A New Year is traditionally the time to take stock of the previous 12 months and look forward with optimism to the coming year. A few highlights aside, I think most would regard 2016 as one to forget for the UK model railway business. As Steve Cooke admitted in last month's BRM interview, Hornby came closer than anyone would like to going bust. We must hope that the company's latest recovery plan delivers its promise of stability, and clears that massive stockpile of unsold models without compromising relationships with the retail trade and end consumers. There's little doubt that the product

Over at Barwell, it was not a vintage year for Bachmann either. Despite investment in the R&D department to clear its backlog, new releases were conspicuously few. The only new self-propelled OO items were the Wickham Trolley and magazine-commissioned 'USA' tank, plus new chassis for the 'V3' and Ivatt 2MT 2-6-2T - a disappointing return from this usually prolific company. Graham Farish N scale releases were equally sparse, but fortunately

is good enough, and the announcements we've had so far for 2017 look like

'bankers' in terms of sales.

the outlook is much rosier for 2017.

Elsewhere, the release of Rapido's APT-E (May 2016 BRM) was a high point, as was the quality of the same company's N scale TEA bogie tanks for Revolution Trains. The same could not be said for all new models entering the market; snappy taglines promising to set new standards could not mask the fact that some models failed to live up the expectations set during development.

Equally, a worrying number of new models suffer from inconsistently executed or poorly researched decoration - an aspect that comes into ever-sharper focus as prices, and expectations, rise. The best products are outstanding and deliver good value for money, but when sales are hard to come by there's no room for "that'll do". As an optimist I genuinely believe that 2017 will be a better year - as long as promises are delivered. There are dozens of exciting new models to come, supported by numerous useful accessories and gadgets to make building a more realistic, absorbing layout easier.

While we're talking about new horizons, I'm sad to report that this will be my last issue as Editor of BRM. It's been a privilege to act as custodian of the magazine for the last three years and I'm extremely proud of what we've achieved in that period. The magazine had its best-ever year in 2016, and I know it will continue to thrive in 2017 under new management. I'll close by expressing my thanks to the team at Warners, Steve, Howard, Andy and Phil, all our advertisers, contributors and, you, the readers for all your support and encouragement. Have a happy and productive New Year!

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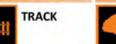

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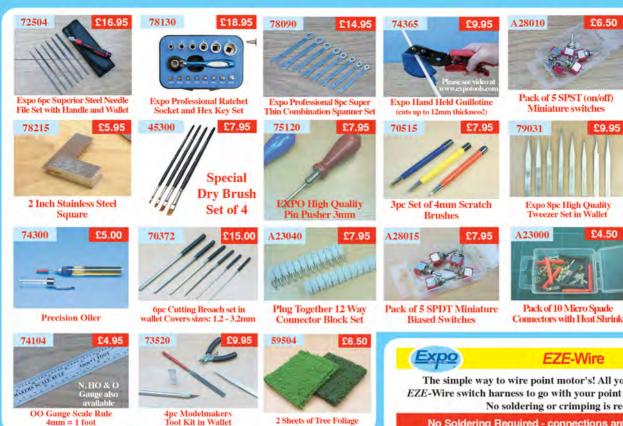

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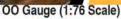

This new layout by George Woodcock, John Norton and Richard Coleman takes us back to the Fens of East Anglia at the end of the 1960s.

t is an April morning in the Fenland that straddles Cambridgeshire and Norfolk. It's 1967 and in the distance a train horn can be heard from the direction of Wisbech, heading towards the small station of Fenchurch St Peter. This isolated site seems only to serve a few scattered houses and farms along an arrow straight road. The signalman comes down from his 'box and closes the manually operated level crossing gates. He returns to his post and operates the lever to raise the Home signal for the station. Within a couple of minutes a green 'Derby Lightweight' DMU rumbles into the Down platform and draws to a halt.

