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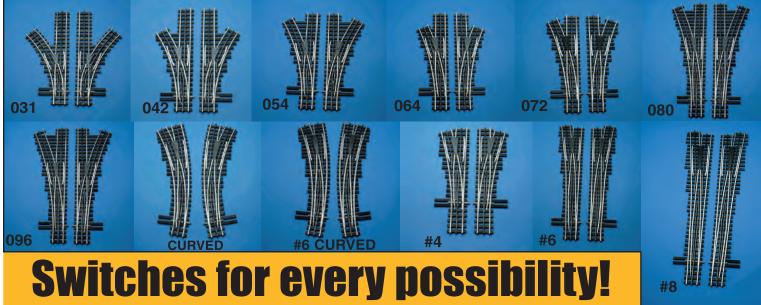
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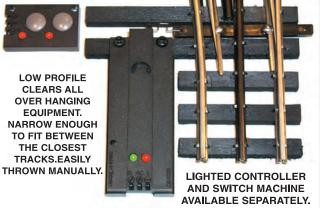








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ON THE COVER

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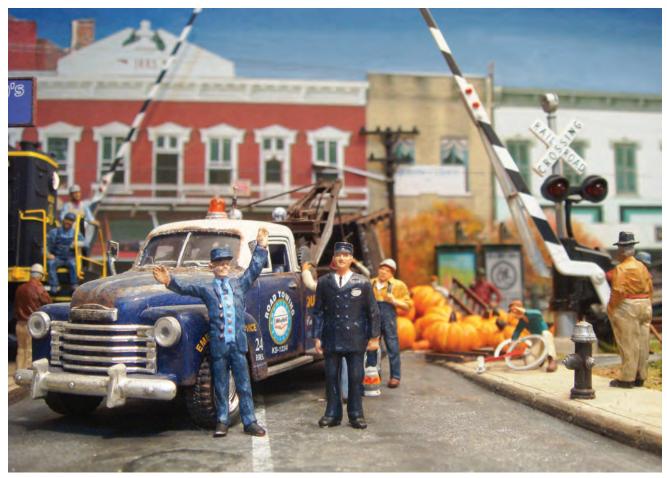

Show Me a Story



What's going on here? Steve Phetterplace shares the account of a seasonal incident inside this issue.

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There's a story behind virtually every model train layout. For example, what was the motivation for building the layout in the first place, and why was O gauge selected? What was planned in terms of scenery and operations? How did a particular theme, brand of trains, or type of control system come to be chosen? And the list goes on. This is the type of information included in nearly all of our major layout features, and it gives the reader the background needed to understand why and how the layout was constructed.

What about stories that exist, or potentially exist, right there on the layout? When we create individual scenes for our miniature rail empires, I tend to think of them as vignettes incorporated in a broader overall setting. We often have the makings of a story when we determine just where to position the various structures, figures, and other scenic features. A fictional tale based on what we are creating may not be the first thing to come to mind, but it's probably safe to say that just about every object or figure placed on the layout has some purpose for being where it is. And if that is indeed the case, it follows that some potential exists for elaborating on things a bit and spinning a bit of a yarn.

I really enjoy seeing my fellow hobbyists engage in some creative storytelling with select action and scenes on their layouts to the extent where they may even reposition trains and other objects on the layout as the story line develops. I think it's great when someone takes the time and effort to conjure up a make-believe scenario and follows

through with a sequence of photos that guide the viewer through the timeline of the event. In some respects, it's very much like a photo essay that might have appeared in LIFE or one of the many other newspapers and magazines we enjoyed in the past.

A fine example of the potential for storytelling and the type of story I'm referring to appears in this issue in a new section called "Rail Tales." Our premier "Rail Tales" features the creative work of Steve Phetterplace, an OGR contributor and forum participant. Steve has been published in OGR before ("Let it Snow!" in Run 232), but this time around, he had originally submitted a few photos that he felt might be appropriate for "Readers' Rails." Upon seeing what Steve had come up with, I decided that this interesting little story deserved a bit more exclusive treatment. A story line was developed that turned Steve's photos, complete with a fictitious newspaper article, into a fun and fanciful feature that I believe our readers will thoroughly enjoy. Perhaps best of all, the incident he describes and portrays is entirely appropriate to this particular time of the year.

Regular readers of OGR will recall how other contributors have also developed and shared fictional stories about certain aspects of their layouts. Often these accounts are displayed as sidebars to the main article, or they may even constitute a theme for the entire article. Jim Policastro, to cite just one example of the former treatment, has taken us on tours with his little people as they explore new sections of his layout. Don McCuaig took a different approach and provided a detailed layout feature that was, at its core, an imaginary journey through a section of the northwestern U.S. Bill Bramlage went even further than that where he showed us how to create an entire picture book for his grandson based on an adventure Thomas the Tank Engine experienced on Bill's extensive layout.

We hope to include more standalone illustrated short stories in future issues. All that is required is a bit of imagination, about 500 words more or less of descriptive text, and a digital camera capable of producing high-resolution images. Most current cameras will do fine in that regard if set to record the fewest number of images. The idea would be to depict an imaginary event that unfolds somewhere along the tracks, which ideally includes the trains in some way. It could be a story developed around a roundhouse scene or perhaps something related to a particular event or incident somewhere along the line. For that matter, it might even be a recounting of the adventures of one or more of the 1:48 scale "inhabitants" of the pike, human or otherwise. The only limits are what the imagination can dream up and the ability to develop the action visually and logically in a series of around five to seven photos.

It would be great if this inaugural version of "Rail Tales" inspires more readers to take a close look at select scenes on their layouts and consider the possibility of spinning a yarn that can be shared with our readers. It could be a whole lot of fun. So show me a story!



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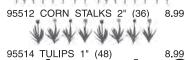
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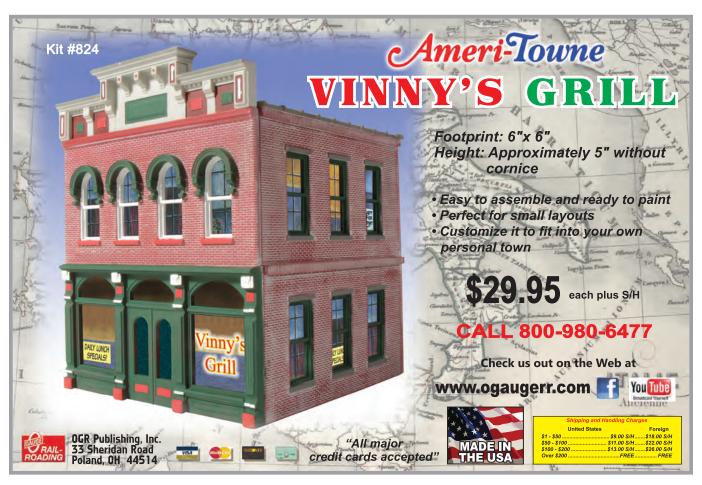
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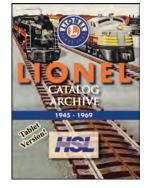


The Grevhounds **Are Running**

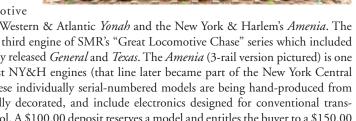

SMR 4-4-0 locomotives

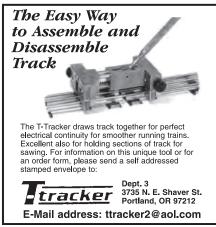
Schneider Model Railroading, Inc. (SMR Trains) has received prototype models for its next limited edition locomotive

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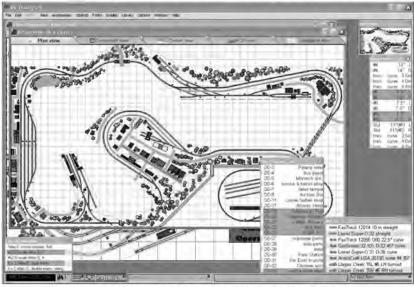

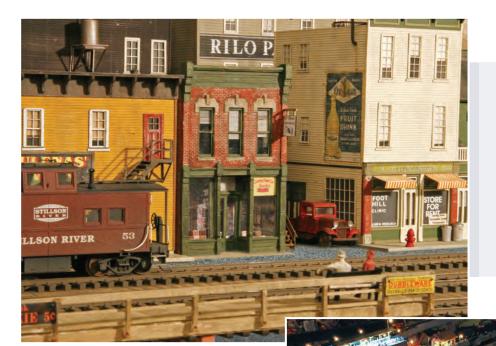
Tranquil Harbor

Waiting for a Train

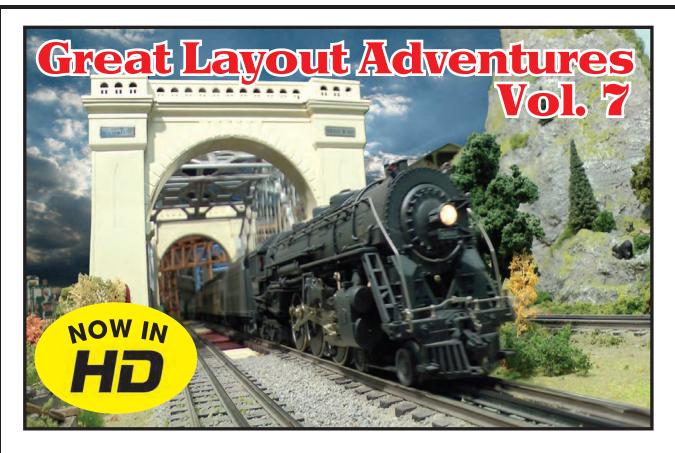

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Product Reviews



3rd Rail Pennsylvania EMD E7

Review and Photos by George Brown

Passenger diesels from EMD have been favorites of mine since I first saw them on the New York Central Water Level Route in the late 1940s. I know, even the mention of the NYC in a review of a model decorated in Pennsylvania colors could be considered as heresy. But as a simple matter of locale, I got to watch EMD E-series diesels painted in gray lightning stripes pass by me long before seeing those long, handsome growlers finished in Pennsy Tuscan red or Brunswick green.

Regardless of the road, the twin engine 2000-hp passenger pullers from La Grange were something to see.

With their origin in the mid-1930s, the real EMD E-series locomotives were initially equipped with two 12-cylinder Winton 901A diesels rated at 900 hp each, thus the model designation of E, which stood for eighteen-hundred horsepower. Beginning with the E3 and carrying through to the E7, the big Es had twin 12cylinder EMD 567 diesels of 1000 hp each. Each diesel drove its own generator, which provided the electrical power to the traction motors. As a side note, the successor E8 was rated at 2250 hp, and the final locomotive in the E series, the E9, was 2400 hp.

The E7 debuted in 1945 with a more vertical nose than on its predecessor E3 through E6 models. As the best-selling passenger engine ever, the E7 ended production in 1949 with over 425 A units delivered to 30 railroads along with over 80 B units going to 10 roads. A distinctive external telltale for the E7 A units over the later E8s and E9s was the panel of vertical louvers located immediately behind the doors to the cab. One E7 survives today at the Railroad Museum of Pennsylvania in Strasburg.

Our evaluation units of the 3rd Rail E7s were decorated as Pennsylvania Railroad EP20s. In Pennsy parlance, EP20 stood for EMD, passenger, and 2000 hp. The PRR owned 46 of the EP20 A units and 14 B units. Our models were from the first release of the 3rd Rail E7, which I understand is now sold out. By the time you read this, 3rd Rail's encore release of the engines will likely be available in B&M, B&O, CB&Q, C&O, GM&O, NYC, Penn Central, PRR Tuscan single stripe, Seaboard, and Southern.





