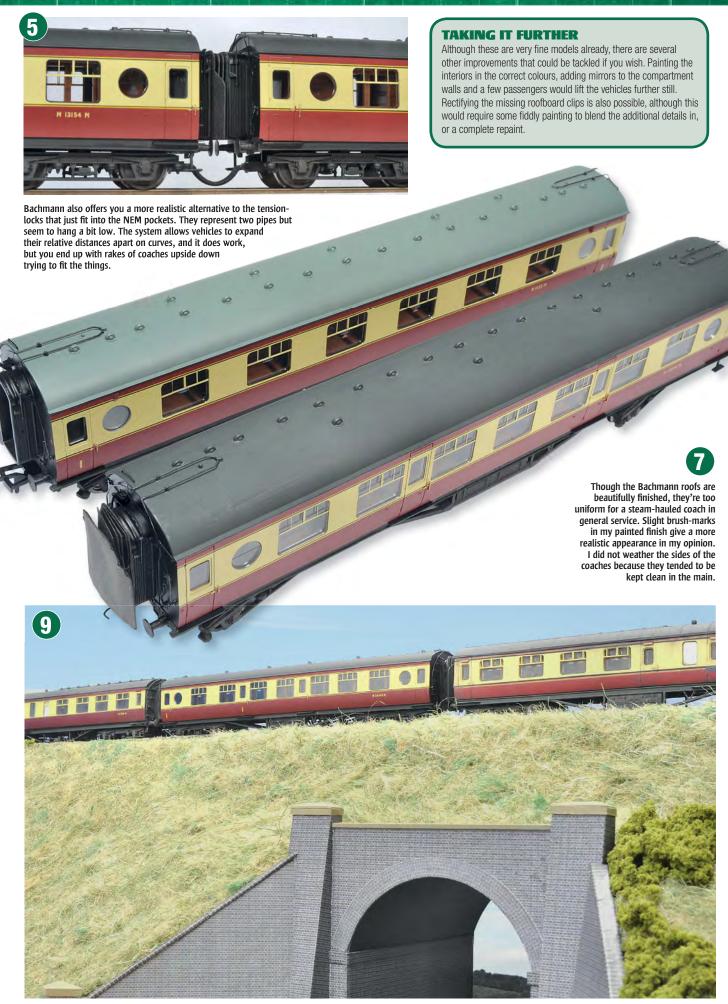


A Composite 'finished' and ready for service in its three-set. It's a pity no attempt was made to represent the roofboard brackets, fitted just below the cantrail towards the middle of the sides. Not wanting to spoil the excellent paint finish, I didn't attempt to make them. I've weathered the underframe using a sable brush and a mixture of Humbrol enamel matt black, greys and browns, effectively mixed on the surfaces. I sable-painted the roof with Humbrol No. 67, with a touch of matt black added.



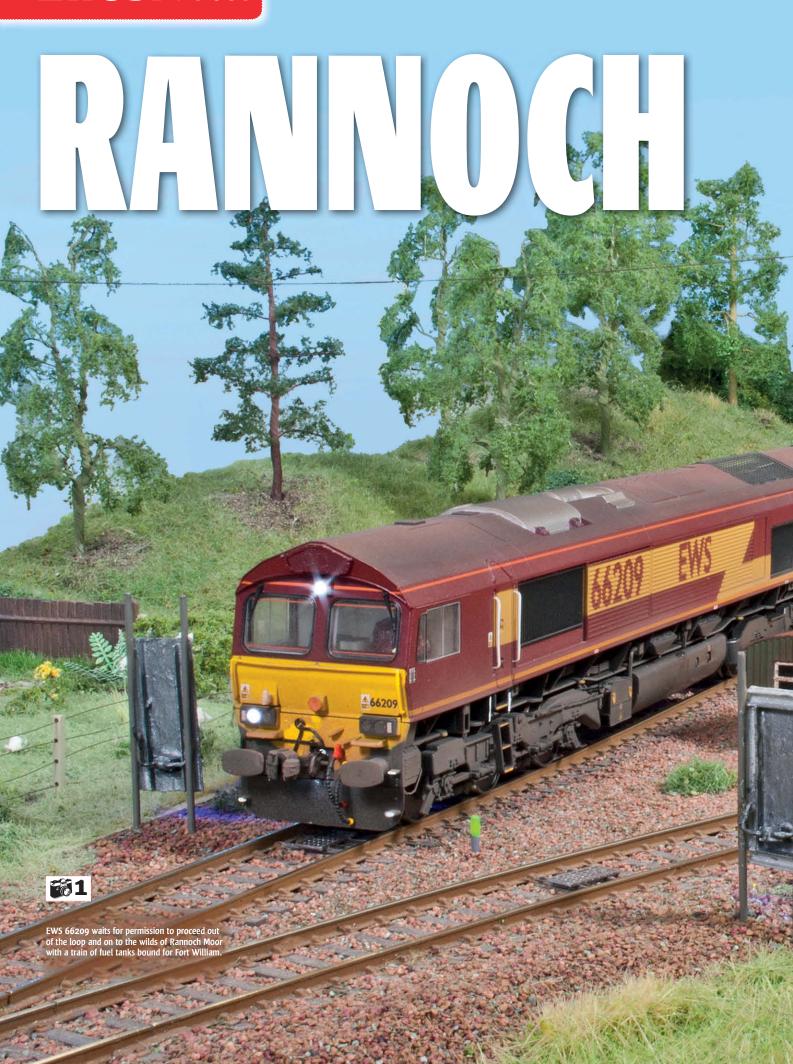
A returning excursion heads westwards at Little Bytham. The penultimate and last cars are the 'Porthole' TK and BTK respectively. Weathering the outer end of the BTK adds a final touch of realism. The two other carriages are Hornby 57' Stanier TKs. The respective finishes are entirely compatible and represent perfectly the slight differences in the colours of prototype vehicles.

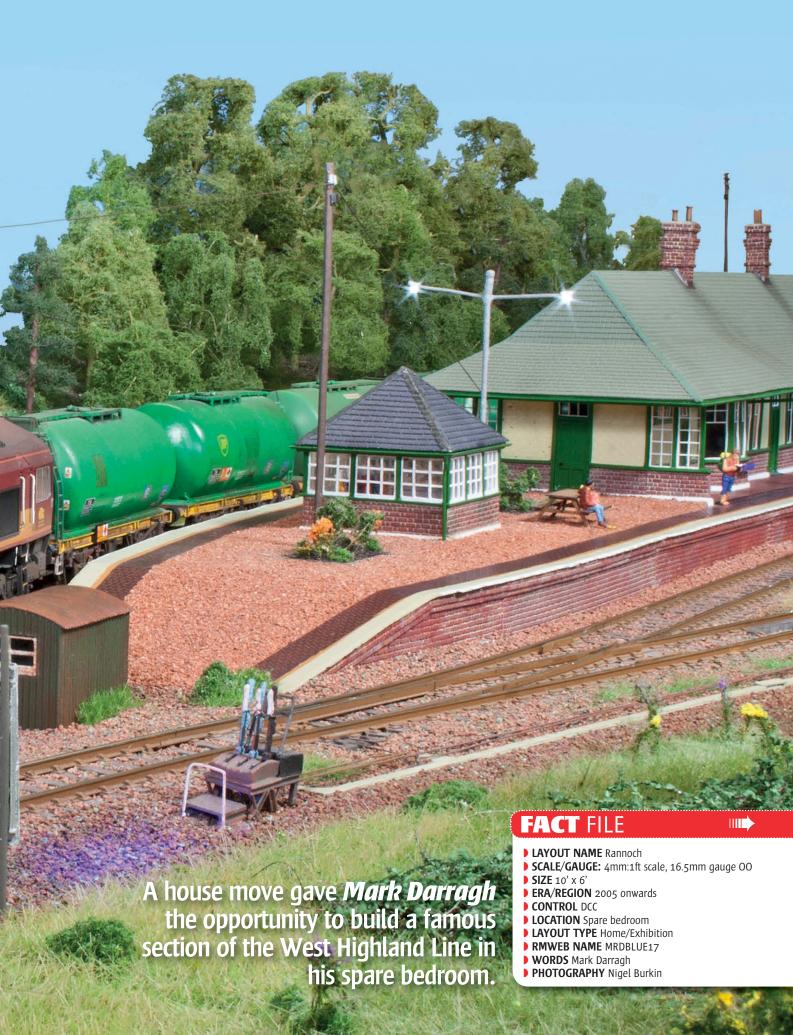

LAYOUT FOCUS

y wife and I moved to a bigger flat back in 2008 and for the first time I gained my own dedicated train room. This came with the caveat that I could do what I liked in there so long as the bed was available for guests. Being a traditional Edinburgh tenement flat the room was a decent size at around 16' long by 9' wide. As tempting as it was to fill it, I needed plenty of storage space and I liked having my desk near the window for modelling. A footprint of 10' by 6' was settled on, as this would give me a decent space to play with and also not be so big that I couldn't finish it. The big question was what to build.

As a Barrow lad I had sketched numerous grandiose ideas for a West Coast Main Line layout, inspired by Furness Model Railway Club's 'Boldon Junction', and by watching trains at Lancaster. Since moving north of the border, my interest in the Scottish railways had grown along with my collection of modern image Scottish rolling stock.

I spent three years commuting by train to work in Fife over the Forth Bridge and around the Fife Circle. I therefore had plenty of possible locations to inspire me but anywhere of interest would be just too big to model. I kept looking at the stock I had and wanted to include the West Highland portion of the 'Caledonian Sleeper', which until July 2007 was Class 37 hauled. The West Highland Line fascinated me with its variety of trains, bridges and buildings along a scenic and remote route so I focused my search on the line.

Turning to the internet I followed the route using Google Maps noting down the station names I came across. I then entered these names and searched for images that came up until I discovered Rannoch. The typical Swiss chalet style station building survived, as did its platform signalbox and it had a footbridge from the car park to the platform. The viaduct beyond the station also seemed a popular location for photographers and the whole place well and truly captured my imagination.

I had never attempted to base a model on an actual place before as the thought of having to scratchbuild everything for it was quite daunting. I had not been on the West Highland Line to visit the actual location and so didn't have a true feel for the atmosphere of the place.

To overcome this I did a lot more research on the internet to gather as many images of the place as possible and made lots of notes and sketches from which I could work from to try and re-create everything as realistically as possible.

Typing Rannoch Moor Station into Google produced some good initial results. I quickly discovered the photo-sharing website Flickr which had lots of images from this location, many taken by non-railway enthusiasts, of the surrounding scenery and actually at the station itself which included so much detail. Because there are so many everyday objects and people in these types of photographs it meant I was able to get a good idea of the scale of things and work out what needed to go where and also what to include on the model

A rough trackplan was sketched out and then transferred onto a roll of lining paper measured out to the 10' space I had available. I laid some track out to see how it all looked and what would fit into the space, drawing on the position of the key buildings, platform and scenic features that I wanted to try and include. I worked out that wrapping the scenic section around the corners would create more space and open up the scene. This meant I could also include a viaduct, albeit not to the size of Rannoch's but in keeping with the West Highland Line structures.

EY DETAILS MOORLAND SCENERY

Spectacular scenery features in so many photographs of the West Highland Line, with the railway blending into the landscape. Attempting to capture this and recreate it in a small space was a challenge. The landscape is built from blocks of polystyrene, carved to shape. These were covered with papier mache using wallpaper paste (I fill up an old pop bottle to store paste left over after wallpapering jobs around the house) and torn up bits of paper which gives a nice solid covering and seals everything in. A base layer of brown acrylic paint was applied before hanging basket liner was stuck on top with PVA glue. This was all good messy fun and a great way of creating large areas of lightweight landscape quickly and cheaply.

Once that was dry, the detailed vegetation was added including brambles, bushes, gorse, wild flowers and static grass to finish off. I worked from photographs to get the colours of the season and also to work out what types of vegetation grew where. I tried out a lot of new products that I'd never used before; made a static grass tool for about £5 from a tea strainer and a fly swat and found that even traditional scatter material still has its uses. Lots of trees were needed; the firs are from International Models, and the rest are from Hornby, which are excellent and often overlooked. The Beech trees at the front of the layout are positioned so as to give the impression of the prevailing wind blowing across the wilderness



The famous viaduct has been compressed to fit the available space and the required curve radius.

CONSTRUCTION

Happy with my plans and with a clear vision of what I wanted to achieve I started on the layout construction so it was out of the armchair and into the hall! Living in a flat this was the only space to do any construction work in and my wife - in her words - "tolerated" this. The baseboards are nothing fancy and were built on four boards to keep joints to a minimum. They needed to be simple to construct and made using materials I could buy and carry on foot from my local DIY store about a mile away. Each baseboard is 6' x 2' using 6mm ply tops with softwood frames roughly 2" x 1" around the outer

edge and a couple of cross beams at 2' intervals. These were glued and screwed together and are solid enough and lightweight.

I like being able to view a layout as though I'm actually there by the lineside so settled on a low enough height to be able to sit in a chair and watch trains go by as I relax after work. The layout sits on eight wooden A-frame trestles with metal bullet type dowels used to create perfect alignment and G-clamps to hold the boards together. After laying the track I filled the layout with stock and had a good play until I was happy everything ran smoothly, tweaking some of the sharp curves as I went.



A couple of small cottages complete the scene at either end of the station and feature fully-detailed gardens.





BUILDINGS

To create buildings that looked right for the layout, the only option was to scratchbuild. Over the years I've picked up a lot of hints and tips from fellow modellers, especially Ged Rutter, on ways of creating models of actual buildings which stuck with me and gave me the confidence to have a go.

I usually make a rough scale drawing first to make sure a building looks right when reduced to 4mm:1ft scale. The measurements from this are then used for marking out plastic sheet, which avoids waste as mistakes can be amended at the drawing stage. All my buildings start off with a base of 2mm thick art card onto which the footprint of the building is drawn. I sometimes include what the interior rooms might be like to help position doors and windows. I mainly use Wills sheets for wall sections that are cut to size and glued straight onto the card base. These are quite thick and the corners need to be cut at an angle so the brick or stonework joins neatly.

Door and window frames, sills and lintels are made from plastic strip and plastic weld is used to stick parts

together. Wills slate sheets get the lower edge cut at an angle to create a nice thin edge before being glued in place. Plastic strip detailing is used to create fascias and barge boards on buildings with half round rod and rod section for guttering and down pipes. Tamiya masking tape cut into thin strips makes convincing lead flashing around chimneystacks. It is also good for roof ridge and hip tiles as it bends into position and is easy to paint. For window glazing, clear plastic sheet is used – the packaging from the Wills sheets is ideal and sealed in place with Johnson's Klear.

I chose to build the tiny entrance shelter that leads from the car park onto the footbridge first as I could learn a lot from building it. If something went wrong it would not be a disaster if I had to start again. I built up the structure using the techniques above and in my madness used plastic strip to make beams for the roof frame with Wills slate sheet added on top. Mock-up roof sections were made out of scrap card first, to ensure the plastic sheet wasn't wasted through error.

The real Rannoch gained its footbridge from Corrour station and the model is made from the Lochgorm

etched brass kit. It was the first time I'd attempted anything like this and it went together well. Painted in First Group purple and white it stands out from the green and cream of the station building and the surrounding countryside.

The signalbox and station are the most recognisable buildings and form the centrepiece of the layout. The 'box went together quite quickly, although making the windows from thin plastic strip was a little tedious. The interior is detailed with parts from the Wills signalbox interior kit with whitemetal levers and an LED light built into the roof space.

My station building took around six months to build, on and off. Firstly, I made some drawings to work from, adding in as much detail as I could find for the real building. Whilst this helped create the footprint, where doors and windows would go and the height of the brickwork, the size of doors and windows were still a bit of a mystery. To solve this I actually measured the front door of my flat as it was of a similar size, style and age to the ones at Rannoch.

I also had a bay window in the lounge and a single



and double sized window in the bedrooms so this gave me enough to go on. Pete Harvey (PH Designs) designed a brass fret for me with all the doors and windows I needed. This not only saved a lot of time but greatly improved the finished item. The hipped roof was the hardest part to build and started with the upper sections first before the lower sections were added. The underside has wood planking (Slater's plastic sheet) and beams exposed with the gutters added. Brass rod was used for the downpipes due to their size and shape.

It's fair to say that I got a bit carried away with the interior, which includes fireplaces, tables and chairs, a till, glass cake counter and bunk-beds all made from plastic strip and card. Warm white LEDs are fitted with bright white micro-LEDs for the exterior station lighting.

A couple of cottages complete the buildings for the layout. The cottage at the north end appears in lots of photographs taken from the island platform. These provided good rear and side views to copy but the rest had to be made up. Wills white rendered stone sheets

were used for the walls and slate sheet for the roof.

Windows were cut out and a pack of Wills windows used with the smaller ones made from plastic strip. Plastic strip was also used for the wooden battens at the gable ends and roof edges with gutters added from half-round strip and rod for the downpipes. Chimneys were made from a bit of Milliput on the top of the stack with plastic rod and strip used to make the pots.

Parts from old brass frets were used to create the brasswork on the front door with letterbox, door handle and knocker all added to finish off once the door was painted. This can't be seen from any viewing angle but I know it's there! The cottage at the south end is a kit-bash from the old Hornby thatched cottage kit. The patio door and open window are made from plastic strip just to add a bit more interest along with the whirly-gig and chicken run.