The signalman lowers the signal arm behind the train as a solitary passenger climbs on board. Another distant horn is heard from the opposite direction and the signal arm in the distance is seen to rise as the sound of a diesel locomotive starts to get louder. A Brush Type 2 (Class 31), with a train of 12 ton vans from King's Lynn, hoves into view as it accelerates up the slope from the bridge over Middle Drain and crosses from the single track branch onto the Up passing loop.

The signal at the end of the Up platform now rises as the driver leans out and changes the tokens on the apparatus opposite the signalbox, then, with a short blast of the horn, rumbles over the level crossing, through the platforms, and back onto the single track section leading to Wisbech and Whitemoor Yard in March.

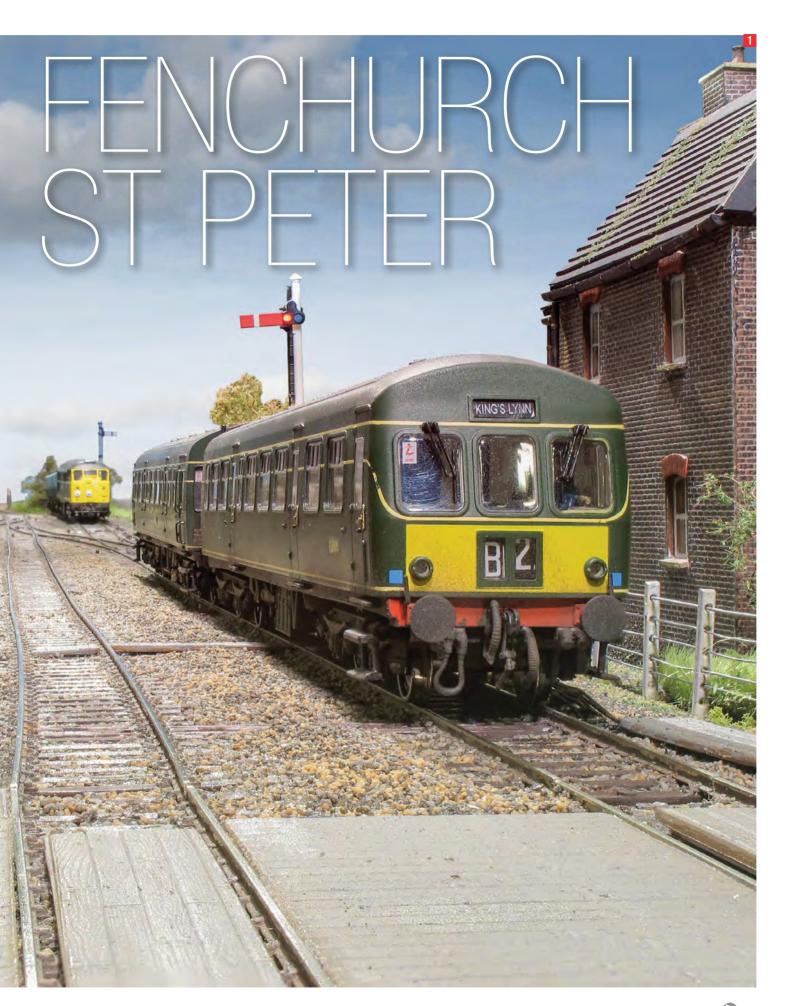
The signalman then raises the starter and Home signals for the DMU before going down to the platform to give the token to the driver of the DMU, which swiftly gathers pace as it leaves past the huge silos of the Eastern Counties grain store and heads for Magdalen Road, where the branch joins the main line to King's Lynn. This is a fairly accurate description of activity on the Wisbech branch in 1967 but sadly it did not take place at Fenchurch St Peter which is, as some of you already know, a fictitious location. Our model is based on Middle Drove, which was one of three stations on this remote Fenland branch, parts of which still exist 50 years after closure.