Construction and Features

For the 3-rail operator, Sunset/3rd Rail offers its E7s in powered A units with TMCC and RailSounds 4.0 under license from Lionel, Cruise Commander speed control from the Electric RR Co., fan-driven Turbo Smoke, and command-operated coil couplers. A separate nonpowered B unit with thumbtack couplers is also available in road names that ran the cabless booster units.

In the 2-rail version, both A and B units are powered and are also offered separately. According to the ad on the 3rd Rail website, the 2-rail A unit has 64-channel sound and QSI Titan DCC with a tether cable carrying drive power from the A unit to the B unit. After a few minutes with a ruler and calipers, I confirmed that the 1:48 scale dimensions of the A and B units compared favorably with those on engineering drawings of the real E7s.

Each unit has a molded plastic body mounted on a stamped sheet-metal frame. As shown in the photos, the body is realistic with a number of separately applied plastic, brass, and cast details. I particularly liked the A unit's signature antennas of the PRR, which proved amazingly robust when I worked on the engine. I simply slipped the protective strip of shipping foam between the antennas and set the engine upside down in my padded servicing cradle. See-through screens cover most of the vents on the carbody, with windows and portholes also glazed appropriately. However, these windows and portholes are machined from clear polycarbonate rather than the usual molded clear plastic. In fact,

the polycarbonate used in the 3rd Rail E7s is the same material used for cell phone screens and is impervious to damage from paint or solvents.

In the first production run of his E7s, Scott Mann of Sunset/3rd Rail had the inside surface of the portholes painted, but for the second run, they will be clear. If you have a first-run E7 and want to remove the paint from its portholes, Scott told me that acetone will take the paint off and not harm the polycarbonate. Personally, I'd remove the portholes from the carbody before applying any solvent such as ace-

Realistic diaphragms are on the ends of the units along with train lines that proved

to be remarkably malleable, which is fortunate. On O72 curves, the couplers swing into these lines and bend them out of the way, which is where they stay. To photograph the engines, I was able to bend each of the lines back into its normal position of hanging straight down, and none of them broke off. The next time I ran the E7s, the coupler bent the lines out of the way again. I'm sure running the engines on O54 curves would do some major adjustments to these lines.

Unlike other modern 3-rail O gauge diesels, the 3rd Rail E7 powered units use a single large Cannon motor. This motor drives all six axles via a toothed belt and drive shafts under the frame and in the trucks. Universal joints connect these shafts together and allow the trucks to turn. Journals for each axle are sprung, and all twelve wheels are flanged. On the outside wheelset of each truck is a pair of traction tires.

LEDs provide all the lighting on the A unit, which includes the headlight, red classification lights, number board lights, cab interior light, and backup light. Inside the industrial green cab are figures representing the crew in addition to the control stands and other apparatus. The B unit has an interior light also. Because the B unit has pickup rollers, a Mini Commander EX board and coil couplers from the Electric RR Co. could easily be installed in it for command-operated couplers.

The satin finish Tuscan red paint on





our evaluation sample A and B units was flawless as were the stripes, lettering, graphics, and other individually painted small details. I did find the lettering of Southern Pacific Company on the owner's plates rather curious since the evaluation Es were decorated as PRR units.

On the A unit, the pilot is mounted to the frame instead of the front truck as is common on most 3-rail O gauge diesel locomotives. With the factory-installed front coupler in place, O72 is the E7's minimum curve. However, removing the front coupler and then installing the solid pilot included with each A unit enables operation on O54 curves. As part of this review, I initially planned to install the solid pilot for one of the photos. The coupler is easy to remove from the front truck, and the pilot is even easier to swap once the coupler is gone. However, I discovered that

removing the front coupler meant also temporarily dismounting the motor and battery bracket from the frame. You see, the wires to this coupler route under these components and connect to the electronics located on the back of the frame. Because the engine was not mine, I chose not to tear it down that far.

At Trackside

On the editorial Carpet Central Railroad, the 3rd Rail E7s smoothly started and accelerated whatever weight of train I coupled to them. My favorite was a nine-car mail train with head-end express reefers, baggage, RPO cars, and a P60 coach, which were all finished in PRR Tuscan red.

With the flywheel-equipped Cannon motor and Cruise Commander motor

driver electronics, the E7 ran nearly silently with the sound shut down, regardless of the load on its coupler. Of course, the electronics worked predictably well using either the original TMCC hardware with a CAB-1 for command control or the Legacy system with the CAB-2 set to CAB-1 emulation mode. With the Cruise Commander electronics running in command mode, acceleration and deceleration can be set to 32 steps or 100 steps with speed control on or off. I preferred 100step operation for its smoother changes in speed and, in fact, I don't recommend 32 speed steps.

Transformer-controlled conventional operation was also smooth and predictable. As with all 3rd Rail locomotives, a 9-volt alkaline battery for RailSounds backup power is installed at the factory in China.

For operators who like smoke, the white vapor streamed with reasonable density from all eight of the small exhaust stacks on the A unit. A small funnel comes with each A unit for filling the smoke unit, which has to be done rather slowly and carefully through one of the forward exhaust stacks. The reason is that the smoke unit is located under the front end of a small plastic exhaust manifold for all eight stacks. With the smoke unit in operation, this manifold disperses the smoke to all the stacks. A slide switch under the frame sets the smoke unit for command or conventional operation or off. My default setting is off. By the way, no smoke unit is installed in the B unit.

Considering the unusually large speaker inside the A unit, I was somewhat underwhelmed by the quality of the sound from it. As an experiment, I sealed all the see-through vents from the inside body with small layered strips of clear shipping tape and also applied thin strips of duct



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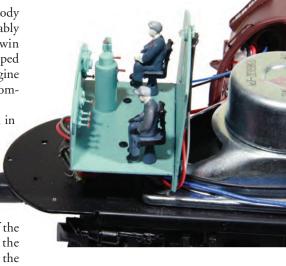
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tape as a soft gasket between the body and frame. My reward was a noticeably improved reproduction of the twin EMD 567 sounds. Naturally, I stripped all of my "sound mods" off the engine before returning it to Scott at the completion of this review.

Out of the box, the engine ran in conventional mode but would not detect the TMCC signal or run under TMCC. Scott immediately sent a new R4LC receiver board that cured the

problem. As shown in the photo of the engine with the shell removed, the R4LC board plugged on top of the Cruise Commander motor driver assembly and was a snap to replace. To freely paraphrase the Schick razor blade ads of years ago, pull-push, click-click, change boards that quick!

Overall, the E7s tracked my Atlas O72 mainline and O72 crossover switches smoothly and gracefully without a derail occurring over the several cumulative hours I ran them.



At the End of the Run

I enjoyed my visit of several weeks with the two 3rd Rail E7s or, in the case of the Pennsy decoration on our evaluation units, the EP20s. They were without a doubt a handsome pair on display or on the road.

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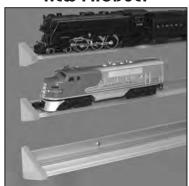
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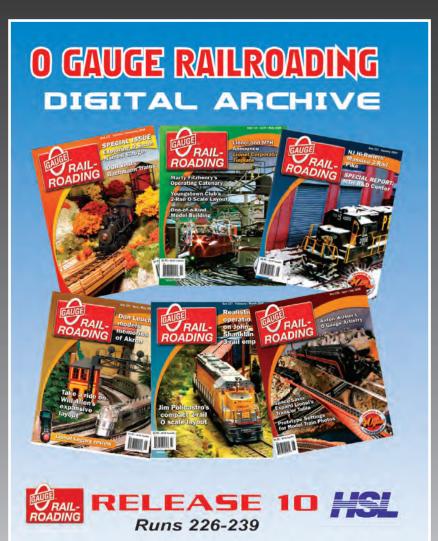
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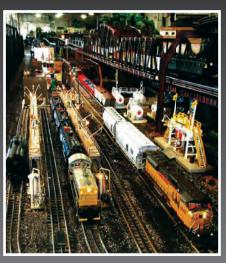
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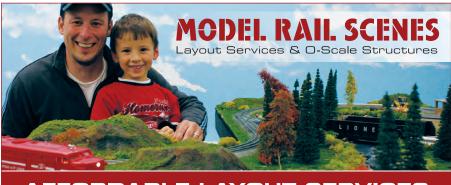
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MTH Ready-to-Run PRR 4-6-0 Steam Freight Set

As the FedEx driver handed me a monstrous box from MTH, my first thought was anything this big has got to be exciting. After all, I'm from the era of when bigger was synonymous with better. If that paradigm held true for the MTH steam starter set that I lugged to the OGR testing lab, which also serves as my train room, this was going to be a fun review. Oh, the package was 20"x 7"x 30" and weighed 23 pounds. One thing for sure-under a Christmas tree, the box and its contents would definitely have lots of hope as a show starter. And Dad would know for sure that he was not destined to get yet another bizarre holiday necktie.

Available in either Pennsylvania or Union Pacific markings, this RailKing Rugged Rails set includes everything needed to run the train. In the way of tools, only a pair of pliers and a small flat-blade screwdriver might be necessary. Our Pennsy set included the equipment listed below and shown in the photos:

- 4-6-0 steam locomotive
- Freight cars:
 - Chromed Gulf tank car
 - PRR gondola with crate load
 - PRR N5c illuminated caboose
- 31" x 51" 12-piece RealTrax oval
- 54-watt Z-500 transformer with connecting wires and illuminated track lock-on
- DCS Remote Commander singletrain control system
- RailWare interactive DVD and operator's manual

Before I get into how the set runs, let's take a brief look at its various pieces of equipment.

Locomotive

Both the die-cast engine and its plastic tender have no particular prototype that I can determine. Its decoration is reminiscent of the Pennsylvania Railroad in the glory years of the early 20th century with the overall Brunswick green and colorful trim. As to the paint and decoration, it's first rate as I always expect from MTH.

The ten wheeler's primary technical attributes include the Proto-Sound 3.0 digital control and sound system plus the tetherless drawbar. This drawbar is a thin and narrow composite board with printed circuits that carry power and control signals between the engine and tender. If an event such as a derailment and rollover should happen, the drawbar can withstand a 90-degree twist without damage. As with all MTH steamers, the Proto-Sound 3.0 electronics ride inside the tender. By the way, this same set was sold in the 2010 season, but with Proto-Sounds 2.0 and a tether cable between the engine and tender.

Additional operating features include a headlight with automatic two levels of brightness, fan-driven smoke unit, can motor with flywheel, and metal gears on



the engine. A remotely operated Proto-Coupler is on the back of the tender, which rides on metal trucks with die-cast side frames. By the way, these side frames are definitely PRR style.

The smoke unit puffs in time with the sounds of the steam exhaust chuffs, which occur twice for each revolution of the drivers. I found this surprising because I'm used to four chuffs and puffs per driver turn from MTH steam locomotives. Additionally, the only control for the smoke volume control is a potentiometer accessible from underneath the tender. To set the smoke density, ranging from maximum down to off, a small flat-blade screwdriver is needed. Remote control of the smoke is not available with the Remote Commander.

Freight Cars

All three of the freight cars have plastic bodies with most details such as ladders and grab irons molded in, sprung metal trucks, and operating thumbtack-style couplers. As their name of Rugged Rails implies, these cars can withstand considerable stress from derailments, heavy handling, or even careless storage.

On the tank car, the chrome finish is dazzling with crisp and colorful lettering and graphics. Although the ladders, platform, and handrails appear to be delicate, they are actually quite durable.

The gondola provides the extra play value for the set with its removable load of two simulated wooden crates. Three foam blocks, which are also removable, hold these crates in position in the car. With its crates and foam blocks out, the gondola could then carry just about any load that a new train enthusiast, regardless of age, can fit in it. An example could be the new cell phones for junior and sis. They can make videos with their phones riding around in the gondola and then share these action clips with all their Facebook friends.







