# KEY DETAILS TRACK



I had always been a Peco user, happy with its looks, robustness and the way it functioned. But, at an exhibition a few years ago curiosity got the better of me and I purchased a few yards of SMP flexitrack, took it home and compared it to what was on Rubbishtown. Big mistake, as no sooner had I done so than a voice in my head started telling me to rip it up and replace it. Even at that stage,

I was thinking of using Peco turnouts in conjunction with SMP track but when it came to this layout, there was no choice but to learn how to build my own turnouts. To do this, I chose the easier route of bullhead rail and PCB sleepers, the first efforts being acceptable (as in, they worked but looked, well, wrong) and later ones looking better. Once you practice, it's actually pretty easy to turn out (pun

intended) turnouts to the dimensions you require.

The track was painted first with an aerosol can of Railmatch Sleeper Grime, followed by the rail sides and chairs being given a coat of Precision Track Colour. It is laid on C&L foam underlay and the ballast, all from C&L, is a mixture of 2mm Light Grey for the main lines and Ash Ballast for sidings and the cess.

Now 'Rubbishtown' was perfectly acceptable but when the baseboards warped due to a misinformed decision to use Sundeala, I had little choice but to tear it up and start again. There were a number of elements of the layout that I felt needed improvement and I was itching to move forward and try new areas of modelling.

### **WHY BACUP?**

So why a grotty mill town in East Lancashire which lost its rail connection in December 1966?

When I was 15, I bought a book called *British Railways Past & Present, No. 3: The North West.*On page 77 is a photograph of a run-down Bacup station, and a Cravens DMU departing as 'Black Five' No. 44728 idles in the headshunt with a brake van. There was no glamour in the station or surrounding

area, no pretence of a past glory at this railhead. It was always a small terminus with no famous named passenger services, no exotic locomotives or anything else that is supposed to appeal to railway enthusiasts or modellers. And in a strange way, that's exactly why it appealed to me.

Bacup was at the head of two branches; one from Bury via Rawtenstall (part of which is now the East Lancashire Railway) and one from Rochdale via Facit. The station was a terminus comprising a double-sided platform, a goods yard which used the platform run-round as a headshunt, a couple of carriage sidings, and a junction just off the end of the platforms. A mile down the Rochdale branch was a locomotive shed which closed in 1954. The station itself had a canopy of 12 pitches that covered about half of the full platform length.

I should point out at this stage that the layout is based on Bacup but is not true to prototype, as I did not have the room to do it justice. The trackplan is hopefully recognisable to those who knew the location but beyond the railway boundary nothing is in its correct place. However, all the elements are from Bacup and the surrounding area. Think of it as 'Abstract Bacup', a catchy name I am sure you'll agree.

### **GETTING STARTED**

To me, the planning of a layout is as enjoyable as the actual construction. Researching the location you wish to model, drawing trackplans, imagining how it might look, even constructing mock-ups of various structures can be a real pleasure.

It was during this stage that I realised that I was going to have to take a huge step up and build my own turnouts. When the plan was drawn using Anyrail software and Peco templates, there was just no flow to the station throat area. This was compounded by limits of available space and the baseboard joins. It would have meant having to use Peco turnouts of different sizes and radii and would have ended up looking scruffy, causing derailments and leading to no end of frustration. As such, I downloaded a copy of Templot (track planning software), swore at it a lot, deleted plenty of early attempts and then finally twigged out how to use it and quickly saved then printed off the plans before I forgot how to use it again.

The next step was key to progressing the whole layout. As the station buildings and canopy play a large part of defining the layout as Bacup, I built this first with the reasoning that if I couldn't make a decent representation of it, then there was no point in continuing. After three months of cutting, gluing and painting a large amount of plastic card and more lengths of Microstrip than I care to remember, I was satisfied that I could pull the layout off and made a start with the track.

### **PROGRESSION**

early to raise the trackbed above the baseboard frames and fill in the scenery above and below it. As such, other than the trackbed, there aren't many level areas on the layout with even the road past the station entrance being on a gentle slope. As far as scenery goes, there is not a great deal of greenery, the majority of space being filled with mucky stone-built terraced houses and mills, stone setts and filthy retaining walls.

The vast majority of the buildings on the layout are scratch-built; the exceptions being a greenhouse and a handful of lineside huts. Having decided to model a town in the Pennines, there was no option but to scratch-build the sandstone houses, mills and other buildings; lots of them too.

All the non-railway buildings are based on real examples in or around Bacup. Google Earth is a

highly useful tool in providing inspiration, details and dimensions. The railway buildings are taken from a number of other locations, chosen as their dimensions fitted better with the reduced scale of the layout when compared to the real location. The signalbox is a model of one at Hebden Bridge, the goods shed is based on one down the Facit line in Whitworth; Bacup had a rather large goods warehouse and there just wasn't the room for it on

The buildings are mainly constructed using a shell of mounting board, clad with embossed plastic from a number of sources and painted/ weathered using enamels. Slates are made from 150gsm paper. The majority have windows and doors made from plastic card and Microstrip, with a few exceptions, for example the signalbox, using etched windows. I was far too worried about making a mess of them and gluing on and cutting the Microstrip for such intricate windows would have driven me potty!

Chimney pots on the houses have been a point of contention, as anyone who has followed my thread on **RMweb** will know. Initially, I used tapered pots and was happy with how they looked but it was pointed out to me by a number of members that castellated pots were used in the Bacup area. It has been a running joke for some time but finally, I managed to source a vast amount of the correct pots from Freestone Models and attach them.

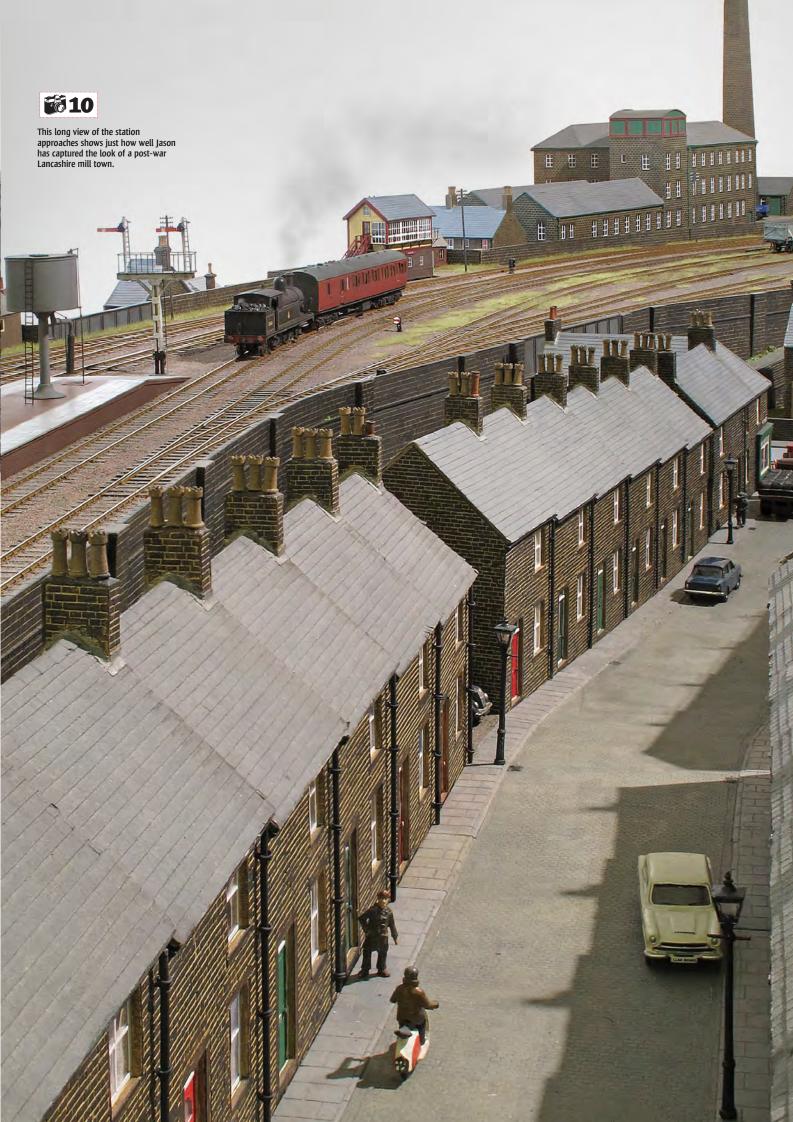
Other areas of discussion (which have inevitably led to changes) have related to the colour of gutters and drainpipes, stench pipes, diagonals on gates and most recently, the colour scheme of mangles!

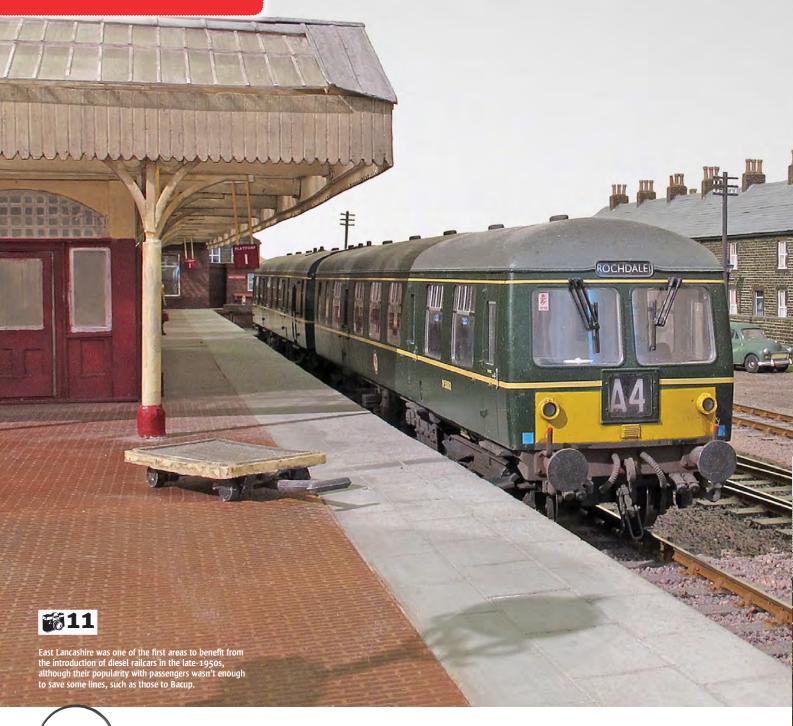

### **KEY DETAILS** WEATHERING BUILDINGS

Weathering of the buildings is achieved by first painting the embossed plastic with stone coloured enamel paint and then once dry, dabbing on first brown and then matt black enamel paint with an old rag wrapped tightly around the index finger. Doing so leaves the paint on the raised section but not in the mortar courses. I have tried this method with brick too; it was not as successful.



# WHAT MAKES BACUP A GREAT LAYOUT?

Although Bacup is Jason's first 'serious' layout he's very effectively captured the atmosphere of a Lancashire mill town in the 1960s, towards the end of steam in the area. The modelling of mundane terraces and functional mill buildings is to an exceptionally high standard. The locomotive and stock weathering is superb and the layout runs very smoothly. The only drawback is that it isn't an exhibition layout as it

deserves a much wider audience.

### **TAKING STOCK**

Bacup's passenger services went over to diesel railcars from the mid-1950s and from then on, the only locomotive-hauled passenger services were occasional railtours and Wakes Weeks excursions to exotic locations such as Morecambe, Blackpool and Southport. With that in mind, I duly purchased a couple of DMUs but then temptation got the better of me and I purchased an ex-L&YR Aspinall Radial 2-4-2T. Of course, a 'Lanky' layout should have a 'Lanky' locomotive. In fact, it should have a few, so it was followed by an A Class 0-6-0, a Class 23 0-6-0ST and in the pipeline, a London Road Models Belpaire-boilered Aspinall Radial 2-4-2T.

As I already had a few locomotives more common to the line in it's twilight years (for example Stanier Black Five 4-6-os), the layout now flits between a couple of periods in time; namely the late-1950s and early-1960s, with best efforts not to use locomotives that wouldn't have been seen together. After all, the 'Lanky' machines were something of a rarity by the early-1960s.

The majority have been renumbered to examples that are known to have run in the area, if not up the branch itself. A few have been chopped about a bit (the amateur's way of saying modified), all have real coal added and I am in the process of weathering them. Coaching stock comprises mainly RTR items, with goods stock being a mixture of RTR and kitbuilt, the latter gradually out-numbering the former.

### **LESSONS LEARNED**

Building the layout has been a rollercoaster ride. One of the aims was to teach myself various new modelling skills and constructing a layout based on a prototype location has driven me forward in doing so. Since starting the layout three years ago, I have improved my scratch-building and weathering methods, taught myself how to build turnouts, constructed my first etched brass locomotive kits, built signals from MSE components, plucked up the courage to take a scalpel to RTR locomotives costing a fair chunk of cash and glued my fingers together countless times (the last wasn't really an aim, more of a side-effect).

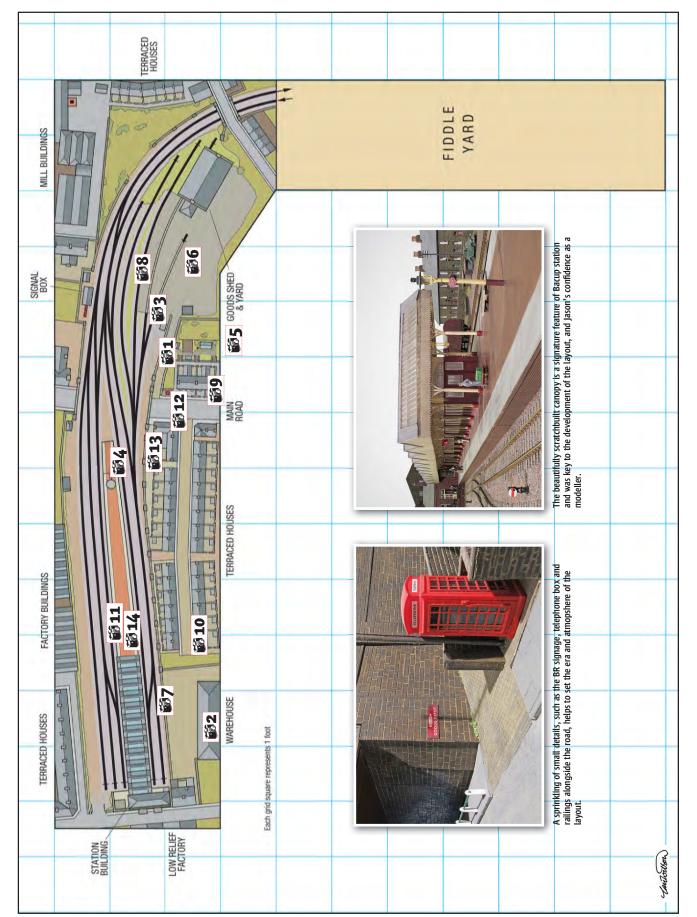
Without the advice and guidance of countless people on **RMweb**, I fear I wouldn't have achieved much more than 'Rubbishtown II' so may I thank each and every one of you, from those who I have chatted to on the forum and in person, through to those who posted up how they tackled tasks in their threads. Even those who wouldn't shut up about chimney pots!

And to finish the article in the traditional way, what does the future hold? Sitting back and playing trains, mainly.



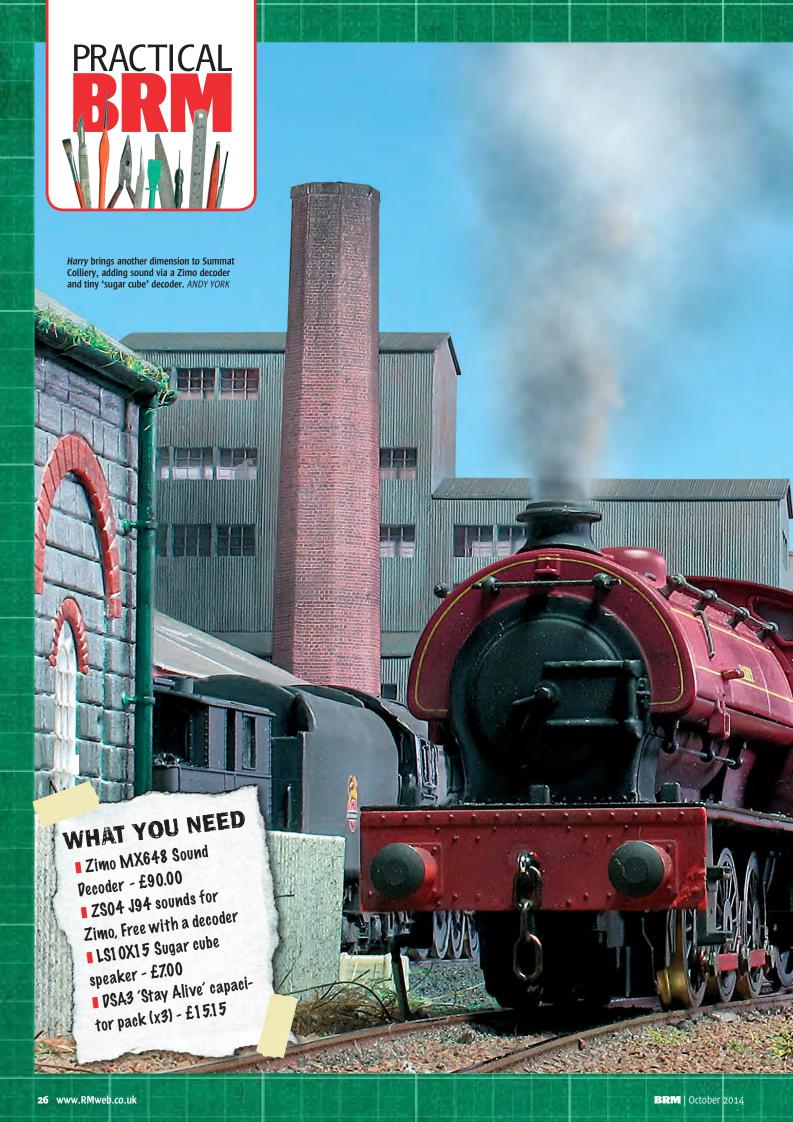

# FIT SOUND TO A LICENSTRUCTURE FIT SOUND TO A LICENSTRUCTURE

It can often be difficult to figure out how to install DCC sound into small tank locomotives, but as RMweb member *Ian Mellors* shows, new products are making it more practical.

With a little modification to the internal weight, and a little time and patience you can have a sound-fitted shunting locomotive for your layout.

TURN OVER FOR STEP-BY STEP GUIDE



Installing DCC sound into such a small tank locomotive might seem to be a step too far. However since the Zimo MX648 decoder and 'Sugar Cube' speakers came onto the market it has become a possibility.

I had previously fitted a Lenz decoder and a 'Stay Alive' capacitor pack into *Harry* - the main shunting locomotive on my Summat Colliery layout (November 2013 **BRM**), and so did not want to lose this extra functionality once sound was fitted. Thankfully the MX648 also allows for the fitment of an external capacitor, although it needs extra external components to control the in-rush current caused when the capacitor charges up.

The sound scheme was produced for Digitrains by Paul Chetter and features his 'Multi-drive' system whereby two distinct sets of exhaust notes are present on the decoder, one for a light engine and the other for one working a heavily loaded train. You can switch between the two sets by pressing the F5 key.

Dismantling the model is straightforward (see above). At this stage it is best to remove the front motor fixing plate by removing two more screws – now the motor terminals are exposed.

Unsolder the two bundles of wires leading from the pick-ups from the motor terminals. Make a note of which bundle leads to which motor terminal as you will need to make sure that you connect the orange wire from the

decoder to the bundle you connect to the red decoder wire, they are not colour coded for you!