We changed the name as we have taken a few liberties with the original site plan. To give the layout more interest, both for operators and viewers, we added the large grain stores belonging to Eastern Counties Farmers. They are based on two other locations in East Anglia, at Kennett and North Elmham. Both were railconnected but sadly are not today.

The name 'Fenchurch St Peter' comes from the wonderful book The Nine Tailors by Dorothy L. Sayers, which is also set in the Fens. The other alteration in the landscape is that we have moved Middle Drain about

two miles closer to the station. The station building, now a private house, the Down platform with its waiting shelter and parcels shed survive today along with the adjacent pub, 'The Highland Laddie', which is also now in private ownership.

Inspiration for the layout came from a DVD made by TVP called Branches Across East Anglia which has a section featuring a journey from March to Magdalen Road in 1968 just prior to closure. Also of great help was the book Branches Around Wisbech by Andrew Ingram who also kindly let me have more photographs taken on the line as well as providing the information that the

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station still existed. This led me to make a site visit to Middle Drove where I met the wonderful John Watson - the current occupier - who kindly let me photograph and measure the various structures.

FENLAND SCENICS

The baseboards were built by Richard, John and myself at John's house and then brought to my house where the track was laid and the electrics installed. The layout operates using Digital Command Control (DCC) but the signals and points are operated using conventional DC controls from a panel at the rear of the layout.

Low wattage LEDs give a warm, spring-like glow to the landscape which is set in late-April.

The church on the nameboard is Tilney St Lawrence - the nearest village to Middle Drove. The clouds and backscene were painted by my younger son's girlfriend Petra. Thanks to the Cloud Lady!

The Fenland landscape is mainly flat arable land with the dark, peaty and fertile soil providing the dominant colour. Nowadays the area has many more trees than it did back in the 1960s so there are only a few trees and clumps of bushes, mainly around the station and few patches of uncultivated land. The fields were made from scenic materials from various sources while the dark soil colour is diluted Dark Earth textured paint from Green Scene which also supplied our ballast.

John built most of the station buildings as well as the

pub. The grainstores feature an older building based on North Elmham and a newer building based on those at Kennett - both are scratchbuilt. The silos are from Walthers but with scratchbuilt walkways and loading augers.

The signalbox is a Wills kit based on one at Wisbech East and so it is completely in keeping with the area; it just needed the steps turning through 90 degrees and a brick chimney adding to one corner. The small LNER permanent way hut is a card kit by Scale Model Scenery which sits in almost the exact location as the one at

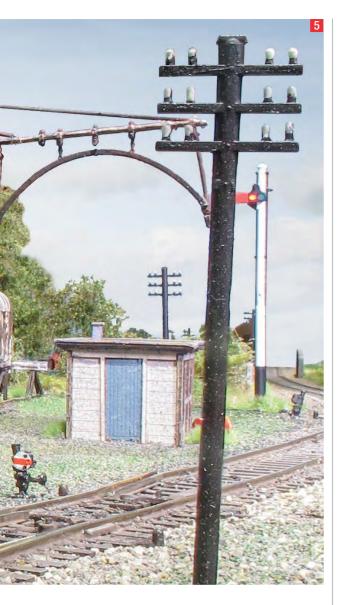
Middle Drove. Our bufferstops are a mix of BR and Midland types from the superb Lanarkshire Models range.

The bridge over Middle Drain uses a mix of Peco girder sides and Plastruct girders with the abutments coming from the Wills range of building sheets. The water is Deluxe Materials 'Solid Water with ripples created from 'Making Waves' by the same supplier. The various types of foliage, rough grassland and field borders come from a variety of sources including Silflor, Noch and Hedgerow Scenics. The concrete fence posts are Ratio and the wire is made from Florist's or Rose

Wire. I'm sorry for this long-ish list but they are all answers to questions we have been asked during the layout's first few exhibition outings.