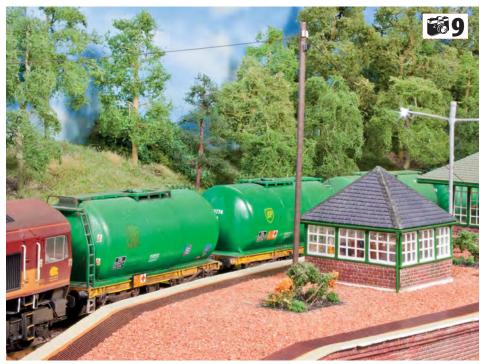
KEY DETAILS RETB STOP BOARDS



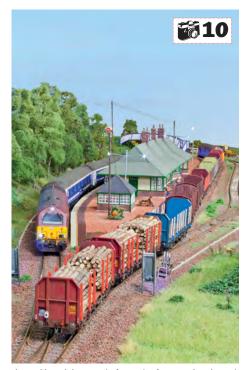
Since the mid-1980s the West Highland Line has been controlled by Radio Electronic Token Block (RETB) signaling. Passing loops have sprung operated points with 'STOP' boards positioned at the ends of the loops. Blue lights flash when the line is clear to proceed. I only discovered this from watching YouTube clips of

trains departing and decided this had to be included on the model. It was achieved using a simple four-function DCC decoder. The functions are set so that each pair of LEDs at the north and south ends have a function assigned to flash and another fixed 'on'. By simply turning the fixed function off the lights flash to

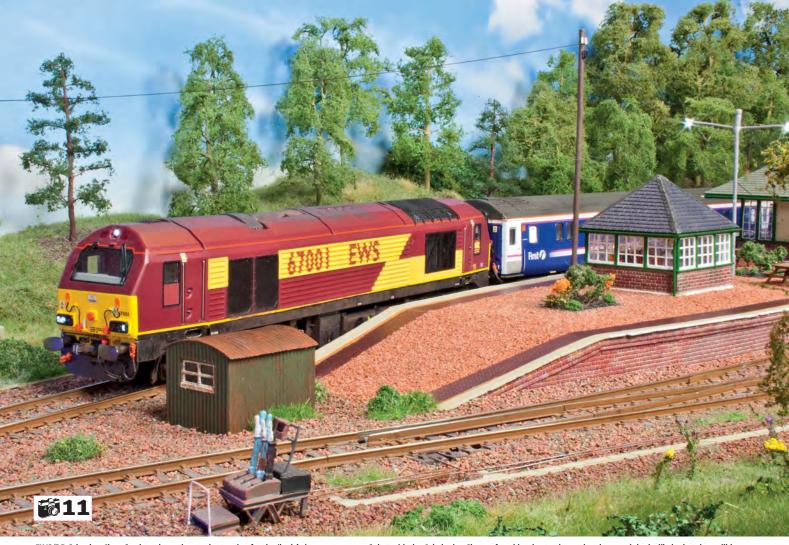
signal the line is clear to proceed. The boards were kindly made by Phil Holman and fitted at its first show. The RETB transmitter mast is modelled at the south end of the station along with Peco TPWS grids and the bright yellow posts are markers to ensure trains are clear to pass at the ends of the loops.



Neat touches such as the typical pink Scottish ballast platform surface and flowerbeds help to make the scene more authentic.



The northbound sleeper waits for a train of OTAs to clear the section.



EWS/DB Schenker Class 67s have been the regular traction for the 'beds' since summer 2006, but with the Caledonian Sleeper franchise due to change hands soon, it looks likely that they will be replaced by rebuilt Class 73/9s supplied by GB Railfreight. The Mk 3 sleeping cars are also on borrowed time, with new 'hotel trains' built by Spanish firm CAF due to be introduced by 2018.

ROLLING STOCK AND OPERATION

I wanted to create a representation of the trains that could be seen on the WHL from around 2005 onwards. This would still allow for a healthy mix of Class 37s alongside the Class 66s and 67s that were starting to take over. Watching YouTube video clips and pictures in magazines helped me to create various prototypical trains from the period. I've included the Fort William portion of the 'Caledonian Sleeper', Alcan tanks, BP tanks, Railtrack Autoballasters, engineers trains and timber traffic.

For added interest it's assumed that the paper mill at Corpach is still in operation sending paper by rail and receiving china clay from Cornwall. Empty coaching stock for 'The Jacobite' steam service also makes an appearance using modified Bachmann Mk I coaches with Railtec transfers to turn them into suitable West Coast Railway Company stock. Although not correct for the WHL, passenger services are formed using Bachmann Class 150/2 and 158 DMUs.

Some of my favourite locomotives, such as 37416 in its 'Royal Scotsman' maroon livery and modelled just how I saw it at Edinburgh, and the West Coast Railways pairing of 37676 Loch Rannoch and 37516, were created for me by Andi Walshaw. Stephen Cunningham weathered the rake of Autoballasters to match the colours seen on rakes used on the line. Nearly all the units and locomotives are fitted with Howes and now mainly Legomanbiffo ESU sound systems.

'Rannoch' took about three years to build and was only intended for home use. You can see the entire build within the layouts topic section on **RMweb** and I'm grateful for the amount of information and encouragement shared on there, which helped keep the build on course. I joined Diesel & Electric Modellers United part way into the build after meeting Phil and Alan on the DEMU stand at Glasgow. From getting involved in the area group activities and making many new friends along the way it has made exhibiting the layout possible thanks to all the 'Rannoch on the Road' crew. I have Stephen at Ayr and Kev at Barrow to thank for the first invitations before the layout was even finished, along with my wife for making some curtains to make it more presentable and Mike Bartle for lending me his lighting rigs.

Following suggestions at shows for ultimate realism I apparently need to create a DCC controlled swarm of midges and make the whirly-gig in the cottage garden operational. I still need to visit the real Rannoch station one-day as well! **BRM**



How do you find enough time for modelling?

I fit my modelling into any spare time I have. Even since becoming a dad for the first time, I still get the odd hour here and there to do things. I usually have a pile of bits or projects that I can pick up and do either on the layout or workbench at any one time and the variety helps maintain interest as you can pick something and continue where you left off.

How do you overcome problems that you encounter?

I find my membership of DEMU and Scottish Modellers to be very helpful and the wealth of knowledge is amazing. I would advise anyone to ask questions on the forum and quiz our group at shows.

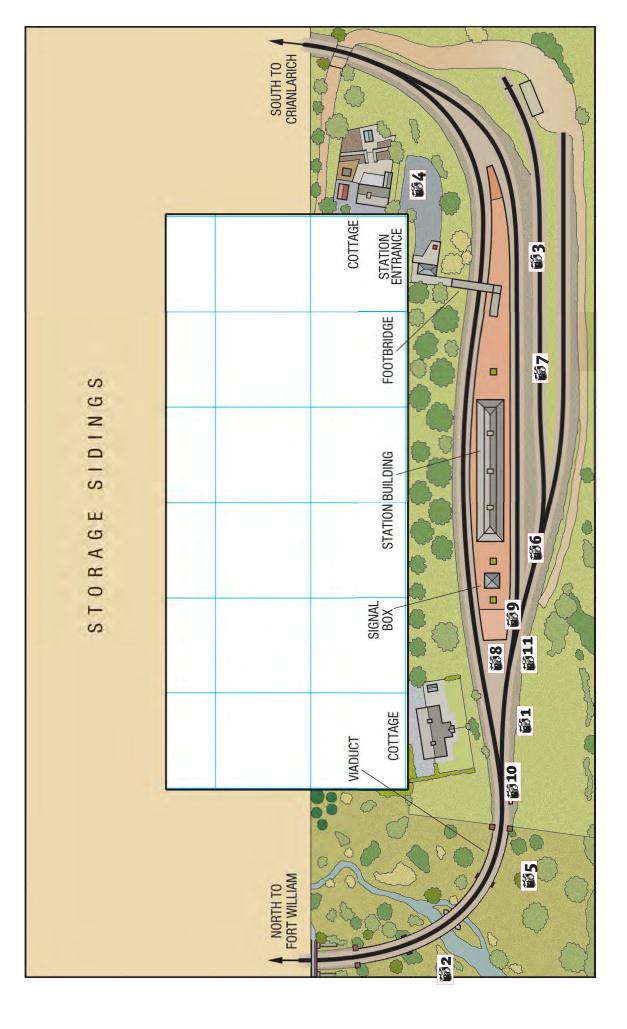
Where do you buy your models and materials?

I enjoy going to the Train Shop in Morecambe. I've shopped there for at least 20 years - since I was about 12. Richard - the owner - has always made me very welcome. Despite now living 200 miles away I still go on my way to visit family and friends in Barrow and Richard always keeps what I order for me. I also buy from exhibitions too as they are often the best place to see specialist suppliers and obtain detailing bits. My regular suppliers include

Harburn Hobbies, Cheltenham Model Centre, DC Kits (Legomanbiffo sounds) Railtec transfers. R3sprays, Carinsroadworks, Shawplan and Ten Commandments.

What developments would you like to see in the hobby?

I would like to see four-wheel chemical tank wagons produced, specifically 45t and 51t Caustic soda tanks, acetic acid types and CO₂ tanks for Speedlink workings (FTG Models intends to produce the latter - Ed.). Hopefully Bachmann will get round to these at some point. RTR 'Salmon' and 'Mullet' departmental wagons would also be great.







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PROJECT LAYOUT

WENS

Phil Parker continues his First World War field railway project with a look at how to construct a canal, add scenery and build some appropriate wagons.

he main feature on 'Owen's Bridge' is a canal. It is the reason for the bridge after all. According to photographs I found, French canals differ from their British counterparts in that they have wide sloping banks and often run in cuttings. There's no continuous towpath either.

This isn't a problem as all the normal scenic There are dozens techniques can be of products aimed used. Firstly, a smooth base for the water at the modeller who is created and then the banks are built up. These are much what the photographs I've watercourse. I'm sure an expert

for the moment my excuse is that I simply copied a photograph!

There are many methods and dozens of products aimed at the modeller who wishes to incorporate water into a layout. All have their uses but for the flat and relatively still water found in a dockside or canal, yacht varnish always works best for me. This is proved time and again by the number of people who tentatively prod the water at exhibitions to see if it is wet.

It's cheap and readily available, you might already have a can in the shed or garage

already. If not you can probably pick up one for a DIY job and then use the leftovers on your model railway. Unless you are building a lake, the quantity required isn't large but for the best effects, you'll need around seven coats to build up the apparent depth.

The enemy of realistic water is dust. You need to keep it out of the varnish while it is drying and then once finished, the water will need a polish every so often. For those putting the layout on display, adding a spray

can of furniture polish and a duster to the exhibition kit is also a good move. BRM



STEP-BY-STEP **GUIDE**

A lowered section of the baseboard formed the basic shape (as shown last month). Although the sides should slope to the water, I decided to do this with scenic material rather than form them in plywood which was beyond my basic carpentry skills.

BUILDING A CANAL



Sloping sides were created with strips of corrugated cardboard glued roughly in place. These didn't need to be perfect as the next stage was to cover them up. Normally I'd use plaster soaked bandage but as I didn't have any to hand some paper kitchen roll was dipped in household filler and draped over the banks.



The canal banks and surrounding landscape were treated to a thin coat of ready-mix filler to take away the flat baseboard look. The trick with this stuff is to wet your hands and smear it around so the surface has no sudden lumps, just gentle contours.



Colour arrives via emulsion matchpots. The earth is 'Nutmeg' and canal 'Java Bean' with streaks of grey, although the exact shades don't really matter. Once fully dry the water is given its first coat of varnish.

Right After a couple of coats of varnish, I covered the banks and surrounding groundwork with static grass. This was then sprayed with hair lacquer and coarse flock powder sprinkled over. Then it was back to varnishing after the 'water' had been cleaned of all the loose grass. The extra coats of varnish need to be carefully splodged around the banks so the grass on the edge is surrounded by water as though it were growing just below the surface. One problem you can see in the photographs is the wrinkly surface caused by applying too thick a coat of varnish. While it's not unrealistic – ripples in the water are natural after all – I'd have preferred a really flat surface.



For really good wet-looking water, nothing can beat seven or eight coats of Ronseal Yacht varnish. Don't be tempted to use a cheaper version as I found to my cost that this smells terrible and never really seems to fully dry. It's also clear, unlike the Ronseal version which has a hint of yellow in it that accentuates the apparent depth of the water.

TREES, POPPIES, LAYING TRACK...

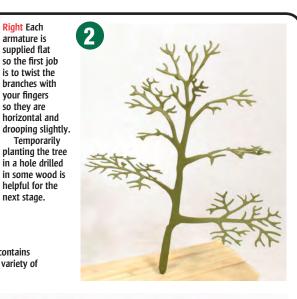
PRACTICAL

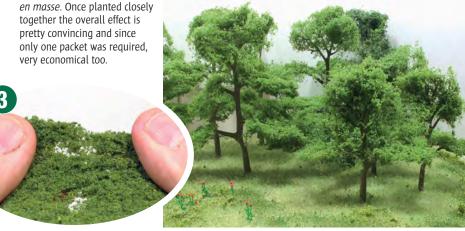
art of my plan with 'Owen's Bridge' was to disguise the tiny dimensions of the model by hiding the holes where the track passes through the backscene with some trees. In such a small space there's no chance to use the modelling clichés such as bridges or tunnels but this does the job pretty well. To get the results, I needed a reasonably dense forest. Building each model individually would be terrific but very time consuming. However, Hornby has some decent basic trees in the Skale Scenics range that are cheap enough to use

Right Densely packed foliage mats provide the leaves. Tease these out and then cut in to clumps before sticking them to the branches with PVA glue. Let this dry and then spray with hair lacquer and lightly sprinkle some of the contents of the flock packet over them.



Hornby's R8943 tree pack (RRP £12.10) contains everything required to make 16 trees in a variety of heights up to 14cm.

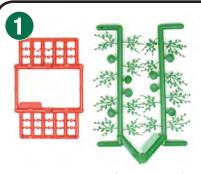

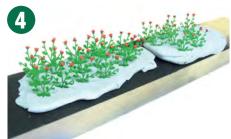
Plastic poppies from Busch (ref. 1255, £7.50) are sold in packs of 80, ready to assemble. Each plant is made up of a stem and flower heads moulded in appropriately coloured plastic.

The stems are fixed into the flowers while the latter is still on the sprue as this is easier than fiddling around with tiny parts on the workbench.





No special tools are required for assembly but I find that wire cutters are better at removing the poppy heads from the sprue. Cutting with a knife tends to send the flower flying. Revell plastic glue appears to be the best adhesive here, others don't seem to produce as strong a joint with this plastic.



Before planting on the layout, the plants are fixed in Blutack and sprayed with matt varnish to remove the plastic looking sheen.

POPPIES

The French and Belgian countryside suffered greatly from the ravages of war. Well-tended fields quickly became a devastated wasteland. As farmers tried to restore their land once the battle front had moved on, they discovered that clumps of poppies started to appear. The seeds can lay dormant under the earth for many years but once disturbed, in the warmth of the 1915 springtime, they started to grow again.

Inspired by a poem entitled 'We Shall Not Sleep' by John MacRae, American Moina Michael put her energies in to persuading the War Department to adopt the Flanders Poppy as a symbol of remembrance, starting the tradition that continues to this day.

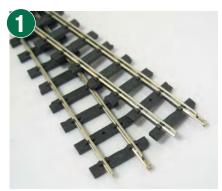
I thought it would be a nice touch to sow a few miniature poppies in the fields around Owen's Bridge, as a small tribute to those killed in the conflict whose aftermath I was modelling.



LAYING TRACK

ur trackplan is a simple oval with a single siding – not so different from what you find in some train sets. With such a simple plan I've even used sectional track for convenience. It's certainly the easiest way to lay nice neat curves.

In fact, the tracklaying is utterly conventional. Everything here will also work on a OO gauge layout.



Peco's new 009 Setrack is easy to use although possibly a little too neat for a WW1 field railway. For the longer straights over the bridge and behind the scenes the matching flexitrack reduces the number of joints.



Where pins are to be used, it's worth drilling slightly in to the wood first. Use a 0.5mm drill bit in a pin vice turned by hand. No need for power tools here.



All the track was hand-painted with Humbrol track colour (No.173) and then the rail tops cleaned with a rubber before the paint had fully dried. On larger layouts, spraying is much quicker.



Fine ballast from Greenscene was brushed into place and fixed with a PVA/water mix. Prototype images show the ballast disappearing into the surrounding earth. Brown emulsion adds some appropriate colour.



Setrack doesn't really need to be nailed down most of the time. Lay it on some PVA or double sided carpet tape and it's possible to let the ballast do the job of holding it in place permanently.



A small hammer should push even the thin Peco pins in to the wood. Don't hammer them all the way down at this stage though.

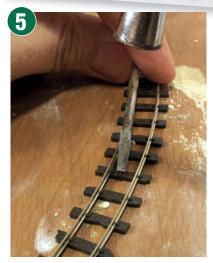

On narrow track such as this or N gauge, the final push needs to be made with a narrow punch to avoid whacking the rails. If one isn't available, the flat blade of a screwdriver will do. Don't nail things too hard, the sleepers should not bend or the track will distort.



Let the glue dry for 24 hours before using static grass anywhere near the track. A few fibres sticking through are appropriate but the effect I was after wasn't a completely overgrown railway.

TURN OVER TO SEE HOW THE WAGONS WERE BUILT...



PRACTICAL BRANCH

ast month I built a locomotive for the layout, so now it's time for some rolling stock for it to haul. Huge numbers of wagons were built and operated during the conflict. Some, like those for moving field guns were very specialised. Mostly though, both sides used open wagons and vans just like any other railway. Mind you, they were used for both goods, personnel and even as mobile workshops.

After hostilities ended, many wagons were shipped back to Britain and sold off cheaply to narrow gauge railways to replace older stock. Thus, you could find these vehicles all around the country.

Even when the bodies had passed their best, the bogies soldiered on and you can find at least one pair on the Ffestiniog Railway today under a passenger coach.

Narrow gauge wagon building doesn't have to be any harder than putting together a standard gauge kit. In fact, for bogie vehicles, the one-piece mouldings mean it is hard not to end up with a running vehicle. In fact the biggest problem is squeezing in some weight; the plastic models are very light indeed. Perhaps the best solution is to add some loads under which you can hide a bit of lead.

At least the livery is simple – grey paint with black metalwork. In service the wagons would be pretty filthy so I've run some Games Workshop shading paint into the woodwork as a starting point, but more work with weathering powders will follow.

Next month we'll look at adding the ruined farm buildings and final details.

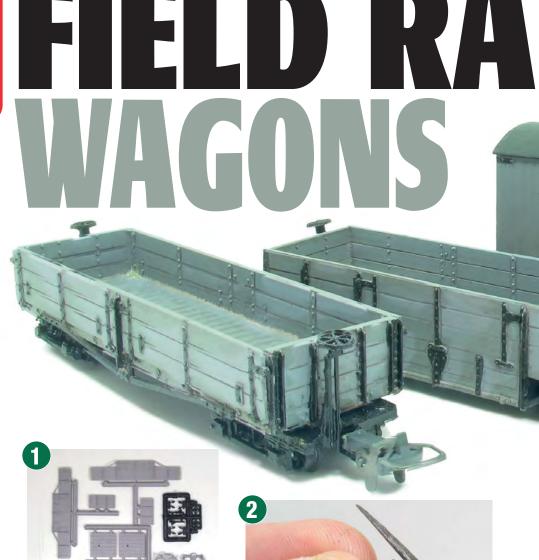

If you've ever built a plastic wagon kit, the contents of the Parkside packets will be familiar. A good feature is the one-part moulded bogie, saving the builder the effort of accurately assembling the running gear.