Next, space needs to be made for the decoder and speaker. For a simple sound installation all that is needed is the removal of the 'U' shaped part of the cast weight that sits in the lower half of the boiler space.

Fit the decoder by connecting the red and black wires to the two bundles of pick-up wires, using heatshrink material to insulate the joints. Then connect the orange and grey wires to the motor. Don't worry if you end up getting the orange and black wires round the wrong way, you can always reverse the connections or use CV29 to make sure the locomotive runs forward!

Connect the speaker to the purple wires. Use a very small screwdriver to open up the small spring contacts on the speaker before inserting the wires – no soldering is needed. With its basic set-up the decoder fits in the bottom of the boiler space and the speaker sits above it under the cast weight.

Select a suitable capacitor that will fit under the weight; there is room between the speaker and the motor. A DCCconcepts capacitor pack will do the trick. If you want to fit the largest possible capacitor, use a file to make a shallow slot in the underside of the weight to accommodate the larger diameter.

art of TRMG's agreement with **BRM** is to exhibit Stokesay Junction, as it develops, at four major exhibitions. It is essential for guaranteed running quality to ensure that the baseboards fit accurately together. It may not be obvious but the tolerances required for N gauge are even more demanding than for larger scales.

We set out to guarantee the flatness of the eight baseboards and therefore the trackwork – irrespective of venue.

The baseboards of the original layout were held together by hinges with removable pins. We found there was too much movement when

re-assembling the boards and so used bolts screwed into captive nuts. Although this improved the accuracy we felt that it was still not the definitive answer.

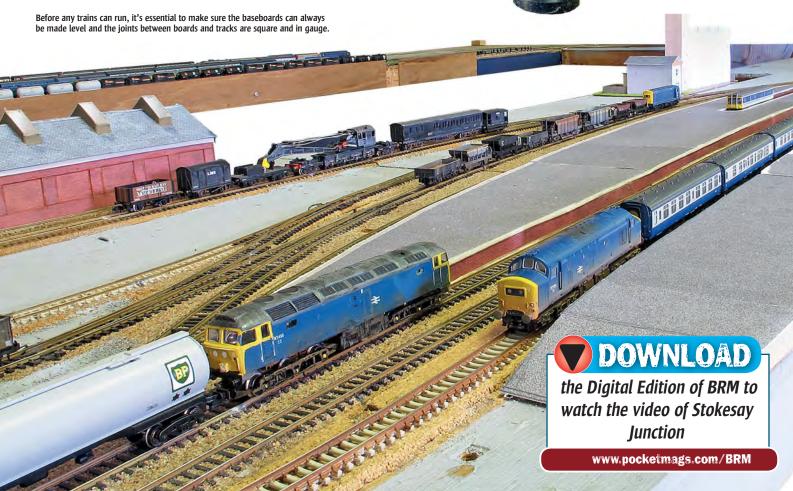
We turned to our preferred option of pattern makers dowels with most boards held together by over-centre catches. We also added adjustable feet to each of the legs (see right). We now have a firm basis, but still with flexibility, to transport the layout and know it

to transport the layout and know it will reassemble with the same degree of accuracy every time.

The other major variables in this quest for perfection are track joints at the baseboard interfaces. Track joints on baseboard ends must be accurate and in gauge. Track soldered to copper-clad sleepers has been used in the fiddle yards. On the visible sections track is soldered to brass track pins. All of the baseboard joins are protected by end plates when the layout is in transit. We have retained the original concept for transporting the layout; each front

board is mated with the corresponding back board and the two side boards are similarly held together. As mentioned previously each pair of boards is held by end plates. This ensures that the most when the water idea of the

by end plates. This ensures that the most vulnerable parts, the undersides of the fiddle yards, with their protruding point

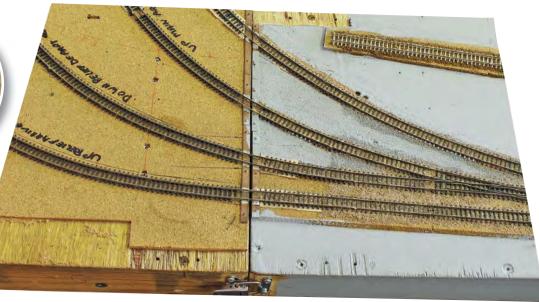
motors, and the top sides of the front boards with buildings and scenery, are protected in transit. As multiple aspect signalling is to be one of the features of the layout we are working on developing a system of removing all signals for transit (we'll cover this in a later article).

Fixing strips are fastened to the edge of each board to facilitate location in the transport van. We try to hire the same van type each time so that this feature can be standardised. A location plan in the van is then drawn up, and adhered to so that everyone knows where every board is placed in the van.

### **AT THE SHOW**

Erection and breakdown are to be carried out in a set sequence which is agreed by the exhibition team. We always have a list prepared for all of the items that must be taken to exhibition - not

forgetting the coffee mugs and chairs!

Two weeks prior to a show all tracks are checked and cleaned. In particular it is vital to check all points, particularly slip points, for pieces of stray ballast and other detritus. Good lighting, good eyesight, a small paintbrush and a very fine pair of tweezers are the main tools in this operation!

Following this the tracks are thoroughly cleaned, ideally not using abrasives. The layout is not

fitted with electronic track cleaners as locomotive manufacturers disclaim any responsibility for problems they might cause! We were lucky in that we were shown an excellent method of 'de-snagging' the track by a visiting member of the EM Gauge Society, who joined as a temporary member of TRMG.

A similar rigorous examination is also carried out on the locomotives and rolling stock. All wheels must be cleaned and checked for gauging. Similarly couplings must be checked as they can have a disconcerting habit of dropping with disastrous consequences. It is important to check lubrication of locomotives - eight hours of continuous operation at a two-day exhibition can take their toll. Any stock not coming up to scratch, has to be 'withdrawn' pending repair, hopefully returning at a later date.

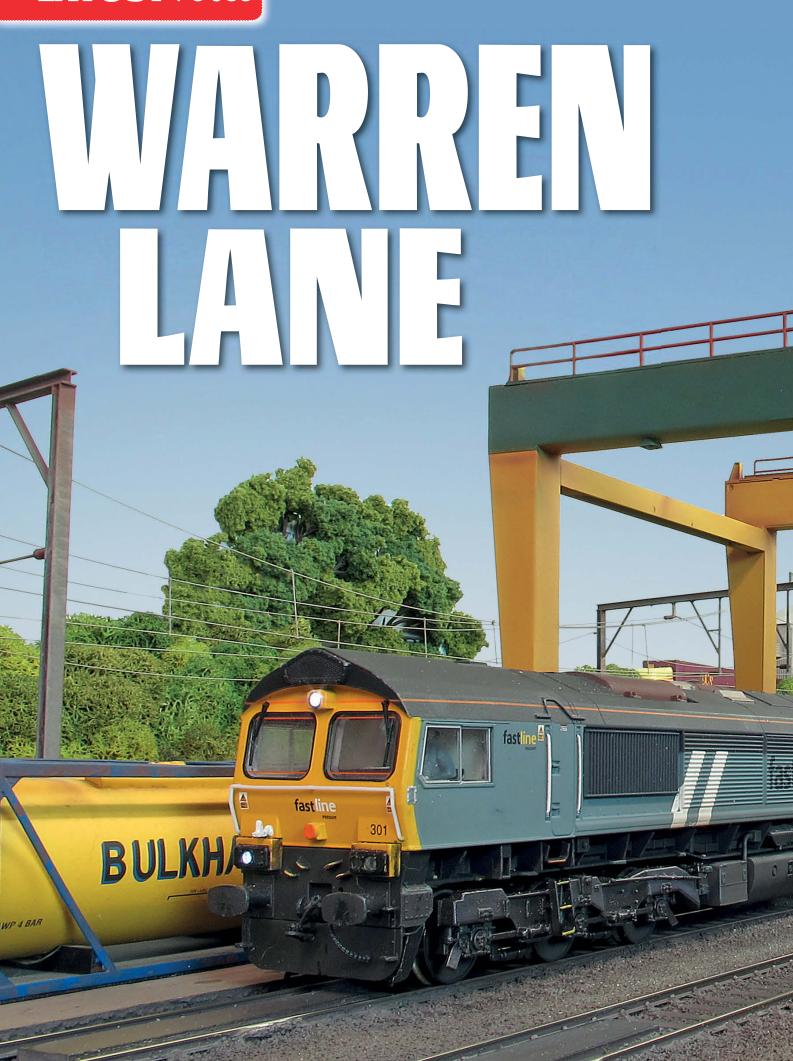
It is prudent to ensure there is 100% back-up of controllers, as these too, have to endure quite a bit of hard use over two days in an exhibition hall stuck in

Layout presentation should also be thoroughly checked and anything which might detract from a good visual impression for the general public, must be rectified both prior and at the exhibition. A spare tin of paint, paintbrushes and tools should be included, along with a quantity of 'tacky blue stuff' and drawing pins, which can be used to effect a

first become interested in model railways when my Mum brought me a Hornby train set one Christmas, I think I was about eight. Unfortunately the track was steel and soon rusted in our damp shed so it didn't last long.

A few years later, I started buying model railway magazines with my pocket money, I used to spend hours and hours studying every page until they fell apart. I daydreamed about what it would be like to own [Peter Denny's] Buckingham Great Central, my favourite, and plan my own layout. Of course I never had the money or the skills so the model railway dreams died.

Then, 35 years later on a whim Maggie and I visited our local model railway exhibition. As we walked into the school gym, right in front of us was the most amazing model railway I had ever seen!

It was Twin Falls, an On30 Logging Layout by Mick and Dan Lawrence. 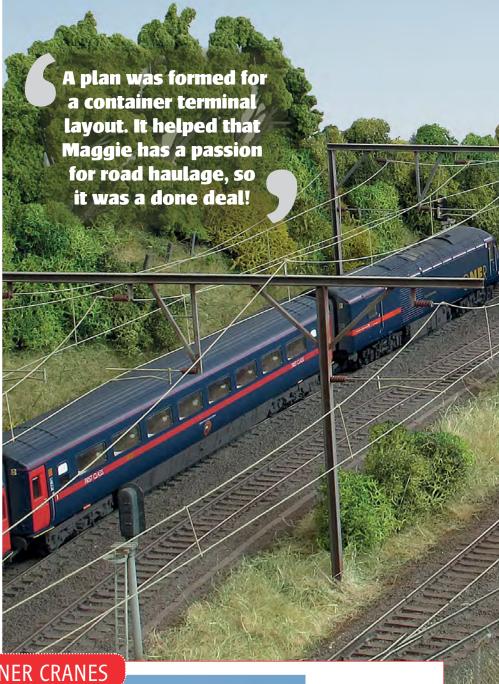
We made plans to build another logging layout, but soon gave that idea up as nothing we devised came close to matching Twin Falls.

Work started on Warren Lane in February 2010 and thanks to Ken Wilkinson we were invited to the Mid-Essex Model Railway Exhibition which was only seven months away that September!

I don't remember much about that summer.

If we weren't busy building baseboards or laying





The main focus of the layout is the gantry cranes. These are Heljan models repainted into Freightliner colours. They're fully operational models and can move and pick up containers using electromagnets. I replaced the original Heljan plastic track bases with code 75 flat bottom rail soldered to printed circuit board (PCB) material. This gives the cranes a run of about 8' not quite prototypical length but not too bad. We have converted about 95% of our containers with metal strips so that the cranes can move, load or unload boxes from anywhere in the yard.

track we would be out on field trips taking pictures at Felixstowe, Tilbury or Southampton.

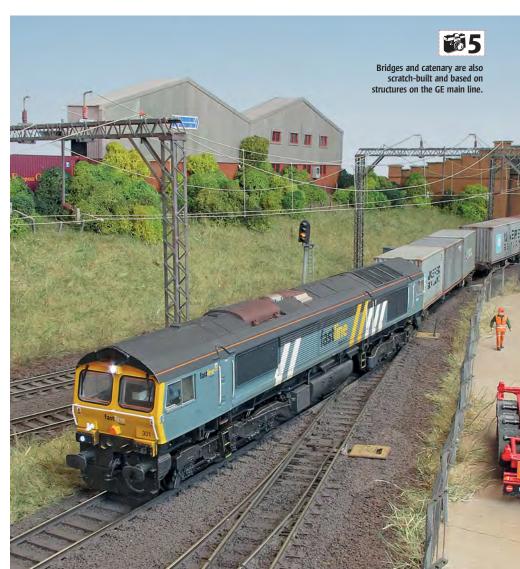

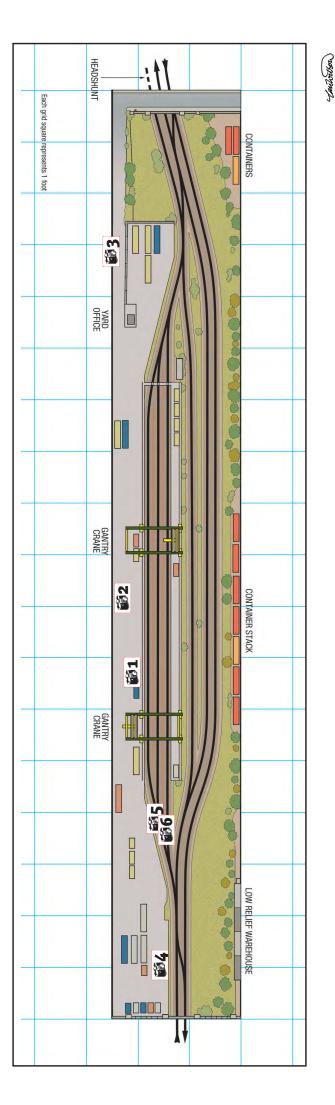

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# WERE THEY REALLY THAT COLOUR?

Colour is a hugely subjective and often emotive subject for modellers. HMRS Transfer Development Manager *Tanya Jackson* looks at the factors that influence our views on railway liveries.

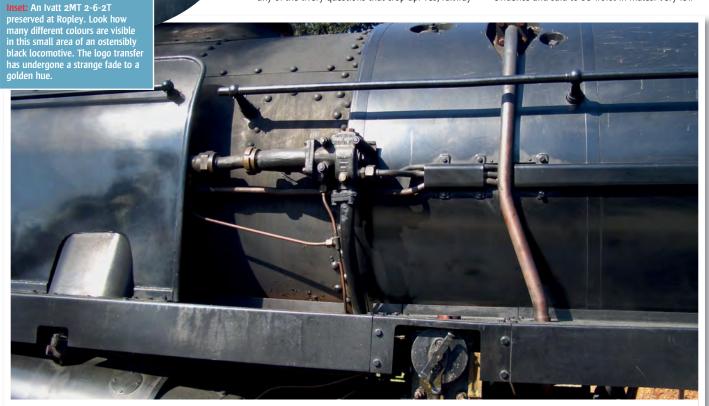
s the BR coaching stock steward of the Historical Model Railway Society (HMRS) I often have to address questions about livery - particularly those 'right shade' questions. In my other role as Transfer Development Manager such questions also occupy a considerable part of my time. I am often confronted with one of the most intractable of livery questions; what was Midland red, LMS crimson lake, BR maroon - or whatever?!

## THERE'S NO ESCAPE!

The more I have researched liveries - over more years than I care to disclose - the more I have reached the conclusion that there is no single right answer to any of the livery questions that crop up. Yes, railway companies did strive for consistency, but how far that was achieved depended, like so much else in life, on varying and disruptive circumstances. Issues such as application, cleanliness, maintenance, poor quality materials and cleaning that did more harm than good frequently intervened to thwart the best laid out livery schemes and render locomotives and stock a variety of different shades of the same colours – or, even worse, one different from that intended.

So, what are the facts behind livery colours, and what evidence should you rely on as to the 'right' colour for your model - bearing in mind that 'right colour' might be a subjective matter! Let's take the last of those first – the evidence.

Memory is by far the most fallible of all forms of evidence and said to be worst in males. Very few

people have perfect colour memory, and certainly this may largely be discounted as a guide to historical accuracy.

Some years ago, at an HMRS meeting in Skipton, Tony East took volunteers from the audience and, having eliminated the possibility that they were comprehensively colourblind, tested them to see if they could hold a colour in their memory for 15 seconds and then match it. None of them managed it. As he says; given that, how could they manage to accurately memorise a colour for 40 years? I am sure Tony would concede that this small test was not wholly scientific, but it accords with much other evidence about the fallibility of colour memory.

## PHOTOGRAPHIC EVIDENCE

All published images have been through several transitional processes before they arrive on the printed page. Each stage adds its own distortions and compromises.

Colour negatives are made up of discreet layers, each responding to a primary colour. To compensate for limitations in the chemistry of these layers the transparent film base has a balancing orange tint. In very early colour negatives this tint was almost red, but, due to gradual improvements in the technology, these days it is pale orange. At the printing stage, further adjustments are made so the print looks natural. A realistic appearance is imposed on the printed image by informed guesswork; it is not an accurate colour reproduction of the object.

When images are scanned from transparencies there are fewer steps, hence fewer compromises, but the dynamic range which can be recorded in a transparency is more limited. This is all to miss the main point, really. Normal photographs just don't contain enough colour data to accurately represent the object. For this reason some technical photographers include a colour reference card in the image. Measurements can be taken from this to correct for errors and reproduce elements more accurately.

In the Victorian era colour prints of locomotives were often created using a process known as chromolithography. This is a process where individual colours are printed on top of a black and white image one at a time. As Tony East points out, these pictures are made with ink, not the paints actually used on the objects portrayed, and also lack the varnishes and other finishes that may have made the actual vehicles look quite different.

This method, and others where an artist has selected colours, can have the advantage that a trained eye was involved in capturing and reproducing the particular colours and may be the most authentic records we have of some pre-Grouping colours - but don't bank on it without other evidence. Alongside his article in *Railway Archive Volume 5* Tony East exhibits a spectacular howler – a magic lantern slide supposedly of London Liverpool Street in GER days which is actually a picture of the LB&SCR side of Victoria station. The image sports a 'Terrier' 0-6-0T retouched into GER blue! Beware of artistic licence.

## PAINT SCRAPINGS AND DOCUMENTARY EVIDENCE

Paint scrapings are probably the best and most reliable source of information, however, we do

I make no extraordinary claims for my colour memory but this is BR blue as I remember it, on 33053 at Ropley in 2010. It was always prone to whitening in streaks, presumably the result of detergents. Note also that the underframe equipment proves that black is not always black. A combination of oils and greases, dirt and rust particulates have rendered it a variety of different colours, tones and shades.

need to be guarded here as one or two samples are only a snapshot. Moreover, historic paintwork has all too often been painted over and may have been affected by the paint on top of it, although I am told that a skilled paint matcher can match a paint colour even from a faded or contaminated sample.

In respect of documentary evidence, records do exist as to how paint was mixed but these can be unhelpful to say the least. For example, the recipe for LMS crimson lake specifies the use of 12lb of standard LMS lake (paste form). This paste was provided by an outside contractor which doubtless mixed up each batch according to judgement, the mix needing to vary as the ingredients in themselves would tend to vary in strength. Whilst one does not like to cast aspersions, providers of raw materials have long been known to vary the quality of their products - 'quality fade' is not a new issue! The paste would be mixed with varnish, turpentine and drier, doubtless in some pretty poor light conditions (as far as modern, professional paints matchers and artists are concerned).