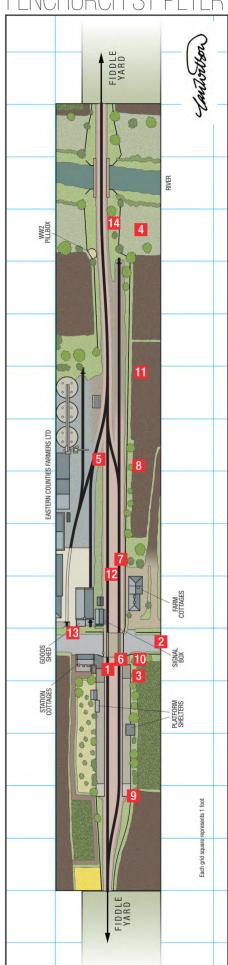
DIESEL TRACTION

Though this was a relatively quiet rural line it featured a number of different types of DMUs and locomotives in its last years. Passenger services feature Class 101, Class 105 and early 'Derby Lightweight' units. The latter sometimes run with one car in green and the other in BR Blue just as happened on the real railway. Repainting these units seems an odd thing to have done as they were all withdrawn only a year after the closure of the line.

There were also occasional locomotive-hauled services formed of a Mk1 Second Corridor (SK) and

Brake Second (BSK) and hauled by A Brush Type 2. On the TVP DVD, as the unit leaves March station, two coaches of this type can be seen in an siding which led me to think that if a DMU failed, a locomotive could be brought from the nearby March MPD to haul a substitute working.

There was also a parcels working from King's Lynn to Peterborough routed this way formed of yet another Brush Type 2 and an eclectic mix of parcels stock. We run an empty train in the opposite direction as this must have happened sometimes too. Freight traffic on the line seemed to consist mainly of agricultural traffic conveyed in 12t vans from King's Lynn to Whitemoor for onward distribution across the country. Sometimes

there are the odd coal, open and bogie bolster wagons included because this was still the era of the mixed freight train.

Since we built the layout TMC has produced a model of the blue 'Covhop' sugar hoppers so we have invested in a pack of four. In real life they usually ran from British Sugar's plant at Cantley to a bagging plant in York but in our world they are running from the sugar mill at King's Lynn. Who knows, it might have happened! The large grain stores at Fenchurch St Peter generate a considerable amount of traffic, including wheat to Birkenhead and Avonmouth and barley to various locations in England and Scotland for the brewing and whisky industries. This is conveyed in unfitted BR grain hoppers and the later privatelyowned and vacuum braked BRT hoppers often known as 'Blues' due to their livery. There is also incoming fertiliser and animal feed traffic for distribution in the local area by Eastern Counties Farmers. This organisation makes use of the goods shed since

its closure by BR in 1966, at which time the station became unstaffed like so many others across the region.

One other infrequent traffic flow is the occasional tankload of diesel fuel to power the driers in the grain store. The motive power for these trains is usually Brush Type 2s in various BR green and blue liveries, Sulzer Type 2s (Class 24s) transferred to March from Ipswich in 1967 and English Electric Type 3s (Class 37s) also from March. I can find no photographic evidence that the latter locomotives ran on the Wisbech branch but I can also find no reason why they wouldn't. Our locomotive sometimes runs with a brake tender kindly loaned to us by our good friend Dave

That then is the story of our long-vanished rural outpost of 'Fenchurch St Peter' which is now just another footnote in the history of East Anglia. We hope you have enjoyed the visit and we hope that you get chance to see the layout somewhere in the next few years.



THE MAKERS RAILTEC TRANSFERS

Part of a new generation of specialist suppliers, Railtec uses technology to provide high-quality transfers to modellers. Ben Jones went to find out more.

say 'people buy people'. Luckily in my professional and personal life I've lived in different continents and cultures, and that teaches you something. In conjunction with that, my philosophy is this: if we put man on the moon nearly 50 years ago then most things today should be possible.