At the end of the train, the caboose has a figure representing a crewman riding in the cupola. For rolling stock with few frills, the wire handrails are unexpected as are the two electrical pickup rollers, one on each truck.

Transformer

Basic is the best description for the Z-500 transformer, colloquially called a brick within the hobby. All it does is transform its rated input of 120 VAC to an 18 VAC output. The power plug is the on/off control—plug it into the AC outlet for power up and unplug it for power down. A 4-amp circuit breaker is manually resettable.

DCS Remote Commander

My usual reference to the DCS Remote Commander is DCS lite, and as such, this train control system is a featurereduced subset of DCS that controls only one engine; that is, the one included in the set. Rudimentary operations are possible with this system, which includes Proto-Sound startup or shutdown, throttle up or down, reverse, horn or whistle, bell, sound volume, and coupler opening. Initiating random special sounds and triggering passenger or freight yard announcements can also be done. However, no emergency stop or power-off function is provided other than unplugging the power cord.

The hardware consists of the handheld remote and the interface box that connects between the Z-500 and the track. Buttons for each of the eight functions plus the throttle control are on the handheld, and the interface box has a green indicator that lights momentarily upon receiving a command from the handheld. Two owner-supplied AA batteries power the handheld, but the interface box gets its power from the Z-500.

Unpacking and Assembly

Setup of the set took less than 30 minutes, and that included taking the items that make up the set out of their individual boxes, which were packed inside the colorful set box. The sensations I experienced while unpacking each of the boxes and then looking at its content for a few minutes was not unlike the excitement of a Christmas morning.

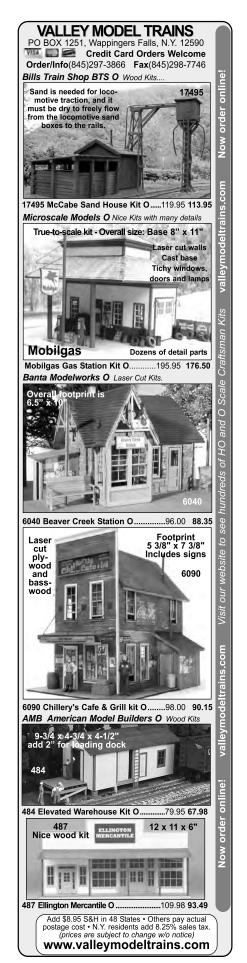
Assembling the loop of RealTrax was a little bothersome depending on the fit of the plastic tabs under the rails. I had trouble aligning and snapping together a couple of the joints on the straight sections and connecting them to the curved section. Putting the curved sections together went without a hitch.

Electrical connections could not get any simpler for the neophyte or experienced hobbyist. At the track end of the hookup is the illuminated lock-on that plugs into any of the sections. Power feed wires with factory-installed, color-coded plugs connect the electronic interface box for the Remote Commander to the lockon. And a single coaxial plug on the end of the cord from the transformer plugs into the interface box. In my opinion, the entire electrical system was well thought out and implemented. In a word...nice.

Remote Commander and DCS

Unlike DCS, which uses wireless radio frequency signals for two-way communication between the DCS remote and the TIU, the Remote Commander sends lineof-sight infrared codes to its interface box in one-way communication. Essentially, the operator points the handheld remote at the interface box and presses the desired button. The interface box receives the infrared code, translates it, and sends the required digital command to the engine for execution. If the handheld remote is not pointed more or less directly at the interface box, or if an object is in the path of the infrared beam, the intended operation such as direction change won't happen. Additionally, the Remote Commander is meant to work only with the set's engine, so the ID number sent by this system to the engine is fixed and cannot be changed.

However, the set's engine can be run on any layout using DCS or conventional transformer-controlled power, as I proved on the Editorial Carpet Central Railroad. Even though the Remote Commander is a feature-reduced control system, the engine has the fully featured Proto-Sound 3.0 electronics, including supercapacitors for backup power to support an orderly



shutdown. But there is a caveat for taking the set's ten wheeler from a DCS layout back to the track run with the Remote Commander. When the MTH Ready-To-Run set's engine powers up on a DCS layout, it is assigned a new ID number and runs as any other DCS steam locomotive. But with this new ID number, the engine will no longer work with the Remote Commander until it is reset back to its factory default ID. As a further condition, resetting the engine back to its factory default can only be done within the advanced menu available only on a DCS remote controller. But once reset, the engine will run again under control of the Remote Commander.

At Trackside

Not that the train ran great on the O31 loop of RealTrax supplied with the set, but my wife was so impressed with it she asked if I would like to buy it for my collection. My response was that it's a neat toy, but I'd rather have the one that got away—see my "Helper Engine" column in the previous issue, Run 258.

Initially, the Remote Commander behaved unpredictably and randomly failed to execute commands, even with my being careful to point the handheld remote at the infrared receiver on top

of the interface box. I didn't see any particular pattern indicating an operator error, so I gave up in frustration and decided to come back to the problem later. But after spending a couple of hours of typing on this review, I went back to the set, and it worked without a glitch from that point on. Even after running the engine on the CCRR and then resetting it back to its factory default, the Remote Commander worked every time, all the way to packing the set for return to MTH.

The engine and lights in the caboose never used more than 20 watts, even with the train running fast enough to get visually unstable in the O31 curves. As to the inevitable question of did the engine leave the rails no! But on a couple of the curves, it appeared to be just shy of launch speed, so I immediately slowed it down.

While I'm on the topic of speed control, I quickly developed a preference for the rocker switch throttle on the Remote Commander's handheld over the thumb wheel of the DCS remote. Overall, I rather liked the petite handheld, even if I did have to point it in the general direction of the interface box every time I wanted the engine to do something. But mainly, the train set was fun to run!

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Born to Have Fun

I suppose it was only natural that I would become interested in trains. My father was an engineer for the B&O during the steam era and through the 1970s, and my uncle was track maintenance supervisor for the B&O Akron Division. During World War II, he was recruited by the government and was responsible for establishing the track network at the Ravenna Arsenal in Ohio. For that reason, two engines on my 3-rail O gauge layout have special meaning to me: the B&O Royal Blue 4-6-4 Hudson and the E3 diesel A-B-A units that ran a daily schedule between Washington, DC, and New York City.

In the 1950s, a group of railroad history fans would charter the Royal Blue, ride the steam-powered version from Washington to Chicago, and then return to DC with diesels heading the consist. It was past the steam-to-diesel transition period, and not many had my father's certification to engineer both steam and diesel. As a result, he was selected to make both runs each year. He would take the steamer west, attired in his bib overalls complete with red neckerchief, and return on the diesel in a suit and tie. I also was fortunate to have ridden the Royal Blue from Washington to New York in 1957.

Like other boys my age back when trains were the toy of choice for most lads, I would sneak the Lionel catalog to school in my lunch pail and argue the merits of the Lionel 3-rail Magne-Traction with the 2-rail American Flyer guys during recess.

It was two weeks before Christmas in 1951 that Dad told me about an ad placed

in the local paper by a man who had a used Lionel train setup for sale. If I was willing to settle for second hand, we could go look at it, or we could wait and see if Santa might bring something new. Of course I would

happily settle for second hand. I was, after all, used to having some second-generation items in my life and not ashamed of it at all. My mom made me the nicest shirts out of flowered feedbags she bought for 50 cents from the turkey farm adjacent to our own farm and much nicer in my view than what the other kids had. So, Dad and I looked at and bought the used set, which turned out to be a prewar Lionel with lots of O27 track and many cars, switches, and cardboard buildings. We got it all for \$50.00—a lot of money in those days but it amounted to much more train than Santa ever could have mustered up new. Many hours were spent lying on the floor in the parlor watching, at eye level of course, the engine's headlight reflect off the rails as it rounded the bend. This was in a time before we had TV and were pretty much required to use our imagination while listening to the radio. My grandson once asked me if I was born before fun was

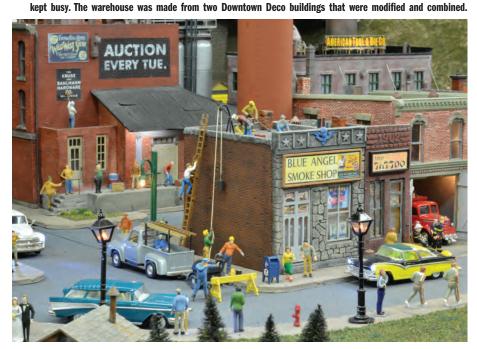

invented, but I think it's safe to say that some of the most fun you can have is fun you invent for yourself.

That first train was later set up in the basement of our farmhouse on two sheets of plywood. I continued to add to it every time a birthday or Christmas came along and could pretty much count on there being a new present of some Lionel or Plasticville stuff. The failed strings of Christmas lights even were recycled as interior lights for my buildings.

That layout remained in place for many years until I sold it to get money to buy photo darkroom equipment and a 4x5 press camera. I remember my mom asking

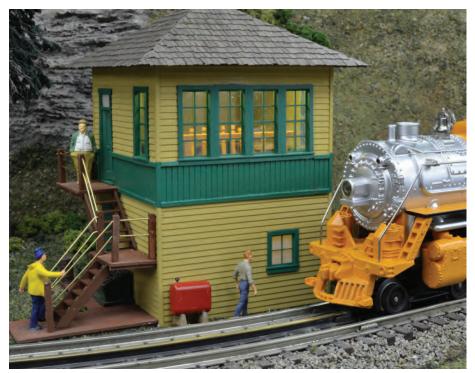
The smoke shop gets a new roof, and the hardware company warehouse dock workers on the next block are being



many times if I was sure I wanted to sell my trains. They had been my prized possession, and trading trains for photo equipment turned out to be a difficult but wise choice as it lead to a career that lasted a lifetime: first as a portrait photographer for a local studio, then as photographer with an engineering company, and finally into the law enforcement field where I retired twice. Still I never lost interest in trains. I was always looking at train magazines and public layout displays, but raising a family on a cop's wages left no time or money for trains.

In 1990 after my first retirement, I started once again looking into the hobby. At first I planned to model in N scale or HO but soon found that my ability to work with something that small at my age was a stress on my agility and eyesight. So I came back to O gauge and am definitely glad I did.

My initial plan was to construct an island in the middle of the basement with one side devoted to postwar Lionel and the other side to contemporary MTH hi-rail. With that plan in mind, I started acquiring most all of the operating accessories made by Lionel between 1945 and 1969 and restoring them both operationally and cosmetically. After several years passed and with another retirement fast approaching (including more time to work on a layout), I determined I needed to make the best use

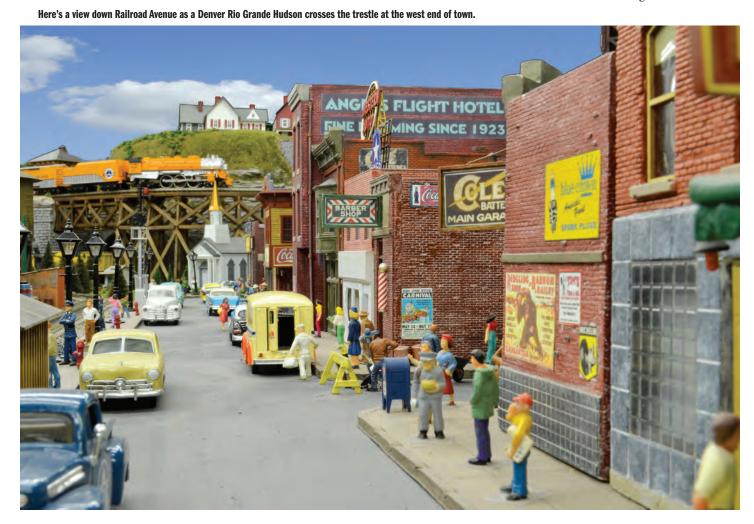


A Rio Grande Hudson passes my latest addition to the layout, which is the interlocking tower with a detailed interior.

of the space available. After long and careful thought, I decided to settle for MTH trains with a focus on realism and detail. Finally, a plan was coming together in my head, and I would start on the actual construction. I would model small town America, and the era would be late 1940s to early 1950s during the transition from steam to diesel

A new furnace and hot water tank installed against one basement wall increased the space available for trains. The layout now measures 8'x 21' with triplelevel plywood benchwork that is fitted with Atlas track laid on cork roadbed. Motive power is MTH Proto-Sound 2 engines and rolling stock. The buildings are a mixture of Ameri-Towne, Downtown Deco, Lionel, craftsman kits, and others. I operate the layout with DCS powered by a single Z-4000 transformer. A separate 28-amp, 12 VDC power supply is used for lighting and some accessories.