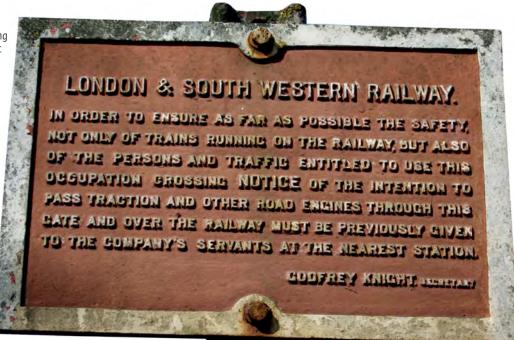
For the most part good documentary evidence on railway company liveries is rare. Ivor Lewis' article

in the HMRS Journal Volume 20, No. 3 describes just how excited the HMRS' GWR stewards got when they discovered a fragment of paper, from 1902, in the British Railways Board's Residuary Archive that contains lining instructions for GWR locomotives. This shows that Churchward initially approved the continuation of the Dean style lining. It is quite a find that backs up the existing research, but such finds are rare.

## **CONSISTENCY**

My fellow HMRS stewards of the GW persuasion, as mentioned above, state that the colour panels which Swindon used as their guide for locomotive green were consistent from the years 1875 to 1939 (*Great Western Way*, HMRS Publications, Chapter 3: Locomotives, p14-15). Varnish, mixing instructions and other factors led to observed shade differences – such as that in 1928 when the mixing instructions were changed. I have been told, by someone who was there, that the BR post-1956 era maroon applied at Derby was a good match to old LMS coach panels found at the works.

On the other hand, a correspondent has told me of riding from Perth to Edinburgh in the summer of 1959



## **PROTOTYPE INSPIRATION**

The patina of scratches on this transfer, on a preserved coach side at Didcot, makes it look like a Roman mosaic. You would not notice it except up close. I suspect this is mostly the result of cleaning, possibly tearing at areas already damaged by corrosives deposited from the atmosphere. It appears to have affected the white area more than the others but a view even closer up shows that to be an illusion.

or 1960 in a BR standard coach that had been turned out unvarnished by St Rollox, presumably in a hurry to fill a rolling stock shortage. He describes it as having "a matt, dull deep pinkish hue.'

There is evidence of consistency - or attempts at consistency, but changes in method or materials - or the need to get stock out as a rush job - could cause changes or lead to aberrations. Someone with long experience of working in a railway workshop has told me: "Colours varied according to who was doing the painting and when... and that was just the black!"



Reactions in paint don't stop once it has dried. The elements of the pigment may redistribute and lead to a gradual change in colour. It is well known that lead paint can darken due to the oxidisation of the lead. This may explain why some colours, such as Midland red, reportedly darkened as they aged. Another change that occurs is called 'float out', where the yellow pigment slowly sinks to the bottom and the blue rises.

These changes would happen in a normal atmosphere, and normal light conditions, without exposure to the more serious challenges railway rolling stock must endure; moisture, heat (especially where steam locomotives are concerned), soot, oil, acid, alkalis, salt spray and many more nasties will all take their different tolls on a paint surface.

A coach or locomotive exposed to the sea air of the West Country would doubtless weather in a different way from one suffocating in the smog of London.

been intended. exchanged between sets.

Until the demise of steam - in fact, until the general cleaning up of the atmospheric environment in the 1970s - a great deal of airborne filth was deposited on objects and this is reflected in BR documents that record some truly woeful examples of damage to liveries. These include an example of a coach, newly painted, that was put outside and ruined in just one weekend. The main source of such dirt was identified as the roofs from which it was brought down by wind and rain. It makes you wonder why they didn't wash the roofs

Cleaning is, of course, the answer to removing damaging deposits, but that can inflict its own ravages. BR locomotive green was one colour known to darken due to the patina of scratches that hand cleaning caused. This is probably one of the 'other factors' behind the change in shade on GWR locomotives, as well as MR red.

A varnish coat is meant to protect paint but from the

mid-1960s British Rail stopped applying it. Instead the new rail blue was to be its own protective layer and was originally applied via an airless brush method with a semi-matt finish. BR internal documents relate that early experiences with the results were not at all happy. Automatic washers damaged the surface and detergents were often left on too long, resulting in a characteristic bleaching of the paint. Vigorous attempts were made to remedy the situation, with some success, but those who recall BR in the 1970s will most likely remember it as the

fade-shade decade. BR returned to brush painting at many locations and the result was a glossier finish than had originally

Carriages running together could be in different stages of fading and weathering. Even on the Southern, with its fixed rake system this could occur, and even within multiple units. This could be due to vehicles being outshopped on different dates, or being

Light colours were/are much more susceptible to staining than dark ones; a BR document dated 1952 concluded that the cream used in the contemporary livery scheme, as well as that on Pullman cars, was "totally unsuitable" for railway service. The paint lasted as little as ten months before a complete repaint was necessary to restore a proper finish.

In contrast, Tyneside electric multiple units, painted in the contemporary multiple unit green, only needed touching up after a period of three years. The document also notes that photographs (it includes some) cannot not fully convey the deterioration.

It was reported in a BR document from the early Sixties that 2,800 tons of brake dust built up on the bogies and underframes of Southern Region vehicles alone in a single year. These encrustations caused damage to paintwork as well as being unsightly.

The British Transport Films production Power to Stop of 1979 shows the research work that was done on brake blocks to reduce the amount of wear and the corresponding detritus. It also reports that BR was replacing 3.5 million brake blocks annually at the time, costing an incredible £10 million a year.

Most weathered models - particularly the RTR ones - is that they are often pristine paint finishes with 'dirt' sprayed on top and no attempt to replicate the deterioration of the paint surface beneath.

## **PAINT TECHNOLOGY**

One correspondent advising me on this article commented that he found a 'fairground appearance' on preserved lines, a brightness of colour that he doesn't recall on the railways they intend to represent. Whilst

The SWT livery of Desiro EMU 450101 should last around ten years - a vast improvement on its predecessors. Modern cleaning regimes have been much improved by research and so has the design and behaviour of brakes, traditionally a major cause of pollution as well as soot, oil and fumes.

I have cast doubt on the validity of memory earlier, that was on the ability to recognise precise shades. In this matter I believe my correspondent's' memory has served him well and that what he correctly observes is due in part to the improvements in paint technology, where preserved railways are using modern paints to try to reproduce the effect of older paint types. Tony East's article, referred to earlier, outlines the problems that beset earlier paint technologies and how things were gradually improved.

In the modern era the use of two-pack spray paints has resulted in a much more glossy, vibrant and hard-wearing appearance of stock on the 'real' railways that can last ten years or more. This is often coupled with vinyl transfers of equally bright appearance – although, again, colour matching can be problem and there are some classic examples where the transfers and paints are combined and just don't match!

## **AMBIENT CONDITIONS**

The filth that contaminated rolling stock was very often airborne and likely dulled the light quality as well. This is suggested as another reason for the apparent brightness of preserved stock mentioned above.

Ambient light conditions play a large part in how we perceive colour, as well as the qualities of reflected light from varnished surfaces. One of the reasons that BR chose a part-matt paint for its new corporate image was to avoid the effect whereby distortions and other defects are shown up and exaggerated by reflections. In the diesel age, with more metal panelling, this was of greater concern.

Whilst researching this article I was contacted by a modeller who has painted his models to fit in to the specific light conditions of the winter's day – complete with snow – that his layout portrays. Whilst this may be a little extreme for some, it is worth considering the kind of light quality that will be available when and where you display your models and possibly choosing the colours accordingly, rather than being tied to a qeneral prescription of 'the right colour'.

A related issue is of course that of scale colour - perhaps one of the most contentious subjects when it comes to painting models. Anyone who has experience of choosing paint from a swatch, only to be disappointed, or maybe even aghast, as to what

it looks like on a whole wall knows something about this affect. When you reduce the size of an object its colour appears darker. There are plenty of anecdotes about modellers getting the right shade of paint – even a pot of the real paint from the works - only to be surprised that it looks nothing like the prototype. This is, again, something that needs artistic judgement and modellers should feel free to experiment.

## CONCLUSION

I hope I have produced some good reasons to liberate modellers from the tyrannical strait jacket

of 'exact shade' orthodoxy, whilst showing that you can be historically accurate whilst being rather more creative with your colour. If nothing else, when the colour of your new coach doesn't quite match the colours of the rest – relax, it's prototypical!

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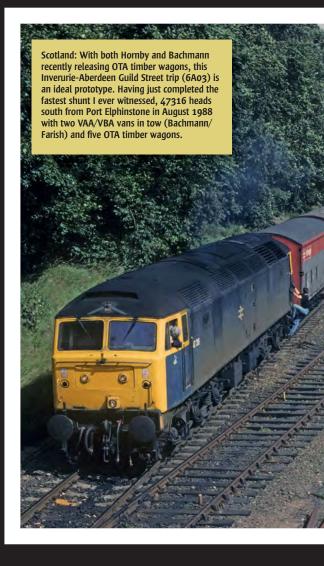

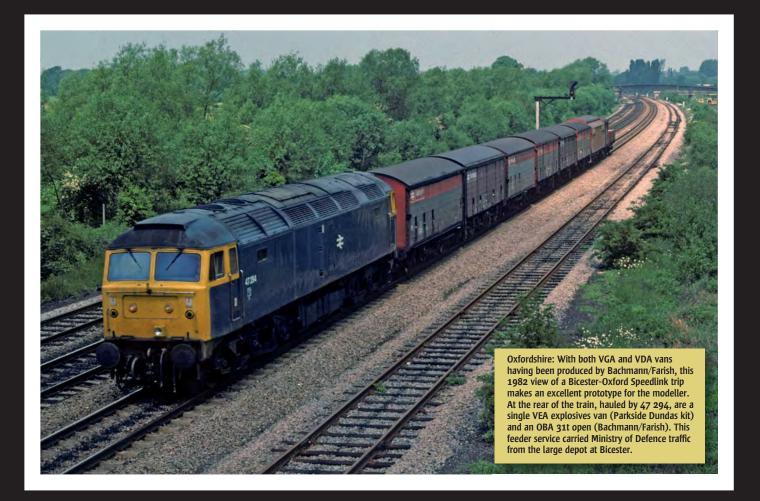

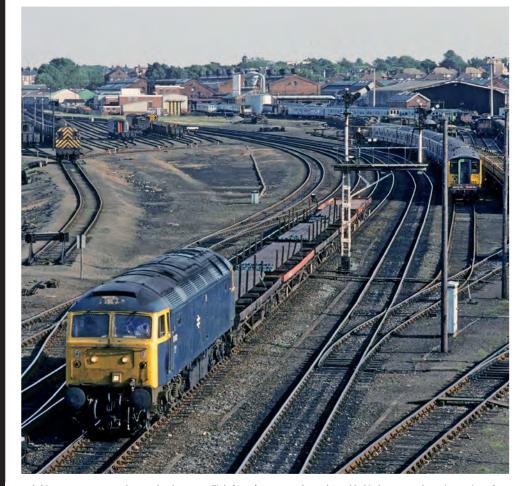

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# BRM MEETS... STEVE LAMACQ

**Ben Jones** talks to BBC Radio 6 Music DJ Steve Lamacq and finds out how and why he came back to his childhood hobby.



hat do you do when your lifelong hobby is also your job? And what if that job is in a stressful, ever-changing, highly political world like the music

At first glance, BBC Radio 6 Music DJ and former *NME* journalist Steve Lamacq doesn't fit the usual mould for a railway modeller. Witness to some of the most famous, and infamous, events in recent British music history, he has a seven-days-a-week job that still sees him attending three or four gigs every week, on top of his regular late-afternoon radio show and having to listen to, and absorb, an avalanche of new record releases every week. It's a wonder he has time to eat, never mind build a model railway.

When we meet at his London home, the evidence of two of his major passions can be found wherever you look; floor-to-ceiling racks of CDs and vinyl records, band posters around the walls and, piles of model railway magazines. In the converted loft, there are even more CDs, more magazines and a model railway being built to a good standard. So what made him take up the hobby?

"I was given a box of my old models by my parents a few years ago" says Steve, recounting a story that will be familiar to many. "It was really easy to fall back into. It really took over for about three weeks before I realised I had better go and do some work." he laughs.

"When I was a kid, one of my earliest memories is just sitting transfixed by a train going round an oval of track. I built it up so it was a double track with a couple of sidings. I think I was quite fascinated by the detail of it all."

"I remember having the set with the coach that collected the postbags and remember being fascinated by how it worked, thinking 'this is brilliant'."

"And then the modelling came. I started to build tunnels and kits of buildings and stuff, signals that changed."

As yet another Heathrow-bound airliner drones overhead, he continues; "I was quite into it until I was about 13, but then I guess I became obsessed with music. I'd been into music since about the age of ten; 1973/74 was the classic era of British glam rock, but then pop music went a bit rubbish for a while and I suppose I went back to my hobbies. Come 1977/78, it came back with something of a vengeance.

"I think this, coupled with moving up to big school, your life changes very quickly." Again, this will

resonate with many of us whose interest lapsed, only to return strongly later in life. He says; "I lost touch with it until I opened up this box containing my old set. It's quite evocative of the time, with its Bird's Eye fish finger vans and old Esso oil tanks. I got it out just for fun, it still worked and then I thought, 'I need to find some space for this."

How did the experience compare with those fond memories?

"When you were a kid it was just something to play with, but when you're a grown-up there are a lot of possibilities. It tests a lot of skills. I'm hopeless at electronics, but I've learnt a bit about wiring and carpentry doing this" he adds.

"Back in the old days, if you wanted to make scenery you had little packets of not very realistically coloured scatter, and lichen. That was all we had. And if you wanted to make a tunnel, you used chicken wire. When I saw some of the magazines, I couldn't believe how far things had developed in the time I'd been away."

Was there an element of regression or nostalgia

"It does make you think of a time when you had fewer responsibilities, but now there's just so much to learn. You feel like you've just gone back to school after missing an entire year. I've got 30 years of catching up to do. There are so many possibilities now, with the advances in scenery."

With that mention of scenery, I ask if there's a particular aspect of the hobby he enjoys more than others.

"I love doing the scenery. Scenery's easy!" he claims, although maybe not everyone would agree...

"All these things open up to you when you get back into the hobby. You work out which bits you like, and which bits you don't. Repetitive jobs like wiring up the track; it's satisfying when you've done it, but it can be quite tedious."

"What I really like is how you start looking at things in a completely different way. We followed a band around on tour earlier in the year. You turn up in somewhere like Bristol and as I'm walking around, I'm no longer looking at it as just another town, I'm looking at the buildings that are slightly different and thinking 'how on earth would you model that?' Or 'are those windows available or would I have to make them?'"

He continues; "Recently I was down visiting my folks in Essex and spent ages staring at the hedges around Chappel [& Wakes Colne] station and thinking that they weren't at all how I remembered them. So they'll have to come off the layout and be re-made. Looking at something and trying to re-create it, that's what I enjoy. There's something very satisfying about watching a train run through a setting that you've made."

## **HOME TURF**

Steve's native Essex clearly has an influence on his railway interests. I wonder if there are any locations or lines that have inspired his modelling?

"I've been to Chappel two or three times now to just sit there and take it all in. I think it's something to do with the pace of life. When you're busying yourself around the rock 'n' roll industry everything's moving so fast, even musical movements. Doing something else can give you back a bit of that quality of life.

"It's brought me more into contact with the area where I grew up and the history of where my mum and dad grew up, but reading newspaper reports and a couple of good websites about the run up to the closure of the Sudbury-Haverhill line in the 1960s – it's a fascinating insight into the times. How they

were trying to fight the closure and how things have changed."

Moving back to his modelling he says; "The current layout is various little bits of stations and buildings that were on the lines from Mark's Tey to Sudbury, Haverhill and Halstead, which is where I went to school. I'm trying to take little elements of what you can see and try to put them all together in quite a confined space.

"My first layout wasn't really a brilliant model, it was just stuff I'd bought on a board. Aesthetically it was

quite pleasing, but historically, massively inaccurate!" he admits.

"So now, I'm trying my hardest to model something that actually bears a resemblance to something that was there in the past."

So it's about pressing the right buttons, creating something that has resonance?

"That's it. Chappel was not far from where I went fruitpicking to earn money to buy records, Blur's first gig and reunion gig were there, so I have happy memories of it in other contexts too. I was very lucky to get a ticket for the reunion. It was very laid back and they were terrific that night. Just being in this old goods shed was brilliant. It has that feeling of history, and you can get the train home!"

During our chat, Steve points out some of the buildings that he has made from scratch, including one based on Chappel goods shed. Do such events and memories spark off his modelling projects?

"Yeah. I started off doing little things and teaching myself. I made the end of a goods shed, but the windows weren't very good, so I had to learn how to do that. "I thought when I started making buildings that if I got something wrong I could cure it later. Never go through the building process thinking, oh, I'll sort it out later. It just creates more problems down the line. But, I always try and get to the end of a project and look at it, rather than giving up halfway through. Then you've got a list of things you can do better next time."

What about the trains? Were there favourite classes from his early years?

"In terms of the trains themselves, they're mainly just shapes in my head, but some of my earliest memories of travelling by train would have been travelling up from Colchester to Liverpool Street behind some of those big old bullish diesels.

"In the old days Liverpool Street was so dark, not like it is now. If I could model anywhere urban, I'd love to have a crack at Liverpool Street as it was then. Soot and dust everywhere, it felt like the difference between dingy record shops in the 1970s and the bright clean shops of the 1990s. It just feels darker and naughtier and felt like you were a part of something."

## **FINDING TIME**

Bearing in mind all his other commitments, I ask how much time he can actually devote to building his lavout

"Usually a bit on Sundays, sometimes on Saturdays but less so in the football season." Here we diverge for a moment from railways onto one of his other lifelong passions – Colchester United FC.

"I split my Sunday up into doing four or five hours of work in the morning, trying to catch up, and then four or five hours upstairs in the railway room trying to calm down."

Do any of his colleagues or friends share his interests?

"It's interesting. I can't even remember how it came up in conversation but as soon as somebody knows that you're keen on model railways, the word goes around. I'm not sure that there are any other presenters, at 6Music, Radio 1 or even Radio 2 but there are a lot of engineers and live music producers into it; it's like a secret society.

"I was having a conversation with one of them about the Ally Pally show and my producer interrupted; 'No, the Florence & the Machine gig isn't until the end of the month'. And I said, we're not talking about Florence & the Machine, we're talking about the Festival of Model Railways!"

Is it the common need for electrics and electronics that draws the engineers in I wonder and Steve replies "I think it helps that they get a lot of free wire!"

"We did a gig, a joint production between ourselves and Radio 3 last year and managed to get The Stranglers to play The BBC Proms. I turned up and got ushered into one of the outside broadcast (OB) trucks, expecting to be instructed on which microphone to use, but no, someone had a new railway magazine and wanted to show me something.

"It's nice that there are other people around you can have a chat with, even when you're standing in a field at Glastonbury. I was there this year talking to one of the heads of OB about how far he'd got with his layout!"

For someone deeply involved in an industry that revolves around creating a cool, marketable image, as well as a great sound, what's the reaction from friends and family when they find out about his model railway?

"First of all, virtually everyone I know who's close to me has said, at some point, that I should get a hobby. Obviously, my hobby is music but it's also my job. I do tend to get quite absorbed and can be a perfectionist. "I think I was getting so strung out by extreme music industry politics and the way the industry was evolving that certain things were making me angry about the whole thing. And then you forget why you liked music in the first place."

"So what I needed was something to let the pressure and when I did, they could hardly take the mickey because I did exactly what they said. Most of the people I know are quite interested in it, although they were quite taken aback at first."

"If you hear that Steve Lamacq, A&R man to the stars, 'Mr King of Indie' makes buildings for his model railway on the weekends, I suppose it is a bit of a surprise. Some of the people at work are quite into it themselves, and a lot of others know someone who does it. You don't realise how big the hobby is until you go to one of the big model railway festivals and you see the scale of it."

## **TIME AND PATIENCE**

As our time draws to a close, I ask what advice Steve would give to other busy people in similar situations, and those who have recently taken up the hobby.