Running will be improved if the tips of the pinpoints are trimmed back with two or three strokes of a needle file. This shortens the axle and makes it spin freely in the plastic axle boxes.

WD MODEL KITS

The four-wheel chassis is made up of plastic mouldings, although these have to be assembled by the modeller. Bodywork is a series of resin castings. The runners for these are substantial and easier to cut away with a fine saw than trim with a knife.



Chassis construction is a little fiddly but if care is taken, a free rolling model will be the result. The body requires superglue as plastic solvent won't work. The corners are moulded with a thin overlap which requires careful handling until fixed as it is a little fragile.

COUPLINGS

Parkside kits (bottom) are designed to use ready-made BEMO couplings. The tails of these have to be shortened before fitting on to the mountings provided. The W^D models kits (top) and locomotive use Greenwich couplings, an etched device that is compatible with the BEMO but less chunky.



The Greenwich is supplied in pairs as a flat etch that has to be formed with pliers. It's important that the loop pivots freely so time spent opening out the holes slightly will pay off with reliable operation.





Axles clip in to the bogie frames and then brake gear is added. The black projections at the end of the bogie are mountings for BEMO couplings.

After this the body is assembled as per the instructions. At the corners, the plates are moulded to overlap so they can be trimmed back after the glue dries for a perfect finish.

HOW TO MODEL...

TORNADO'S SUPPORT COACH

Since its completion in 2008, Tornado has proved hugely popular in model form, but if you're running it on the main line you'll need a support coach. James Reid shows how he modelled the A1's extensively refurbished Mk 1 companion.

he A1 Steam Locomotive Trust recently produced a limited edition, by Bachmann, of its Mk 1 support coach E21249. The model was made available to the general public after the Trust's own members orders were fulfilled.

Having purchased one, I assembled as much information as was available at the time before starting work. This came from the internet and published magazines and made it clear that many alterations had been made to the vehicle to make it suitable for its new role. In fact, many thousands of pounds were invested in transforming this once-derelict Mk 1 Brake Composite Corridor (BCK) into

'better than new' condition with modern electrics/electronics, staff facilities and a space for the A1 Trust sales stand.

As befits a support coach intended to be out on the main lines of the UK for long periods, a kitchen was installed in one of the compartments. I have endeavoured to replicate this by modeling a cooker, sink, fridge and cupboards made from various thicknesses of plastic card, suitably painted and, of course, a chef. The most obvious visual requirement was to paint the bottom 4mm of the kitchen window white on the inside. Again, using available photographs, I applied representative signage and panels on the internal corridor walls. **BRM**

STEP-BY-STEP **GUIDE**





A kitchen was installed in one of the compartments including a cooker, sink, fridge and cupboards made from various thicknesses of plastic card, suitably painted and a chef.



To match the prototype, 4mm of the kitchen window was painted white on the inside - a distinctive feature of E21249 since its rebuild.



The steps on the coach ends were removed along with the handrails. Replacement handrails were formed from nickel silver wire with small off-cuts of plastic card forming the water filler covers.



After suitably painting the coach interior, seats and floor, I installed several figures in the compartments to represent A1 Trust members and the support crew.

Two integral electric LED tail lights were fitted to the prototype at each end and these were re-created using plastic card and Hobbycraft red self adhesive jewels. A Kadee No. 5 coupling was fitted at the rear along with a Keen sprung end plate as the BCK would be coupled to a fixed rake of coaches.





STEP-BY-STEP **GUIDE**

Air brake pipes and vacuum brake hoses pipes were fitted to the dragbeam on either side of the couplings.

Cabinets for the extra electrical equipment were found in the spares box and positioned on the chassis solebars, based on photographs obtained from the internet.



The roof ventilators were removed from the roof carefully and new vents installed to suit the layout of the prototype. As the coach now has a generator set, an exhaust outlet was fitted too.

Finally, as the coach was going to be coupled to a locomotive at the front end, a screw link coupling was fitted to the leading end. A BR style end cover was placed



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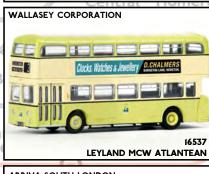




















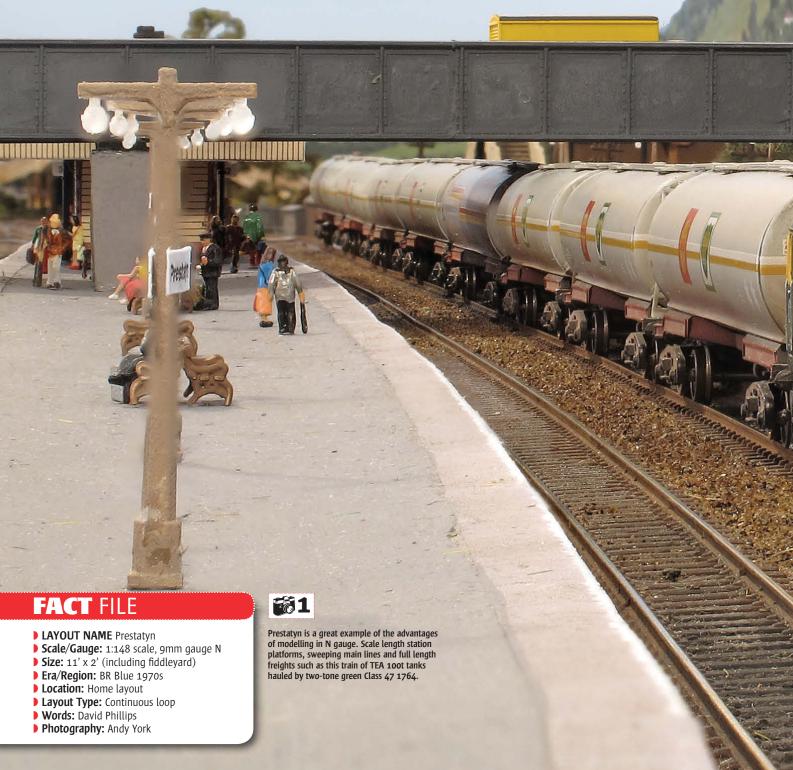

Crossharbour

If you're living far away from where you grew up, a model railway can help you to relive those rose-tinted childhood days and the trains of your youth, as *David Phillips* explains.









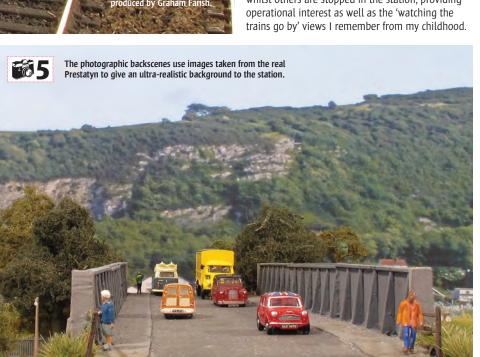


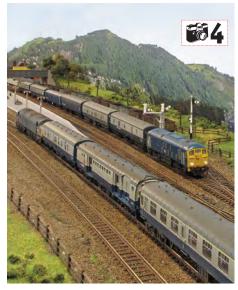
was born in Prestatyn, a seaside town on the most northerly point of the North Wales Coast, in the Summer of 1966. It was not the most auspicious period in British railway history, but I spent 25 years in the town before moving to London. My father had worked on the railways as had his father before him, so it was inevitable that I developed an interest in railways from an early age. A Tri-ang 'Big Big Train' was my first proper train set (I still have it!). Many layouts in various scales followed over the years, most little more than an expansion of the train set on a board, until January 2011 when I joined **RMweb** and became enthralled with the layouts on display. These depicted a far greater level of realism than I had thus far demonstrated. Experiencing the enthusiasm among the forum members to help and encourage a new modeller, coupled with the desire to build something more worthy of my time and effort led to a new beginning; and so Prestatyn in N was born.

I have always had a real fondness for Prestatyn station; its long, slender gently-curving platforms; the semaphore signals that exist even today and the booking office/main building which survived from LNWR times. It has only recently been removed to be replaced by an exact replica. I loved sitting on Platform 2 - which faces South and used to get really hot, gazing out onto the mountain behind, whilst waiting for the trains to pass through and guessing which platform they would take as they thundered up the coast from Chester.

The sheer variety of rail traffic which has passed through the station in the last half century is amazing and was another reason for choosing this location. From humble DMUs to locomotive-hauled expresses and Super Voyagers; from Freightliner container trains to ballast trains and nuclear flasks, just about every type of diesel locomotive seen in the UK, and pretty much every type of passenger vehicle and freight carrier has passed through.

There have also been many steam specials gracing the North Wales Coast, so plenty of excuses to run out the famous locomotives and pretty coaches! Not all trains stopped at Prestatyn, so there's plenty of scope for trains to run through whilst others are stopped in the station, providing operational interest as well as the 'watching the trains go by' views I remember from my childhood.





Class 24s and Class 40s were common in North Wales throughout the 1970s, as demonstrated by these Graham Farish models working parcels and TPO trains.

COMPRESSION

I decided to model the station trackplan as laid out in 1962, before the Up Slow line was removed. This gives Up and Down main lines with their respective Slow lines; I also included the bay platform by the signalbox at the west end, but left out the branch line to Dyserth due to space constraints.

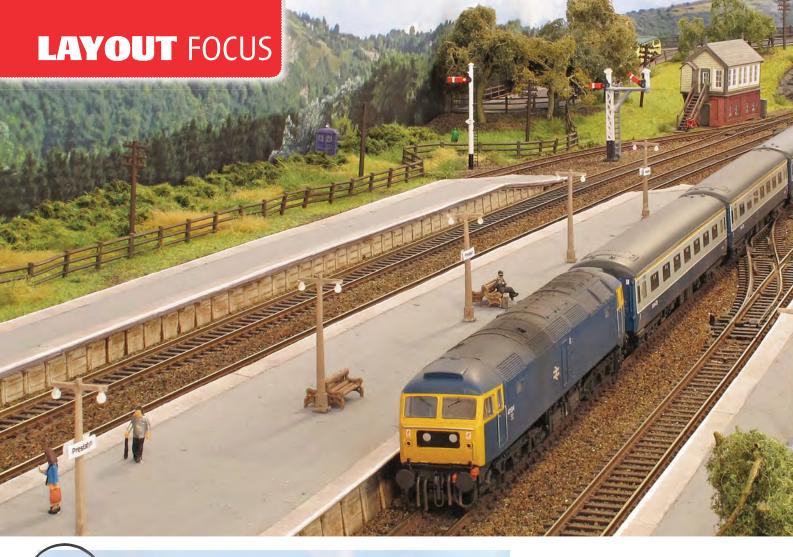
The layout is 11' by 2' 2"; this was the space available so the prototype had to be compressed to ensure it fitted with all the salient details still present. These included the station building, signalbox, overbridge, footbridge, four-track crossing including single slip at the West end of the platforms, and the old Victorian footbridge upon which I used to stand as Class 40s and 47s roared underneath!

The central island platform at Prestatyn is 860' long, not including end ramps, and 20' wide at each end. Approximately 517' from the west end is the first of the overbridge supports, which is also the widest part of the platform at 31'. The curve is more accentuated on the Down (south facing) side by about a foot, so the platform bows out by 5' on the Up side and 6' on the Down side. In 2mm scale, this equates to 1,720mm long and 40mm wide at each end; the widest part being 1,034mm from the west end and 62mm wide. Assuming an end ramp length of 20' that makes it 900' long, so 1,800mm in 2mm:1ft scale. The other platforms are approximately 10' wide and follow the curve of the island platform.

All this came out slightly too long for the space available to I decided to adopt the 'rule of thirds'. For example, rather than having the platforms at 1,800mm long I could shorten them by about 559mm (22") to 1,219mm (48"), but still retain the gentle curved profile of the original. The latter would accommodate a Class 40 and seven Mk 1/2 coaches with room to spare at each end, so this was the way to go; a locomotive and seven coaches represents the majority of inter-regional workings, and the expresses (which mainly passed through) could be eight or nine coaches at a push, which I thought was more than enough. I had to shorten the HST to 2+7 from the more prototypical 2+8 but that was a small price to pay.

In working all this out I also discovered that prior to 1961 (when the platforms were lengthened) the station was roughly the same length as my model





(EY) DETAILS BUILDINGS

All the buildings and bridges are kits or scratchbuilt as there was nothing close in the ready-to-plant market. For the station building I rebuilt the old Prototype Models LNWR kit and the signalbox is a modified Metcalfe kit. The bay signal is a Dapol item; the bracket signals await replacing with working models once they become available.



and the pointwork actually ran into the station area, as does mine. It was only moved away from the west end with the lengthening upgrade. So I actually have a prototypical trackplan that works for me albeit from another era; but then it's a representative layout not a scale rendition!

FLEXIBILITY

The baseboards were built from 9mm ply on a 2" x 1" frame, and are lifted up on 4' 6" legs in order to clear all the stuff underneath; this is a great operating height as you can look into the layout

rather than onto it, and enter into the operation much more easily. It also makes for easy tracklaying and scenic work as you don't have to constantly bend over to paint or glue things together.

The era represented can be changed quite easily as the basic infrastructure has remained unchanged since the 1960s, and indeed the station building has just been rebuilt to original London & North Western Railway (LNWR) specifications! By swapping the stock and road vehicles I can change the whole layout from 1970s BR blue to 2000s Arriva Trains Wales/Virgin Trains in just a few minutes.

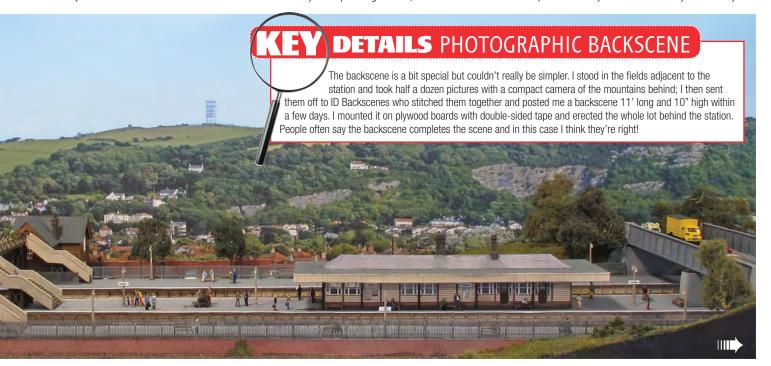
All the track in the scenic section is Peco code 55 finescale laid on Gaugemaster foam ballast strip – this has been augmented with loose ballast and heavily weathered. All other track is Peco code 80; all the points are electrofrog and changed using Peco switches. I use a Gaugemaster Q four-track controller and HF2 track cleaner and have never had any problems with performance; testimony to the running qualities of the stock as well as the track!

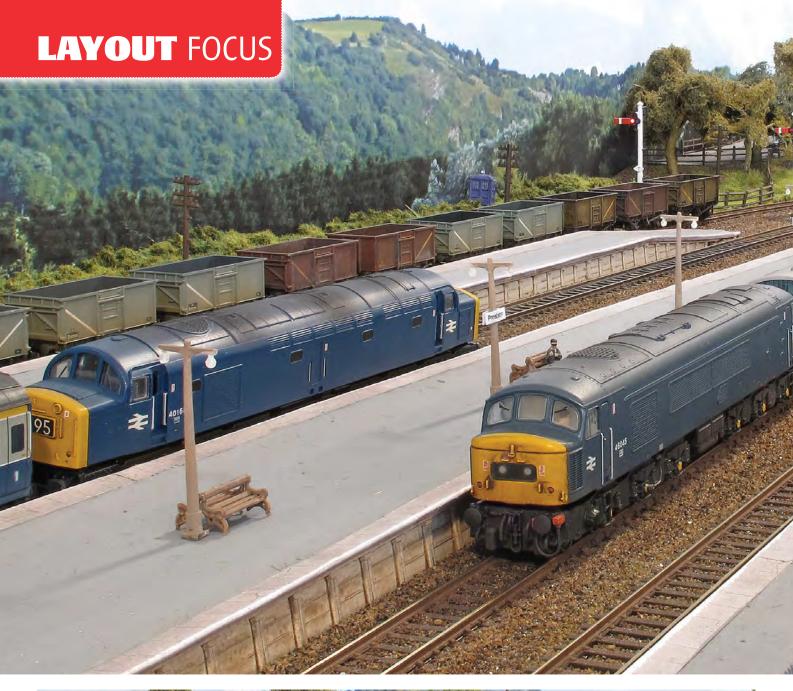
The fiddleyard has five loops for each main line meaning there can be ten trains available for any one operating session, and each side can

accommodate up to ten-coach expresses in the longest loops.

Scenery is from Woodland Scenics, and the superb Static Grass Applicator from FMR provided the power behind the grass effects in between. I've tried to replicate the mix of virulent weeds and hedges amongst dead grasses and a mixture of trees which typifies The Morfas behind the station.

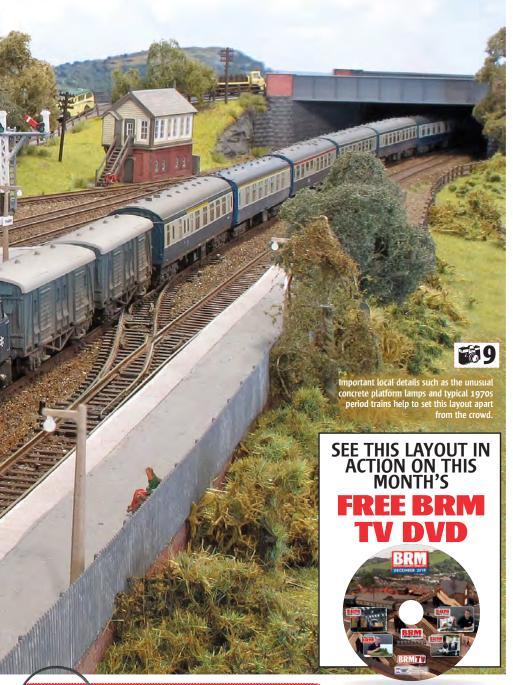
Figures are from Bachmann, Modelscene and eBay. I've tried to position them so they look natural and free-flowing rather than motion-captured which you see on some layouts. If they're

not moving they shouldn't look like they are!

Virtually all the stock is from the current range of Graham Farish and Dapol, and most of it has been detailed and weathered by Pauline McKenna at Millfields Models. I learned early on that my abilities didn't include the finer points of such skills so I decided to leave that side of things to the professionals. It's been well worth the additional cost.