Every section of track has wires soldered to the bottom of each of the three rails that run down through the cork and

plywood to 14-gauge bus wires that run along the perimeter of the layout from the Track Interface Unit. In hindsight, this turned out to be overkill, but I decided to do it this way because, if it turned out later to be needed, it was not going to be possible to do easily or neatly after the fact. The only exception is when an insulated section of outside rail was needed for activating accessories such as crossing signals. Plus I reasoned that even if all that additional wiring wasn't necessary, it sure wouldn't hurt anything to have it already in place. The result is that getting a strong and consistent DCS signal throughout the layout has never been a problem.

Not being particularly interested in replicating prototype operating procedures, I laid track in five separate loops for continuous running of the trains, with two reversing loops on the second level. The layout includes more than 250′ of track, and I am able to have at least five trains running in various directions on a continuous basis.

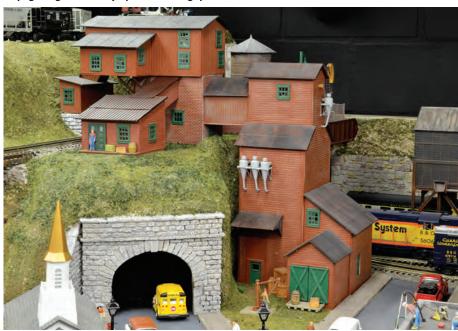
All of the tunnel portals and rocks were cast with Hydrocal in handmade rubber molds, and the terrain was formed using plaster cloth over woven and glued inch-

thick cardboard strips followed by applications of latex paint and landscaping materials.

Among my favorite buildings is a

structure I made with a Lionel grain elevator, a Lionel coaling station, and a few spare parts added to create a mine that covers two levels. This structure could use some

additional detail, but I am still debating what to add and where to add it.

The feed mill on my layout is modeled after a classic Farm Bureau feed mill like the one in Phalanx Station, Ohio. When I got my first drivers license years ago, my Saturday job was to take our 1947 Dodge 3/4-ton stake-body farm truck and trans-

port feed to the mill about a half mile from the farm where it was ground by water power. Even before I was old enough to have a license, I made the trip with our Ford 9n tractor and hay wagon. I have a lot of memories of that time and place and like to keep those memories alive on my layout when possible.

Another favorite is the Downtown Deco beverage dock. It was initially supposed to be an eight-bay flat placed against a wall, but I cut it and wrapped it around the City View apartment building and added a roof to make it into a unique warehouse (it's the building with the auction sign).

The market storefront was cut out and replaced with two wooden doors to become a single-engine firehouse, just right for small town America.

A Downtown Deco union hall on the city level was modified to have a full-windowed store front.

Ameri-Towne rooftop water towers have been added to many of the tall buildings in the city. Roofs are a very visible part of the layout, and I am in the process of working on making stacks, vents, and details to help improve their appearance. I

also plan to learn the art of silicone mold making so I can cast in resin some small details like skylights and stairways that are otherwise unavailable. The city structures are mostly made from various combinations of fronts and sides from the Ameri-Towne 820 series of kits.

The gas station is a converted Lionel small loading dock. I plan to replace it and several of the other plastic buildings with some wooden structures of similar design. This will give me something to do in summer evenings when we are out touring the country in our travel trailer. Sure beats watching TV.

I like MTH and Woodland Scenic figures and also buy unpainted Arttista pewter and Preiser resin figures because I enjoy painting them and giving a distinctive look to my miniature population.

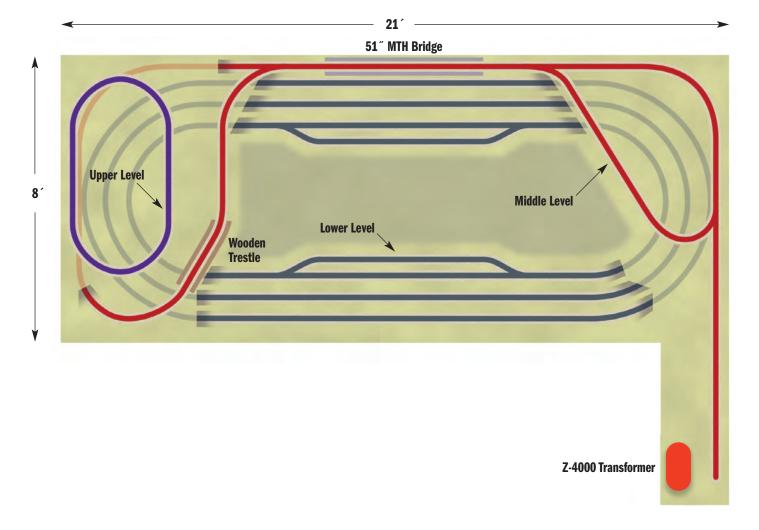
I started out lighting interiors of the buildings with LEDs thinking that they would create virtually no heat, would not use much current, and would rarely burn out. But I discovered that LEDs emit a beam

rather than an even 360-degree illumination. So I went back to using incandescent grain-of-wheat bulbs. The LEDs work great

for things like the blinking lights on the barriers at the construction site and the flashing dome lights on the police cruiser,

but for now, I'll stick with incandescent lighting for the buildings.

The animated signs from Miller Engineering are great, and I plan to add more to the layout. I use the Miller Engineering power module to reduce 12–16 volts down to 4 volts and thus eliminate the battery packs. One module will power several signs.

Building the layout has not been without its challenges and even an occasional misstep. For example, I had an area on the layout that needed some sort of feature. I decided on a water tower. After completing construction and spending more hours shingling the tank's roof than I did on my real two and a half car garage. I placed it in the location it was intended for and quickly decided that it was too nice to hide way back there. So I brought it out, relocated an interlocking tower and an oil tank, and placed the water tower in their place. That original scene-challenged spot still needs some attention.

This keeps me well occupied for many hours and sure helps pass the long Ohio winters. Like many in the hobby, I sure could use more space to expand the layout, but I find that there is always something more to do with what I already have.

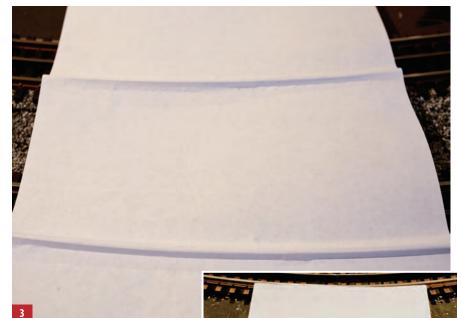


Test Your Nerve, Cross at the Curve

 ${f I}$ will be the first to admit having a great fascination with grade crossings and rails that appear to be buried in asphalt. Track is after all the most important scenic element on the Munoz Lines and just about any model railroad, and I have endeavored to make my track as realistic as possible. A modeler has only to watch real trains rolling by grade crossings to be motivated to re-create that important detail in 1:48 scale. We know that in most situations, a railroad is going to have to cross a street or highway at some point. If you have a realistic town or city, you'll likely need an equally realistic grade crossing somewhere. Obviously, it's both preferable and easier to model a road crossing on a straight section of track, but I've never really been one to do things the easy way. I decided to run a grade crossing across three curved tracks (Photo 1).

As is often the case, my imagination runs ahead of my strategies. I had never built a realistic grade crossing at a straight track. How did I know I could do so over three curves with decreasing radii? I have heard some say there is a fine line between bravery and foolishness. Nevertheless, my mind was made up, and I forged

I selected an area between two

structures in the town of Roseville, named for my 95-year-old mom, that would likely lead to the center of town. The grade crossing would traverse two main lines and a siding—all curved. To make things even more difficult, I decided my asphalt would meet the railheads with barely any perceptible gap. The interior of the grade crossings between rails would be wooden planks weathered for effect.

My initial plan included using Gator board, a laminate of polystyrene foam sandwiched between veneers of resin-impregnated wood fiber. This material can be painted without fear of warping or rippling. Gator board comes in various sizes and thicknesses. I decided to use 1/4" board I purchased in 2'x 3' widths. The other very basic and readily obtainable materials needed for this project are shown in Photo 2.

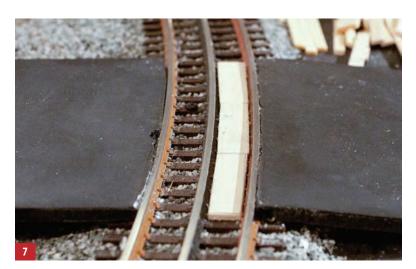
I began by creating templates made to match the exact curvature of the rails, one track at a time. I took a white 8-1/2 x 11 sheet of paper, held the paper firmly in place over the outside main line, and made a mask of the rails by running my fingers over the paper where it covered each rail. After four or five passes, the paper mask took on the exact curvature of the track and also reflected the depth of the rails (Photo 3).

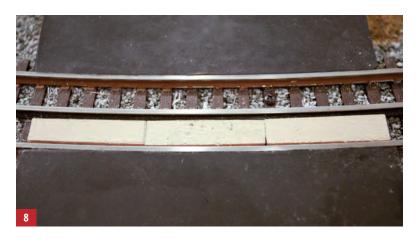


I returned to my workbench and carefully cut out the exterior area of the outside of the curve and taped it to the foam board. Gator board is very difficult to cut cleanly, so you must use a new hobby knife blade for each piece of board. I slowly sank the blade into the board in 1/4" movements to score along the cut line and then used the knife to make the full cut. The knife left a very smooth edge, and I held my breath as I placed the foam board against the outside of the rail. It was perfect! I knew I was on to something.

I repeated this paper mask process for the opposite side of that track and once again was rewarded with a piece of foam board that was practically a perfect match for the edge of the rail (Photo 4). I used my hobby knife to cut slight adjustments to make the fit even better.







The process worked equally well for the inner main line and the siding. I used flat black camouflage paint by Rust-Oleum to create a base coat that I would later weather (Photo 5). When the paint had dried, I mounted the foam board against the track on the outside and on a downward angle away from the track since the road would slope upwards to the rails. The foam board on the other side would meet the outer track of the inside main line, so that piece was placed level in between the two main line tracks, as seen in Photo 6. I repeated that leveling process with the inner mainline curve and the outer rail of the siding. On the opposite side of the siding, the foam board was angled down again. I now had all the foam board crossings in their places.

I used yellow carpenter's glue to attach the board to the plywood tabletop. I do know that special noninvasive glues are

needed with ordinary foam board, but I assumed the yellow glue would not be absorbed into the Gator board. Any areas adjacent to the track that were not snug against the rail were filled with spackle. When dry, I softly sanded it with very fine grit paper.

The next step was to insert wood planks between the rails. Atlas O track presents a problem in that regard, and a logistical solution was needed. In other words, some experimentation was in order. I soon discovered that the plastic spike heads and tie plates on Atlas O rail do not permit scale-size ties to be placed parallel to the track and to lay flat. So I cut sections of thin balsa wood





that fit exactly between the spike heads and tie plates. I found that if the balsa wood was slightly too wide, I could push it down (balsa wood is very soft) and achieve a flat base for the next layer of planks (Photo 7).