"Just get on and have a go. I haven't got 30 years of experience, but I want to do something which looks pretty good so I'll give it a crack.

"But definitely do something for yourself, even if it looks like it's going to be an uphill struggle and have patience. What would be the point of having it done in three weeks? You'd have to start again then! There's something about putting each little piece together that's very satisfying, even if it feels tedious at the time.

Clearly speaking from personal experience, he adds; "Plan it – really plan it, otherwise you might end up with something you're not satisfied with later.

"Like all good ideas, let it ricochet around your head for at least a month, draw it out and then have another think. If it's still a good idea, it will come back as a more detailed and better idea in the long run. Sometimes I get a little bit impatient and just want to get on with it and end up making an error!"

"You've got to have some time, and you've got to have a little bit of room, but I think the main thing is patience - you've got to take everything at a slower pace, which is quite enjoyable in a way. It's the stress-busting aspect that really appeals." **BRM**

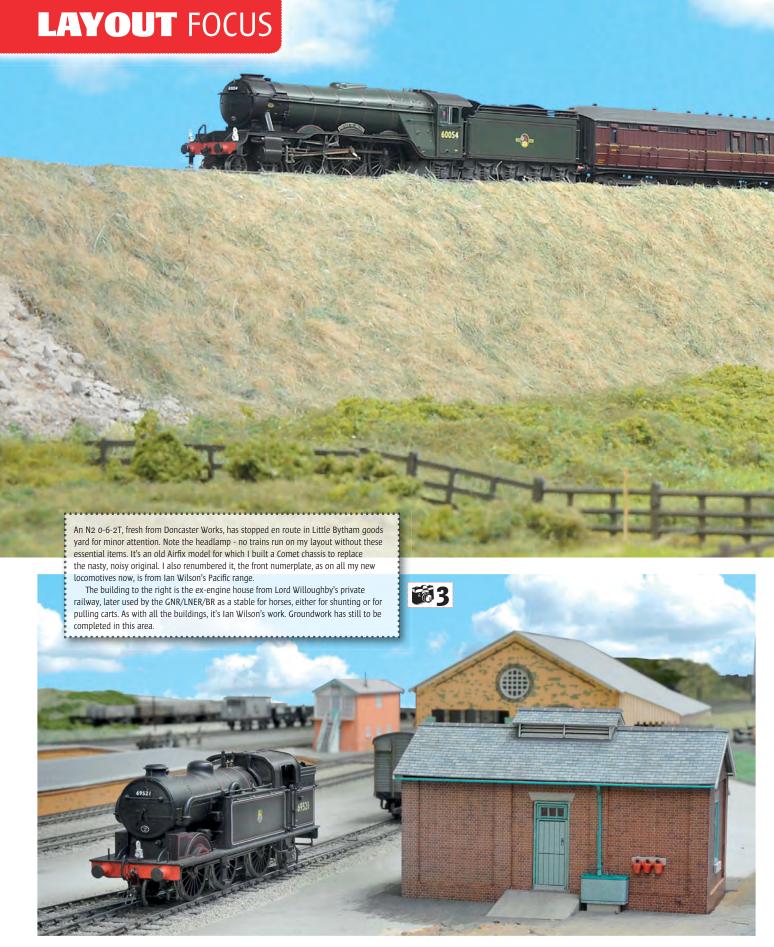

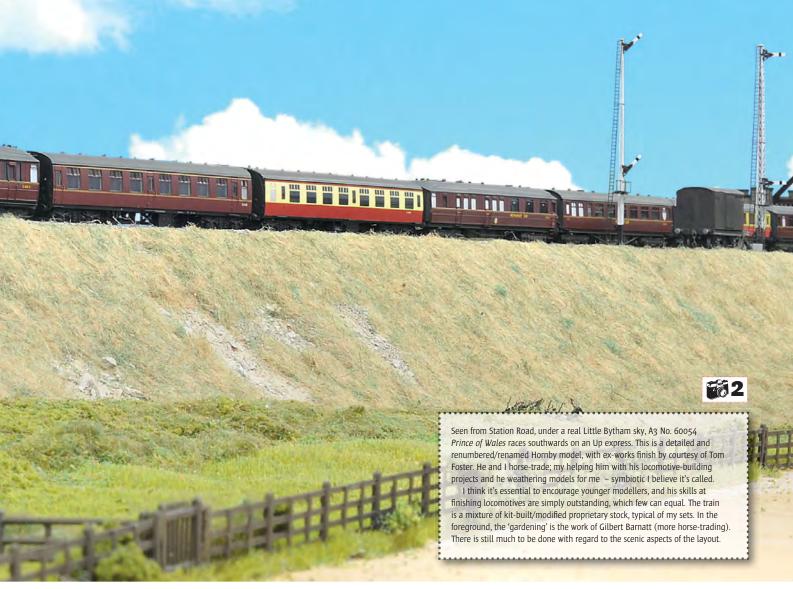
'm delighted that 'Little Bytham' has been placed high up on the voters' list on **RMweb** for inclusion in this issue of **BRM**, despite the fact that it isn't actually a layout thread in its own right. I must offer my thanks to all who've expressed an interest. May I also offer grateful thanks to all those who've wished me well over the last three years?

Regular readers of the magazine will remember a frequent series of updates on the layout's progress, beginning in 2008, but rather tailing off from 2011. Chronic illness is totally indiscriminate, and almost nothing was done on the railway for three years. And, apart from an appearance in *Modelling Inspiration* and a few snippets in the main magazine, readers who were following the

project must have been puzzled as to where it was going, especially after it featured in a DVD in early 2011. I'm now pleased to report that further progress is taking place and a further DVD appearance is being prepared.

So, what progress has taken place since Little Bytham's last appearance? The construction of the platforms and goods dock were the last 'major'

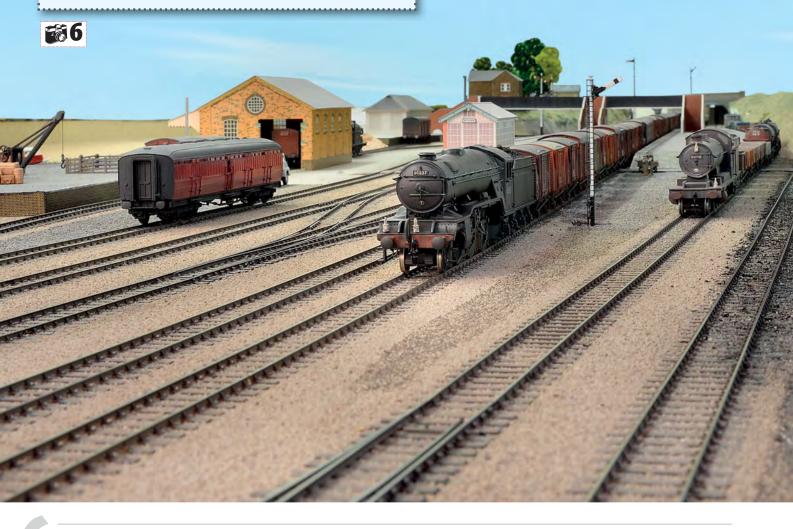




## **LAYOUT** FOCUS

What the East Coast Main Line was all about in steam days, or at least how I'm trying to represent it, as a V2 powers northwards on a fully-fitted freight, passing an O4/8 on a mixed goods. I made the V2 using one of Graeme King's resin bodies on a Comet chassis (an article is being prepared). The O4/8 is a product from my modelling dawn of time, part scratch-built, part K's kit.

The wide open space element has been captured well I hope, set off beautifully by Norman Solomon's peerless trackwork. The signalbox is a mock-up but the goods shed (Ian Wilson's Prototype Models prototype) is almost complete; just the lintels and doors to do. To the left, one of my Hornby/Trice coach conversions awaits collection. An article on how I did these will be appearing in the 2015 BRM Annual, due out in November. The first telegraph pole has sprouted (joined-together Ratio) and there is one more signal to complete and install, to the right of the track adjacent to the O4/8.



## Though my period for the layout is 1958, one of the great pleasures of operating it is to have guest locomotives and stock provided by dear friends.

development; since then any further scenic work has been very limited, but worthy of some small mention. This has included the making of the barrow crossings, part-representation of the hard standing in the goods yard, forming the limestone outcrops in both sides of the cutting at the south end, the making of the old engine house/stable in the goods yard, the construction of the Station Road overbridge, the beginnings of the footbridge, making some of the signals operational (more on this at a later date), the fixing of fencing and telegraph poles, and the representing of the rough grass area below the embankment at the north end.

The last mentioned has been already featured in **BRM** (February 2014), though more has been done since then. As usual, several good friends are helping with the project and the responsibility for

the engine house, overbridge and footbridge is Ian Wilson's, the signals' operation Graham Nicholas (the builder of Grantham), the fencing Rob Davey and the rough grassing by Gilbert Barnatt.

It is the intention to write small articles on how the various developments have been achieved, but for now the photographs illustrating this piece should, I hope, give a good indication of what's been happening.

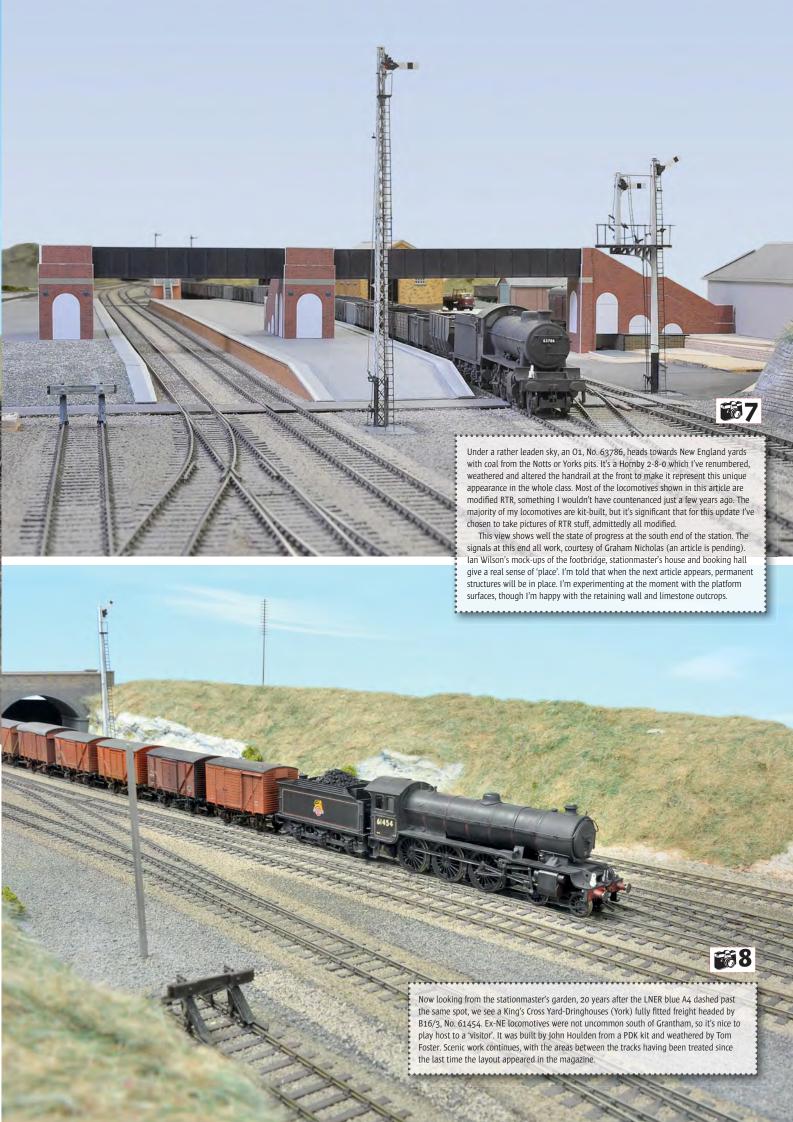
Obviously, because my principal interest in the railway is the making of locomotives and stock, there are several new additions, and some of these are shown and mentioned in the relevant captions. Some are modifications to the latest generation of RTR models, others complete kit-builds. Several will form the basis of future articles in their own right.

As progress continues, I'm conscious as to how

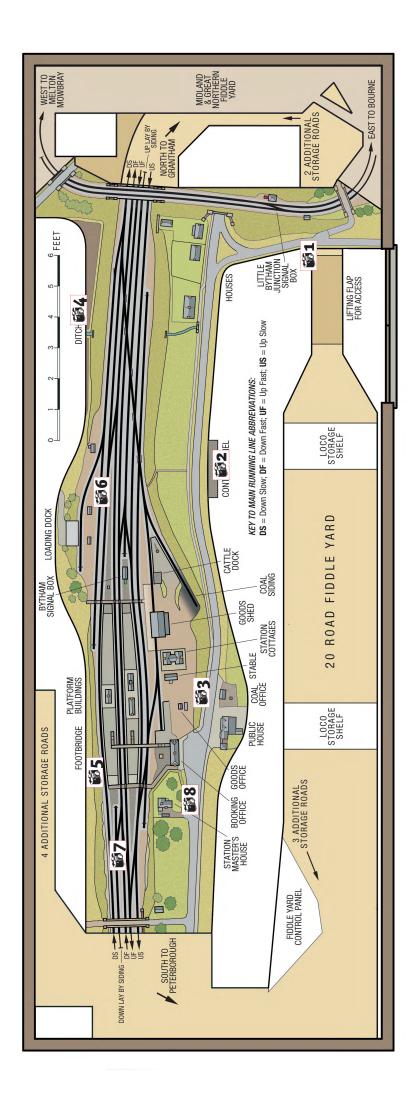
representing an actual prototype is so much more rewarding (at least to me) than just making things up. Consulting actual photographs of the real thing and pondering how best to represent what's in them is really fascinating. Where you have first-hand anecdotal evidence with regard to, say, how the railway (at a local level) was worked, it's also fascinating to try and incorporate such practices into the operation, though fly-shunting and horse-shunting are beyond me.

Whether I replicate smashed doors in the goods shed is a moot point, but we'll see. Sadly, the last surviving member of the Bytham gang died earlier this year. He was pre-deceased by his colleague a couple of years ago. Both were source of many delightful tales and had several most useful photographs. Many thanks Pete and Wilf. **BRM**

## **DONOR MODEL**

An ever-popular base model for a variety of conversions is the old Airfix Mk 2d BSO. This representation of vehicles 9479-95 is a pretty good model, even by today's standards. Only now is a replacement in sight, in the form of Hornby's new Mk 2e vehicles. For conversion work, I would avoid the relative expense of a new Hornby model and find a cheap second hand Airfix one. Should the project go wrong, the loss won't be too great.

Fortunately, the Mk 2d BSO shares the same bodyshell as the Mk 2e and Mk 2f; minor underframe detail differences are simple to alter

on the base model The DBSOs were converted from Mk 2f BSOs in the 9513-39 series. Bodyshell modifications are limited to those made by BR to create the DBSO, namely the creation of a driving cab at the van end. The later addition of a generator and its grilles adds to the conversion project, making it all the more interesting.

The model could be reassembled using the glazing and bogies of the base model if desired, thus keeping project cost to a minimum. I chose to refine the model with Shawplan 'Laserglaze'. Bogies were upgraded at minimal cost by using Replica Railways B4 bogies. It is likely that the supplied wheels on an old second hand model would need replacing. 12mm disc wheels are



Displaced by Class 158s in Scotland, the DBSOs were transferred to Anglia services and saw further modifications prior to being superseded again by Mk 3b DVTs in 2004-06. Five of the 14-strong fleet were obtained by Network Rail (NR) and two others are now with DRS.

The PH Designs Mk.2f DBSO kit is available in several versions

enabling the modelling of ScotRail, Anglia and Network Rail

Network Rail The DBSO remains a popular conversion and now has a new twist thanks to the various modifications made to NR DBSOs, now known as Remote Train Operating Vehicles (RTOVs), to accommodate a generator and other equipment. Peter Harvey, via his PH Designs range, has produced a conversion kit incorporating the features of the Network Rail operated RTOVs. Add Shawplan

I chose to have a go at the Network Rail version with the idea of making up a short test train to use it with Track Inspection Coach DB999508. Even though Bachmann has announced a ScotRail DBSO model for release in 2015, a Network Rail version is likely to remain a remote possibility due to the various modifications made to the full size vehicles which might preclude a dedicated tooling – who knows? As conversions go, DBSOs are great for newcomers to rolling stock conversions because the base model is inexpensive. Whilst it requires some work including repainting and significant changes to the body shell to incorporate a generator together with modifications to the underframe, the actual modelling is not difficult to do. BRM

WORKING ON THE BODY

Use a sharp scalpel to mark the window positions, taking care not to move the overlay mask during this process. Keep the blade at right angles to the coach side so not to over emphasise the window openings.



Handrail positions are easy to locate on the body using the etched mask. Mark each one in place with a 0.45mm drill.



Remove the overlay mask and cut out the new windows together with the air horn grille opening by drilling a close network of holes within the scored lines.



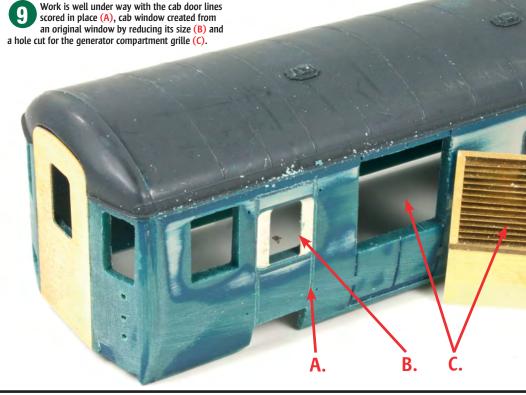
Check the position and size of each window as they are filed to shape. Network Rail RTOVs do not have front gangways. The model is fitted with a blanking plate where the gangway used to be.



The generator grille is assembled by fitting the slats to an etched frame. Mark in the position of the grille in the coach side using the assembly. Cut an opening in the side, located in the position of the luggage van doors, to accommodate it.



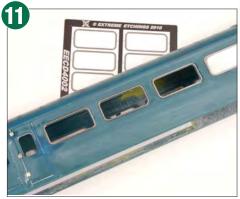
Use the part window blanks supplied in the kit to reduce the size of the small window. This becomes a cab door window which also needs the door lines scoring in place using the etched mask as a guide.

It is inevitable that some remedial filling work will be required. Squadron putty is ideal for this task. Note that the cab fittings have been added to the cab front.



To enhance the appearance of the large passenger compartment windows, I used Shawplan window frames, even on the pair of plated over windows, one on each side.



An initial coat of light grey primer reveals any faults in the fitting of components such as the gangway plate and in the bodyshell. A little more filler and a final smoothing down with wet and dry paper tidies things up. I was unhappy with the cabside windows and re-profiled them with the help of a couple of pieces of styrene strip. It is easier to make these changes before painting starts.

## **UNDERFRAME MODIFICATIONS**



The headstocks of the Mk 2d coach model are the wrong shape. Correct them by removing with a razor saw and rebuilding with styrene strip.



Xuron snips make quick work of chopping away the pressure ventilation ducting – Mk 2f stock does not have this feature. Finish off with a sharp scalpel.

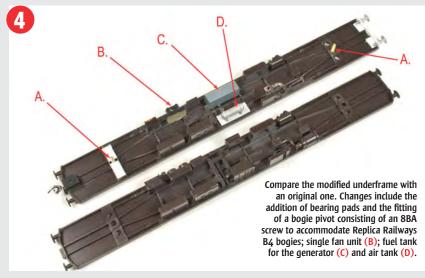


With razor saw in hand, remove the twin fan unit and replace with a single Hurst Models fan unit.

ome of the moulded detail on the underframe is not required and should be cut away. I used photographs to determine what was left on NR RTOVs. A fuel tank was added for the generator compartment too. Fortunately, a 4-CIG underframe equipment box from a Southern Pride kit suited. I happened to have a spare, but a tank could be made up from pieces of 20thou styrene if required.