All the passenger and freight rakes are prototypical, and I have photographs of the prototype of virtually every train run on the layout; this way I know I can't get them wrong! The main focus for me has always been the trains themselves so I try to make sure all the details are included, including corridor doors and tail lamps on the end coach, or brown staining around the rusty hinges on the front of a Class 40 – these are the things which make the layout believable and give me the most pleasure in running the trains.

As well as railway modelling, I play bass guitar to professional standard and have a 'nine to five' job in the Public Sector. I am also an Elder at Living Stones Evangelical Church where I play bass guitar and preach every Sunday, and am a father to two teenage daughters, so time is at a premium! It has taken me two years to bring Prestatyn to a stage where I am happy to lean back and watch the trains go by without feeling 'I really must...' but I'm sure there'll be other bits to do as we go.

I have thoroughly enjoyed the experience of building a layout based on a prototype, but know I couldn't have done it without the invaluable help and encouragement of all those who contributed to the layout thread with suggestions, hints and tips along with expertise in so many areas that I simply couldn't have sourced myself.

Looking to the future, I intend to re-wire the fiddleyard with IRDOT (infra-red sensor) technology to allow automated sequences to take place, but that may be some way off as I'm pretty useless at electronics! As well as finishing off Prestatyn I'm also hoping to build a model of Llangollen station in the present day, in OO this time - steam locomotives and old Mk 1s galore! The thread is already up on RMweb and I welcome all contributions. BRM

KEY DETAILS FLEXIBILITY

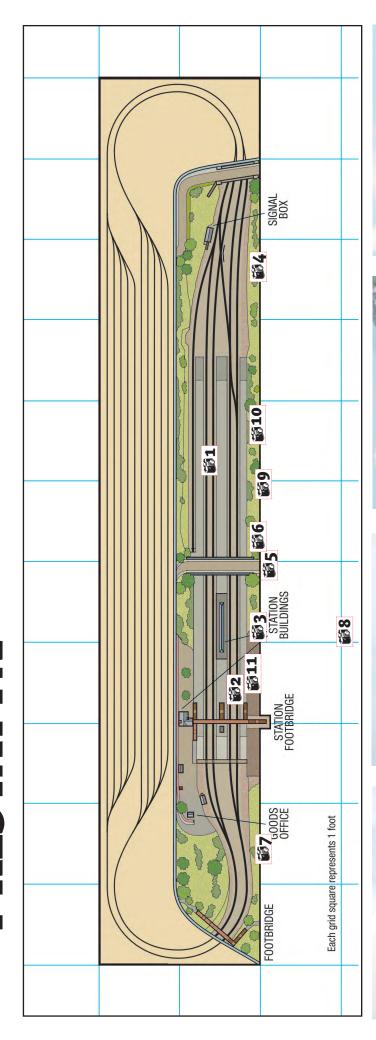
Modelling a location that hasn't altered much over the decades can be a wise choice, especially if your collection includes models from different periods. While other locations along the North Wales Coast have changed radically

since the 1960s, Prestatyn retains much of its original character, allowing me to run 1970s BR blue diesels or, in this case, Virgin Voyagers and Arriva DMUs from the 2000s.





TOF THE MONTH







David's fleet includes most of the necessary locomotive types for the North Wales Coast in the 1970s. Class 24s and 40s were very common and appear frequently, alongside Class 45s, 47s and various types of DMU.



Passengers wait on the central island platform as a class 24/0 chunters away at the head of a parcels train. By the 1970s, these locomotives had been relegated to secondary duties such as local freight, departmental and lightweight parcels trains.



Modellers of the 1970s are now fortunate to have a wide selection of period road vehicles from which to choose. This British Rail yellow Leyland FG flatbed is a BT Models product, ideal for parking in a lineside yard or depot.

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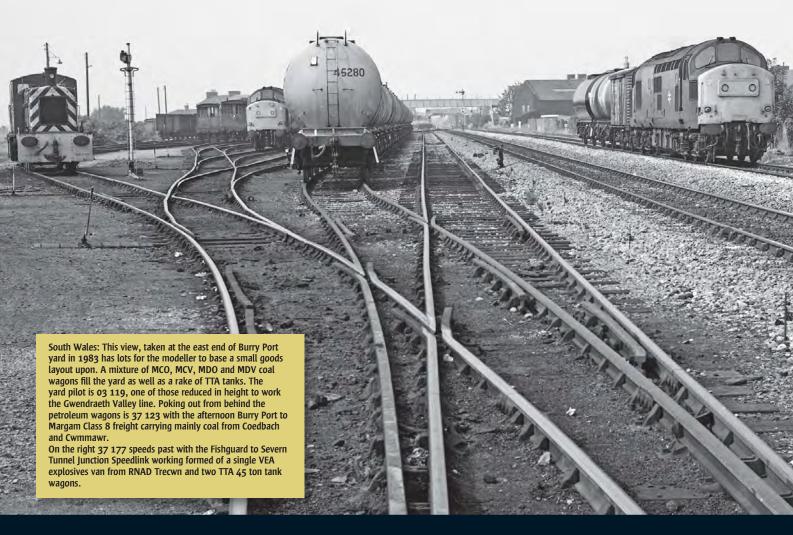

PART 3: SPEEDLINK TRAINS

In his third collection of archive photographs from the 1980s/90s, *Michael Rhodes* presents a diverse selection of modelleable Speedlink trains from around Britain.





Humberside: Back in 1980, Hull still saw several Speedlink trips to the many sidings around the town. Here the afternoon Saltend to Hull New Yard trip is seen passing through Hull Docks. The two Class 20s, 20 008 and 20 217 are hauling a solitary acetic acid tank. The latter is not available as a ready-to-run model, but can be found in kit form.



Tyneside: Amazingly this two wagon train is 6563, the Scunthorpe to Aberdeen Speedlink, seen here in 1985, behind 31 247 at Ouston Junction, south of Tyne Yard. The first wagon is a BDA bogie bolster (Bachmann/Farish) carrying steel from Scunthorpe, whilst the second is a Railfreight HEA coal hopper with coal from South Yorkshire coalfield, attached at Doncaster for domestic depots in Scotland.

PROTOTYPE INSPIRATION

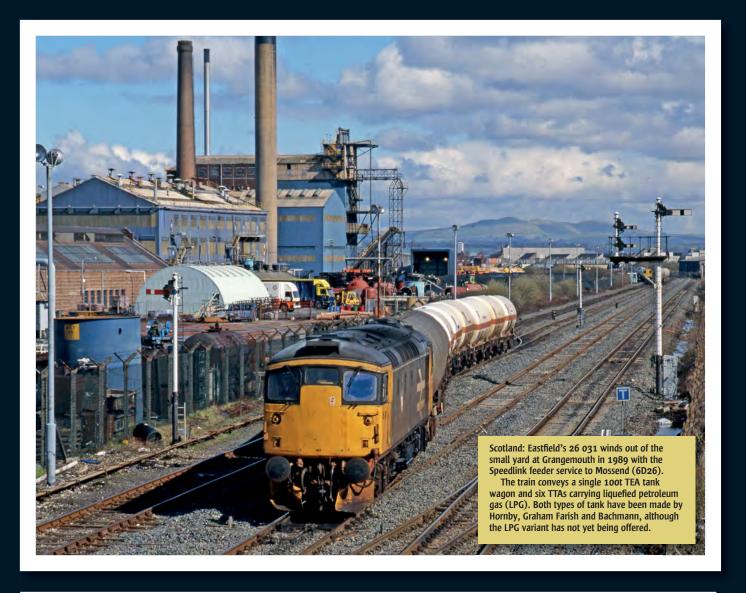


Merseyside: Passing Rock Ferry in 1983 with the daily Birkenhead to March Whitemoor Speedlink is 25 251. It arrived a couple of hours earlier on the 6M90 Speedlink from Whitemoor, delivering several wagons of grain for export and is now returning with two empty Polybulk wagons, destined for East Anglia. Bachmann/Graham Farish offer OO/N models of Class 25s and Polybulk bogie hoppers.



Fife: BR blue 26 027 arrives at Methil Docks with 6G01, the Speedlink trip from Thornton Yard. When this image was taken in 1986 there was a large import traffic of wood pulp from Scandinavia for paper manufacture. Most of it was carried in VDA vans (as seen in the second wagon). Behind the '26' is a unique experimental wagon converted from an OBA open wagon for this traffic and given a TOPS code of OEA – perhaps some courageous modeller will be able to convert the Bachmann OBA? With Heljan and Dapol making the Class 26, modellers have excellent models of these locomotives in N, OO and O gauge.







Cheshire: During the late-1980s and early-1990s, Class 20s were commonplace around Warrington on MGR coal trains to Fiddlers Ferry power station. They were also often used on Speedlink trips, as here with 20 007 and 20 166. The train is reversing past the photographer and is in fact the Warrington to Allerton Speedlink trip delivering fuel oil to the depot. With Bachmann producing excellent models of Class 20s and TTAs in 00 and N, this is another short freight which can be replicated exactly on a small layout.



KMRC's second exclusive OO gauge model will depict this lovely little William Adams tank locomotive, most famously used in Cornwall and on the Isle of Wight. *Ben Jones* gets a sneak preview. *Photography: Tony Wright*

n the September issue of BRM, Tony Wright cast his expert eye across Heljan's model of the Gresley O2 2-8-0. This month, thanks to Kernow

Model Rail Centre, we preview another pre-production model given the same designation, but very different in size, origin and intended use.

Having successfully worked with Dapol to produce a Beattie 2-4-0WT in OO gauge a couple of years ago, KMRC announced the Adams O2 as the follow up. As a class strongly associated with the Southern's 'Withered Arm' in the West Country, it was an obvious choice for the Camborne-based retailer.

Add a shortage of small Southern

tank locomotives, a very pretty little prototype, numerous detail variations and liveries into the mix and it's easy to see why KMRC took the plunge.

For various reasons, development of the model has been slower than anticipated, but this latest engineering prototype from DJ Models has recently been signed off by KMRC, allowing the project to move to the next stage – decoration. Once the factory-decorated samples are approved, KMRC will give the go-ahead for production to start, with the first batch of models hopefully arriving in the UK in early-2015.

Very kindly loaned for inspection is the engineering prototype for K2103, which will depict No. 30182 in BR lined black with the early emblem and fitted with push-pull equipment and a Westinghouse air pump.

Westinghouse air pump.

The very busy front end of the model displays a wealth of fine detail, with wire air pipes around the Westinghouse pump, air tanks, separately fitted small details such as the auto-control gear and wire handrails all contributing to a superbly detailed feel. Likewise, the detail in and around the cab, accurately shaped body, die-cast metal wheels, fluted coupling rods and fine running

gear make for a model that is impressive and charming in equal measure.

As a late-condition mainland 02, it will be an ideal companion for another KMRC exclusive being produced by DJ Models – the LSWR 'Gate Stock' pushpull coaches. Isle of Wight locomotives will differ in several respects, not least the redesigned and extended coal bunker and lack of push-pull gear. However, across the seven models there will be numerous detail variations to suit livery, period and area of use.





Introduced in 1889 to work suburban trains, 60 O2s were built and gradually cascaded to the country for branch line work as larger classes replaced them on increasingly heavy trains in and around London. A batch was also transferred to the Isle of Wight in the mid-1920s, famously working there until 1967.

For this month's 'BRM TV' DVD programme, we gave the O2 a thorough running test on Graham Hobbs' garden railway and it performed reliably, smoothly and quietly, even in less than ideal conditions. The five-pole motor drives both leading axles and brass pick-ups have been provided on the bogie axles – essential on such a diminutive machine.

Although largely built in plastic, the model is given much-needed weight by the metal chassis block and accurately shaped frames, which are visible ahead of the driving wheels.

Anyone who has the 'Beattie' will be familiar with the method for installing a DCC decoder; the smokebox door is cleverly held in place by magnets and can simply be popped off to reveal a six-pin socket in the smokebox.

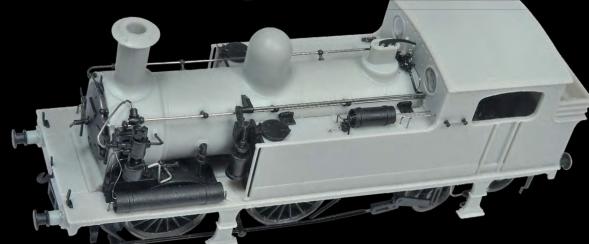
Interestingly for such a small locomotive, it has been designed for the installation of sound. Lifting out the coal load in the bunker reveals enough space for a speaker and two wires fed through specifically for this purpose. It's a clever piece of design that should

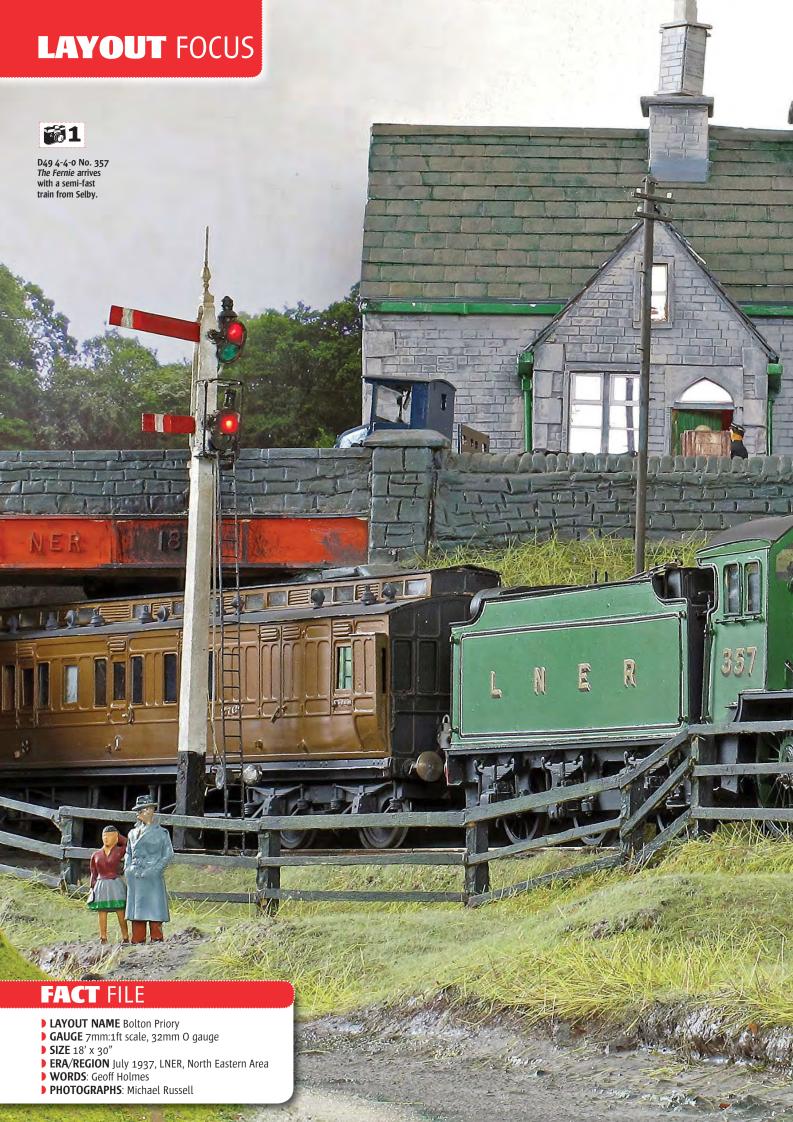
help more people to fit their own DCC sound.

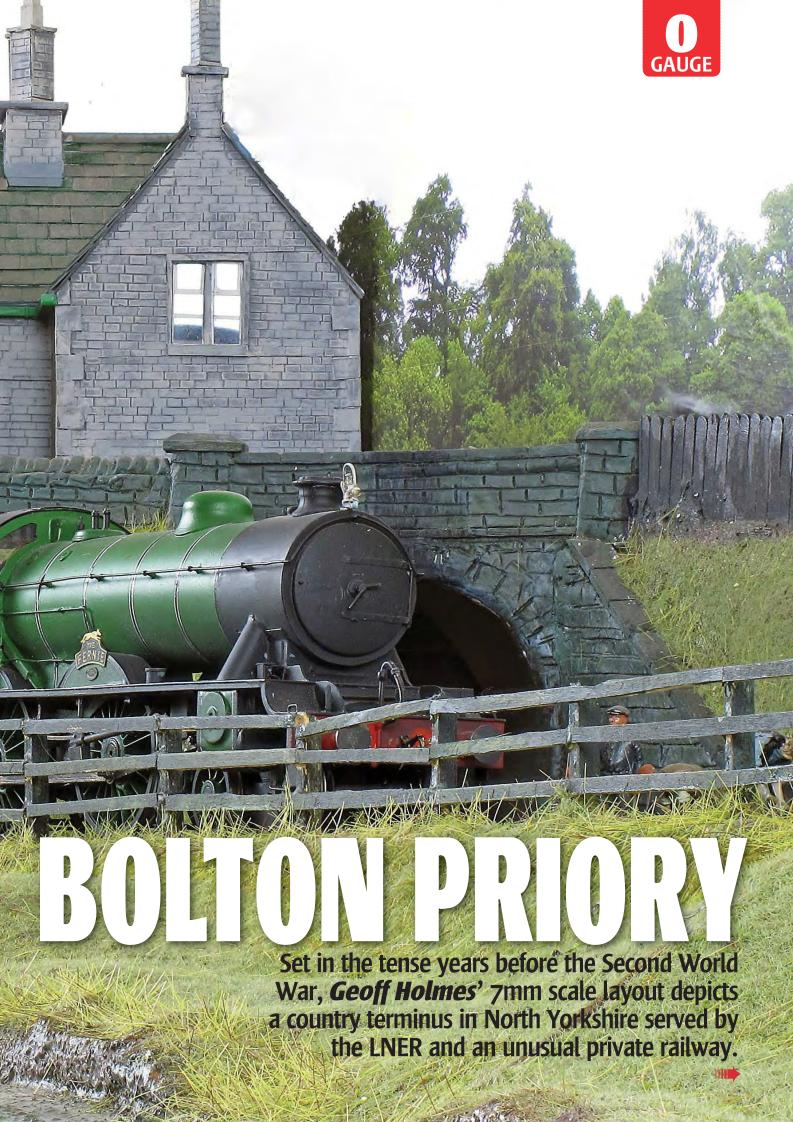

LAYOUT FOCUS

any years ago I was given a Hornby 'Royal Scot' electric train set for Christmas. Many of you will have seen this strange locomotive that came out as a 4-4-2 with a large bulb in the centre of the smokebox door. It may not have been very realistic, but it started a lifelong interest in model railways. It was Christmas 1936, Berlin had just hosted the Olympic Games and there was a general feeling of unrest in the country. Nevertheless to me it was pure heaven and with Dad's assistance, or my hindrance, my whole bedroom was very soon taken up with model railways. Much of this first layout was donated by relatives.