I now placed three O scale ties end to end on the balsa against the center rail (Photo 8). I was careful to ensure that the center rail height was slightly higher than the planks; otherwise, my locomotives would be coming to an abrupt halt at crossings as pickup rollers touched wood and not rail.

Now I hit another snag. A second row of O scale ties next to the first was not wide enough and left too much space between the first tie and the outer rail. It simply didn't look good. Adding a third tie was just as bad because then there would be

insufficient room for wheel flanges. I was temporarily derailed. I was trying to avoid cutting lots of ties. I then remembered a bag of Woodsies Craft Sticks I had bought at a craft store. Woodsies come in various sizes. My Woodsies were the same thickness as the O scale ties and slightly wider and longer. The width was perfect for me to lay them down next to the O scale ties, and I could cut the length to fit. I was back in business. Once the planks were glued in place, I could get to the fun part of detailing and weathering (Photo 9).

I used painter's drywall tape for road markings. I cut long strips and then individually cut each marking. I based my street marking plan on regulation road marking standards found on the Internet. The tape is sticky, and after I cut and

applied the tape, I sprayed the road with Dullcoat. After the Dullcoat dried, I used Bragdon Enterprises powders in various shades of charcoal to weather both the asphalt and the planks.

The final test was to run trains over my new grade crossing (Photo 10). Of course, I pushed boxcars across as I worked—a good idea—so I had every reason to believe I would not have any serious problems. I cleaned the track with care and rolled a Santa Fe Northern through the crossing. I tooted the whistle for two longs, a short, and another long. Now I could blow the whistle for a legitimate reason. By law in the real world of railroading, I was required to do so and was more than happy to comply in my 1:48 scale world.

Bevell's O Gauge Seasonal Spectacular

For more than 32 years, people have made pilgrimages to the small farming town of Blackstone, Virginia, between Thanksgiving and January to see the free model train layout and Christmas display at Bevell's Hardware store, one of the largest holiday train displays on the East Coast. Visitors can see over 12 O gauge trains running at any one time ranging from a Southern Railway 0-6-0 hauling a logging train to a triple-headed set of scale UP Big Boys pulling more than 60 cars.

Bobby Daniels and his wife, Lynn, are

the owners of Bevell's Hardware, and when they got into the business in 1979, they created the store's first O27 layout on a 4x8 sheet of plywood. Bobby assembled the trains, and Lynn used her artistic talent to create the scenery with a Department 56 Christmas village. Their young son, Robbie, operated the layout. Each year the layout grew bigger and better, with the 2011 layout being 20'x 56'. Emphasizing scenes typical of a small town USA agricultural farming community, the highly animated layout depicted national and

local history, agricultural and military interests, Christmas villages, and other attractions. About 37,000 visitors saw the layout in 2011, including more than 1,600 school children. A record daily attendance of nearly 2,300 visitors was also set in 2011 a few days after the layout was featured on Virginia Public Broadcasting's "Virginia Currents" show. That's a long way from when Bobby started collecting trains with his dad, a former Norfolk & Western station agent in Blackstone in the 1940s.

As was the case with so many young boys

of the 1950s, Bobby's mom and dad gave him his first Lionel train set. The holiday layout today is a comprehensive display of Bobby's and Lynn's combined interests in trains, antique cars, trucks and tractors, Department 56 and Lemax buildings, Disney characters, and circus items. Much of Bobby's antique train collection isn't even on the holiday layout, but it is displayed year round in row after row of display shelves along the store walls.

The Bevell's Hardware train layout has many different facets that appeal to old and young alike by showing some railroad history, local Blackstone history, and small light-hearted animated scenes that entertain everyone. Examples include a man swimming who is being chased by an alligator, a boy flying his plane in the park, boys hanging out at the watering hole, children having a snowball fight, ice skaters in a park, and a hunter who never seems to be able to bag the rabbit.

Railroad and U.S. history is represented by scenes such as a reconstruction of the May 10, 1869, golden spike ceremony at Promontory Summit, Utah, upon the completion of the first transcontinental railroad. A number of other scenes represent the Civil War period. If visitors look carefully enough, they will even find the presidents on Mount Rushmore. O scale riders in moving hot air balloons are treated to a bird's eye view of the whole scene.

Local and Virginia military history is commemorated by models representing Fort Pickett, located just outside Blackstone and Fort Eustis, headquarters for the U.S. Army Transportation Corps. Many Fort Pickett buildings, the airfield, and WWII prisoner of war stockades are represented, painted in their original camouflage paint schemes.

Most real military railroad operation and maintenance training is conducted at Fort Eustis, and Bobby's layout depicts the engine and maintenance facilities found there during the steam era. It's common to hear Army men and women comment on how they appreciate being honored for their current service. It is especially heartwarming to hear someone talk about just getting back from Iraq or Afghanistan while looking at an army railroad car with a Welcome Home sign. A special train added in 2011 was the Welcome Home Troops Train, which had signs on many of the military cars acknowledging the various local National Guard units and remembering veterans of past and present wars. Running around the fort is an Abram's main battle tank that operates on K-Line SuperStreets track. Soldiers can be seen rappelling down a tower, while nearby others are on the firing range honing their marksmanship skills.

Many historical Blackstone buildings are represented including the John Thomas Antique Carriage Museum and Schwartz's Tavern, a completely restored 1790 tavern located in the city park next to Bevell's Hardware. There is action on one of the layout's most popular scenes: a city block of buildings with four different fires burning at one time. It takes the full attention

of one layout operator to keep those fires burning. In this animated scene, the voices of the firemen, policemen, and emergency personnel are recordings of actual people who work in Blackstone's police and

fire departments.

Also included is a drive-in theater like the one Bobby visited as a teenager, and it's always a toss up regarding which movie young visitors like better: Thomas the Tank Engine or Cars. The drive-in is one of the most popular scenes with young-

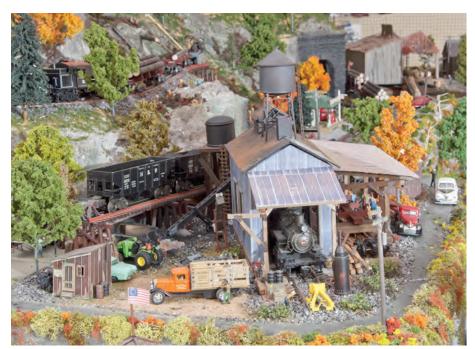
In 2011, Bobby's layout went "green" with six power-producing windmills, a new oil field and gas producing facilities, and trains pulled by the new genset engines that rank as railroading's most efficient diesel engines.

For many years, Lynn has paid special attention to showcasing the circus collection including both the trains and the circus. Two or three roller coasters run each year along with the many rides and the animated side shows associated with all circuses. Inside the main big top are animated high-wire walkers, animal acts, and a full crowd of people.

In 2011, Bobby added a new 25' circus train that has the type of smooth-sided metal

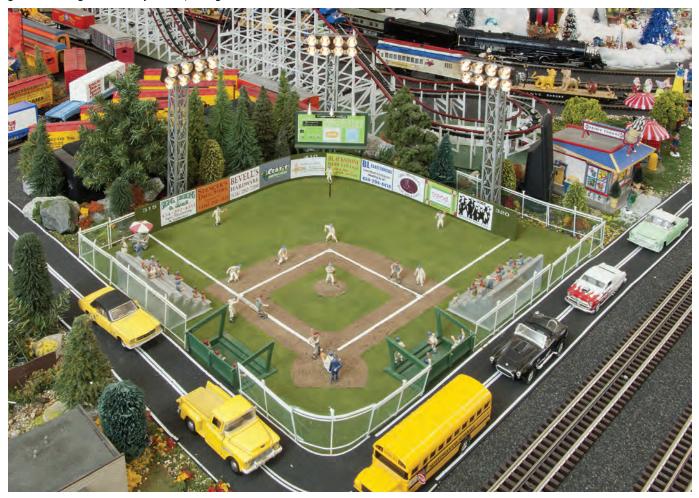

cars currently being used to transport the Ringling Bros. and Barnum & Bailey consist, a mile long train in real life. This is in addition to Bobby's antique collection of circus cars made from Walthers kits built in the 1950s. Complete with animations and sounds, the circus scene also provides a great place to run Thomas the Tank Engine. A logging operation and gold mine were also added to the layout in 2011.

That layout is created on a platform covered by 3/4" plywood with holes cut for the various animated scenes. At 28" high, the plywood is supported by 2x4 modular sets of frames that are strong enough to walk on. Robbie developed and constructed all the modules for the 2011 layout as he has done for many years. The 28" overall height was selected because it provides an ideal viewing level for both small children and adults.

Plexiglas protects the edge of the layout and needs to be cleaned every evening. To provide access for track cleaning and main-

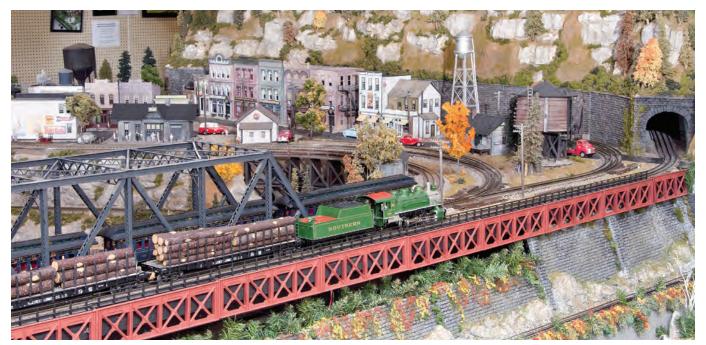


tenance, Bobby created a number of 2' paths between different scenes. These walkways are covered with rubber matting to help them blend in and provide good footing.

After the main table is finished each season, numerous loops of track are added. The track used is 3-rail Atlas O with minimum 72" curves. All wiring is at least 18-gauge or thicker stranded wire. The Atlas O service department has supported Bobby's efforts for many years by sending spare track and rail joiners via overnight delivery, sometimes as complementary aid to a worthy cause. Switches are included in many of the individual scenes, but to help assure consistent operational reliability, they are not used on the main lines.

Control systems include MTH DCS, Lionel TMCC (soon to be replaced by the Lionel Legacy system), and conventional transformer control. All are powered by five MTH Z-4000 transformers, two MRC transformers, and some older Lionel ZW transformers used for lighting, accessories, and animation power.

Even though Bobby's train collection is traditional and covers all scales and manufacturers, he normally runs new production trains from the

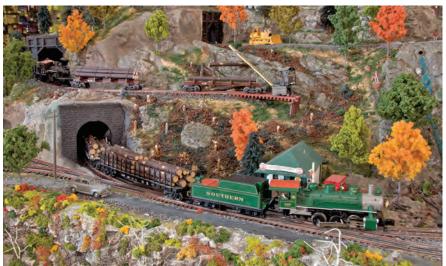

major manufacturers that are equipped with digital command control. It is common for Bobby's engines to log over 500 hours of running time each season, and the MTH system helps maintain a log of running time so maintenance can be performed in a timely manner. Two of his

MTH Big Boys have over 2,500 hours each.

Other members of the family, especially Lynn's daughter Kathy and daughter-in-law Ashley; family friends; volunteers from the local Crewe Railroad Museum in Crewe, Virginia; and the High Bridge Model Railroad Club in Farmville, Virginia,

have all contributed to creating this seasonal display. It takes about 12 weeks to set up the complete layout, and the platform is configured differently every year to give the overall layout a new look. That way, visitors always have to search for their favorite scenes and animations even if they appeared on the previous year's layout.