The conversion can be simplified by reusing the original coach bogies. I chose to use a Replica Railways B4 bogie kit, modifying it by replacing the linkages with a representation of dampers. Whichever bogie is used, the clasp brake shoes are not needed and may be trimmed away because DBSOs/RTOVs have disc brakes. Etched discs by Hurst Models or MJT Components will enhance the appearance of the model.

The key task is to rebuild the cab end headstocks to allow the fitting of the obstruction guard and extended oval buffers. The following sequence shows how the work was undertaken.





The headstocks can be rebuilt from styrene strip and fitted with extended oval coach buffers. Fold the obstruction guard supplied with the PH Designs kit to shape and glue it behind the headstocks.



The completed headstock detail with frame ends showing. They will be detailed with an ETH socket and air brake hoses.

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## PAINTING AND FINISHING



Laserglaze can be secured by running thinned gloss varnish around the inside of the window frames without touching the surface of the glazing itself.

conversion involves a mixture of different materials, it is easier to apply a coat of light grey

primer to the model rather than touch in metal parts with

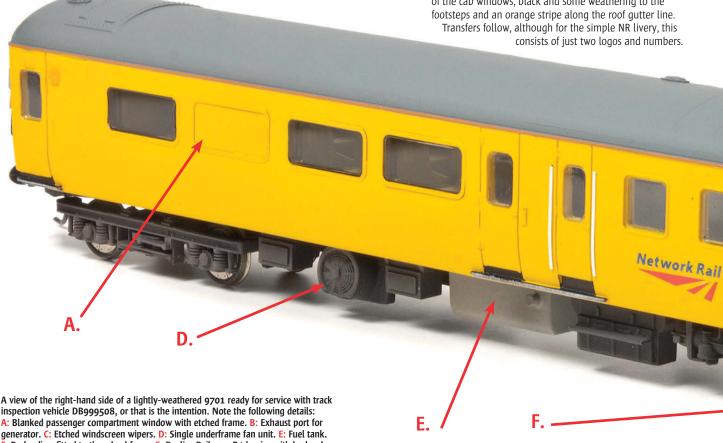
a brush. This has the benefit of showing up any faults in the body prior to painting. Faults are tidied up together with a further coat of primer before applying a base coat of Network Rail yellow paint. I follow up with 'warning panel' yellow to the cab front, the colour being different to NR yellow. NR grey to the roof and black on the inner end completes the primary paint job.

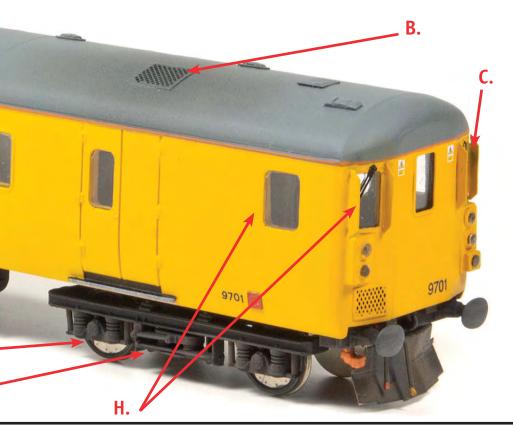
hilst the original glazing can be refitted, the new windows for the cab will need glazing. Cut some acetate sheet to size and fit it to each window, secured with clear gloss varnish. Also use the latter to secure the windscreen wipers and the small lenses of the light clusters made from lengths of optic fibre. Shawplan Laserglaze windows are easy to fit, requiring a stroke of a file or two to the smaller clear windows to fit the door and guards compartment window openings. A spot of clear varnish is all that is required to secure the glazing in place by allowing it to run around the inside of the window opening by capillary action.

Small details to add after painting and varnishing

include handrails for the new cab door; the holes having been drilled out during the conversion stage. Orange door lock warning lights can be added to the panel between the inner end passenger doors and toilet window using a square of clear orange film. Air pipes and a coupling hook finish off the underframe. The final job is a very thin wash of roof dirt grey, diluted to 25:1, to the coach sides and end to represent grime that is omnipresent on all rolling stock, even after a short time in service. Grime is particularly noticeable on light coloured stock and Network Rail yellow is no exception. Apply this sparingly with a flat paintbrush and without overbrushing so as not to rework the varnish finish.

This model was prepared for the fitting of running lights and a decoder – a future project. When I fitted the head and tail light etchings to the cab front, they were drilled through to the interior so optic fibre light guides could be installed once all painting and finishing work was completed. Lighting is a project in its own right, including the choice of decoder, wiring, fitting wheels that will enable current collection and wiper pick-ups to both bogies.

Such a conversion creates a convincing model with the satisfaction of knowing that it is unique and completely personal. Whilst the ever-growing coverage of ready-to-run models is beginning to impact on some popular conversion projects, not to mention kit-building, many opportunities remain for kit and conversion projects. It does not hurt to have a go for the experience and to say, "I built this!" **BRM**

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## DOCTOR YELLOW & FRIENDS

Having created various NR trains for his 'New Bryford' layout, *Mick Bryan* discusses hows, whys and wherefores of modelling contemporary test trains.



et's get one thing straight; it isn't simply a case of painting it yellow! Much of the current fleet of Network Rail test trains is modified from revenue earning vehicles as part of the locomotive-hauled or electric multiple unit fleet. These vary from a complete rebuild where the origin of the vehicle can be difficult to determine, to simple modifications, such as a plated-over window. There are a few coaches that are simply painted yellow, but they are usually just included in a formation to give extra braking capability.

I am often asked where I obtain information and photographs regarding the modelling of these trains. In particular, where do I find out the numbers of the coaches?

Some have been heavily rebuilt and fitted with test equipment, while others, such as ex-Gatwick Express Mk 2f 72612, are included in test trains to ensure there is sufficient braking power and have minimal modifications. Periodicals such as *Rail Express* and *RAIL* often have useful photographs and reports of train workings, the various recognition and spotting books can also be used, but in this age of the internet, there is a huge amount of information on the web. Start by typing 'Network Rail' into photographic resources such as *flickr.com* or *smugmug.com* and be ready to burn the midnight oil!

A simple search will reveal a list of vehicle numbers such as 72612, 999605, 9481 and train reporting numbers, 3Q01, 1Q64 for example. These vehicle and train reporting numbers can then be used for further searching via the photographic sites and Google.

One of your best resources will be www.departmentals.com. This site has a very useful 'sightings' database where any of the test vehicle numbers can be entered to view a list of dates and locations. These can easily be cross-referenced with picture websites to confirm the exact formation and even orientation of the vehicles within the train.

There is also a departmental vehicle discussion group at *finance.groups.yahoo.com/group/departmentals* for further perusal. Fellow yellow junkies are also useful for providing information!

Numbers of the locomotives that are used to power the trains can also be used as search terms. These are covered later in the article. As with any research, you will be distracted and led down odd alleyways, but that's half the fun

Your searches will also lead to other avenues to widen the research, using the descriptions of the test coaches – Structure Gauging Train, Ultrasonic Test Unit, Track Recording Unit, TIC, EMV, for example.

## **GOING FURTHER**

Most photographs tend to be trackside and threequarter views, which are very useful for body and underframe detail, so when I have the chance to take my own photographs, you will usually find me on an overbridge taking roof shots.

There are some test train formations that changed little over long periods of time, such as the now-disbanded Structure Gauging Train, but many of the track monitoring train consists can vary, almost on a weekly basis. For example, there's a regular train running on the Southern Region usually consisting of High Speed Track Recording Coach (HSTRC) 999550 and Electrification Measurement Vehicle (EMV) 977983. Electrical power is provided by one of Network Rail's Mk 1 generator vans and a brake force runner

## **PROTOTYPE INSPIRATION**



Modellers of the NR fleet need to keep abreast of the frequent changes that occur in the use, deployment and look of the various yellow vehicles. makes up the formation. Mk 2s 6261 and 9523 have recently fulfilled this role. However, the generator and brake force runner can be swapped with others in the fleet and one of the Mk 2 Radio Survey Coaches (RSC) could be included instead of a brake runner.

Using the information gathered, I can search for photographs and details of specific vehicles and ask the following questions:

- What is the origin of the coach?
- Is there an RTR model of the original coach?
- ▶ How much work is involved what modifications are there to windows, doors, underframe and roof?

- If there isn't a suitable RTR model, is there a kit?
- How difficult would it be to scratchbuild?
- What other vehicles are required to make up a test train and can they be modelled?

Then I apply the same criteria to the other vehicles. If I've determined that it can be modelled, then it goes on the 'to-do' list!

Over the short period that I have been compiling this article, some of the formations and uses of the trains have changed, as well as some of the bodyshell details. The recently introduced PLPR vehicles have had a couple of window blanks fitted or removed. For example, former Mk 2f Restaurant First Open (RFO) 1256 that had been running as a brake force runner with RSC3 -977997, has had one of the previously plated windows from its RFO days altered to a 'half' window and two windows on the opposite side plated over.

SGT2 has recently been formed with 977985, which used to be bar-coupled to the Optical Car 460000, until it was replaced by RTOV 9708 in 2009.

TIC 999508 and the original Structure Gauging Train comprising 975081/975280/460000/9708 have been retired from active duty, although 9708 has since been

refurbished (see photograph) and is now part of the active RTOV fleet. It still retains the various boxes and brackets on the cab end from its days with the SGT.

Another SGT vehicle, 72630 has been converted from a brake force runner and semi-permanently coupled to 977986. 977985 is now paired with 99666, while 62287 has replaced 999605 and is designated UTU2.

The PLPRV and Mk 3b DVTs have still to enter full service but recent trials have seen a Class 67 sandwiched between 82111 and 82129. The DVTs are also sporting new banks of monitoring equipment above the bufferbeams, as well as nose mounted cameras.

## TRACTION

Motive power is drawn from various sources including Network Rail's own and hired in fleet of Class 31s -31105/106/233/285/465. 31190/452/454/601/602 have also been used over recent years.

NR's ex-Class 37's 97301-304 are regularly used, especially for duties in Mid-Wales, where a trial of the European Rail Traffic Management System (ERTMS) is in progress on the Shrewsbury-Pwllheli/Aberystwyth line.

Direct Rail Services Class 37s are also hired, and used either in push-pull mode with an RTOV, or top-and-tail,

- DBSO: Driving Brake Second Open. A Mk 2f Brake Second coach converted with a driving cab, known as a Remote Train Operating Vehicle (RTOV) by Network Rail.
- DVT: Driving Van Trailer.
- ▶ High Speed Track Recording Coach: Checks the alignment of track and rails to ensure that they are fit for high speed running, and identifies problems so that they can addressed by maintenance teams.
- ▶ **PLPRV:** Plain Line Pattern Recognition Vehicle. Fitted with high-speed cameras and optical measuring systems to check plain lines, particularly rail/sleeper fixings, negating the need for manual trackside inspection.
- Radio Survey Train: Checks the integrity of the railway's own radio network, based on its own GSM-R telephone/radio network.
- > Structure Gauging Train: A train that checks tunnels, platforms, bridges and other structures surrounding the railway to ensure that the 'envelope' through which trains run is to the agreed standard.
- ▶ Ultrasonic Test Unit: Ultrasound equipment on specialist vehicles checks the integrity of rails and spots any cracks that may be forming due to fatique.





sometimes with Network Rail Class 31s and 97/3s. DRS Class 47s were once common on test trains, but haven't been used recently. RTOVs can only operate with locomotives fitted with Blue Star multiple working equipment, currently limiting them to Class 31/37 power.

Network Rail's own Class 57/3's have been used on stock transfer duties, but now that these have been transferred to DRS, that duty will cease. Class 73s from various sources are often provided for test trains on the Southern Region. A pair has made forays north to power a test train on the Merseyrail network for the past three years. NR is in the process of having two Class 73s completely rebuilt with two 750hp diesel engines to make them into 'Ultra Class 73s' capable of operating anywhere on the network (see p70). GBRf is also re-engining some Class 73s and it's likely these will appear on test trains in the future.

DB Schenker Class 67s are also used, with the current plan being that they will power PLPRV trains using a Mk 3b DVT at the other end. Class 67s are also used if testing duties require speeds of 100mph or more, such as overhead line testing with 975091 Mentor. Class 67s are often used top-and-tail.

Over the summer of 2014, some of the New Measurement Train vehicles were undergoing maintenance and the NMT has been formed of a mix of Mk 1/2/3 vehicles with Mk 1 975091 *Mentor*, sandwiched between Mk 2s 72616 and 9516, with Mk 3s 975984 and 977984 making up the set.

Hopefully, this will spur a few more on to enter the brightly coloured world of test trains.

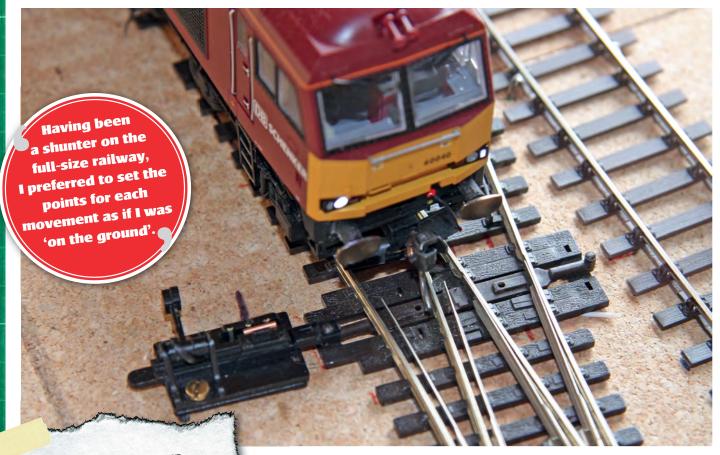




HOW TO FIT...

# HAND-TH

Former BR shunter *Graeme Elgar* explains how he installed simple hand-worked point throws on his 4mm scale layout.



## WHAT YOU NEED

Caboose Industries Ground

t had been my intention to motorise all the points on my layout Halstead & Orpinghurst. At Halstead, the terminus, this was achieved using Tortoise switch machines operated from a Modratec fully-interlocked lever frame using double-pole, double-throw (DPDT) slide switches and in the yard a combination of Peco/Seep soleniod motors controlled from a 'stud and probe' panel.

At Orpinghurst, however, I used Tortoise switch machines on the main line controlled from DPDT switches on a panel. To control the yard I needed a different method of operation due to four factors:

- The 'town' or London end of the yard is obscured by an overbridge
- The length of the yard means it will be inconvenient to have a central control point
- Deneath Orpinghurst Yard are four hidden storage sidings which would make placing the Tortoise switch machines either beneath or in close proximity to their points awkward, if not impossible!

Cost! Even if it were physically possible, Tortoise switch machines cost almost £15 each, which when I need eight of them, plus the DPDT switches and lengths of wire, the price comes to well over £100.

Having been a shunter on the full-size railway, I would prefer to set the points for each movement as if I was 'on the ground'. This may seem strange after saying the yard at Halstead is controlled by a 'stud and probe' panel, however at Halstead the layout is relatively complex and most of the pointwork is near the panel so I can see when the movement has cleared the points and its safe to change them.

At Orpinghurst, the yard is lengthy and with an overbridge remote point control would be difficult. I didn't want to touch the point blades to change the route as this would introduce oil and dirt (or whatever else is on fingers!) to the rails and so on to the wheels, nor did I want to use a short length of dowel as that might damage the points, so some form of switch or lever would be needed.

Browsing the advert section of *Model Railroader* magazine I saw that a company called Caboose

# ROWN POINTS

## **SPDT GROUND THROW**

This ground throw (Ref. No. 224S) differs from the simple version before as it has single-throw, double-pole switch built in to change frog polarity (Photo 8, p76). As with the simple version, part assemble the ground throw by adding the base and inserting your end fitting of choice, then add the small brass contact. Fit the throw to the point and 'finger' test its position. When happy with its position, mark where a hole is to be made for the contact strips (Photo 9), remove the assembly and drill the hole (using a 9mm bit) (Photo 10).

Complete the assembly and solder the wires to the contact strips as per the instructions (Photo 11). For added protection when all the wires were soldered on I covered the contact strips with shrinkwrap.

Once all the wiring was complete, I carefully opened out the securing holes as with the 'simple' ground throw to accept 8BA bolts, following the same procedure to avoid overtightening.

Looking at the size and close proximity of the throw to the point I did wonder if there would be sufficient clearance for longer vehicles, however, a quick test with a Class 60 soon proved all was well (Photo 12)!

You may find that during testing the frog is dead, however, a small amount of adjustment to the contact strips in relation to how they meet the small brass SPDT contact will rectify the problem.

Industries make two types of 'ground throws' (US terminology for points levers). Shortly after, I saw them in action on a friend's US layout and was suitably impressed. They are simple to install and operate too.

I decided to try both types, more down to availability issues than trial and error! One is a 'simple' ground throw which just moves the point blades, the other has a built-in single-throw, double pole (STDP) contact to change the polarity of the point frog.

All the Peco Electrofrog points were given a 'reliability modification' (Photo 1) whereby the small wires that connect the point blade to the frog rail/crossing vee were removed and a permanent connection made between the stock rail and the blade rail (this ensures power to the point blades rather than relying on the tab on the blade making contact with the stock rail). Having done this, if left unconnected the frog will remain dead, however when wired up correctly its polarity will be determined by the lie of the points, normally via an accessory switch attached to the point motor or built-in as with Tortoise switch machines.

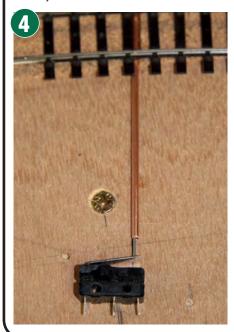
Obviously having a microswitch on view next to each point isn't going to look good on a finished layout so for those three points with a 'simple' ground throws there is a piece of piano wire to activate the microswitch.

Whilst gathering all the parts for this article, I had difficulty obtaining piano wire, and eventually sourced it from a general model shop in Dingwall,

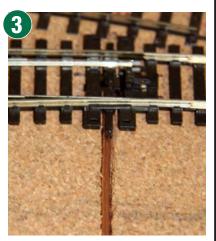

Ross-shire along with the copper tube. Whilst the copper tube was easily sourced, a common cry from shops when asked for piano wire was "we're fed up of telling people there's no call for it!"

#### **'SIMPLE' GROUND THROWS**

Both types of Caboose Industries ground throws are made of strong self lubricating Delrin and are 'self latching' – which means they hold the point in the chosen position until they are 'thrown' again.

The first step is to assemble the ground throw. All that is needed is to choose the end fitting that suits your make of points and insert it into the main assembly and it's ready.

All track on the layout is laid on 3/32" cork. I drew a straight line on the cork in line with the tie bar and cut a 3mm wide channel along the line. I measured the distance between the tie bar and the location of the microswitch and cut a length of copper tube approximately 15mm less than that measurement (Photo 3).

Next, I measured the distance from the hole in the centre of the tie-bar to where the microswitch will be, added 4mm and cut a piece of piano wire. At one end of the wire, 4mm was bent through 90 degrees, inserted in the tube with the short end bent up into the hole in the tie bar (if the wire protrudes from the tie bar, trim it to size). This was then laid into the 3mm channel.

Having already selected the approximate location for the microswitch and cut the piano wire accordingly, I then 'finger' tested for the precise location. This involved placing a finger on the microswitch, moving the points to and fro, observing the arm of the microswitch and listening for its activating 'click' (Photo 4). When I was happy with its position, I secured it to the baseboard and wired it to the point (Photo 5) before testing the polarity with a locomotive.