This was my start in the hobby, but it was soon rudely interrupted. It was never again run and it was the 1950s before I was able to continue the hobby. My two daughters were as keen as I was so a Tri-ang 'Jinty' and a 'Princess Royal' took me into the OO gauge scene. I stayed with 4mm scale until 2008 when I sold off my EM gauge modern image layout and turned back to O gauge. What got me started again was a Jim McGeown NER G5 0-4-4T kit; a thank you from a friend for whom I had done some work.

'Bolton Priory' is my current and, I feel sure, last layout. Although I was brought up in LMS territory, and having worked for the Midland Region of BR, my real passion was the North Eastern Area of the LNER. I reasoned that the area near to my home was a good location for a 'might have been' prototype.

Back in 1876 the NER co-operated with the Midland Railway on the Ilkley & Otley Joint Line to get to Ilkley from Arthington Junction. The MR was in no hurry to connect Skipton to Ilkley and



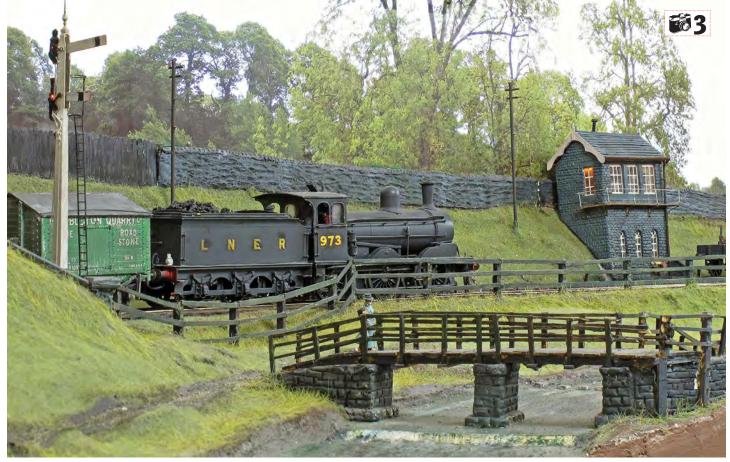

the **Duke of Devonshire**, who has a large estate at Bolton Abbey, wanted a rail outlet for his stone and timber traffic from Hambleton Quarry and the sawmills. He also regularly entertained other members of the aristocracy, including royalty, at his home on the Priory Estate. So, with my imagination running riot, I could see him offering land to the NER to build a branch from Ilkley to Bolton Priory leaving via a triangular junction at Ilkley Gasworks, sweeping down to the banks of the River Wharfe and running via Addingham (Wharfeside) to a terminal station, not a stone's throw away from his home. I also envisaged a feeder line to the aforementioned sawmill and quarry. His only

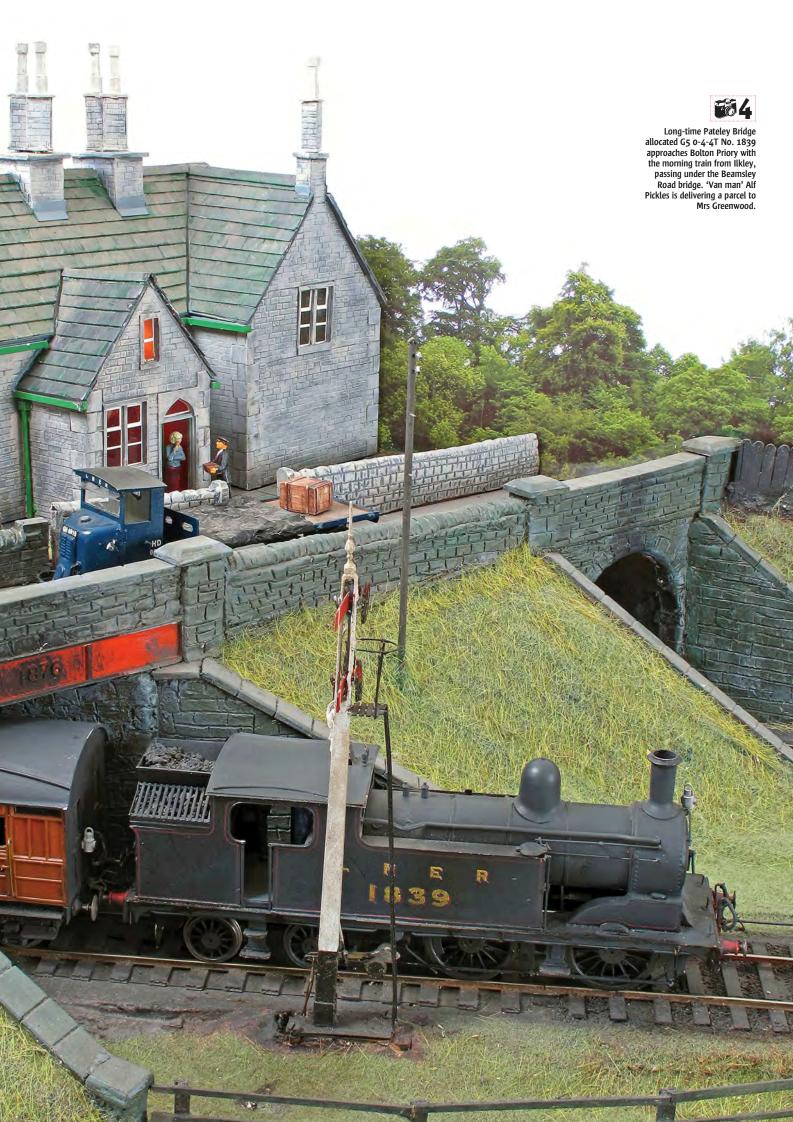
stipulation was that the station be built as close as possible to the style of Richmond in North Yorkshire.

MAKING IT WORK

My railway room and workshop is 18' long, so I had to think carefully about how much of this scenario, or rather how little, would look realistic in the space available. To allow me to run fairly prototypical branch trains I needed a fiddleyard some 6' long, but this was going to make the visible length too short. So I compromised and built four 4' 6" by 30" baseboards of which three are fully scenic. Another consideration was that, as a retired person, I had to be careful with expenditure. Luckily my

(EY) DETAILS SCRAPBOX SCENICS

Many small items of lineside bric-a-brac can be seen around the layout, most obviously the platform furniture. Many of these were built from scrap materials. The platform seating is brass rod bent to shape and off-cuts of old etchings. The wheelbarrows, both two and fourwheeled, are fabricated the same way using small brass washers for wheels. The Pooley weighing scale on the platform is scrap brass, but the weighbridge in the yard is made from modelling clay marked out

by hand, the latter being completed at the time as scribing all the setts in the goods yard. In the coal siding can be seen a couple of one hundred weight scale bag loaders, which all coal merchants used in railway yards, again made from the scrap box.

Another prominent item is the loading gauge, built from a timber post sanded to shape, with the arm and bar at the top made from scrap brass.

Platform lamps were made from square section brass tube. The glass at the top was cut from commercial 12-way electrical connectors with the brass portion removed and a grain of wheat bulb pushed inside. The wire supplying the current passes down through the tube and the whole thing is topped

off with a plastic card hood. The water tank was also built in plastic-card with a brass ladder; the base being constructed in the same way as the station walls. The NER did not build cattle pens at its wayside stations, preferring instead to use hurdles to form pens, often on the passenger platforms, which were sparsely used at many rural locations. At Bolton Priory they are a feature of the wooden platform extension and the hurdles are, as you might expect, built out of old etched frets.

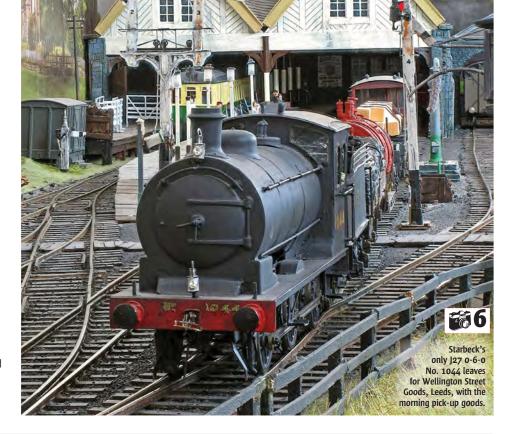
I must now admit to actually spending on figures, milk churns, barrels, packing cases and also the Scammell mechanical horse delivering parcels on the bridge. The lorry in the yard is an item of military hardware which I was given.

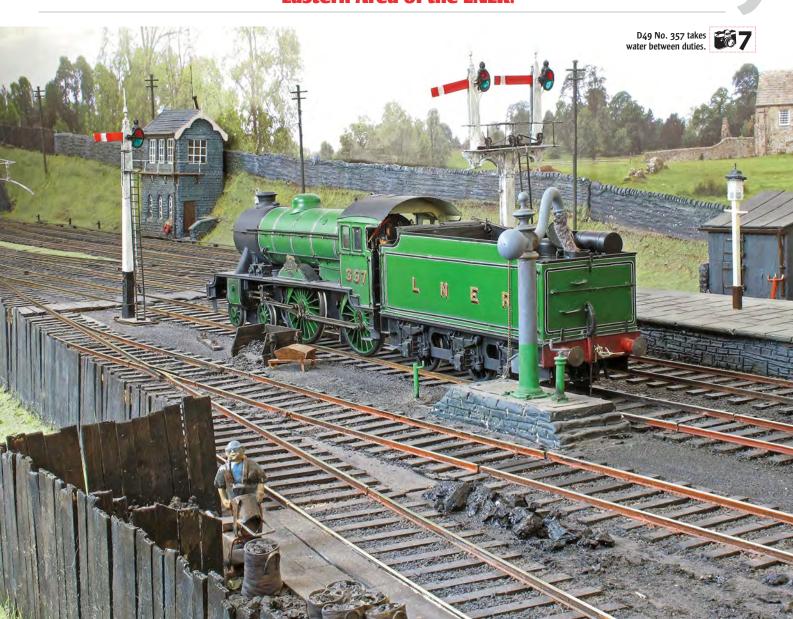
biggest interest in the hobby is in construction, so scratchbuilding was to be the order of the day.

Each board is wired back to the panel as a separate layout so I can check for faults on each individual board. With all the boards wired and test running successfully completed, I fixed the ballast in place. The NER used mainly ash ballast and was sometimes parsimonious in its use, so I set to with a bag of silver sand and a spray bottle filled with a mix of PVA water and a drop of washing-up liquid. When I was happy, and further test running was completed, I gave the whole area a covering of Carplan matt black which when dry gives the slightly purplish colour of ash.

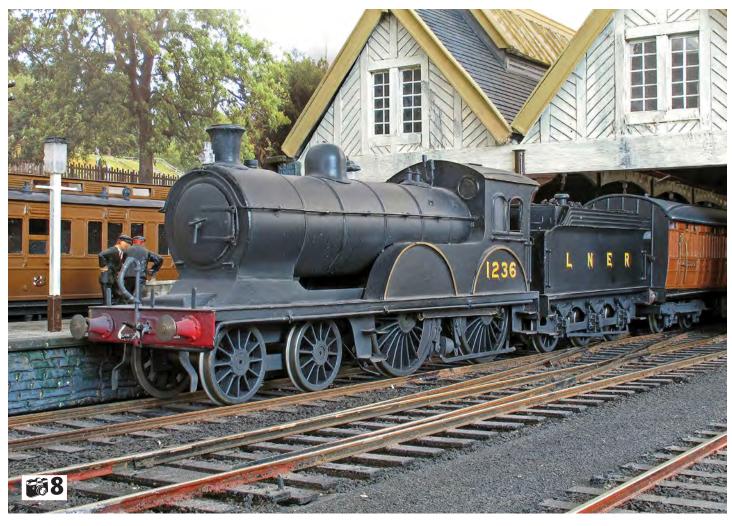
In the meantime, I had been busy building a modified version of Richmond station. This is an exercise in multimedia construction and the basic shell is built from scrap plywood of either 4mm or 3mm thickness. The platform is a solid piece of 5/8" thick timber cut to shape. The edges are made from Obeche stripwood and each flagstone is marked and filed to shape. The surface flags were made using modelling clay rolled into the central area and then marked out with a ruler edge.



Although I was brought up in LMS territory and worked for BR London Midland Region, my real passion has always been the North Eastern Area of the LNER.



LAYOUT FOCUS

Walls are also covered with modelling clay with each stone marked carefully to ensure the integrity of the structure as in real life. In other words, no stones are depicted as being unsupported by those beneath.

The gable ends of the train shed are constructed from 2mm MDF scribed to form the distinctive end pattern of the roof. The central support for the roof is made from plastic card cut in a fretted pattern as per the prototype.

The roof is supported by columns using two different sizes of tube to give the necessary shape. Wiring for the roof lights passes up these columns to hide it from view. The main crossbeam supporting the gables is made from plastic card as are the bargeboards on the roof and also on the raised section which allows smoke to clear the station area.

The station has a booking office, parcel office, waiting room and Station Master's office along with a main entrance hall. I have put quite a lot of detail in the rooms even though no one can see them without taking the roof off. These are also electrically lit. The goods shed, unlike the one at Richmond, is attached to the station building. The construction of this was by the same method as for the station.



SCENERY

Landscapes were formed of flyscreen mesh over wooden formers and covered in a liberal layer of one-coat plaster mixed with PVA to give it some elasticity. The bridge and stepping stones from Bolton Abbey are reproduced, but reduced in size and moved from their true position. The fencing is made from wooden coffee stirrers. These were procured from many different station buffets and, as long as you get the straight grained ones, they make excellent modelling material.

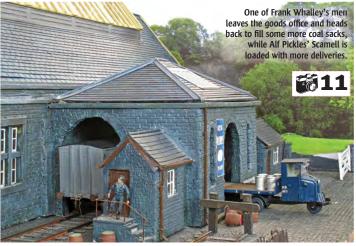
The signalbox is constructed in the same way as the other buildings, but here I splashed out on a really nice interior seen at the Halifax O gauge show along with an NER water column. It was difficult, as a Yorkshireman, to get my wallet out!

At the same time I purchased an NER bracket slotted post signal from MSE and I then scratchbuilt my other signals based upon that one. They are, at the moment, operated by Fulgurex motors, but I may in the future change to using servos.

The grassed area has a base covering of various green flocks spread over dilute PVA with a final trimming of static grass to give the impression of longer grass around the edges. The backscene is a 360 degree panoramic view taken from the actual river bridge. In all, 16 images were stitched together on a computer by Skipton Model Railway Club secretary, Trevor Shaw. They were printed by a local photographic shop as A3 size prints and fixed in place with paste. This was, apart from the purchase of rail and sleepers, the most expensive part of the layout.

MOTIVE POWER

That first locomotive kit inspired me to purchase another one, a J21 o-6-o, from the same supplier. With nowhere to run them, I then started building the layout, but the kits also gave me the inspiration to scratchbuild more.

My friend Peter Dunford had long been building unusual locomotives for which kits were unobtainable. After a few drinks we decided to build D20 4-4-0 No. 1236, a long time Starbeck machine, but Peter's input flagged after a while due to ill health and so I carried on alone. The final outcome pleased me so much that I now scratchbuild any locos that I require.

To date these have included J25 No. 2142 and J27 No. 1044, (both Starbeck locomotives in 1938),

N9 No. 76 (of York shed), No. 357 'The Fernie' (a Neville Hill D49) and Sentinel Steam Rail Motor 'Emerald' (also from Starbeck).

A McGeown N10 was converted to an N9 as No. 348. Currently under construction is an A8 4-6-2T No. 1530, which was at Neville Hill in 1938. The two kit-built locomotives are G5 No. 1839, which spent most of its long life at Pateley Bridge (a sub-shed of Starbeck) and J21 No. 973, another Neville Hill resident. Also available for use is G5 No. 149 which I built for club member David Seymour.

The Devonshire Estate Railway, which moves timber and stone from the Duke's estate, is worked by two Agenoria Models Manning, Wardle o-6-oSTs; 'Barden' and 'Beamsley'. One of the two Ford railbuses provided for the use of the estate workers

is constructed from a Branchlines kit and the other is scratchbuilt. These date back to a period when I was thinking of building a model of the Selsey Tramway.

Rolling stock for passenger and goods workings is in the main built from Slater's, Parkside Dundas, D&S and Ian Kirk kits. Of late I have been building more obscure vehicles using Slater's and Alan Gibson underframes including a couple of ex-NER coaches for which kits are unavailable.

You may have noted the date of that Christmas gift all those years ago and will realise that time is not on my side, but I still have a part-time job and relaxing at the modelling workbench is the best therapy in the world. I do hope that I have inspired others to build a model railway. **BRM**

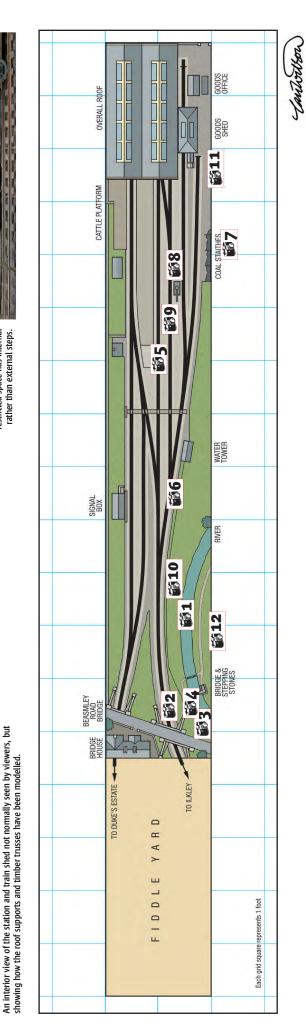


The signalbox is based on the one at Richmond, North Yorkshire, but because of restricted space has internal rather than external steps.

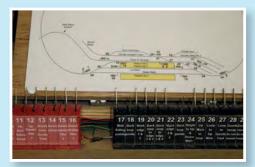


SIGNALLING A DIFFERENT APPROACH

ow refreshing to read Roy Harris' letter in the October issue of **BRM**. Indeed it is reassuring to know there are others who are content with RTR models and have never built a wagon kit. I must confess I am not much good at scenery either, but my wife does help a little there.