Ground cover is a mixture of real soil, real rocks, foam, fish tank gravel, and cat litter. Commercial scenery is by manufacturers such as Woodland Scenics and Scenic Express. A number of custom rubber molds were created for making the numerous rock retaining walls and rock outcroppings. The 2011 layout included more than 200 new trees, most in fall colors, that Bobby purchased from DC Rail and Hobby Depot with owners, Dave and Mary Ptak, delivering them personally to make sure they were the right colors for the fall scenery.

The 2011 layout took about six weeks longer to build due to floods, a leaking roof that had to be replaced, and incorporation of a 12'x 24' new center mountain section that was purchased as a complete layout built by Ashe Rawls of Richmond, Virginia.

See Run 245 for photos and details of this nationally recognized mountain layout. The new section has highly detailed scenery and structures. Along with requiring wide load highway permits to move the layout from Richmond to Blackstone, all of the front windows of the store had to be removed so that a long forklift could insert the layout into the building. With additional track and scenes on both ends and back sections, this new mountain section runs four separate trains, and after the holidays it will become a yearlong operating layout for the store.

Houses and buildings are typically Lionel and MTH. Other structures and customized commercial buildings, especially where animated, include highly detailed paper buildings. The different scenes spring to life thanks to the hundreds of figures in various positions and poses along with numerous vehicles, lots of signs, boxes, barrels, fences, and others. There is even an engine that has taken a nosedive into the pond at Ft. Eustis.

The basic purpose of the layout is pure entertainment for a Christmas season, and Bobby is already hard at work on the 2012 version. Future plans are only as big as Bobby's, Lynn's, and their friends' imaginations, so the community can certainly look forward to another great layout in 2012. There even are plans to make the park-size train that runs outside Bevell's Hardware bigger and better for giving youngsters a train ride around the park.

Having lived in the Blackstone, Virginia, area for many years, Lynn and Bobby Daniels are well known for their free Christmas train

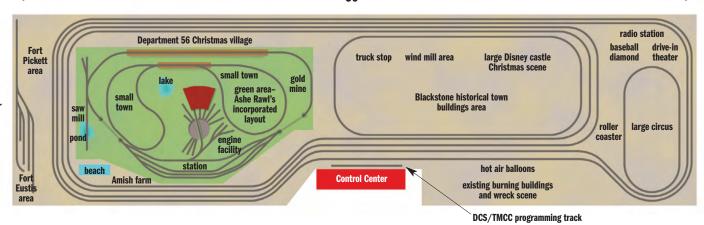

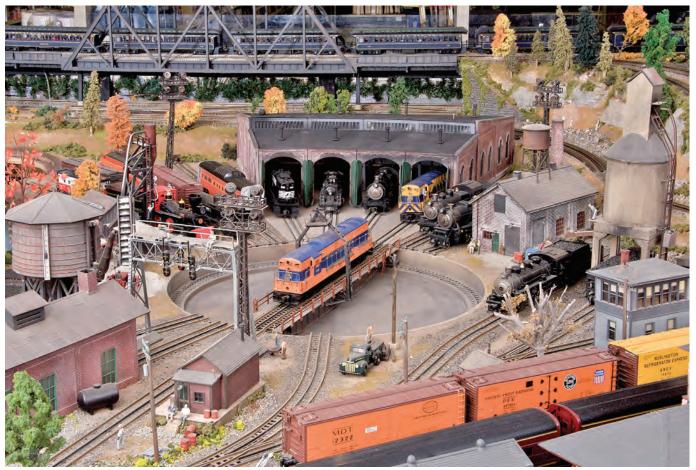

All Tanked Up

I grew up in an industrial area in northern Indiana, and among my earliest memories were the massive refinery complexes in the area with all the different size storage tanks and their associated networks of piping and valves. When I started to plan industries for my O gauge layout, I decided early on that there was going to be a refinery.

Refinery tanks come in all shapes and sizes, with the spherical tank being what I regard as the most interesting. Spherical tanks are used for storing a variety of gases and liquids depending on the state of the material. I decided to build a few of these spherical tanks for the layout using, basically, items that I had lying around the house.

Materials I used included 1/4" and 1/8" balsa wood strips, a 6" diameter Christmas tree ornament, a leftover sheet of foam core board, a cutting board, straightedge ruler, scissors, tape, box cutter, CA glue, and various plastic straws and fittings (Photo 1). Plastruct in 1/4" and 1/8" or something similar is recommended, but I made do with all I had available at the time.

The tank is going to be made out of the Christmas tree ornament, which I got for 25 cents at my local discount store. It is 6" in diameter, so measure and cut a piece of foam

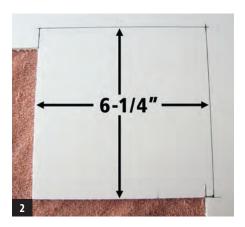


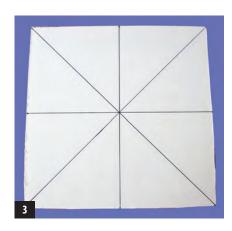
core larger than whatever size bulb you may use (Photo 2). This will provide the base for the tank.

The tank will be positioned on the center of the base, and determining the center is very easy. Simply draw diagonal lines from corner to corner using a straightedge ruler, and where they intersect will mark the center of the base.

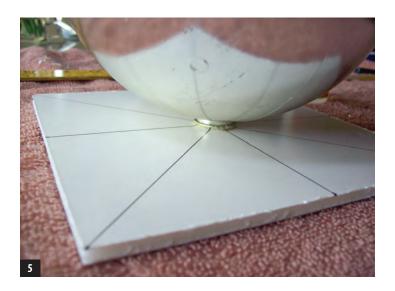
Then draw two additional lines through that center point to separate the square base into four equal sections (Photo 3). The importance of these lines will become clear as this project progresses.

Remove the hanging clip on the ornament, then turn the ornament upside down and apply a small amount of CA glue to















adhere the tank to the center of the base (Photos 4 and 5).

Using the straightedge ruler, determine the location and length of each support leg. In this example, each leg was cut to 3-1/4", and a location mark was made on the base where each leg meets the base (Photo 6). Photo 7 shows how you can quickly mark the other support locations by just measuring the first one from where the tank is sitting in the center to the mark. Then all you have to do is continue marking each location by that measurement for the remaining seven supports.

Since all I had on hand for this project were balsa strips in 1/4" and 1/8" widths, I used these as my support legs and diagonal braces. In my example, I cut the support legs 3-1/4" long and then mounted them in their respective locations (Photos 8 and 9). I then made a diagonal measurement from the top of one support to the bottom of the adjacent support to determine the length of each diagonal member. On my project, that ended up being 3-7/8" (Photos 10 and 11).

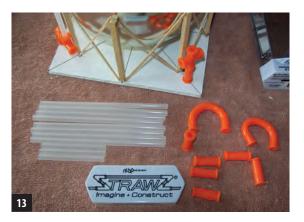
The completed raw tank structure was then detailed with contributions my wife, LaKeeta, made to this project. Some weeks earlier at a local yard sale, she had found a Strawz construction set made up of plastic straws and various connectors. An Internet search for Strawz will









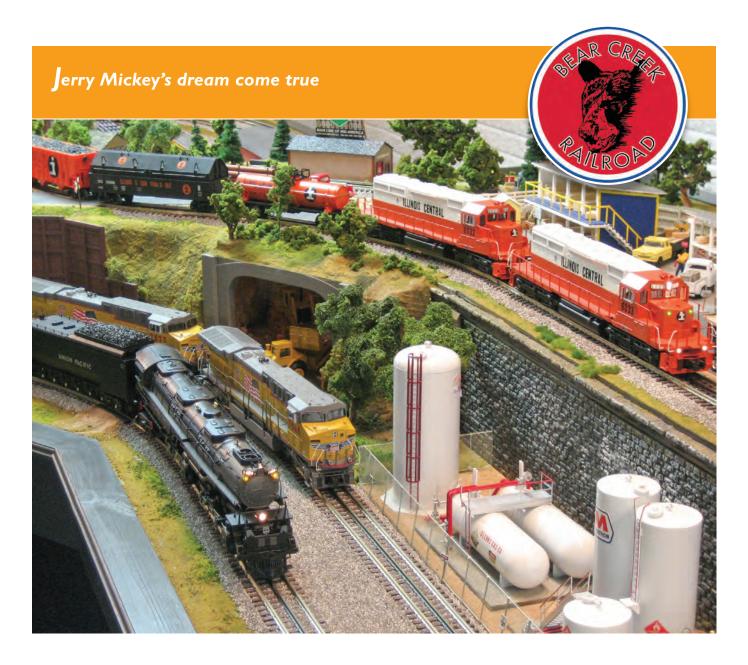


locate retail sources for this product. She is always looking for things I might be able to use on the layout, and so for a buck these little parts came home with her. Since I needed to add piping detail on the tanks, she suggested I use her contribution to the project (Photos 12 and 13).

After adding the piping and fittings, using photos of prototype tanks as a rough guide, I sprayed several coats of flat white over the entire project. I had enough materials to build two of these tanks and added them to my refinery project (Photo 14). I eventually will add appropriate markings on the tanks using homemade decals.

Overall, this was an enjoyable project that can be improved upon using all plastic parts, but it still came out fine and gave me the incentive to build even more tanks. I will need more tanks of all sizes, so it's time for a visit to the plumbing department of a local home improvement center. Can you say PVC?





BEAR CREEK RAILROAD

Having a large O gauge layout has been a dream of mine since childhood. My initial O gauge train of not many years ago was a Soo Line Lionel Service Station Set

along with enough track for a single loop powered by a 90-watt Lionel 1033 transformer. These purchases were set up on a ping-pong table. ing community were named Bear Creek, a name inspired by a country road near my home town in central Illinois. From that point on, my hobby eventually spread to cover all available space.

The first permanent layout consisted of two 4x8 plywood sheets. This was later expanded with two more sheets to form a U. After three years, a third section was added, and the layout then measured 24'x 12' with two levels at each end. After completion, I discovered that the fun is in the building and not simply looking at the finished product.

Construction of the present layout began in January 2006 with 36 particle board 1/2" sheets framed with 1x4s and cut to the correct size. These framed sheets were then assembled in the basement and supported on 2x4s. A shelf attached under the table holds all the transformers, and the area under the layout is left open. This affords ready access and makes cleaning chores much easier.

The Bear Creek Railroad is a two-level layout at each end. It was necessary to complete all track work for the lower level before installing the upper level. For sound control, 1/2" Homasote board painted green was added on top of the particle board. Then track was laid on cork roadbed. After completing the lower level, the upper level was installed. Removable panels, fitted with magnets for easy removal, were added between the upper and lower levels for access to the tracks and trains. A trim board around the edge of the

table finished the project.

The railroad has a walk-around configuration and measures 46' long and from 4' to 14' in width. The upper levels are 42" high, and the lower level is 34" off the floor. The 600' of track and all of the switches are from Atlas O. Curve diameters are 81", 72", and 54". Woodland Scenics ballast covers the roadbed with equal parts of "Gray Blend" and "Gray Ballast" together.

I have a couple of favorite railroads, and they are evident on the layout. The Illinois Central operates on the upper level, and the Union Pacific runs on the lower level. There are a total of five loops. The layout is equipped with DCS, which allows for simultaneous operation of up to 10 trains.