You may find that the copper tube deflects when the points are thrown and the microswitch doesn't activate. If this happens, secure the tube near the end with a small cable clip or a couple of screws either side of it. **BRM**

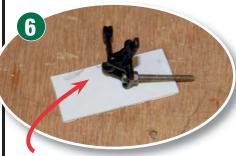

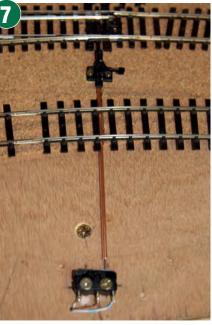

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# APA PARK





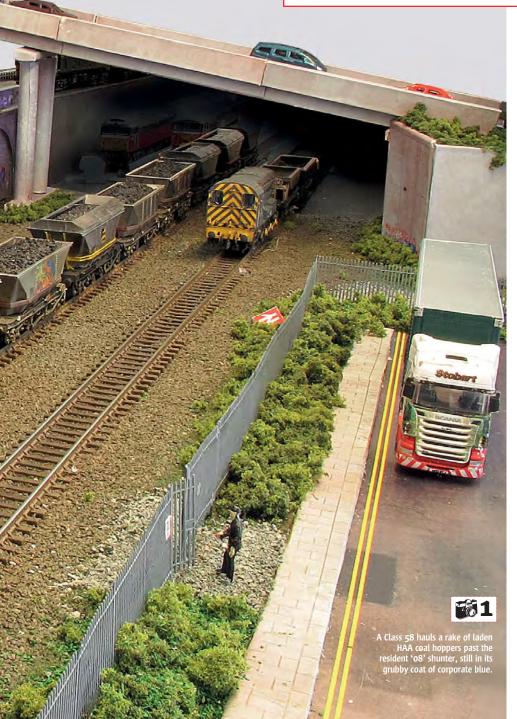
Great layouts don't have to be big. RMweb member **Steve Purves** took the boxfile concept to a new level with this budget N layout housed in a converted toy box.

## **KEY DETAILS** IKEA TOY BOX

The IKEA box, known as APA, is intended as a toy box for a child's bedroom. There are a number of dioramas and layouts being built using them as a base. This could be seen as a natural progression from a 'boxfile' type layout, and the APA has the potential to offer interchangeable modules

or scenes within a fixed layout base. The lighting is also from IKEA (Ledberg). This is fixed to the inside of the top frame. A micro-layout can offer anything from a photographic diorama to a fully operational exhibition layout, as seen here, and can offer real results in a short period of time at very little relative cost.





pa Park, a new retail park, has been built on a former railway yard just outside town. The yard was built in the early-1900s by the Great Central Railway (GCR) to handle a variety of traffic. Apa Yard was mostly lifted in the late-1970s but a dozen or so tracks remain to one side of the former GCR main line which ran on arches across most of the site. The remaining sidings are used for stabling and reversal of freight traffic including engineering and coal trains.

The local council, keen to promote an integrated transport policy, part-financed the opening of a new station to service the retail park built on the disused half of the site. The logical place for this was on top of the disused arches of the former main line which now connects with the junction to the former Midland Railway station just over two miles away. A simple single line spur was laid for multiple units to serve the new complex.

The former locomotive shed, now just a stabling point, is at the other end of the yard and locomotives can often be seen stabled at the extremities of the yard. Occasionally, main line steam charters are serviced here whilst passengers take a stroll around the town.

#### LIVING IN A BOX

Apa Park, the layout, started life as an IKEA storage box called 'APA' which is just over 2' by 1' in size. I had been browsing internet forums for inspiration on a possible micro-project and was heading towards a box file layout, but then happened upon a couple of users of **RMweb** using the APA as a starting point.

As luck would have it we were heading to IKEA that weekend and I managed to pick one up quite quickly. The box retails for a very respectable £11 and modellers have used them in a variety of configurations. I tried sketching some plans on paper, although I feel that with any small layout it's best to try some stock on the table and get a feel for the space and potential operations in the space available.

The box was built almost as per the instructions but I left one panel out of the long side to create an open side for viewing. I decided to fit the cross piece for the open side as this would come in handy to install some kind of lighting.

With an idea of what I wanted to achieve and by shuffling some stock around in the empty box

## **GATHERING INFORMATION**



I spent the early-2000s travelling around the country by train and have based my modelling on this period. I like to replicate locomotives I saw in the condition in which they were seen. Stock for the layout is biased towards British-built older generation locomotives and multiple units that I saw all over the Midland Region in that era. The operation of the layout is a simple shuttle service for multiple units on the high level station but the low level represents the end of a larger yard complex enabling long modern block trains to be modeled realistically. The scenic break hides the fact that the train isn't 40 wagons long and only the first half dozen wagons are visible 'on stage'. Inspiration has also been drawn throughout from **RMweb**, the Ngaugeforum and facebook. I have drawn ideas from all sorts of sources to put them in my box.



Preserved 'Black Five' no. 45110 rests at the stops after bringing in a charter. It and the 'Dutch' Class 37/0 will retire to the depot for servicing.

I devised a plan; two tracks on a bridge at the back and three on the base at the front, exiting to the right on to a separate fiddleyard board. For the fiddleyard I used the box lid, which when upturned is the same height as the base of the main box. In turn, this makes putting a baseboard in the box easier.

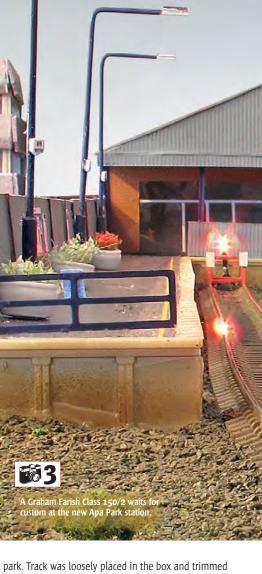
For the baseboard I cut two pieces of 9mm ply to shape. I made the one for the main box an inch or so smaller in both directions so I could remove it from the box whilst building the layout. Once complete this would be fixed to the base permanently and access holes cut in the box to tend to wiring and point motors.

The boards have 1" square blocks glued to them which raise the boards to clear point motors and also locate the board within the box. Because the ends of the box are slightly inset I had to cut the hole in the end of the box before I could assemble the boards to get the alignment correct for the baseboard join. I planned on using simple dowels and toggle catches for lining up the lid to the box, but this brought its own challenge, the height of the lid. To get around this I used two more 1" blocks glued to the end of the lid and butted against the box in the correct position this gave me the height required to fit the catches.

#### TAKING SHAPE

With the baseboards in I could see it taking shape. I always like to build 'placeholders' (quick, disposable mock-ups) for buildings so that I can get an idea of how they will look before starting on the final version. I make them from cheap 1mm mounting card from the stationers (you can also recycle used cereal boxes – Ed.).

Using this method there were various developments on the bridge (level deck or angled deck) and arches (red or blue brick) and the size and shape of the retail



park. Track was loosely placed in the box and trimmed to size, I bought some new but heavily tarnished points cheap. A quick whizz in the ultrasonic cleaner brought them up like new!

It was at this stage that the lure of a Dapol Loadhaul Class 56 got the better of me and I succumbed to a DCC trainset which included a Gaugemaster Prodigy Express controller and some wagons. The whole project was originally planned to be a budget exercise so this was my one extravagance!

Sticking with the budget theme, I bought a variable temperature soldering iron set from Lidl (£6.99) and completed the very simple DCC wiring. This was my first experience of DCC and I am suitably impressed. Once I had figured out that you have to isolate the point frogs I was away!

I used Seep point motors controlled by a pair of toggle switches on the fiddleyard board. At this stage I fitted a fascia to the front of the box using 3mm hardboard and sprayed the whole box matt black. An LED lighting strip also from IKEA, called Ledberg, was fitted on the top support which at £11 for three 9" lengths is quite a bargain!

#### **SCENIC SETBACK**

With test trains running well my thoughts turned to scenery; and how things had moved on in the ten years since I last did any scenic modelling!

One new type of product that appealed was downloadable print-at-home building kits – the Scalescenes range met a lot of my needs for Apa Park. The concrete overbridge was first, made of two kits joined end on. This replaced my placeholder with minimal fettling but it looked more like a take-off ramp on an aircraft carrier! It was just too steep. Looking at the arches I planned to use, I realised they were only 45mm high; my upper level board was

60mm above the lower - oops.

This meant it was time to strip it all back down! With the track off I ran a saw through the supports for the top deck and took 17mm out of the height before replacing and fixing at the new height. The modified bridge now looked more believable.

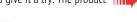
I went for red brick arches on the placeholder retaining wall but this didn't reflect my back story so I opted instead for blue brick arches from Scalescenes - six kits worth in total. The beauty of these kits is the ability to print as many as you need after purchasing the initial download. Peco platform edging was then fitted on the station level which enabled me to get the ballasting completed.

I lined the inside of the box with 3mm hardboard for the backscene, I was originally going to have curved joins in the corners but with space at a premium I decided against it. Onto the board I painted a typical British summer sky, heavy with rain, something not often modelled.

A new lid for the box was cut from 9mm plywood and screwed down with brass screws, I decided to fit a lid as I wanted the box to draw the viewer in, like a three-dimensional picture.

#### **STORAGE YARD**

The fiddleyard board was originally just going to be plain track but I saw on an online forum a member had used 25mm electrical conduit for fiddleyard cassettes, so I thought I would give it a try. The product



## MY FAVOURITE LAYOUTS

In earlier modelling times I looked up to layouts such as Dyserth Road as a pioneer of the DCC depot type layout and New Bryford (see August BRM) for the selection of rolling stock. Layouts that made an impression on me for one reason or another include Acton Main Line as it showed what could be achieved in N in a reasonable space, Holiday Haunts and Stoke Summit were excellent 'trainspotting' layouts and Hedges Hill Cutting just has that feeling of an urban network feeding its way through the city.



## STEVE PURVES

I have been interested in railways all of my life, graduating to N gauge by the age of 13. By 16 I had taken ownership of Griffin Road (an N gauge exhibition layout) which I exhibited a few times. At 16 I started work for EWS at Toton and went on to model other gauges including 00, 0, SM32, 3.5" and 5" gauge live steam before coming full circle back to N gauge in late-2013. I had planned a large exhibition model of Melton Mowbray, set in the 2000s, but this was postponed due to losing the storage space. In search of something smaller I discovered the joys of micro layouts and then DCC.

I got from B&Q was unfortunately too narrow at the top so I had to use a mini-drill with a disc attachment to take the top lip off (a very messy job!).

I also managed to get the self-adhesive version so had to take the foam strip off the back with a knife and sandpaper. A length of track was simply glued into the channel and standard rail joiners used to connect it to the layout. If they get damaged I can just chuck them away and slide on new ones. It seems to have worked well so far...

With the ballast laid and set I couldn't proceed any further until I had funds to purchase an airbrush for weathering the track. I pressed on with constructing and modifying the Scalescenes car park kit and scratchbuilding a station building and

modern retail park out of plastic card.

I weathered the track with layers of brake dust, rust and oil, before giving it a blow over with a mix of all three. I use this mixture as a base for weathering my stock and buildings as it helps to blend everything in together.

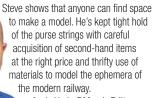
At this stage I read about the N Gauge Society Annual Modelmaking competition for small layouts. I could see Apa developing well and, with little

over a month to the deadline, it was within reach of being finished. I decided to enter – there's nothing like a bit of pressure

With a young family, time and money are at a premium and just as the entry form was sent the budget ran out. I had to sell a locomotive to raise the required capital to buy the finishing touches. This included details such as point levers, the yard light from TPM and the palisade fencing from

N Brass Locos. Apa was designed to be a budget project and I believe I managed

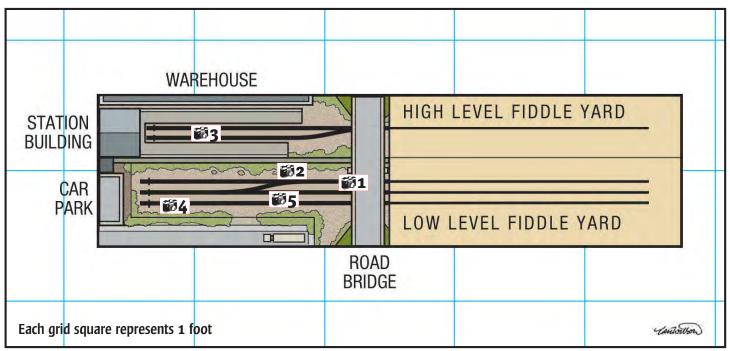
to stay under the £100 barrier, excluding locomotives and rolling stock.

At shows the layout has been a success and was awarded the Graham Farish Trophy at the International N Gauge Show. This now sits proudly atop of the box, somewhat dwarfing it!

Modelling on a tight budget has been very rewarding as has seeing the project evolve. I was only able to devote maybe an hour or two, once or twice a week to modelling once the kids were in bed but the results shown here demonstrate what can be achieved in a small space. **BRM**

## THE GENTLEMEN'S

Stuart Hilton's dioram depicts a hidden side of the 1980s railway.

Stuart Hilton's diorama

ometimes it's a building you pass every day, but don't notice until it's gone, sometimes it's an idea sparked by a chance remark. The Gentleman's Restroom was the result of two, completely independent suggestions. Firstly, the announcement of the 2011 RMweb Diorama Competition and secondly, someone had started a forum thread which asked 'which was the grottiest toilet building seen on a layout?' The thread showed various examples of excellent models of toilet buildings, some were of the platform-based Victorian wrought iron outdoor type, and others were of buildings found in loco yards. But no-one had modelled just the interior.

The competition rules stated the dimensions of the diorama could not be bigger than 20" x 11" x 11". Putting the two concepts together has proved to be one of the most self-perpetuating things I've ever done.

#### THE MODEL

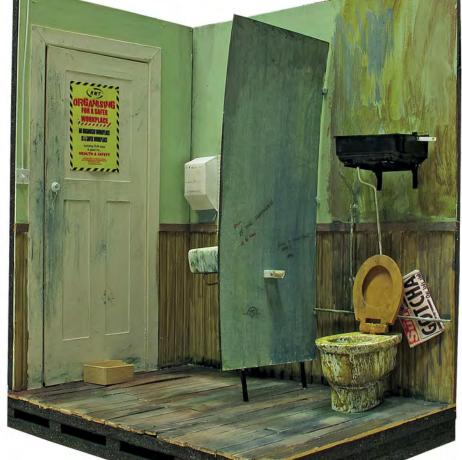
Wanting to use the dimensions to their best effect, I decided on a base of just under 11" square, using the 20" for the height. A quick sketch made me realise the two key elements would be the sink and the toilet itself.

A trawl through the internet resulted in both items being ordered in 1:12 scale. When they arrived, I realised the wooden toilet pan had a solid base to the height of about where the water level should be. There was no possibility of representing a clear liquid - it would have to be 'blocked', so was painted gloss dark green. And so started the process of making the whole model as

disgusting as possible! From the scrap box a

length of 4mm metal siding was used to make the lower wall panelling, topped with strips of coffee stirrer. Over the sink is a section of 4mm setts, to represent glazed tiles. The rest of the fittings are more items from the scrapbox - real copper tube for the pipework, a thin sliver of T section strip for the light switch toggle, more plasticard strip and tube for the empty roll holder.

The painting was done in a deliberately patchy fashion - the floorboards were given various washes of dark green, brown, grey and black, then rubbed with sandpaper and kitchen role to blend and wear away the paint. Similar treatment was given to the walls, where the lower panels were coloured to represent damp & mold. The tiles were given a coat of thin gloss white, over which a small mirror was glued.

Final touches included an empty paper towel dispenser, a cardboard box in place of a bin and a piece of wire instead of a door handle. An RMT poster and a BR

logo were the 'railway' connections required in the rules. I wanted a copy of a newspaper as

reading material and emergency supplies, and found an image of the Sun's 'Gotcha' headline. I didn't realise what the headline referred to and was mortified when I found out it was from the Falklands conflict, in case it would cause upset. I was assured it wouldn't.

It was fun to make, the build thread was enhanced greatly by the collective wit of the members who posted their support and encouragement and the result in the competition still gives me goosebumps. So, if ever you feel like a break from modelling your normal subject, have a go at something a little different - you too might be flushed at the outcome! BRM

## 'MN' CHECKLIST

- ▶ Check if DCC Ready models produced before 2004 were not.
- ▶ Ensure brass contacts on tender connection are not damaged.
- Watch for an overly-prominent join along the boiler top.
- Check that loco/tender lead wires are intact on later models with plug/socket arrangement.
- Does it run smoothly? If not, check wheels/pick-ups for dirt.
- Is it DCC? Check that the decoder is operational. Models with the 'XS' suffix to catalogue numbers should be sound-fitted.
- Check for loose or missing parts. Items such as handrails, lamp brackets and tender ladders can become detached.

t's widely regarded as the model that re-launched Hornby as a serious contender in the OO locomotive business. Quite simply in a different league to the often toy-like models that preceded it, the rebuilt 'Merchant Navy' sold by the shedload in its first few years and continues to be a regular in the Hornby catalogue.

More than 15 years on, it has been updated with DCC compatibility, a better tender pick-up arrangement and there's even a DCC Sound-fitted option. Externally though, the 'MN' looks much as it did when it first wowed Hornby customers in the late-1990s. Constant improvement on subsequent models means that the big Bulleid 'Pacific' isn't quite up to the exquisite standards achieved since, but it's still an impressive model with lots of good features.

Subsequent production runs have been shorter and certain models attract

a premium, as the table opposite highlights. Although it has been produced in large numbers over a long period, releases have been somewhat lacking in recent years and so the secondhand value of some models has increased.

The 'MN' was the first Hornby steam locomotive incorporating the numerous authentic detail variations to which we've become accustomed. On this model, the differences are largely restricted to tender types, two of which have been produced; cut-down, long wheelbase 6,000gal on the early editions and a 5,100gal type introduced later.

Originally, the models had a sprung rear driving axle, but this was changed to a standard axle type by the start of 2003. According to our 'MN' expert, the sprung axle could cause models to run with a waddle and the later arrangement is preferable.

As with any secondhand purchase,

you should ideally take a good look before handing your money over and, if possible, ask for a test run to ensure it behaves as it should. The boiler moulding seams can be fairly prominent on some models and it's worth checking several models before choosing the best.

One final point; if it's possible, check the current draw before buying a second-hand model. If it is 0.3Amp or greater, check that the two gear wheels on the intermediate shaft have a gap of about 20thou between them. This will keep the gear meshing sweet.

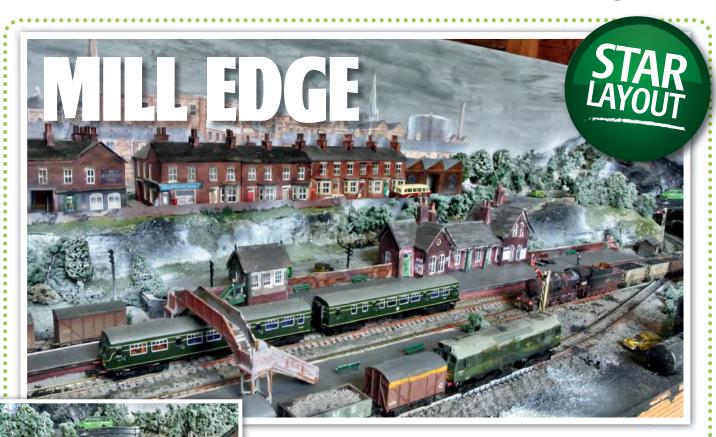

bought a floating shelf kit (25cm x 100cm) from a DIY store to display some stock on last year. I came up with the idea of making it into a diorama, based on a large diesel depot and somewhere I could display locomotives that were not being used on my main layout.