My enjoyment comes not from building models but operation. I am therefore quite content to use Bachmann and Hornby products straight out of the box, and use these to create (hopefully!) some realistic operating scenarios.

My layout is fully signalled on all running lines, using mainly Traintronics colour light signals. There is some primitive interlocking with the points whereby the route indicator will only show when the associated signal is green and the points are set for the diverging route. This is achieved by using Peco accessory switches under the points.

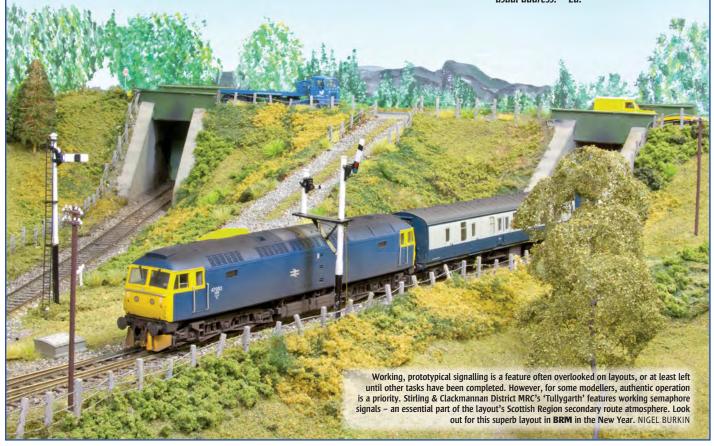


As with the real thing, if there is no signal to control a particular move then the move is not permitted. Although I like the flexibility of DCC for my locomotives, all the signalling is controlled the traditional way from levers as part of the enjoyment comes from re-creating the signalbox environment (see inset photograph)

For this reason I find the reviews of new RTR models the most interesting part of **BRM**. However, I do feel it would also be interesting to have some articles on signalling and other aspects of operation, formation of trains and so on, for those of us who enjoy our hobby without actually building anything.

BRCW TYPE 2s IN SCOTLAND



fully agree with the points made by Roy Harris in his letter in the October **BRM**. As a former employer used to say of his logistics company; "It's my train set and I will run it the way I want to."

Even the late and much respected David Jenkinson had his 'funny trains', trains that would not normally be seen in a Settle & Carlisle environment. My 1960s BR Scottish Region layout features largely prototypical motive power but Pennsylvania Railroad GG1s, SNCF CC6500s and even an LNER P2 now make occasional appearances!

However, for those who do strive to attain prototypical authenticity, I am afraid that the closing remark of the review of Heljan's new Pilot Scheme Class 26 perpetuates the myth that the Class 26/27s were used indiscriminately across Scotland.

When the Pilot Scheme Class 26/os first arrived in Scotland, they were used almost exclusively in pairs to dieselise the Edinburgh-Aberdeen service from April 1960. Within a couple of years, they were displaced by the arrival of Haymarket's Class 40s and cascaded onto other duties, effectively bringing about the end of Haymarket depots' steam allocation.

Diagrams for 1963/64 (by which time they would all have acquired yellow warning panels) show the class to be fully engaged on duties from Edinburgh to Aberdeen, Broughty Ferry, Perth and Stirling (all via the Forth Bridge), to Glasgow Queen Street and Glasgow Parcels Station (both via Falkirk) and to Hawick, Riccarton Junction and Carlisle (via the Waverley Route).

It can therefore be seen that this model in this livery would only be appropriate for a layout based on former North British or Caledonian lines east of Glasgow and would be inappropriate on any layout based on former GNoS, Highland or G&SW lines.

Roy Simpson I would love the Hatton's model but with TTS sound on the Hornby version for just a few pounds more, I think the latter will get my vote, unless I win the lottery. Then it will be one of each!

WHITES AND WRONGS

There is one minor thing I would like to point out however; prior to the 1950s white paint was very rarely used on either domestic or industrial buildings.

It is a common mistake, not only among railway modellers, but film and TV programme makers as well. Too many period dramas depict pre-war buildings with white windowframes and doors. It was only after Imperial Chemical Industries (ICI)



began to use titanium dioxide as the main pigment for white gloss paint that it became widely used. Prior to that doors and window frames tended to be painted darker colours.

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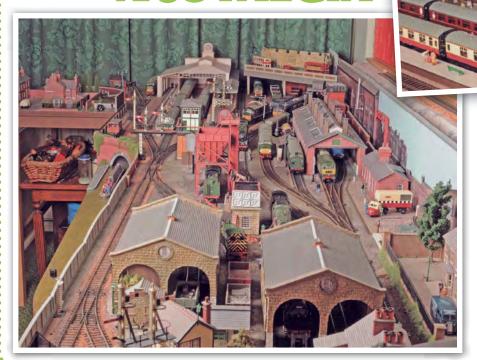

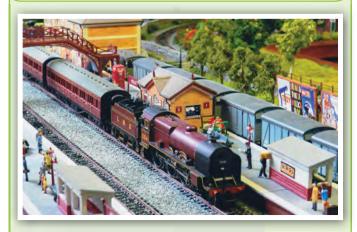

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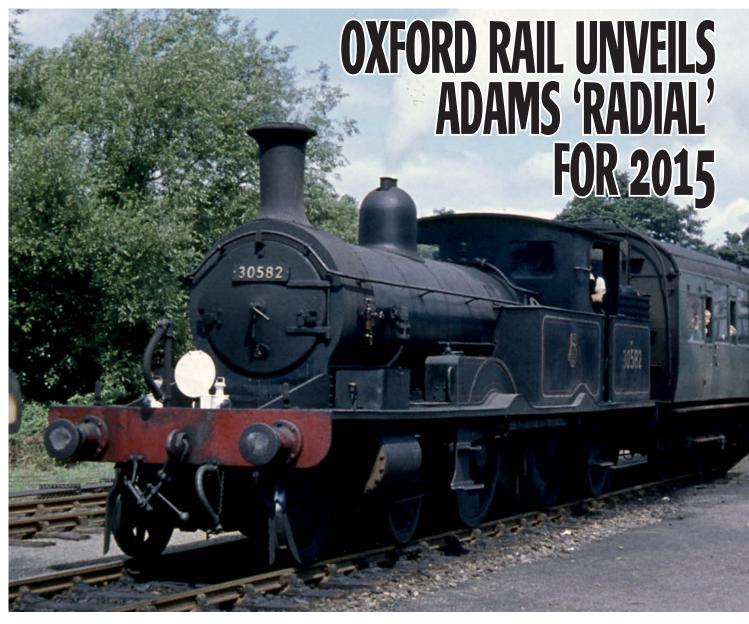

FACT FILE LSWR ADAMS 'RADIAL'

Introduced in 1882 for use on suburban services in south and south-west London, 71 were built by Robert Stephenson, Dübs & Co., Neilson and Beyer, Peacock to a William Adams design. Officially known by the LSWR as the 0415 Class, they gained the nickname 'Radials' due to their trailing truck arrangement.

Quickly displaced by Drummond M7s and suburban electrification in London, the class was cascaded to lighter work across the LSWR/SR system, with many being withdrawn in 1916-18. Of the 30 inherited by the Southern Railway in 1923, just two remained in service by 1928. Their light axleload and flexiblity made them ideal for the lightly laid and tightly curved Axminster-Lyme Regis branch in Devon. No suitable replacements could be found and so Nos. 0125 and 0520 were recommissioned and rebuilt to extend their working lives. The fleet increased to three in 1946 when No. 488 was bought back from the East Kent Light Railway (for £120!). The trio, numbered 30582-584 after 1948, survived until track improvements allowed lvatt 2MT 2-6-2Ts to be drafted in by BR in 1961.

No. 488, which was sold by the LSWR to the Ministry of Munitions in 1917 and to the EKR in 1919 before returning to the fold in 1946, was rescued by the Bluebell Railway and now resides as a static exhibit at Sheffield Park.

ranching out from its core business of die-cast road vehicles, Oxford Diecast is to produce OO gauge RTR locomotives for the UK market. Starting with the much-requested LSWR Adams Radial 4-4-2T, Oxford Rail is planning quick expansion in this area with several more products to be announced over the coming months. Engineering samples of the 'Radial' are expected in early-2015 with the first releases expected mid-year.

Acknowledging the complex service history and detail variations of this class, Oxford Rail has catered for two alternative boilers and frame arrangements, two chimneys, rectangular or oval spokes, single or double slidebars, alternative coal rails and pipework arrangements according

to livery and locomotive.

Other features will include a fivepole skew-wound motor, eight-pin DCC decoder socket, low gearing for prototypical slow running, sprung buffers, NEM couplings, a detailed cab interior, weighted chassis for extra haulage power and pick-ups on all wheels.

Oxford Rail is also promising 'allover sprayed bodywork with precision printing', although the exact identities and liveries of the first releases had not been revealed as this issue of **BRM** went to press.

Prices are still to be confirmed, but the models are expected to be available through Oxford Diecast's usual network of stockists.

BACHMANN'S NBL 'WARSHIP'

Bachmann has published the first images of its forthcoming OO gauge Class 43 'Warship'. Based on the MAN-powered locomotives built by North British in Glasgow, the all-new model will allow the D833-D865 batch of diesel-hydraulics to be modelled in RTR form for the first

time. Bachmann's existing 'Warship', which can trace its origins back to Mainline Railways in the late-1970s, is based on the Swindon-built, Maybach-engined D803-D832 batch.

Significant extra detail is visible on the new model, particularly on the bogies and roof. Other features

will include a 21-pin DCC decoder socket, illuminated headcodes, cab lighting and provision for a sound decoder. Three versions are promised for release in mid-2015; BR maroon D865 Zealous, BR green D835 Pegasus and BR blue 842 Royal Oak with full yellow ends.



TOWER AND LIONHEART JOIN FORCES



RTR O gauge private owner wagons are being produced in a combined

effort between Lionheart Trains and Tower Models.

The 8-plank side and end door wagons are based on the current PO wagons in the Lionheart range, and Tower has added another six exclusive liveries. The wagons feature sprung buffers, sprung couplings, finescale wheels and a compensated chassis.

This is the first time that the two businesses have collaborated on a project and they have indicated that it won't be the last. Other projects between the two firms are currently under development, with details to be revealed next month on Tower Models' website.

The wagons are priced at £40.00 each or six for £225.00 and full details of the liveries available are on Tower Models' website.

FIRST LOOK: HELJAN O 'WARSHIP' AND FALCON

Latest CAD artwork from Danes reveals progress on O gauge

diesels, wagons and GWR '1361' in OO gauge.







eljan has gone public with CAD images of its latest projects, revealing how much progress it has made with each one. Design work on the O gauge Class 42 'Warship' diesel-hydraulic is well underway, along with Brush prototype Do280 Falcon and 7mm scale 'Dogfish' and 'Catfish' ballast hoppers.

The German-inspired lines of the 'Warship' look to be particularly well captured at this early stage of development. The unique Falcon (below) also looks to be well advanced. Already offered in OO gauge, the O gauge models will be impressive when they arrive, given the exceptional length of the original.

Heljan's 'Dogfish' and 'Catfish' wagons will be a welcome addition to O Gauge. Judging from the CADs, the Danish company have the design down (almost) to a tee. At an equally advanced state is the O gauge 'Catfish'. A total of 716 were built by MetropolitanCammell between 1954 and 1961.

of these new Heljan models Finally, Heljan has on the BRM Digital Edition, revealed the first images of its OO gauge GWR '1361' 0-6-0ST, which looks set to go head-to-head with a rival model of the same class from Kernow Model Rail Centre.

No information has been given about whether Heljan's '1361' will feature the same variations between individual locomotives as promised by KMRC or likely delivery dates, but by releasing CAD images, the Danes have confirmed their intention to continue with the project despite the duplication.

HORNBY SR2-HAL EMU

Ben Jones
takes a look
at Hornby's
second
venture into
1930s-built
Southern
Railway EMUs.

hen Hornby released the '2-BIL' last year, few expected another Southern Railway EMU to follow so closely behind. However, this new '2-HAL' takes advantage of much of the good work seen on the 'BIL' to produce an alternative unit that will please Southern Electric fans and appeal to modellers of the late 'Big Four' and BR steam/



Kindly loaned by Kernow Model Rail Centre for review is this mid-1960s BR green model of 2630, one of the first batch of 79 units built by the SR for semi-fast work as part of its Medway electrification scheme in 1939. Complete with yellow cantrail stripes over the First Class compartments, small yellow warning panels and black triangle denoting the guards van end, the unit is finished in BR(S) multiple unit green with superbly printed coaching stock roundels. The matt finish is neatly applied throughout and suits the 'HAL's' austere outline.

With its angular welded steel cabs, the 'HAL' has a quite different appearance to its predecessor and one that has been well captured by Hornby. The same applies to the overall body shape, which features some subtle curves and angles that could easily have been overlooked. The pronounced radius of the curved windowframes also contrasts with those of the 'BIL'

As with the 'BIL', a mix of moulded and separately fitted detail has been employed. Items such as water tank filler pipes on the inner end of the DTCL and multiple working jumper cables on the cab fronts are neatly executed

in blackened wire and fine plastic respectively, while other details such as door handles and ventilators and lighting conduits on the roof moulded as part of the bodyshell. However, the roofs also have separate wire handrails; one on the DTCL and two on the DMBS.

Underframes are also fully detailed with numerous separate components, fine trusses and full length stepboards. Some of the underframe details are relatively fragile and require careful handling. Staying below the floor, Hornby has responded to criticisms of the 'BIL' by tooling the correct 10' wheelbase outer bogie on the trailer coach. The finely-detailed 10' powered bogie under the DMBS and two inner 9' bogies are shared with the earlier EMU.

One slightly unfortunate aspect of the newly-tooled trailing bogie is that the new NEM coupler pocket moulding is too long, meaning that standard NEM couplings won't lock into place. This can be cured by trimming 1-2mm off the end of the pocket, allowing the prongs of the coupler to fit as intended. No couplings are provided for the outer ends, so you'll need to source your own.

A set of self-adhesive stencil-type headcode characters is supplied



in the packaging. Route codes for typical 1960s 'HAL' duties include '12' for Waterloo-Alton, '15' for London Bridge-Brighton stoppers via Redhill on the Central Section and '60' for Brighton-Portsmouth Harbour semi-fasts.

Other standard features include sprung metal buffers at the outer ends and a sprung centre buffer between cars, a commendably short inner coupling bar (non-conductive, although this is not an issue as there are no lights on either car) and an eight-pin DCC decoder socket on the chassis close to the motor housing.

The model has much in common with the '2-BIL', including the surprisingly heavy DMBS car (365g) housing the five-pole skew-wound motor bogie. This provides smooth, quiet performance and should run well in multiple with other 'HAL' and 'BIL' sets, in prototypical four, six or eight-car formations.

Removing the bodyshell to fit a DCC decoder is straightforward; just four clips hold the body in place and clear, illustrated instructions are provided to assist you. The instruction sheet also covers lubrication or the

mechanism and coupling.

While the bodyshells are off, there's plenty of scope for further detailing of the interior units by painting them in the correct colours and adding adding some passengers. Additional details such as mirrors and advertisement

posters on the partition walls would also help to 'gild the lily'. A further enhancement would be interior lighting, using a product like Train-Tech's 'warm white' carriage lighting strips (www.train-tech.co.uk).

Whether you choose this mid to

late-1960s unit, the slightly earlier BR green variant without yellow warning panels or the Bulleid-era SR green version (R3260), the 'HAL' is a welcome addition to Hornby's Southern EMU family and an ideal companion for the '2-BIL'. Recommended. **BRM**

'REFURB' CLASS 37



ver the last few years Graham Farish has offered two quite different Class 37 models in its range. While the Class 37/0 was updated to modern standards in 2008, a much older model of the refurbished Class 37/4 and 37/5 variants persisted alongside it until recently. A replacement has been promised for some time, and

engineering prototypes have been around for at least 18 months, so it's good to report that the production models are at last being released 'into the wild'.

Shown above is 37406 The Saltire Society in early-1990s Railfreight Distribution sector grey. Although Eastfield's '37/4s' had been replaced on West Highland Line trains by 1988, 37406 remained a regular sight on WHL

freight trains until the late-1990s with RfD, Transrail and eventually EWS.

Like the re-tooled Class 37/0, this new version is streets ahead of the model it replaces. The overall body shape, detail and relief of the mouldings and extra attention to aspects such as the grilles, nose ends and bogies are far superior to the old Farish '37/4'. The major differences from unrefurbished locomotives are the revised grilles on

each side of the nose and updated nose end units with plated-over headcode panels and high-intensity headlights. The plug-in nose ends have been designed to allow various Class 37/4 and 37/5s to be offered, including those rebuilt from split-headcode Class 37/0s (37501-521). No fewer than five versions are advertised in the 2014 catalogue; 37407 Loch Long in BR large logo blue, Railfreight red stripe 37506

nly last month we reviewed a brand new Mk 1 CCT from Bachmann in OO gauge and now we have the same vehicle in N from Graham Farish. It's a long-awaited replacement for the Lima CCT of 1975, which despite being outdated and overscale has been a fixture of many N layouts for almost four decades.

Unlike the OO gauge model for Invicta Model Rail, this version is on general sale through Bachmann/Farish stockists. Standard BR maroon and BR blue CCTs are being offered, as well as the more unusual 'Tartan Arrow' version shown here. Coincidentally, this shortlived late-1960s/early-1970s quise was also offered by Lima and appears to be much more prevalent in model form than it ever was in reality!

Small numbers of CCTs and ex-LMS 50ft BGs were painted in these colours to promote the Anglo-Scottish express

parcels service, which started in 1967. The striking orange and white colour scheme with prominent branding compares well with photographs of

the prototype and the decoration is crisply applied throughout.

The chassis and underframe has separately fitted footsteps and handbrake levers plus neatly moulded battery boxes, dynamo and vacuum brake equipment. Metal wheels and pin-point axles make the CCT

British Steel Skinningrove, Railfreight Metals sector 37514 and DRS 'Compass' livery 37409 Lord Hinton, as well as RfD 37406.

Fine details include radio aerials on top of the nose and a bag of extra parts to detail the bufferbeam. The pack also includes miniature snowploughs and orange ETH jumper cable receptacles which fit into holes on the nose end.