"Packs of generic markings, for example, are all well and good but that isn't how the railway looks. On wagon packs, even maintenance panels are all different. Yes, they take longer to design but it's worth it. I'm not satisfied with a product that's 95% right, and the challenge is often that final 5% which can delay things getting to market - and most people may not even notice the difference anyway - but the end result is worth it. You've got to have that passion and a spark that fuels you to consistently work those 15-hour days."

Does Railtec specialise in any specific areas of the hobby?

"It began with post-steam as that's my main interest, but now incorporates some pre-Grouping and everything in between, and not just British outline either. My dad used to take us to Guide Bridge, Reddish and Newton Heath in the 1980s. It cemented a love of railways and modelling them, though it's only since starting Railtec and you come to either scrutinise

photographs from yesteryear or physically take a tape measure to a beat up 'Salmon' wagon in the middle of nowhere in the horizontal snow that you realise how little was and is actually 'standard', even on the same vehicle in some cases. This attention to detail has to therefore spill over into what gets produced."

Will Steve take on any request from modellers, or is there a limit to what he can supply?

Chuckling, Steve says: "My default answer to specific requests is 'yes' and then I have to figure out how to do it. Earlier in the year I created some 7mm scale numbers for a Scottish Class 37/4 and was approached by DRS to see if I could produce them at full size for 37403 *Isle of* Mull. I delivered them personally to RVEL in Derby and it gives me a real buzz to see it running around with my numbers on the side.

"No two days are alike; I get asked to produce transfers for aviation modellers, trams, buses, ships, dioramas, slot cars, classic car restorations, bike frames and even harpsichords. I get to work with a real variety of people too, including helping Bachmann with their catalogues, Pete Waterman, Dapol and Peco to name a few. Endorsements from reputable companies are a great selling point."

Despite Steve's prodigious output, as I look around his home I don't see any sign of the sort of industrial equipment you might expect to see in such circumstances. How does he produce all those transfers?

"I've got a laptop, an industrial printer, a ton of patience, endless passion and creativity, and a very understanding other half! The one thing I never have enough of is time.

"Railtec could never work as a 'nine to five' operation. I still try to be open to one-off, unusual requests - that's how I got started and built up that reputation. It's too easy to say 'I can't help you', but these are usually projects which have personal meaning to people, and it's nice to help people realise their own creations. As I get around 150 requests per week however (and increasing), it can lead to longer waiting times so I have to say "as and when" as it becomes just physically impossible to get to every job in the timeframes some people want.

"If it's a stock item then it usually goes out same day, but bespoke requests can take months of research and testing to go from concept to finished product, which many people probably don't realise. Some of it can be done quickly if there's plenty of source material, but vastly detailed items such as crests can take an age to design. It's nice to 'wow' people when they're done though. "Probably 90% of what's on the website came from specific requests: once I've designed it for one person, it's usually available for general sale."

How many requests a year does he receive?

"Requests for custom work or new packs? I couldn't say - way too many to count. I know I'm currently running at around 400 new products per year. I don't think anybody else in the industry puts out as much new stuff as I do, and the philosophy is all centred on addressing customers' needs rather than releasing what I might like to release.

INTERVIEW I RAILTEC TRANSFERS

"Large generic packs are OK, but I hear so many people gripe about having to buy several different packs of different to complete a single locomotive - that's why I have packs which give everything needed for specific locomotives and vehicles on one sheet, even including the 3-D shed codes and nameplates.

As we're talking, Steve pulls out folders of transfer sheets, giving a graphic demonstration of the depth and breadth of what he's been asked to produce. Significantly, some of the latest sheets move beyond decals to include three-dimensional items such as worksplates and nameplates. How does he see his business developing in this direction?

"There's lots of opportunity here; there's potential for smokebox plates, wagon plates, builders' plates, window frames, signalbox names, beading and virtually anything that needs relief. Pete Waterman has already praised the cast steam numberplates which are now on his 7mm models, customisable packs for which will be available imminently [containing shedcode, smokebox plate, worksplate where applicable, caution plate, cab number/plate and RA, BR emblem - all with a number and detail of the customer's choice on the one pack].