The first thing I did was box in the shelf, then glue three lengths of SMP track across it, painted with Railmatch Track dirt. I scratch-built from styrene

sheet brick and corrugated iron a basic loco depot, copied from photos in low-relief.

The furthest track enters the depot front but only by 2 inches. I have always admired winter layouts with snow but have never dared try it, but here was an opportunity to do it. The snow is actually volcanic reptile sand you can buy very cheaply from good pet shops or garden centres in various colours (black version is very useful). The final touch was a fine mist of matt white from an aerosol.

## **ROOM IN THE HOBBY FOR ALL**

have just read Colin Tanner's letter in the July issue of **BRM**. Like Mr Tanner, I have subscribed to **BRM** through a free offer but only recently, so it's too early for me to comment on the balance of articles. However, I would like to respond to Mr Tanner's potentially divisive statement that "we should not lose sight of the fact that we are modelling the prototype." I believe this highlights what must be a dilemma for every editor of mainstream model railway journals. It emphasises two entirely different approaches to our hobby; on the one hand are those whose enjoyment is satisfied by model railways; on the other, those who seek to create models of railways.

For the latter, the focus is on replicating a real railway; the former simply enjoy playing with model trains. There are many shades in between these two basic approaches. Tension can arise from statements like Mr Tanner's.

His view seems to be less: "I would like more prototype articles please" and more: "the reason we are all here is to model prototypes." Wrong.

I have been a model railway enthusiast since 1975. Now in retirement, I am building a large loft layout. I have never had any desire to model a prototype. I enjoy RTR models in their own right. I have never built a wagon kit, scratchbuilt a building, fitted couplings; I have no interest in engineering data or other specifications of prototypes. I skate over many such articles and focus on the layouts and product reviews.

I am not a model engineer; I do not aspire to replicate a real railway; I have no desire to become an expert in constructional techniques. I enjoy the models as they come out of the box and happily play trains without knowing or caring whether the hinges on the smokebox door are accurate.

For anyone horrified by this approach, I am afraid to confess that I don't have real passengers opening the carriage doors either. I think it is sad

how often we come across layout articles where someone says they justify running a locomotive as a 'heritage train' (or some such excuse for permitting something unprotoypical to appear). Far more encouraging is the liberated statement "my layout is fictional, has no particular era and I run what I like."

The great thing about the latter is that it embraces, loves and admires prototypical layouts just as much as any other! The reverse, sadly, is often not true.

So, please do make room for some prototype articles, they may interest us too. But in doing so, please do not lose sight of the fact that we are all here to enjoy our hobby through a diverse range of approaches!

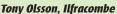

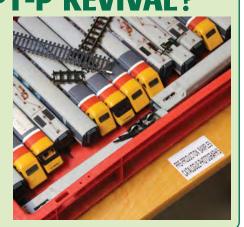

## IS EXTRA DETAIL ESSENTIAL IN N?

eing an N scale enthusiast has been difficult for many years for many reasons, but the one thing that has frustrated me most is the constant improvement in detail that I don't need becoming incorporated as 'standard' and the price going up as a result.

That's not to say that the additions don't have value or that the price rises aren't comparably fair but to me it makes more sense to start with something simple and let people add detail rather than insist everyone takes everything at the highest standard.

Even before the Bachmann price increases many people have been priced out of N scale. While this is harsh on adults, if N is not available to children (who also don't generally focus on the detail - they want trains to 'play' with), the future of N remains stifled and relies on converts from OO. Hornby has the right idea with its Railroad brand; three open wagons for £15.49, as opposed to a single, smaller scale wagon for £20!

Why not try a small simple locomotive and a couple of small trucks at a lower level of detail (maybe using existing older tooling) at a cheaper price and see what happens? I wonder what readers think?

Developing and tooling N scale models costs just as much, if not more, than in larger scales and over the last decade there has been widespread demand for higher standards. Also worth considering is that in most walks of life, most obviously consumer electronics, miniaturisation usually results in higher, rather than lower prices. – Ed.





## facebook Ouestion of the Month

We asked **BRM**'s Facebook community what they thought about a topical subject. Here's what they said:

We've recently seen models of some locomotives produced by more than one manufacturer. What's your opinion on duplication and is it a good or a bad thing for the hobby?

**Alan Emanuel** I do not mind duplication, it is interesting to compare detail and pricing, but what annoys me is when they keep repeating the same loco numbers and names over and over again.

**Brendan Jackson** I believe manufacturers should only duplicate if the existing model/product is completely outdated (i.e. the introduction of Bachmann's Mk.1s when all that was previously available were Hornby's old Tri-ang era versions).

**Paul Clifton** In this age of ever increasing production costs I believe the manufacturers do not have the luxury of competing over the same products. Much better for manufacturers to gauge the needs of the consumer and produce some unique offerings that their rivals are not producing.

**Kevin Knight** In N it's silly point scoring which does nothing to grow the hobby. In the end economics wins, the mob with the deepest pockets will survive and the consumer will be worse off.

Andrew Carter When Hornby and Bachmann have gone head to head it has done no harm, the B1s and Standard 4MTs were a good illustration of this. Both models from each manufacturer had their strengths and weaknesses, and I don't think sales suffered. Generally one manufacturer will make a model and the other will

try and do a better job. It took several manufacturers quite a few attempts before we got the definitive 'Western', or 37 or 40, it does no harm for manufacturers to be kept on their toes by the others.

# 'COAL TANK' TO JOIN BACHMANN RANGE

A London & North Western Railway Webb 'Coal Tank' 0-6-2T was the surprise addition to Bachmann's OO gauge range on August 30th. Although it's only a few weeks since Bachmann unveiled its 2014/15 catalogue, the company chose its annual Collectors Club members day at the Keighley & Worth Valley Railway to reveal its latest model.

The KWVR is home to the only surviving 'Coal Tank', No. 1054,

which is owned by the National Trust and managed by the Bahamas Locomotive Society at Ingrow West. It is one of only six surviving LNWR locomotives

Built in 1888 to a Francis W. Webb design, No. 1054 was the 250th of 300 locomotives built over a 16-year period. Simple, cheap and effective, they were built for short distance goods work, but also proved to be useful for

local passenger trains all over the LNWR system. Withdrawn from service by the LMS in 1939, it was almost scrapped but the shortage of locomotives for the war effort saw it overhauled and put back to work. As BR No. 58926 it remained in service until 1958, the last of its type and the last Webb locomotive in traffic, before being rescued by preservationists and eventually restored to working order.

As this issue of **BRM** went to press, the exact identities of Bachmann's models had not been revealed, but LMS and BR black versions are to be expected, plus a pre-1923 LNWR edition depicting the 0-6-2T as currently running in 2014.

## DAPOL LASER SCANS DRS '68' FOR ACCURACY

Dapol has laser scanned one of DRS' new Class 68 locomotives as the first step in producing its proposed model in both OO and N.

The work was carried out at DRS' Carlisle Kingmoor depot in late-July and marks the ongoing cooperation between the Chirk-based manufacturer and the freight and charter train operator. An immaculate 68005 *Defiant* was scanned outside the depot adjacent to a raised platform to ensure the best results.

DRS has ordered 25 locomotives, developed from the Vossloh

'Eurolight' diesel-electric but trimmed to fit the UK's smaller loading gauge and designated 'UK-Light'.

Once in service the fleet will be used to deliver the full range of DRS operations but six locomotives are being leased to Chiltern Railways to haul 'Main Line' services between Marylebone and Birmingham.

At least two have already been delivered in CR's silver-grey livery.

Joel Bright, Dapol's managing director remarked; "Laser scanning, although costly, is a wonderful research tool for manufacturers as it almost guarantees DRS and our customers that the model locomotive will be the right shape."

Unlike the angular Class 70 – introduced by Freightliner and now also in service with Colas – the Class 68 has more complex curves and flowing lines, and these can cause problems for model manufacturers.

"With skilled interpretation of the data by our designers I am confident that our model of this attractive and distinctive locomotive will delight model railway enthusiasts in both OO and N gauge," said Mr Bright.

The scanning process took just

over an hour, and the data will now be sent to Dapol's CAD team in China, which will translate it into computer files for components that can be moulded and assembled.

The 3-D scanner is mounted on a tripod and rotates slowly, sending out thousands of laser pulses every second. These are reflected back and recorded to build up a 'point cloud' image accurate to 100ths of a millimetre.

Dapol hopes to have CAD files to show soon, with sample models expected in the UK around the end of this year.





## Ixion orders more Hudswells in O

Having sold more than 1,300 of its award-winning O gauge Hudswell, Clarke 'Countess of Warwick' o-6-oSTs, Ixion Model Railways has commissioned a second run of the models in green, red and black liveries. They will be available from

selected retailers in the UK and Australia, and online from the Ixion website later this year.

Ixion is also collaborating with another UK company on the production of a ready-to-run 7mm scale standard gauge steam locomotive suitable for

both the UK and Australian markets.

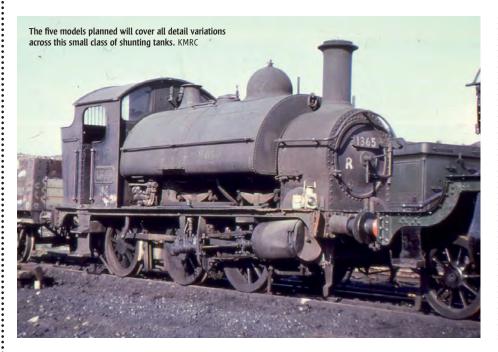

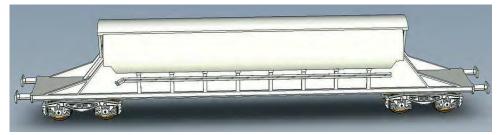

## DJ/KERNOW CLASS 71 UPDATE

DJ Models is now working with Kernow Model Rail Centre on the Class 71 electric locomotive project. Rather than DJM working alone to attract funding via the Kickstarter route (see p96), expressions of interest will now be taken by KMRC.

Customers who want to back this model will fund its development by commiting to pay upfront, in return for receiving a model when the target for production is reached.

Chris Trerise of Kernow Model Rail said "By crowd sourcing the finance for this model DJ Models is able to start work almost immediately. With the full co-operation of the National Railway Museum laser scanning will be carried out very shortly with CAD/CAM production to follow. Whereas otherwise it would take up to two years, this process should make it possible to achieve in a much shorter timescale."

Should sufficient orders be forthcoming, the model will feature a coreless motor, heavy chassis, directional lighting, etched grilles where possible, separate

wire handrails, a 21-pin DCC decoder socket with a large space for a sound speaker and sprung buffers. Only 1,200 models will be produced. The price of the model through this process will be £125.00 including postage to UK addresses. ver the past few years, Bachmann has gradually replaced and updated much of the Graham Farish N scale range. We've seen all-new models of important locomotives such as the Stanier 'Black Five', Class 37, Class 47 and Class 55 Deltic, as well as a host of updated wagons and coaching stock such as the essential BR Mk 1 family. To that list we can now add the BR Derby/Sulzer Type 2 Bo-Bo, better known as Class 25.

Although there's been a '25' in the Graham Farish range for many years - the recipient of a mechanical upgrade a few years ago - it compared poorly with the new generation of N scale diesels and was a prime candidate for replacement. Taking the popular Class 24/0 as its starting point, Farish has developed an all-new model of the versatile and widely used Type 2.

Until now, only the later-built Class 25/3 was offered, but this new model takes the earlier Class 25/1 and Class 25/2 subclasses as its inspiration. The development of the Derby-built Sulzer Type 2s is a long and complicated one (see www.derbysulzers.com), with the design evolving through six distinct variants across two classes eventually totaling 458 locomotives delivered between August 1958 and May 1967.

Choosing the Class 25/1 and 25/2 has allowed Bachmann to re-use the

proven Class 24/0 chassis (albeit with a few modifications), but tool a single bodyshell covering both variants as their GEC electrical equipment was the major point of difference.

BR green D5188 is the sample supplied for review; a Class 25/1 in original condition with small yellow warning panel (applied from new on D5176 onwards), mid-grey roof, off-white bands along the top and bottom edges of the bodyside and red bufferbeams. The real D5188 was delivered to the London Midland Region at Toton on 23rd March 1963 and roamed to various depots around the East and West Midlands before moving to the Preston Division in November 1968. Renumbered 25038 on 25th February 1974, its lack of dual braking equipment made it a

relatively early casualty when the Class 25 fleet was being run down. It was withdrawn from Carlisle Kingmoor on 31st May 1981 and scrapped at Derby Works in September 1982.

Also available now are weathered BR green Class 25/1 D5222, BR blue 25245 and weathered BR blue Class 25/2 25231. Weathered models have an RRP of £109.95, £10 more than their pristine sisters.

#### **LOOKS**

Anyone familiar with the old Farish Class 25/3 should be instantly impressed by the superior looks and fine detail of its replacement. The overall appearance and shape of the Derby design has been captured effectively and the numerous bodyside grilles, access panels, doors and

footsteps have been crisply moulded. The same applies to the roof, which features neat exhaust vents for the engine and boiler. One small disappointment is the roof fan grille, which is also moulded, unlike some other recent N scale diesels which have an etched metal grille. However, there are a few separately fitted metal details, including wire handrails and blackened brass buffers.

From the catalogue images, it's obvious that the new tooling accommodates a number of detail differences. The two BR green models have nose end communication doors, as fitted when delivered, but the two BR blue Class 25/2s have them removed and plated over, a process which started in the late-1960s. D5188 has a full complement of

bodyside air intake grilles, but the other three models have the boiler grilles plated over – a common modification.

The chassis and bogies are as previously reported, although the underframe water/fuel tanks have been changed to match those on Class 25/1s and 25/2s fitted with steam heating boilers.

The model compares well with photographs and works drawings and should please diesel era modellers in this scale. OO gauge modellers will be hoping that Bachmann scales up the models to replace its comparatively disappointing Class 25s soon.

#### **VERSATILE**

Standard features include headcode panels illuminated in the direction

of travel, with red tail lights at the trailing end, a six-pin DCC decoder socket on the chassis, detachable NEM couplers and a bag of optional detailing parts, which includes bufferbeam pipes/cables and a set of moulded three-piece miniature snowploughs.

Like the Class 24/0, the chassis drives smoothly on all four axles from a centrally mounted five-pole motor and has pick-ups on all eight wheels. Our sample performed faultlessly straight from the box and hauled trains above and beyond what would have been expected of the prototype.

A true mixed traffic design, these Class 25s will be equally at home on express or secondary passenger trains, parcels, qoods or departmental

trains across a broad swathe of the country. From Cornish china clay traffic to the Scottish Highlands via Cardiff-Crewe trains and heavy ICI limestone traffic in the Peak District, the potential uses for this model are almost endless.

Having successfully tackled several of the other key first generation BR diesel locomotives, this is yet another impressive new version of an essential and versatile mixed traffic BR diesel. It should certainly prove popular with modellers of the steam/

# HELJAN PILOT SCHEME 26/0

ince the first models were released in 2006, Heljan has produced several variations on the Class 26 theme. Now available is the version that takes the model back to the late-1950s.

Twenty 1,160hp Bo-Bo diesel-electrics were ordered from Birmingham Railway Carriage & Wagon Co. in Smethwick as part of BR's Pilot Scheme to find the best locomotive designs under the 1955 Modernisation Plan. The Sulzer-powered diesels were initially delivered to the Eastern Region for use on outer-suburban trains at the southern end of the East Coast Main Line. They were tested against other 'Type B' designs from North British

D 5300. Fresh out of the box: BRCW Type 2 D5300 in 1958 as-delivered condition.

eljan's Gloucester RCW Diesel Parcels Unit has proved to be a surprise success for the Danish company, with both Western and London Midland Region versions proving popular with modellers over the last year. A further batch of DPUs is now available, carrying 1970s/80s BR blue and late-1980s/early-1990s Royal Mail red. These latest models feature a hybrid front end, retaining the redundant gangway connection but with headcode panels removed and plated over.

Illustrated here is 55991 in late-1980s Royal Mail Letters red/yellow, arguably one of the most striking and attractive liveries ever carried by a BR diesel railcar. The rapid sellout of the first batch of Royal Mail Class 128s would suggest that this livery remains very popular indeed. There's also a second Royal Mail DPU depicting

55992, weathered BR blue W55992 with the nickname 'Scooby Doo' scrawled into the dirt on the gangways and BR blue 55991 with 'Parcels Service' branding.

As with previous editions, the model is impressively detailed, most notably on the underframe and ends, where there are dozens of separatelyfitted components including wire handrails, sprung buffers, engines, exhaust systems and all manner of other essential items.

Decoration is equally impressive, with crisply applied Royal Mail yellow bands along the bottom of the bodyside and diagonal stripes on the sliding doors. Smaller printed items, such as data panels and Royal Mail ciphers are also impressively executed.

In usual Heljan fashion, propulsion comes from a large five-pole motor within a heavy die-cast alloy chassis driving all four axles. Visually, this is not a great problem given that there are only three small windows on each side but it does give the model superbly smooth and powerful performance.

Marker lights are illuminated in the

(later Class 21) and English Electric (Class 23) and were successful enough to warrant a follow-up order for 27 machines (later Class 26/1) and a more powerful version that became Class 27. Transferred to Scotland in April/May 1960, the Class 26/os proved to be one of BR's better investments, remaining in traffic until October 1993.

Heljan now offers its BRCW

Type 2 in as-built condition, and has made a number of modifications to the tooling to incorporate original features. Several livery options are available, all in BR green, including pristine and weathered original versions and with the post-1961 small yellow warning panels.

Starting at the top, immediately noticeable is the original style round exhaust port - the first time this option has been available. Also specific to this version are the oval buffers,

droplight cab windows, unmodified cab doors with windows and nose-end communication doors and the bogie sideframe mouldings, which have the distinctive leaf springs protruding from the centre and tapered cab footsteps. Production locomotives had round Oleo buffers, modified bogie suspension, plated-over cab door windows and footsteps with parallel sides.

The overall look is convincing, especially once the optional detail parts are fitted. As well as bufferbeam pipes

snowploughs, and headcode discs.

Our samples were neatly decorated, with finely printed BR crests, a crisp white waistband and accurate colours. Performance was, as you'd expect from a Heljan model, smooth, quiet and powerful. For DCC users there's an eightpin decoder socket on the chassis and directional marker/tail lights.

On a less positive note, the fuel tanks of both our samples were detached when we opened the boxes and all locating clips were broken, suggesting a fairly major impact during shipping. This one - easily solved - issue aside, this is a useful machine for the steam/diesel transition era, whether you model the southern end of the ECML in 1958-60 or the Scottish Region from 1960 onwards.

ew Hornby releases have been few and far between over the last year, so anything that arrives from Margate is noteworthy. These new Mk 3 coaches are no exception, although probably for the wrong reasons. First announced for release in 2012, they were held over to 2013 and then to 2014 before finally making an appearance. But, like numerous other modern image items produced by Hornby over the last few years, they are something of an odd choice when much more popular and up-todate liveries are still in demand.

For many years, Virgin Mk 2 and Mk 3 coaches have been a staple of

the Hornby range, and a popular item with privatisation era modellers. These four weathered Mk 3s carry Virgin's pre-Pendolino red/grey/white livery, but depict the vehicles after they had been replaced by new multiple units in 2002-05 and had their branding removed. For short period, ex-Virgin Mk 3s could be seen on spot hire work or in short-term use with other operators before finding more permanent employment with Greater Anglia, First Great Western, Chiltern Railways and others. Such a temporary livery would be an interesting choice if it were contemporary, but almost decade after the event it's difficult to see the appeal.