While the familiar Class 37 character is generally well captured, the disappointing gap between the body and bogies remains. This, more than anything, detracts from the otherwise high quality of the design, fit and finish. Graham Farish showed what could be done earlier this year with its re-tooled Class 55 (BRM June 2014) and while it would be unreasonable to expect a complete re-design of the chassis from the '37/0', it is something that ought to be considered for the next generation of Farish Class 37s.

However, the stylish RfD grey livery is beautifully applied and accurate for 37406 before the application of Transrail 'Big T' logos in 1994. Correctly it has cast BR arrows, but no diamond depot plaque, while the nameplates are in a lower position than originally fitted.

Performance is excellent from the all-wheel drive chassis, powered by a

five-pole motor contained within the die-cast metal chassis block. A six-pin decoder socket is provided for easy DCC conversion. The bodyshell simply unclips and lifts off the chassis - if only all models were this straightforward! Bachmann recommends a minimum curve radius of 12", but it will run on 9" radius curves if required.

For anyone modelling BR from the mid-1980s onwards, refurbished Class 37s are essential traction. Ride height issues aside, this is a great improvement on the model it replaces and should prove popular with late BR and privatisation era modellers in N.

See the **BRM** Annual 2015, on sale November 13, for Nigel Burkin's article on how to reduce the gap between body and bogies on a Graham Farish Class 37.

POLYBULK BO **HOPPER**

The eagerly anticipated Polybulk bogie hoppers from Graham Farish have now arrived. Ideal for the Speedlink era of freight traffic, diesel modellers will rejoice at the level of detail present. Built from the mid-1970s by Fauvet Girel in France for use by Traffic Services Ltd, these wagons were effectively replacements for the earlier BR 'Covhops' and Grain hoppers.

The detail on this model has been moulded, with finer parts such as the door wheels, handbrake wheel and handrails separately applied. The handrails are robust and made from wire, except the most vulnerable and largest at the very end of the wagon which is moulded in plastic. Given its size it will bend easily, so handle them with care.

Underneath, an airtank and distributor have been added, whilst on the top, above the Y25 bogies is an impression of the brake rigging.

The size and intricacy of the lettering on the model is impressive. Even with a magnifying glass, I could barely read the numerous English, French and German instructions.

Looking at such a model, you can see how much N gauge has improved - long may it continue.

free-running and stable. Detachable NEM couplers are fitted on sprung, self-centring arms at each end.

The body has plenty of detail too, including flush glazing and a few separately fitted parts such as metal buffer heads. Inevitably for this scale, much more of the detail is moulded, but where that has been necessary the results are excellent.

Whilst not the most glamorous of vehicles, a couple of these will certainly enliven parcels trains otherwise formed of scruffy maroon or blue vans. Highly recommended.

the real 'Covhops'

resh in the office from Graham Farish is this fine model of a BR covered hopper (Covhop) as used by BR from the 1950s through to the 1980s. Versatile wagons, the 'Covhops' were used for the transport of bulk goods that needed to be kept dry during transport, including sand, salt and sugar. A total of 1,337 were built.

This model portrays a member of the last batch, built at Ashford in 1962 to Lot 3431. Incidentally, this is the same wagon number as the 00 gauge wagon released at the beginning of the year, B870812.

Later batches of 'Covhops' had disc brakes down one side and traditional clasp brakes down the other. As such, three-hole wheels are visible on one side and not the other - commendable attention to detail in this small scale.

The two vertical supports at either end of the wagon protrude too much and the 'T' angle is a little on the crude side. Neither of these points are easily visible and don't detract from the overall high quality of this model.

Whether you plan to run them in block trains or as a general goods, no BR green/blue era layout should be without a few of these superb wagons.

REALT RACK CLASS 143 RAILBUS

RealTrack's latest 'Nodding Donkey' is examined by Ben Jones.

aving released its Class 144 diesel railbuses to rave reviews, Realtrack Models has now added the similar, but more widely travelled Class 143 variant.

Built in Kilmarnock by Andrew Barclay, using bodies assembled by bus builder Walter Alexander, the 25 two-car sets were delivered to Heaton depot in Newcastle in 1985. Intended for local services in the north-east of England, their duties extended over a wide area from Carlisle to Berwick-upon-Tweed and Whitby.

In 1991/92, the class moved to Cardiff Canton for use in South Wales, working Valley Lines commuter trains as well as longer-distance services to destinations such as Fishguard and Pembroke Dock. Over the following decade, the class was also used around Bristol and in the West Country by Wessex Trains and its successors.

(15 sets) and First Great Western, which operates eight sets based in Exeter for local services in Devon. Two sets - 143613/615 - were scrapped after being seriously damaged by fire.

As with the '144s', Realtrack has started with contemporary liveries, selecting two Arriva Trains Wales units and two FGW units in 'Local Lines' livery - 143618/619. Reviewed here, and kindly loaned by RealTrack, are two ATW sets carrying the Welsh operator's attractive green/cream livery.

RealTrack's '143' should appeal to a wider audience than its Yorkshire cousin, and offers the potential for many more colourful liveries, from Tyne & Wear yellow to Valley Lines white/green/red. Older liveries should follow in due course, although those wanting original Provincial, TWPTE and Regional Railways units will have to wait for an alternative interior featuring original bus-style bench seats. Production runs are limited to 250-450 sets each (depending on livery), although a couple of alternative numbers and destinations are available for each livery.

Another useful service is the range of options available to customers when purchasing. As well as basic 'DCC Ready' sets, Realtrack can supply models 'to order', fitted with passengers, a Lenz DCC decoder or ESU LokSound V4.0 sound decoder with authentic sounds.

SMART LIVERY

The smart ATW green and cream livery has been well executed, although there are one or two areas where printing isn't quite as crisp as it could be. On our sample of 143609 some

printed as on 143610, suggesting that the finish quality could be more consistent. Logos, numbers and maintenance instructions are neatly printed throughout. Look out also for the warning signs on the doors, transfer 'nameplates', destination roller blinds and overhead line warning notices, all of which are crisp and accurate.





moulded detail throughout. In terms of looks and detail, it's as good as anything from the established manufacturers. It takes a trained eve to spot the differences between a '143' and a '144', but to its credit, Realtrack has taken the time and effort to change its tooling to cater for them.

Changes are largely related to the underframe, with larger equipment boxes under the cabs, minor differences to the underslung components between the axles and less prominent footsteps either side of the BSI auto-coupler on each end. The latter are perhaps a fraction too small compared to the prototype.

The large windows reveal highly detailed interiors with the revised 2+2 Chapman seating arrangement introduced on refurbished sets after privatisation. Impressive details include separate seats, passenger and driver fire bottles and glazed internal partitions.

Separate exterior components

include extensive underframe equipment, wire door handrails, roof-mounted radio pods and exhaust stacks on the inner ends. Moulded detail is crisply executed, including the passenger door buttons and indicator

Sprung gangways address one of the major visual issues on RTR models, eliminating the gap between cars whilst still allowing reliable operation on tight curves.

PERFORMANCE

As with the '144', a flat five-pole can motor is housed under the floor of the Driving Motor Second Lavatory (DMSL) car. Power is delivered to the axles via cardan shafts. The clip-together compensated axle units pivot and provide some vertical and radial play to keep the wheels firmly on the rails.

The Driving Motor Second (DMS) car has four additional pick-ups running in brass bushes behind both wheels on each axle. These supply power for traction and lights, ensuring that operation is smooth and reliable.

An eight-pin coupler ensures electrical

continuity between both cars.

A neat eight-pin connector/ coupling under the gangway provides an electrical link between the two vehicles. The eight-pin DCC decoder socket is located on the unpowered chassis. There's also space for a speaker should you wish to install a sound decoder. Both chassis have holes drilled on the underside through which the sounds can escape. Excellent directional LED white/red lights are fitted. LED interior lights are also fitted. Both can be switched on or off when operating on DCC, but no switches are fitted to give DC users the same options.

All units are supplied with tension lock couplings in NEM pockets at the outer ends and an alternative set of dummy BSI couplers.

n recent years Network Rail has been installing a modern version of 'Searchlight' signals. Lightweight single aperture Dorman multi-aspect LED signals are replacing traditional filament lamp installations.

This increasingly common type of signal is available from new start-up company Scale Design.

Kindly Supplied for review is a three aspect signal with standard height post but without a backboard extension. Scale Design also make the four-aspect version, along with ground position light and semaphore signals.

The model is constructed from brass and cast resin components and makes use of a surface-mount LED to make the whole head a very fine scale model.

It is well built and has a good paint finish, although the shade of grey used for the post might be slightly too dark



for newer installations. The signal doesn't come with an ID plate or telephone, but these can be fashioned out of plastic section.

It is supplied pre-wired with a resistor and, helpfully, with coloured labels indicating the three aspect colours applied to the input wires. Be careful when wiring the signal to a power supply (it operates off standard 12V DC), as the thin single core wire used can snap if bent excessively. Once connected, the LED produces bright, vibrant colours that are like those produced by the real signals.

Overall, these models provide a good alternative to traditional filament lamps for modellers of the contemporary scene. We look forward to seeing more from this new supplier.

BACHMANN BR PIPE WAGON



aving hoovered up most of the standard BR wagon designs over the last decade, Bachmann is now working its way through some of the types built for more specific traffic. Examples include last year's 'Covhop' and the forthcoming 21t Grain hopper, but attention is also being paid to open wagons. First of these to arrive is the 12t 'Pipe' wagon, a dropside open with a 12' wheelbase designed to carry cast iron pipes, but used for many other payloads over the years.

Based on an LNER design, 1,950 were eventually built by BR. Their main workload involved short-term contracts delivering pipes of all shapes and sizes around the country, most notably from the Stanton & Staveley works in Derbyshire. A further 50 wagons were built to the same design for carrying rolls of paper for newsprint.

A batch of 50 was modernised for Ministry of Defence (MoD) traffic in 1983, receiving upgraded running gear and air brakes. Repainted in Railfreight red/grey, they gained the TOPS code ODA and continued in service until the early-1990s

Our review sample is typical of how the wagons looked in the 1970s/80s after switching to the departmental fleet. Decorated in drab olive green, KDB484176 carries the TOPS code ZDV. Bachmann has chosen the RCH vacuum brake arrangement. The convoluted shape of the handbrake lever has been well captured as one of several separate components on the underframe.

Unlike many RTR open wagons, the body sides and ends are commendably thin, more akin to a kit-built wagon. Other fine details include turned metal buffers, separate end lamp brackets and metal strips to prevent the doors banging against the underframe and the moulded strapping/plank detail of the body

Two BR bauxite versions are being produced to suit 1950s-1970s modellers, but this ZDV will also be a very useful addition to BR blue era departmental trains. More colourful livery options also exist in the form of late-1980s Satlink red/yellow and departmental light blue wagons.

Another superbly detailed wagon from Bachmann. Highly recommended.

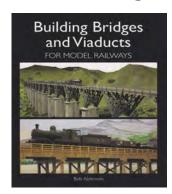

modern world will perhaps be disappointed at the lack of information about concrete bridges.

However, with more than 500 photographs there will be something to interest all bridge builders. Particularly useful are the detail views of aspects such as weathering, safety rails and even signage. Descriptions, diagrams and a glossary of common terms are useful too and make this a handy addition to the layout builder's library.

OVERHEAD LINE STORES VAN

n contrast to today, where Network Rail invests millions in bespoke vehicles for major infrastructure projects, BR tended to take a thriftier approach to such matters. Redundant coaches, vans and wagons were commandeered by the Mechanical & Electrical Engineer (M&EE), Civil Engineers (CE) and Signal & Telegraph (S&T) departments and modified for use as mobile stores, equipment or mess vans and wiring trains.

This new OO gauge ex-LMS 50' BG was used as a Mobile Instrument Store by the London Midland Region M&EE in the 1950s/60s, during the electrification of the West Coast Main Line. Electrification trains in the 1950s/60s were hauled by

whatever locomotives were available, including elderly pre-Grouping types. A few of these vans and wagons loaded with cable drums for the overhead wiring would make an interesting feature for any layout set in the right period and location.

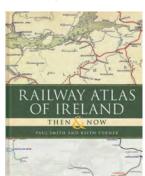

PROXXON TOOLS

Howard Smith tests a selection of useful Proxxon power tools for modellers.

ost of us have some favourite modelling tools. It could be a set of pliers, or even a needle file for instance. And then there are tools that you thought you didn't need, but only realise just how useful they are when you own them.

These Proxxon tools from Germany, imported in the UK by tool supplier Brimarc are perfect

examples. Proxxon power tools are designed to be used by modellers and hobbyists. Its products cater for large tasks such as woodworking, ideal for when a layout build is getting started. But it doesn't end there, metalworkers, scratchbuilders and more advanced modellers will marvel at the top end products in the range, which includes impressive milling machines, bench drills and lathes.

OK, not all of us are going to need a milling

machine, or even a lathe for that matter but there are lots of tools in the Proxxon range that are worth considering. From drills to sanders, glue guns and hot wire cutters, the list goes on.

With so many tools to choose from, I narrowed the choice down to just a few and picked out my favourites. Not just because of their build quality, versatility and ease of use, but also their competitive prices.

FBS 240/E PRECISION DRILL



he words 'Made in Germany' have become synonymous with products of a certain calibre and quality. This is true with this drill. It is presented in a solid storage case with 43 accessories that can cut, drill and sand.

What is particularly interesting is the fact that it has a keyless chuck that ranges from 0.3 to 3.2mm, enough to take most common modelling drill sizes

Yellow nonslip grips are moulded into the drill body and a handy hook to the rear is provided - perfect for handing on the side of a workbench or on the wall when not in use.

You can't beat a good 'box set' of modelling drills, diamond-based slitting discs and burrs. When out and about at the many exhibitions around the country, look out for a set of each. It always pays to have a few in stock and they won't break the bank.

MH550 MICRO HEAT GUN

ou might well ask what use a heat gun tool can have when modelling, but there are several. A few examples are for the bending of plastic or resin parts to shape, speeding up the drying process of paint or glue and even applying heat shrink sleeving when wiring a layout.

A heat gun isn't perhaps as high on our wish lists as a good drill, but if you're building a layout it'll still have plenty of uses and can be used for DIY afterwards.

uilding landscapes from foam board or polystyrene blocks makes for a lighter layout. Cutting shapes into the foam is a messy task at the best of times though, so having the right tool is important. Here is one that no club or layout builder should be without; a hot-wire cutter. As soon as the trigger is pulled, this 12V device heats almost instantly and cuts like a hot knife through butter.

Richard is always prepared to help the beginner in Soldering and to pass on his extensive knowledge of all types of soldering.









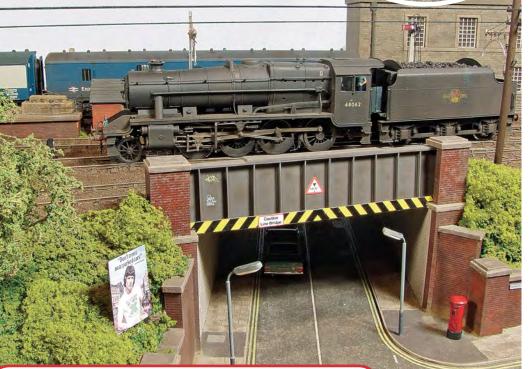

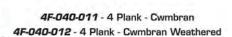

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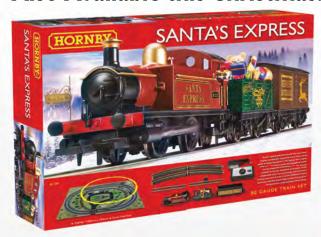

The Bachmann Story



elcome to this new series of articles looking at what could be described as 'The Bachmann Story'. At a time when our hobby is seeing a plethora of changes in terms of direction, pricing and methods, I thought it would be a good idea to commemorate 25 years of Bachmann Europe Plc by sharing our history, heritage and current operations with our valued Collectors Club members. Much has changed since Graham Hubbard started the company on behalf of Kader Holdings Company Limited in 1989 (then trading as Kader Industrial Company), but in many ways the best of what was

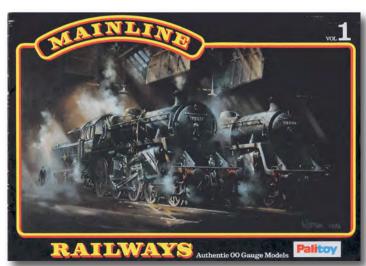
achieved then is perpetuated today. Who better to lead us through this interesting subject than our retired R&D Manager Merl Evans, and his colleague Dennis Taylor, who until recently headed up our product artwork team.

Without seeking to be controversial in my opening statement, I think it safe to say, in my opinion, that the UK's railway modelling market in OO scale stagnated in the 1960s/early 1970s. Modellers had to accept

standards for products that purported to be detailed scale models but bordered on being just marginally better than toy-like in manufacture. Such inherent features typical of the time can be described briefly as follows. Centre driving wheels (on steam outline locomotives) minus their flanges with rigid, one-piece coupling rods; body shells cast as one-piece mouldings with the majority of details combined integrally in low-relief form with the exception of two brass safety valves attached.

These shells were self-coloured plastic or die-cast alloy with a very basic level of applied livery decoration and finish. A large,

crude and obtrusive pressed metal coupler system of hinged hook and frame arrangement, which gained favour in the UK at the time, was employed. Dimensional accuracy in certain products offered was questionable while the motors/drive mechanisms were relatively basic.

Meanwhile, concurrent with this situation, HO scale models of European and American outline made their appearance onto the market. Although these 'high end' products were substantially more expensive (particularly the former), British modellers asked the question why were they starved of such sophisticated products in OO scale. In fact, some chose to model in HO simply because of what was currently available to them.

PALITOY STEPS IN

In the early 1970s this 'climate' did not go un-noticed by one of the UK's major toy makers based in Coalville, Leicestershire, called The Palitoy Company, then part of the Cincinnati-based General Mills Group. Seeking to expand its turn-over, their astute Marketing Manager at that time, Nicholas (Nick) Farmer, began to look into the feasibility of making in-roads into the train set market share monopolised almost entirely by Hornby. This statement is noteworthy relating to the original strategy proposal of the company. Palitoy's success was due to its long-established record in the toy market; the range of sets was their first priority as this was the 'comfort zone' they knew.

The rolling stock and locomotive elements of the sets were to be made available as separate unit sales as it was envisaged these might have some secondary appeal to model shops. Each item bore the exact same likeness to that which appeared in the set contents with no alteration whatsoever in assembly or livery detail.