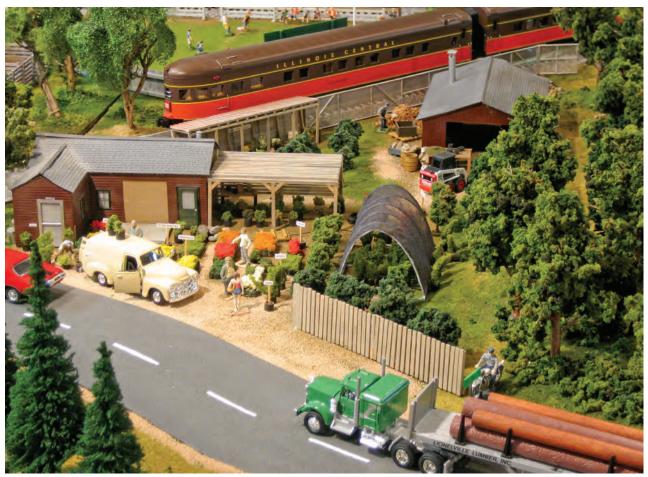
The MTH motive power, with the exception of a Union Pacific Big Boy, is diesel. At any one time, around 125 pieces of rolling stock are on the rails.

Power for the layout is provided by six MTH Z-4000 transformers, two MTH Z-750 transformers, and one Lionel 100watt brick. Three of the Z-4000 transformers are used for track power running the 10 engines. The remaining three are used to power the 275 lights illuminating the building interiors and other areas on the layout. A Z-4000 can power 60 to 70 incandescent 14-volt Miniatronics lamps per side before tripping the internal overload. The Z-750 transformers and the 100-watt brick run accessories and a small display area. All track wiring utilizes 12gauge wire soldered to Atlas track connectors with connections spaced 8' to 10' apart. As DCS performs most reliably with star wiring on this type of layout, 1,700' of 12-gauge wire was required. This combination produces a DCS signal reading of 10 throughout the line.

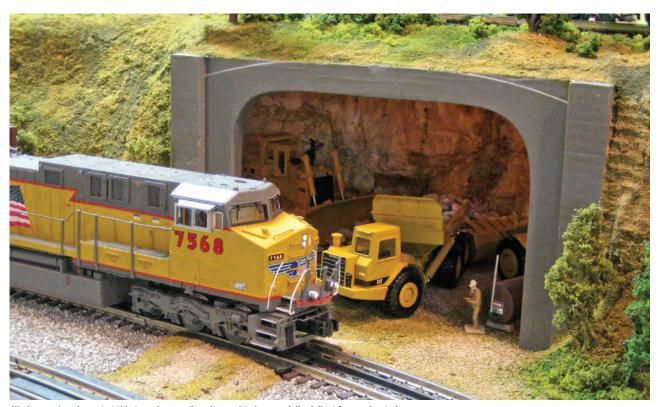
Buildings are the true highlights of the Bear Creek Railroad. All 110 structures are



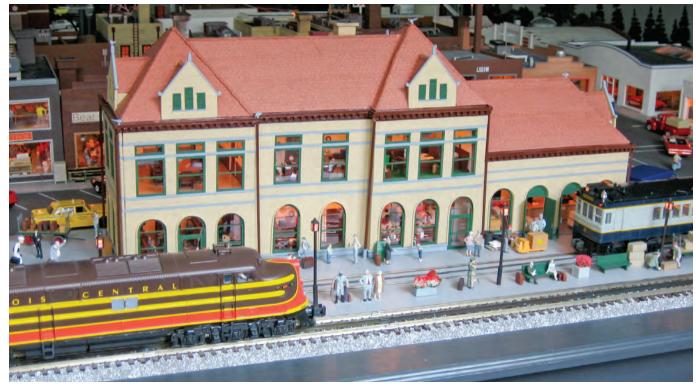
The main yard is located on the middle area of my layout.

The highlight of the town area is the main station. The interior of this two-story building includes a detailed waiting room, ticket office, business office, board room, executive office, and grill. There are 25 lights and 80 figures in and around the station. The roof is finished with 18 packages of slate shingles from Builders In Scale.

built to scale with no models or kits used. Many buildings are patterned after those from my childhood or from my current home in central Iowa. Buildings visible from around the perimeter of the layout have detailed interiors complete with furnishings, accents, and 850 figures, most of which are from Arttista.

Trees, bushes, flowers, boulders, rock formations, and water features are handmade. Approximately 250 dogs, cats, birds, varmints, and farm animals have made Bear Creek their home. Cruising the handcrafted roads are over 245 cars, pickup trucks, buses, semis, motorcycles, fire engines, police cars, and taxis.

The layout is divided into rural, middle, and town areas. There are 21 scenes in the rural area including a coal mine, barber shop, animal clinic, cafe, post office and general store, church, monument company, tavern, lumberyard, fruit and

vegetable stand, train depot, fur buyer, and Anti-Thief Association Hall. The farm is complete with house, barn, sheds, fields, farm animals, farm machinery, trucks, and figures—similar to the place I lived in until I was 16. The main attraction and largest structure in the rural area is the grain co-op.

The middle area is divided by an 8' hand-fabricated bridge. The bridge, with two tracks, connects the rural and town areas. Built of styrene, it stands a scale 31'



The ruling motive power on the Bear Creek is diesel-electric, a lot of which is both contemporary and big.



Bear Creek Co-op is the centerpiece of the rural area. It was constructed using bass wood and stands 20" tall. The roofs are corrugated strips of tarpaper made from masking tape painted black. Next to the elevator is a silo and office. The silo is constructed from a 16" section of 3" PVC pipe.

high and 384' long and supports heavy traffic. The smaller side of the middle area contains the yard and switch tower. The larger side has 10 attractions, including a hobo camp, sandlot baseball field, motel, and restaurant. A 9" monitor and DVD show movies and cartoons at the drive-in theater.

A highlight of the middle section is the two-hole golf course. The greens and tees are all elevated and contoured leading to demanding drives and challenging putts. This was accomplished using 1-1/2" thick foam board shaved to form sloping and undulating greens. Woodland Scenics supplied the grass in varied shades for length and tone. The 10 golf carts, 14 golfers, clubs, bags, balls, ball washers, and other accessories are from Kramer Products.

The largest area is the town and its 47 vignettes. Most of Bear Creek's business, commerce, and retail trade of Bear Creek occur here. There are four major streets with buildings on both sides that contain



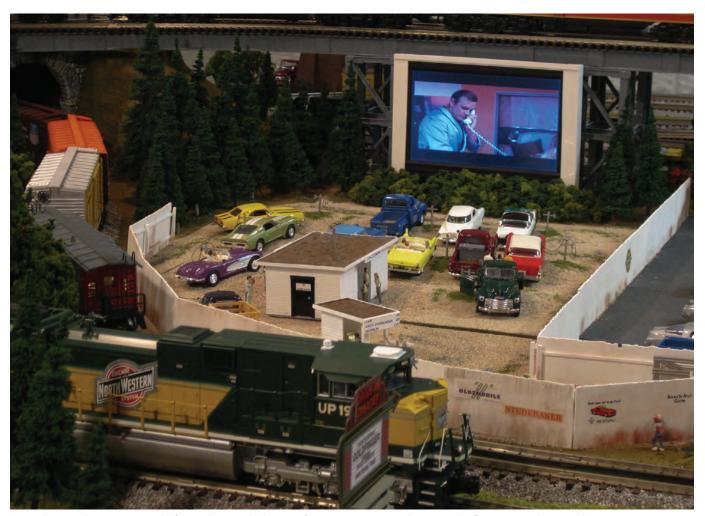
The grain co-op office is brick made with foam brick sheets from Heki-dur. The interior is complete with desks, file cabinets, phones, typewriters, grain testers, soda pop machine, and ledgers. The exteriors of all structures are weathered using wash, paint, or chalk.

what is normally found in a town of 5,000 to 6,000 people in the 1950s and 1960s. Some examples include a school, bank, garage, library, auto dealership, movie theater, bike shop, city hall, florist, pool hall, YMCA, implement dealer, newspaper, hardware store, furniture store, and homes. All are built using Heki-dur brick or stone sheets. They are lighted, detailed, and populated.

The highlight of the town area is the railroad station. In deciding what this building should look like, I searched the Web for images of train stations. One was the old Chicago, Burlington and Quincy station in Creston, Iowa, which currently serves as Creston City Hall. After a road trip to see this great building, construction began. It took three months to complete. Heki-dur brick was again used with styrene substituting for concrete. The interior is detailed including pictures and paintings from Print Shop that adorn the walls.

The Great Leap Backward: **The Lionel Button Box**

Lionel introduced the TrainMaster Command Control system with great fanfare in 1994, which promised to revolutionize the O gauge 3-rail market. For the first time, Lionel operators would be able to realize the decades-long dream of independently controlling more than one train on the same track at the same time. Locomotives with TMCC were also equipped with a digital sound system called RailSounds 2.5 that provided authentic train noises. The system reproduced railroad operating sounds, horns, whistles, and bells recorded from real trains with unprecedented clarity and fidelity.

Lionel touted the ease of use of the newly launched system in the 1994 Electric Trains and Accessories catalog with: "Running trains with Lionel TrainMaster is just like using a ZW. If you know how to run a Lionel, you already know how to use Lionel TrainMaster." The tone of the TMCC intro ads, like the one shown in Photo 2, said it all: "Combine this simplicity with advanced features like walkaround control, multiple-train operation, realistic locomotive speeds, and more. Nobody can match the advanced technology of Lionel TrainMaster. Nobody."

It was an exciting, innovative way to run 3-rail trains, and Lionel fully expected that this new digital train control and sound system would help the company cruise to an easy dominance of the upper end of the O gauge market. That did not happen for a variety of reasons including fierce and effective competition from M.T.H. Electric Trains and other rivals. Also playing a part were the negative attitudes toward command control of traditionalist adult collectors, who made up the bulk of buyers at the upper reaches of the 3-rail market.



High Ownership and Low Usage: A Command Control Paradox

By 2003 the TrainMaster system had been on the market for practically 10 years, and virtually all medium- and higher-priced Lionel steam and diesel locomotives were equipped with command control. During that time, thousands of TrainMaster Command Control Sets for running command control trains had also been sold. TMCC was in wide circulation, and TMCC capable locomotives were being marketed under license by Atlas O, K-Line, Weaver Models, and the 3rd Rail Division of Sunset Models, in addition to Lionel. There were lots and lots of TrainMaster engines and command sets out there, but actually using TMCC was another matter. TMCC defied the adoption curve for consumer electronics. After a decade on the market, a majority of Lionel O gauge hobbyists should have been operating their trains in command control. However, most folks still chose to control their trains the old-fashioned way by moving their transformer handles up and down to vary the speed.

TMCC usage rates had become much more important to sales now that Lionel had an O gauge command control rival in the form of the MTH Digital Command System (DCS). Lionel was developing a more advanced command control system, but the introduction date for Legacy was uncertain, and Lionel wanted to do something as soon as possible to expand command control usage and train sales. One idea to boost acceptance rates was the Button Box, which some Lionel insiders dubbed "The Great Leap Backward" because it was a step back from true command control (Photo 3). The good news was the Button Box allowed traditionalists







to tiptoe into the world of digital train control without all its perceived complexities.

The Button Box

The Button Box was designed to appeal to the legions of nonusers who already had trains equipped with command control. The device allowed conventional operators, who used their transformers for speed control, access to many of the features inside their Lionel command-equipped locomotives. As you can see on top of the unit in Photo 4, there are buttons to control smoke and sound volume, TowerCom, CrewTalk, and front and rear ElectroCoupler activation, in addition to whistle, horn, and bell operation and other TMCC features. It was intended that a Button Box would be placed right next to a conventional transformer for easy access to command control functions. Compare it to this close-up of the CAB-1 remote in Photo 5. Many of the functions are the same, but the CAB-1 can do more including actually operating TMCC locomotives. Another important advantage of the CAB-1 is the operator is not tied down to one location and can operate trains from a variety of locations while walking around the layout.