Added to this is the fact that Hornby has chosen to mix three former West

Coast Main Line locomotive-hauled vehicles with an HST Trailer Guards Second (TGS), the latter also fitted with buffers. While you could assemble a train using the FO, TSO and RFM, together with a Hornby Mk 3b DVT, the TGS is pretty much useless without its companions.

Looking beyond these factors, there's not much wrong with the models themselves. The coaches themselves are neatly decorated, with the striking ex-VT livery crisply applied under the weathering and all the necessary small details present and correct. Authentically, the Virgin branding has simply been painted over, represented by a slightly differently coloured square beside each door. One convincing feature is the smoked glazing, which is a vast

arcels vans, or to be more accurate, Non-Passenger Carrying Coaching Stock (NPCCS) is a fascinating subject, but one that is often overshadowed by 'sexier' subjects. Rolling stock expert and occasional **BRM** contributor David Larkin possesses one of the largest collections of photographs of coaches, vans and wagons in the country and some of those images are seen here in his latest work.

Mainly dating from the 1960s and 1970s, the 175 images cover

dozens of passenger-rated designs for various purposes, as the title suggests. This period was arguably the most interesting for NPCCS, as it featured a lengthy transition from pre-Nationalisation (and even pre-Grouping) types to BR Standard Mk 1 designs.

This softback album is packed with inspiration for modellers, as it contains dozens of portraits of Full Brakes (with guard accommodation, as opposed to simple vans), Parcels and Miscellaneous Vans (PMVs) and those built with end doors for

transporting road vehicles. As well as the more common types, there are numerous more esoteric vans, including an experimental ex-LMS CCT that your reviewer had never seen before.

The only slight disappointment is that all the images are black and white (although of course, this is unavoidable in many cases due to the vintage of the photographs), but some colour would have been most useful for modellers wanting paint their vans in appropriate colours, even if that 'colour' was often just years of accumulated grime.

Volume 2 will look at livestock vehicles such as horseboxes and special cattle vans and vans for perishable milk, fruit and fish traffic. If it's as absorbing as Volume 1, I can't wait to see it.

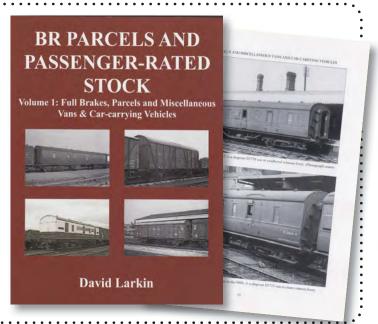

improvement on the clear flushglazing used on many previous Hornby Mk 3s. Hornby's Mk 3 is OK in some respects, but outdated in others, such as the basic bogies and lack of NEM coupler pockets. An all-new family of vehicles to complement Hornby's superb InterCity 125 power cars would be very welcome, as would some more common and/or long-lived colour schemes.

In the early years of BR's corporate image, a number of anomalies appeared as workshops got to grips with its application, and BR decided which vehicles received which livery. Invicta Model Rail's



exclusive OO gauge MLV is a good example of the confusion that could occur. As a self-propelled luggage van, the logical colour scheme would be plain blue and that's what was applied to S68004 in the late-1960s/early-1970s. However, their use on Kent Coast boat trains brought them under the Inter-City banner and so blue/grey quickly became the standard. Despite being somewhat dowdier than many of the other MLVs produced by Bachmann, the plain blue livery is well executed and the model will complement the various other late-1960s/early-1970s Southern EMUs now available. DCC Ready with a 21-pin decoder socket, illuminated headcodes and NEM couplers. Recommended. .



## D BACHMANN 33-079Z PACK OF THREE BR DEPARTMENTAL OLIVE GREEN ZGV OPEN WAGONS (WEATHERED), RRP £35.99

This OO gauge pack features a trio of open wagons commandeered for use by the Signal & Telegraph Department after their revenue earning service was over. Using Bachmann's long-lived china clay wagon as a base, the decoration of each model varies considerably, as was often the case on such wagons. DM417836, KDM418631 and KDW138238 are all lettered 'S&T SBC Crewe Old Rail Stores', as used in the late-1970s at Crewe. They're ideal for use in mixed rakes to form typically shabby 1970s departmental trains hauled by BR blue diesels. Note that the wagons do not have NEM coupler pockets. Limited to 504 pieces.



#### **D** BACHMANN 39-001X NETWORK SOUTHEAST MK 1 EMU TRANSLATOR COACH PACK, RRP £74.99

Until the 1980s, most BR EMUs had conventional buffing gear and could be hauled by locomotives as and when required. But, the advent of automatic couplers meant that a new solution was needed for hauling units away from the wires or third-rail. Translator coaches with standard coupling gear at one end and an EMU-compatible coupler at the other were created from redundant Mk 1s. They were used to assist in the transfer of units from between depots and to BR workshops away from their home region. Some are still in use today, including this pair, Invicta's exclusive pack of NSE Translator Vehicles consists of 975875 and 977087, formerly Brake Seconds 34643 and 34971 in late-1980s/1990s condition. If you're looking for an excuse to run an EMU on a non-electrified layout, this is just what you need. With these two coaches sandwiching a Hornby Class 466 or Bratchell Models EMU and hauled by an RfD Class 37 or 47, you could create a real talking point for any Sectorisation era layout. mongst several new items available from Helmsman Model Rail is a useful flashing beacon kit, suitable for locomotives, unpowered rolling stock and many other applications including road vehicles.

The kit consists of an orange 2mm lighthouse LED, a circuit board to power the flashing beacon and a bridge rectifier - although this is not needed for certain applications - together with full instructions. A small amount of soldering is required for best results, although with care it may be possible to use screw connectors instead.

I fitted it to an old 1:43 scale Land Rover languishing in a dismantled state in the spares box. A pilot hole was drilled in the plastic roof, then opened out to take the LED beacon.

The voltage required to power the circuit board needs to be greater than 3V, so I used a 9V PP battery. If used in a non-powered item of rolling stock the battery will need to be concealed somewhere, together with an on/off switch.

The unit can also be fitted to unpowered locomotives and rolling stock using the track current via pickups on the wheelsets. If these are not

already factory-fitted you will have to fit these before installing the beacon unit.

If fitting the unit to a powered locomotive, you will need to dismantle the model and ensure that there is enough room to locate the circuit board and bridge rectifier, and also determine where the beacon is to be located.

Whichever method you choose, the result is a convincing bright flashing beacon with a steady rate of flash that also has a slight fade effect to give the impression of a rotating beacon. It's ideal for a variety of applications on 7mm and 4mm scale lavouts.

Helmsman can also supply 2mm orange or blue lighthouse LEDs separately in packs of four, priced at £1.00 per pack. Further packs from

number, it's a standard Farish 'Jube' with tender drive, six-pin DCC decoder socket and lots of fine details.

More striking is the BR blue Class 47/0, which has a beautifully printed rendition of the full body height 'Union Jack' flag on each side, Stratford's trademark silver roof and silver-painted fuel tanks between the bogies. Other embellishments include



whitewalled tyres and lamp brackets picked out in white on each end. Headcode panels have the 'domino' marker lights, which are appropriate for the period. The overall effect is impressive and will certainly appeal to those of a certain age that remember the real thing. Like the 'Jubilee', this is otherwise a standard Class 47/0 with working directional



decoder socket. Aimed at collectors, the pack is limited to just 500 pieces and is available from Bachmann stockists now. With two such popular locomotives within,

demand is likely to be strong so order yours soon to avoid disappointment.

## MILFORD MODELS LASER-CUT BRIDGE

arger towns and city centres often feature high-level railways, crossing streets on ornate cast-iron bridges. Modelling these is a tricky business as many ornate but identical castings are the main feature of the design. Cutting the parts out of styrene sheet or cardboard is a job that challenges even the most skilful modeler.

Milford Models & Hobbies has simplified this by providing a kit of laser-cut parts to construct a double track bridge spanning 290mm with a width 105mm. All parts are cut and engraved in 2mm thick MDF which has been painted in grey primer.

Assembly is simply a case of slotting the components together. Fixing can be carried out with either superglue or PVA. A dry run, without glue, is advised as we found that many of the tabs that should fit

through the bridge deck needed slight modification to fit properly. The cross pieces under the deck are a little fragile too but work slowly and carefully and this isn't a problem. The finished model certainly looks the part with a satisfyingly complex structure.



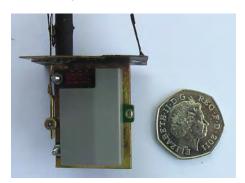

## MINX MICRODRIVES

## **Colin Brown** assesses a new British-designed device for operating points and semaphore signals.

or many years, I have used both Tortoise and Fulgurex point motors and tried the 'slam bang' Peco and Hornby solenoid units, but always had problems adjusting the mechanical linkages to cope with temperature changes.

These types of motors are also sizeable and easier to mount below the baseboard than on top. In contrast, the Minx Microdrives actuators are small (32mm x 28mm x 12mm), easily fitted on top of the baseboard and hidden in scenery or under buildings.



An actuator attached to the base of a working semaphore signal. Again, its small size makes it simple to remove the whole unit from a baseboard for maintenance.

But, their greatest advantage is that they are very easy to adjust, which takes care of temperature extremes. In a shed or loft, this can very between -10°C and +40°C and turnouts need frequent adjustment. With the Minx Microdrives system, you press a few buttons on the controller and the actuator is re-calibrated to the new travel range of the point blades.

The Minx system will also generate a visual and audio alarm if an obstruction, for example ballast granules, prevents correct point blade movement, a blade breaks, or if a train is passing over during operation. Touching a button on the controller returns the blades to release the obstruction.

The pack comprises a controller, two actuators, rods to connect the actuators to the points, fixing screws and two 1 metre ribbon cables for connecting the controller to the actuators (longer lengths can be supplied up to four metres).

I that found installation was straightforward and easy. The instructions are detailed and can be followed without knowledge of electronics. Several wiring diagrams are supplied to cover different types of operation. The Minx Microdrives website (www.minxmicrodrives.com) contains photographs of other mechanisms, for instance to rotate a ground signal through 90 degrees and more circuit diagrams.

I powered the controller from 12V DC but it will work from both AC or DC in the 9-24V range. I mounted it on the side of the baseboard, within a metre of the actuator(s). After centring the actuator

(and the point), it is fixed down close to the point and connected up using the solid rod supplied; no springs or omega loops should be used. The ribbon cable from the controller is then plugged in and a few buttons pressed to calibrate. The operating speed of the point can then be varied over a wide range using a preset on the controller.

#### **SIGNALS TOO**

If you are operating semaphore signals, the controller should be switched to this mode to avoid damage to delicate mechanisms. A preset is used to set the top and bottom position of the signal arm. A variable 'bounce' facility is available too, using the same preset. The actuator can be neatly mounted underneath the signal as a modular unit (see photograph), making it easy to remove the whole unit from the baseboard and avoid damage during maintenance.

Separate relays on the controller switch over frog polarity and another auxiliary items. The relays won't switch over unless the point or signal operates the full calibrated range, giving interlocking of points, signals, level crossing gates and so on, and simple route setting. LEDs indicate relay operation and position.

The controller has two channels and will control two points or signals in any combination. For a crossover using two actuators, these must be in reverse orientation to get the required movement. Remote operation from a panel is possible on each channel or they can be paralleled together by using a simple on/off switch, which synchronises with the point or signal position.

It is obviously easier to install the Minx system from the start of a layout project, but I found it easy to convert my existing layout. From my short experience using the Minx system, I can only say that it is the best I have come across and can thoroughly recommend it, especially for exhibitions, where soldering adjustments are fraught with problems. **BRM** 

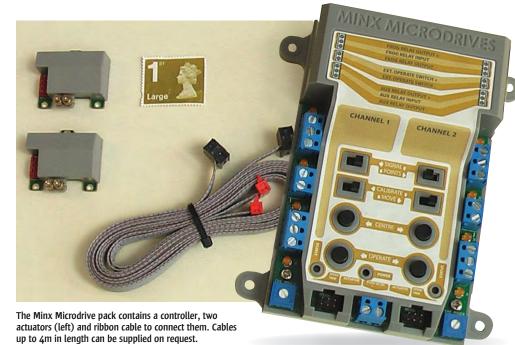

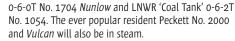

# LCUT CREATIVE SMALL ENGINE SHED KIT

## Phil Parker puts this useful laser-cut building kit through its paces.

aser cutting is a marvellous technology that allows tremendous flexibility in manufacturing. LCUT Creative is a British firm which provides components to help those who want to scratch-build model structures. It also supplies bundles of components as complete building kits. Working this way, the modeller can choose their basic building and

extend it by purchasing extra parts, confident that all the components can be used together.

The LCC B 00-08 bundle for a single road engine shed contains a page of instructions listing the parts and providing basic information on how they should be brought together. There is a note that a building manual can be downloaded from the website - a 131 page generic document covering

techniques for the whole range.

The trick with this kit is to put as much together as possible without glue to get a feel of the way things work. From the instructional diagram, it's easy to assume that one set of wall parts fixes on the outside of the main sections, lining up the joining combs at one end. This is incorrect as the right way is shown in the photos and results in a nice near corner.





All parts are sharply cut from a high quality fibre and paper board material with surface detail etched in one side. The window bars are exceptionally fine but it's a pity the bricks are modern stretcher bond rather than the Flemish pattern.



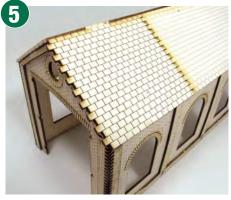
Part numbers are either etched on the surface of the frets or on tags included on the edges of larger components. A dry run is a worthwhile task thanks to the accurate cutting, the parts interlock perfectly.



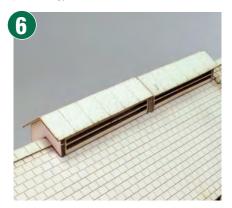
The comers need careful assembly - start with the inner layer. Overlap the outer one so the prongs overlap the ends. The outer layer both covers and strengthens the join. It's easy, but not obvious from the instructions.



On this kit, the notches in the centre roof trusses didn't line up with those in the ends. As the beams seemed too short (130mm instead of 180mm), I left them out. The roof is strong enough although you could brace it too.



The roof is made up of two sections, the shorter of which needs its half slates cut from one end. Do this before assembly as it's a lot easier to get a neat cut line.



Smoke vents are made up and fitted to the top of the roof. They would benefit from a little sanding on the inside edges to allow them to sit properly.

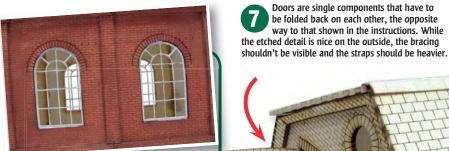
Everything is made from high quality fibreboard which cuts beautifully with a sharp knife when removing components from frets. Leftover tags can be sanded away with a fine abrasive stick.

Engine sheds are odd structures. Because of the large doors, interior detail is desirable, but none is provided - perhaps a supplementary kit could be made to provide this? An extra layer of board would thicken up the walls to improve the appearance, although the finished model is certainly strong enough for handling.

nly strong enough for handling.
The detail inside the roof that is provided suffered from problems that while easy enough to rectify, shouldn't have made it past the design stage. I see that the range has been re-designed recently, so I wonder if this bit has been forgotten?
All in all, this is a bit of a curate's egg – good, in parts. As well as the roof, I have reservations about the bond of bricks represented and the strapping on the doors.

Something to fill the round hole above the end doors would be nice too. On the other hand, the fit is excellent

and those windows are superb.
I'll certainly be looking at the
range for component parts in the
future. **BRM** 

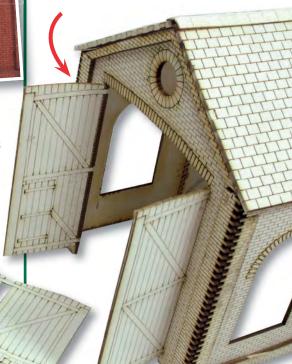


#### PAINTING LASER CUT KITS

One problem with all laser cut models is that the mortar lines between the bricks are incredibly fine. A thick coat of paint with cause them to vanish.

I experimented with a wash of slightly thinned Humbrol enamel (No. 70, Brick Red) and this seemed to work well on the walls, but on the doors where the engraving has very

little depth, even this covered the detail.

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# DAVE SHAKESPEARE

t was with a great deal of sadness that we learned of the death of Dave Shakespeare on 14th August.

Dave was well known to many magazine readers for his seminal layout 'Tetley's Mills' which captured the spirit of a West Yorkshire town and its railway. Dave had a quite remarkable ability to visualise what he thought would look plausible and interesting in any given position on the layout. By taking a few basic measurements, he could construct a frame from ply, coat it with DAS modelling clay, sculpt the vernacular stonework and apply a mixture of paints to produce an interesting building which precisely fitted, cheek by jowl, with its neighbouring properties. His workrate was prodigious and when he set to with a task the progress would put the rest of the modelling community to shame.

In more recent years he recorded such work on **RMweb** and provided inspiration to many in the

community, not just through his modelling but with his determined attitude to life laced with self-effacing self-efficacy. He shrugged off the infestation of woodworm which undermined the first 'Tetley's Mills' and rebuilt the layout. The Mk 2 version featured in **BRM** and this video from 2011 – http://bit.ly/10MgxpT

Having self-built his second new house, he then allowed us to follow

the build of the third incarnation of 'Tetley's Mills' online. Sadly we'll never see this completed as Dave also had an 18-month battle with cancer, again this was fought with dogged resolve to explore every opportunity available.

Many modellers have said that he was an

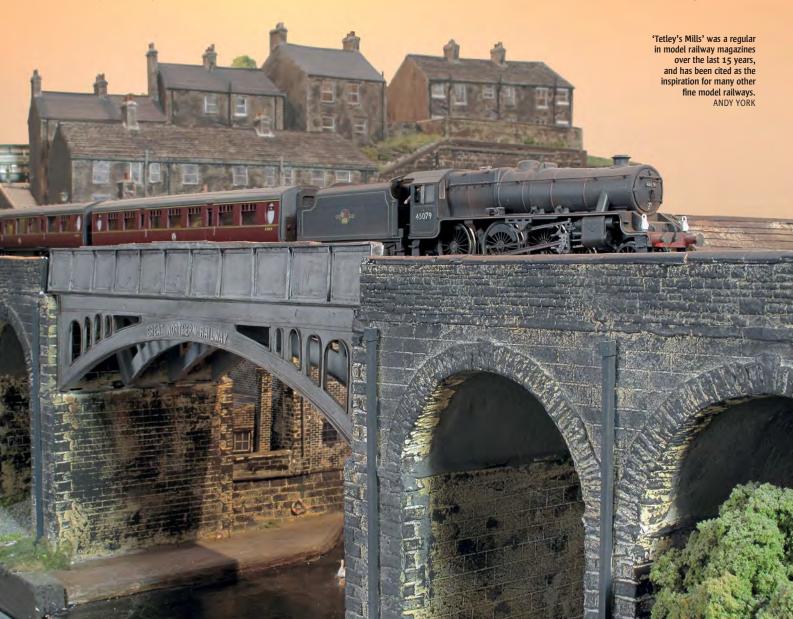


inspiration whose work brought them back to the hobby and for that alone we owe a debt of gratitude for him playing a part in the future of the hobby and he, along with his work, will certainly be remembered fondly.

In recognition of Dave's contribution to the hobby we'd like to create a lasting memorial through the 'Shakespeare Spirit' trophy which will be awarded at RMweb Live for the most inspiring modelling at that event and at

future shows. We are also raising funds for Cancer Research in the spirit that Dave explored every avenue to try and conquer his illness.

Dave leaves his wife, Julie, and family, friends and a legion of modellers with many enjoyable memories of a fine Yorkshireman. The last train has left Tetley's Mills but it will not be forgotten. **BRM**