KADER PRODUCTION

Palitoy already enjoyed a commercial arrangement with the Kader Industrial Company founded in 1948 in North

Point, Hong Kong (Island), as a source of manufacture of some of the toy products it (Palitoy) marketed, predominantly dolls. Kader was at the time already manufacturing for the US brand name Bachmann which it later came to acquire.

They asked if they would make for them, in return for contracts placed with Kader as an OEM vendor, action toys for the Star Wars concept for which Palitoy held the licence. Three avenues of feasibility were explored to address this proposal over a period of time.

The first option was simply to become an importer of Bachmann. The second was to evaluate the feasibility of placing British outline body shells onto US chassis units. And finally, for the first time ever within a Far East factory, tooling a range of carefully selected bespoke products in the scale unfamiliar to the Chinese of 1:76 reduction ratio (compared to 1:87 which they were used to) that would be entirely new in selection of specific prototypes. It goes without saying, the latter was the option chosen. The foundation was set to change the company's future when, without intentionally seeking to do so, almost overnight it found itself one of the main players in the UK ready-to-run railway modelling market.

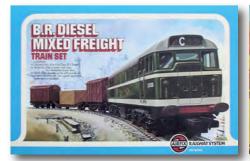
From the very outset in this negotiation, Palitoy senior management were adamant they did not want to be owners of the new tooling about to be commissioned; this cost would be permanently amortized by the Kader Industrial Company. In simple terms this meant Kader remained the rightful and legal owner of any moulds or dies; the

price of this capital outlay would be recouped by building it into the unit price quoted for any particular item, that is, its F.O.B. (Free on Board) or ex-works cost.

Unknown at the time, some 15 years later this commercial arrangement gave Kader an inventory of tooling available for use to form the nucleus of an upgraded range using the same moulds with improved motors and mechanisms. This was to be sold directly via its own division into the UK launching in 1989 as Bachmann Branch-line, imported by Bachmann Industries Europe Limited.

MAINLINE RAILWAYS

To revert to the early 1970s, Palitov's marketing department selected, from a number of other suggestions, the brand name for its model railway concept and this was Mainline Railways. Momentum was building in the associated preparations for Mainline's product launch debut to the toy and model trade, scheduled for the Brighton and Harrogate Toy Fairs in 1976. At this time it became obvious that another major name had noticed that there was room for another in the market alongside Hornby. This was Airfix, who already enjoyed a firm foothold in the scale model/hobby market with its plastic construction kits some of which were railway themed. With the common knowledge of each other's intentions, and projected launch date for unveiling their range to the model trade, this only served to accelerate the activities of both companies. It was conjectured at one time that both the Mainline and Airfix ranges were made in the same factory in Hong Kong. This was

certainly not so as, although approached by Airfix to manufacture for them, Kader had an agreement in place with Palitoy, which they honoured. However, Airfix did source from Kader their scale 4-4-0 locomotives and associated rolling stock for their somewhat 'quirky' Wild West themed play sets, which may have given rise to the confusion.

One thing both companies shared in common was in the subsequent year after their launches (each attending the same 1976 venues incidentally), that they both chose to 're-invent' themselves and adopt a different strategy as to how they saw themselves in the market place as model manufacturers.

Speculation of the time has it that there was a third very well known longestablished toy company, specialising in die-cast models, that coincidentally had its sights set on expanding into railways. However, they abandoned this proposal leaving a 'two horse race' between Palitoy and Airfix.

GREAT MODEL RAILWAYS

Five years after their launch debut, the year 1981 saw the next major milestone in Mainline Railways' story. The Airfix Company went into receivership and was acquired by Palitoy. The model railway division had at this time been re-branded as GMR (Great Model Railways) and the next task was to seamlessly blend the

two ranges into one.

The tooling was placed with established vendors, two used already by Airfix for sourcing, namely Sanda Kan and the Cheong Tak Company. The former was acquired by Kader a few years ago. A third, and until then unknown vendor, namely Todco, was selected into which all GMR goods wagons tooling was moved. There was just one single and noteworthy exception to the latter. Palitoy made the request that the Conflat and its Type B container load be singled out to go to Kader as the latter was ideally compatible with their I-Plank Wagon flat.

With three new sources coming on stream and subsequently opening up the prospect of greatly increased manufacturing capacity, there now followed a complex logistical exercise. It was necessary to unify the product line so that an overall impression of uniformity presented itself on the shop shelves. Paints had to be rematched; the coupler (developed jointly between Kader and Palitoy) was re-tooled to phase out the GMR offering primarily for compatibility and visual effect; coach/wagon wheels and their shouldered axles were standardised and, most importantly, packaging and corporate graphics had to be identical.

It must be realised that for all these vendors, now totalling four including Kader, in day-to-day business activity right from the outset Palitoy never had direct contact with them from the UK (in those days the options were phone or telex!). This was controlled by their own offices situated in Kowloon under the name General Mills (Hong Kong) Limited. Prior to this, and before the CPG takeover (General Mills' toy division), it traded as Palitoy (Far East) Limited undertaking a similar role.

TOOLING OWNERSHIP

Following a directive from the US parent company, it was decreed that after a certain date that Palitoy should own any new tooling necessary in expanding its range and the amortization arrangement enjoyed with Kader must cease. Some of the first new product selections this directive applied to were the Class 56 Co-Co diesel; Class 2P and the GWR Dean Goods. In the acquisition of Airfix all tooling formerly owned by that company now constituted the assets of Palitoy; it was these moulds and dies that were to be later sold to the Dapol model railway company.

Any Kader tooling remained their legal property despite this. The only Kader-sourced items sold to Dapol were stock from their Glenfield, Leicestershire warehouse of finished goods shipments. As a result, Dapol was in a position where it could never be given the opportunity to re-run certain ex-Kader

items such as the popular small locomotives the 57xx pannier tank or the Class 03 shunter.

Confusion and misunderstanding in this ownership of tooling may have occurred, a sizeable chunk of which fell under Kader amortization policy and as a result remained their intellectual property. In 1986 this resulted in a legal altercation being brought by David Boyle, then proprietor of Dapol, against Replica Railways who had negotiated an arrangement with Kader to become import agent. Boyle thought he had been sold the rights to anything made using Kader tooling in the acquisition of the Mainline Railways brand name. However, the date of this litigation is outside the time frame of this profile of the genesis of Mainline Railways for, in 1983, a directive issued by Palitoy's US parent company sounded the death-knell of the brand. It was decreed that all European development should cease (which included the re-launch of Action Man) and the R & D Department based in Coalville would close on 31st August.

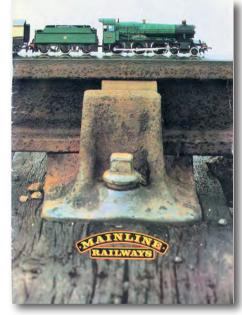
This was a particularly cruel blow to occur at this time as Palitoy management had taken contingency measures to get its house in order and improve its performance. Because of ever-increasing delays in product not being delivered in the year of its catalogue release, a policy of consolidation was implemented. The

development function still went on apace without any new release proposals being unveiled for one year. I 983 saw the tooling completed for a number of new steam locomotives plus a few items of rolling stock, namely, the GWR Modified Hall with Hawksworth tender; LNER Class B1 and LMS 2P. Despite their immediate readiness, requiring only livery artwork to be originated, the projects were simply abandoned although some Class 2Ps made it to market.

By this time, for better in-house project control and long-term planning, the 1:76 scale engineering drawings executed in the traditional drafting medium, before such a thing as CAD, for some (but by no means all) new products were contracted to a competent and railway-orientated drawing office based in Leicester called Tooling Essentials Limited. They had drawn the SR Lord Nelson locomotive plus its associated set of Bulleid coaches using a redesign of Airfix drawings as the basis for the latter.

Furthermore, other projects completed which were never to see fruition were a Class 8F and two LNER Gresley coaches. How an acceptable interpretation of the LNER's teak woodgrain effect was to be achieved in decoration at that time has to remain an unanswered question!

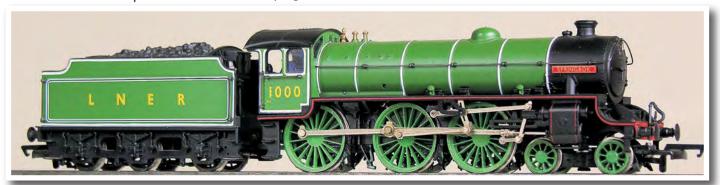

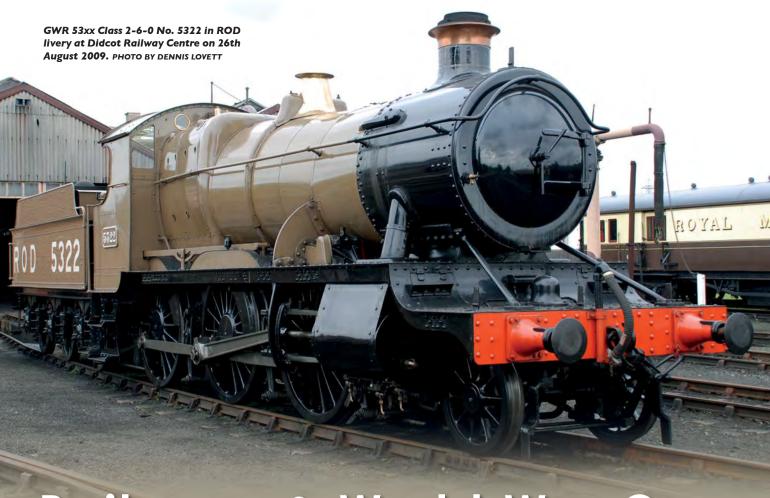

proposals was in existence within Palitoy at the time of closure. It is noteworthy that choices which figured in it would see their appearance made by others such as the LMS Class 5 (Black Five); LMS Ivatt 2-6-2T; SR Class T9 and Class Q1.

Railways & World War One

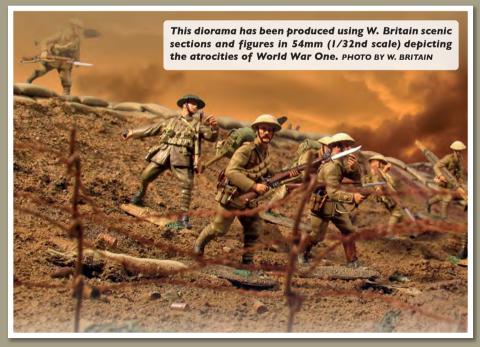
2014 marks the 100th anniversary of the start of World War One. To commemorate the event, Bachmann is launching a train pack in both N and OO scales to represent this dark period in European history during which railways played a major role.

Ithough wars were not new, the outbreak of World War One on 4th August 1914 was the first to be fought on such a large scale, becoming a global war before the signing of the Armistice in November 1918. This 'war to end all wars' was, of course, nothing of the sort and conflicts continue to rage to this day. By the end of World War One on 11th November 1918, some 9 million people had lost their lives and there were few villages or families who had not been affected in one way or another.

The Great War (as it was originally known) began as a result of the circumstances surrounding the assassination of Archduke Franz Ferdinand and his wife in Sarajevo by a Serbian group on 28th June 1914. Ferdinand was the heir to the Austro-Hungarian Empire (which at that time was in league with Germany) and this led to the Austro-Hungarian attack on Serbia in retaliation. At the time there were two large European powers with Britain, France and Russia as one alliance (The Triple Entente) and the Austro-Hungarian Empire and Germany comprising the other, which

was known as the Central Powers. The German forces then attacked Belgium and Luxembourg, which were at the time neutral countries, and made their way towards France and its capital Paris. This was enough to cause Britain to

declare war on Germany on 4th August 1914 and the German advance was halted in an area in North Eastern France where it remained entrenched for the next four years. With most of the French army positioned on the French / German border,



they were caught out when the Germans advanced through Belgium. This resulted in the first battle of the war, the Battle of the Frontiers (7th August – 13th September) that was fought initially by French and Belgian troops. The British Expeditionary Force reached Mons on the France / Belgium border on 22nd August. A British reconnaissance party reached the area a day earlier and following the sighting of German troops, Private John Parr of the Middlesex Regiment became the first British soldier to be killed in the war. The following day the British army was engaged in the Battle of Mons. It was the first of many battles that resulted in the entrenchment of troops that we refer to today as the Western Front. Many had forecast it would all be over by Christmas 1914, however in reality this would turn out to be over four years of bloody conflict. It is only right that 100 years later, such events are reported and analysed to serve as a reminder of how so many sacrificed their lives so that we could enjoy our freedom today.

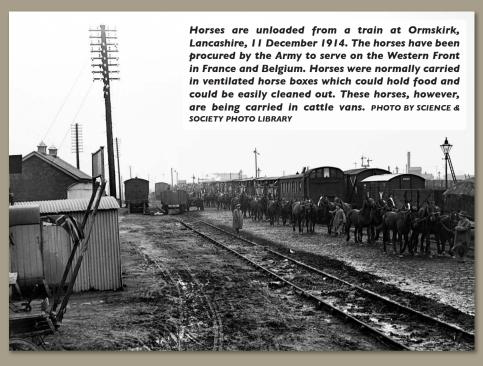
Conflict was not just contained to the Western Front; hence it became a World War rather than a European one. Elsewhere the conflict cascaded into Asia, The Pacific, The Middle East, South Africa and the Balkan states. With the USA providing supplies to the allies, German submarines targeted the Atlantic shipping convoys and in 1917, this led to the USA entering the war.

MILITARY MOVEMENTS BEFORE THE RAILWAYS

The Romans built roads to move their armies from one encampment to another by marching, a daily march being some 12 miles between forts or camps. Over the succeeding centuries military movements were dependent on either horses or marching. These activities were often at short notice to deal with civil unrest in the days before the police force became fully established following publication of the Metropolitan Police Act in 1829. Subsequent legislation enabled the county forces to be formed.

Threat of invasion from Napoleon's French Army led to the building of the 28-mile long Royal Military Canal in Kent that opened in 1809. The advance of the railway network after 1825 would render it the first and last canal to be built in the UK for military rather than commercial use.

The Royal Navy was established in the 16th Century to defend our shores and to transport the Army overseas. To move an army, its horses and equipment to foreign shores was a major logistical exercise that would take considerable time to achieve.



RAILWAYS AT WAR

The first reported use of any rail infrastructure in a war was the Tranent Waggonway that ran from coal pits in Tranent, East Lothian, down to the harbour at Cockenzie and opened around 1722. This used wooden rails and during the Jacobite uprising, which resulted in victory for the troops of Charles Edward Stuart (better known as Bonnie Prince Charles), the waggonway was used by the British Army to shield its artillery behind the embankment that provided a gradual slope down to the sea.

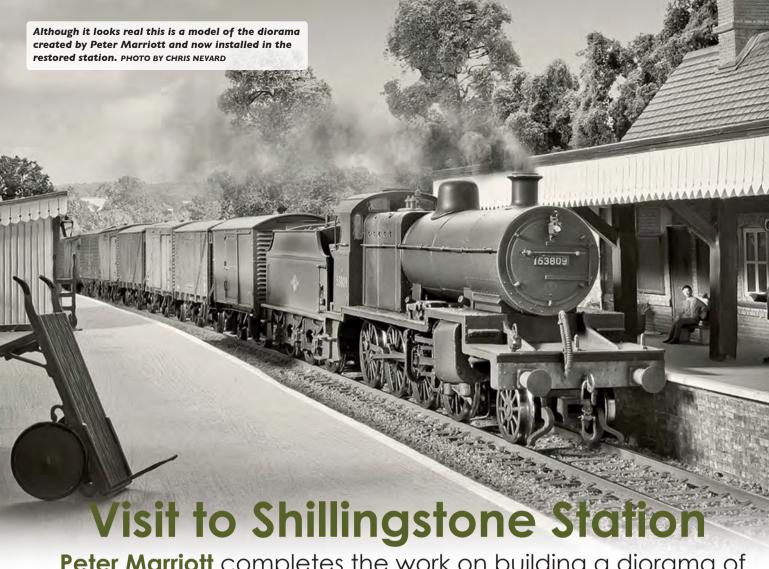
Following the opening of the Stockton & Darlington Railway in 1825, the Army soon realised that using rail could save substantial time and money. It took two

days to march from Liverpool to Manchester and two hours by train. The money paid to the railway company was far less than the additional "marching money" paid to the troops and the response time was almost immediate.

As railways developed across the world they became more instrumental in wars. Britain was involved in three major conflicts between the opening of the Stockton & Darlington Railway and the First World War.

his is the second part of a two part series showing how best to use the Bachmann Scenecraft buildings of Shillingstone Station, which is being restored by the North Dorset Railway Trust.

In this section we take the bare landscape and create something that looks a lot more like grass, weeds and hedges.

GROUND COVER

We concluded the previous article in this series by spraying the entire layout with green and brown acrylic spray paint to quickly cover up the white plaster cloth.

After the paint had dried I spread on Scenic Glue and sprinkled on Woodland Scenics Fine Turf where the grass would grow and fine real sand where the footpaths etc. would go.

After the glue had dried I added static grass fibres in some places with a Noch Grassmaster and Woodland Scenics Poly





Sand was sprinkled on the areas of the baseboard that were not to be covered in grass. Here, the first layer of green static grass fibres has been laid at the front of the baseboard.

Fibre in others where I wanted taller vegetation. This flexible synthetic material sold in green can be used to create undergrowth, foliage, bushes, trees and rambling vegetation. I teased the fibres out from the 'ball' of material in the plastic bag. It can easily be 'moulded' into any shape that is needed.



Hedges and vegetation were made from Woodland Scenics Poly Fibre that was teased out and then fine green turf sprinkled on to it.

I then stuck it down to the landscape with Woodland Scenics Scenic Glue and after a few minutes sprayed it with extra hold unscented hairspray and sprinkled on fine turf to represent leaves.

In real life there are quite a number of weeds growing through the ballast. I dabbed on a few spots of Scenic Glue then used a Noch Grassmaster to add static grass fibres.



Here are the resultant weeds.



A longer view showing the weeds between the platforms and the general vegetation that was mainly made from Poly Fibre, then sprayed with extra hold hairspray with fine turf of various colours sprinkled on.

STATION GARDEN

The flowers are made from laser cut multi-coloured high quality paper that makes them strong but delicate. These plants by Gaugemaster (made for them by Noch) come ready to plant and just need a small blob of Scenic Glue on their base before they can be pushed onto the landscape. The plants can be adjusted into an upright position with your fingers or a small pair of tweezers.

A layer of short static grass fibres were added over spread Scenic Glue. Step 2.