You can run two different engines with the Button Box, but the operator is able to select and operate only one locomotive at a time. To control the functions of two locomotives, the Button Box required the use of two separate, properly phased transformers or a transformer with two separate throttles like the ZW. Basically, you could run two trains as long as each one was on a separate loop or in a different block on the same loop. A rear view of the Button Box shows the attachment points for wires that go to the track or tracks along with the special wall pack that powers the device (Photo 6). The instructions emphasized that only the wall pack that came with the Button Box should be used with it because it would not work properly with any other wall pack.

Appearance

When the Button Box is compared to a production CAB-1 controller, it becomes apparent that the Button Box in this form is a test unit, although it is fully functional (Photo 7). In the instructions that came with the Button Box, Lionel assured product testers that the production version would be properly glamorized for the faithful with a

specially designed case, improved graphics, and replacement of the membrane keypad with actual pushbuttons. Individuals working for the big "L" at the time said it would receive a multicolored art deco treatment similar to what eventually appeared on the Legacy base unit (Photo 8). The shipping box also emphasized that this was by no means a production article, as evidenced by what can be seen in looking at a production TrainMaster Command Set box (Photos 9 and 10).

Why the Button Box Wasn't Produced

The Button Box was truly a great leap backward, and by the time it was ready for the marketplace, it's strictly limited capabilities were at odds with the direction the new management at Lionel was taking the company. Bill Bracy had been replaced as the CEO by Jerry Calabrese, who pushed aggressively to accelerate Legacy development and its advanced features to match or exceed the competing DCS already in the marketplace. Projected price escalation for the developed version made matters worse for the Button Box idea. It was likely that the suggested retail price would be unattractive when compared to the existing TMCC system, which could do a lot more for the consumer for the price (Photo 11). As a result, the Button Box became a technological side road that was not taken by Lionel, and the few in existence became collectibles by accident. George Brown and I managed to test two of them and found, ironically, that within their limitations, they worked quite well.

The Big Question

Is there still a need? The short answer is "yes." There still is a need for a simplified version of the Lionel command system, and the marketplace rendered its verdict on the subject when Lionel announced it was no longer going to make the CAB-1. The price of units in pristine or excellent condition went up sharply as TMCC outfits that had never been used came out of hobbyist stashes in droves to meet the demand. Even with market price escalation, they were considered cost-efficient supplements to Legacy or reasonably priced replacements for worn-out units.















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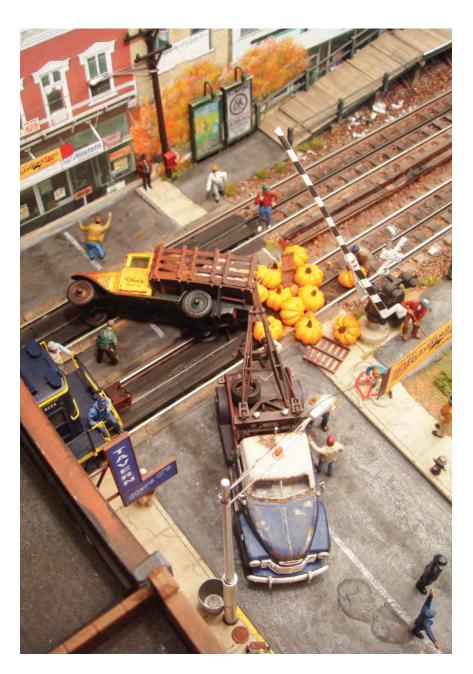




Rail Tales

Pumpkin Truck Squashed by Freight Train

From an October 31, 1971, Staten Island Advance newspaper account by reporter Steve Phetterplace:

What started out as a cool and pleasant October morning turned into what could have been a major tragedy near Staten Island's New Dorp station.

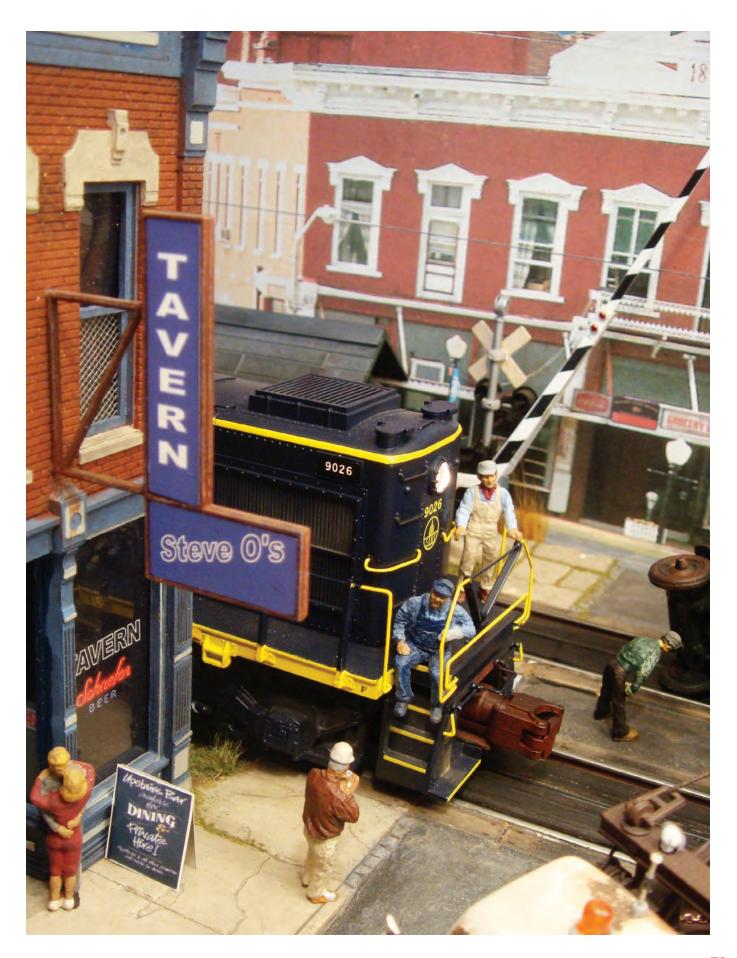
A truck owned by local farmer Jeffrey Greenjeans was crossing Staten Island Rapid Transit Railway Company tracks (SIRT, a subsidiary of the B&O) on Rose Ave. near the S. Railroad Ave. intersection when it was struck by a southbound freight that had been switching cars at a nearby siding.

The truck, which was transporting a load of giant pumpkins destined for competition at the local Oktoberfest celebration, was overturned by the slow-moving train. There were no injuries to the driver Mr. Greenjeans, the train crew, or any nearby pedestrians.

Although the crossing where the accident occurred is fully protected by gates and warning lights, Mr. Greenjeans insisted that the gates were up when he entered the crossing. A preliminary inspection by SIRT and local officials supported the driver's account, and a railroad spokesman later confirmed that a brief power outage caused the gates to fail to lower.

A local towing firm assisted in righting the farmer's truck, and normal commuter operations resumed on SIRT less than an hour after the accident occurred.

Later that same day, one of the victims of the accident—a giant "Big Max" variety pumpkin raised by Mr. Greenjeans—emerged unscathed from its tumble and took first place in the Oktoberfest competition.









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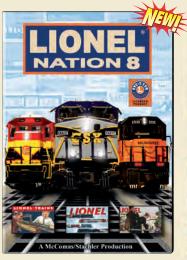
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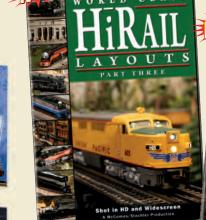
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Scene Along the Rails

Thoroughly Thoroughbred

While our nation was celebrating its 236th birthday this past July 4th, the Norfolk Southern Railroad (NS) commemorated its 30th anniversary at a special event on July 3rd and 4th honoring 20 of the predecessor railroads that make up today's NS system.

The tribute, designated a "Family Portrait," was held at the North Carolina Transportation Museum in Spencer on the former site of Southern Railway's Spencer Shops, once a major steam locomotive servicing facility.

Starring in the event was the NS heritage diesel fleet made up of 20 GE ES44AC and EMD SD70ACe locomotives adorned in liveries representing many of the major lines that now make up the extensive NS network. Norfolk Southern employees in Altoona and Chattanooga, Tennessee, painted the GE locomotives, while the EMD units were painted at the Progress Rail Services facility in Muncie, Indiana. The heritage locomotives are now at work hauling freight across the railroad's 20,000-mile, 22-state network.

"This is the first and probably only chance we'll have to get all these locomotives together in one place at one time," said Norfolk Southern CEO Wick Moorman.

"We're proud of the role railroads play in keeping the country's economy strong, and July 4th is an opportune time to showcase that heritage of service and safety."





North Carolina Transportation Museum Executive Director Samuel Wegner said, "Having these engines gathered together is a phenomenon, not just an event. The N.C. Transportation Museum's

37-stall Bob Julian Roundhouse is obviously a great place to frame this Family Portrait. It's a great partnership with Norfolk Southern to host this historic occasion."

There's more good news for the O gauge

hobbyist. Both Lionel and MTH have announced plans to introduce these 20 colorful locomotives in their respective lines. What a spectacular addition that will make to any layout or collection!







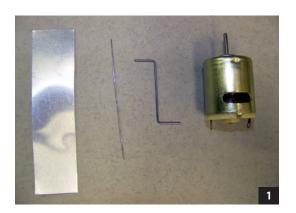


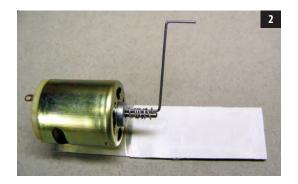


Here's an Idea

Remote Control for Lionel's Postwar O27 Manual Switches

On my Lionel postwar O27 layout, I like the look of the manual 1022 switches better than the remote control 1122 switches. Also, the 1022 manual switch is great for use on industrial sidings because it automatically routes power to the siding. In places where I can easily reach the switches, I also enjoy working them by hand. But in difficult to reach areas on the layout, I use an easy to construct add-on remote control that does not harm the original switch in any way.

The few simple parts can be obtained from Radio Shack. They include a 9–18 volt hobby motor (#273-256), normally open momentary push button (#275-1547), 1N5399 3-amp, 50-volt diodes (#276-1114), and a plastic project box (#270-1801).

Start by bending the 1/32" steel wire to the shape shown in Photo 1.

Attach one end of the shaped wire to the motor shaft by wrapping with soft copper wire and soldering the connection (Photo 2). Cut a piece of thin sheet metal or thin plastic to 1"x 4". Attach the motor to the end of the metal or plastic piece; I used hot glue.

Attach the remaining section of the strip to the bottom plate of the switch using double-sided tape (Photo 3). With double-sided tape, the mechanism can easily be removed later if desired. In positioning the motor with its attached arm and before sticking it firmly in place, be sure to align everything so the motor shaft is directly opposite the switch arm pivot (Photo 4).

Assemble the two push button switches and diodes in a small plastic project box and run wires to the AC accessory terminals of your transformer and to the switch motor using 20-gauge wire. Refer to the diagram.

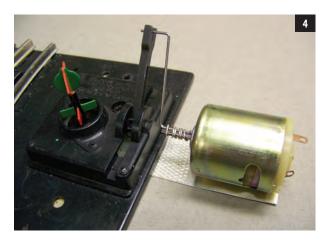
The completed mechanism is in Photo 5. I also wrapped the motor assembly with black electrical tape. This covers the brush openings, helps disguise the



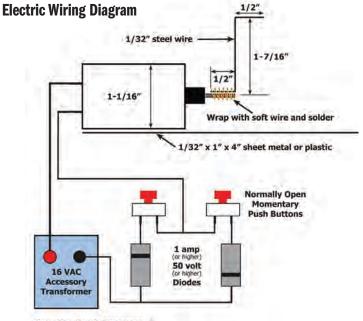








mechanism, and adds strength to the glued joint. The completed mechanism can easily be disguised with scenic materials such as shrubs (Photo 6). You can also use a variety of structures or other objects that might typically be found trackside.