"I met Pete a few years ago at the Nottingham show. He said 'I wish I'd met you five years ago!' We have a solid relationship and work closely together with research for new packs and his help is invaluable. He'll either know the answer or knows someone that will. He uses Railtec transfers extensively on his 'Leamington Spa' layout and it makes me proud whenever I go round to see my transfers in action in such an exquisite setting.

"When I first started I felt limited by the technology, but not now. The 3-D printed plates are a logical progression and are gaining popularity as people see them in action. It helps Railtec become more of a onestop shop. At first I had to explain the new concept, but people soon started chipping in all sorts of ideas. Creating and innovating is what gets me out of bed every day. The technology was a colossal expense but it's already paying off and there are some future innovations up the Railtec sleeve which will add new capability to the ecosystem and which are not even public yet! It's certainly an exciting time."

Does Steve foresee any limitations to this kind of technology in the modelling world, or is there even more to come? BELOW: An important recent development is the ability to print 3-D transfers, raising the possibility of transfer sheets combining conventional transfers and 3-D items such as name and numberplates, beading rivets and cast numerals for smokebox door plates.





"I'm extremely technically-minded and driven; you have to be to push those boundaries. The next step will be to continue to expand the catalogue aggressively, design more 3-D items (possibly light clusters for DRS 37s), and work on the next new concept. There's no real limitation to what can be done now in terms of graphics, liveries and embellishments.

"If harnessed correctly, technology allows us to make life easier for the modeller. It has to advance the hobby otherwise there's little point. A good example would be the intricate designs on the Europhoenix Class 37/7s. I didn't know what the result would be like but they provided artwork for some models they required, and the technology did not disappoint. Likewise, I provided cabside logos, numbers and 3-D shedplates for the naming of Colas 37099 *Merl Evans* - both conventional transfer and 3-D shedcodes applied as a single transfer, or the nameplates where the commemorative plaque is included on the same transfer as the main plate. It saves people time and hassle, and the end result looks cleaner."

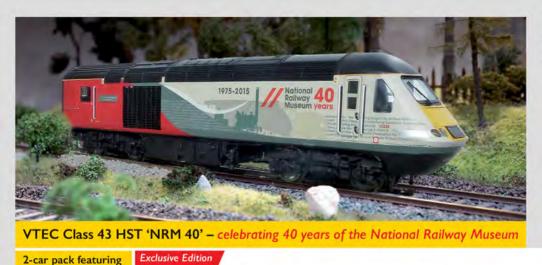
With his grasp of how the contemporary hobby is changing, how does Steve think model railways will develop over the next few years?

"I think there will be a growth in the number of those who undertake respraying as costs of RTR models rise. The majority of resprayers use Railtec and almost every one of them has been overloaded for some time. Many people share their work via social media and this is clearly encouraging others to have a go, to get back to actual modelling.

"I usually get a rush of orders when a new livery or repainted locomotive appears, and I can see that trend continuing as people want to sell them online at a premium while there's a novelty value.

"I'm also seeing an increase in demand for 7mm scale products although that's quite a different beast to 2mm and 4mm. It's a slower market with historically older demographic but even that's changing. Of course it helps that Pete Waterman's Just Like The Real Thing recommends Railtec in its kit instructions. The new Dapol '08' has also led to a rush of people opting for the customisable Class 08 pack with bespoke number and depot code, and that doesn't look like subsiding any time soon."

As we wrap it up, Steve concludes: "People want their railway to look like the real thing and the technology has never been in a better position to deliver it. It takes huge amounts of time and it can sometimes be a challenge but people appreciate that they're getting quality and authenticity, and that's worth the extra effort."

For **BRM**'s new project layout, Phil Parker turns to modern modelling products to restore the station building on 'Stamford East'.

econd hand model buildings are a nightmare for those looking after a stall at a club exhibition. Bulky and fragile, they usually have to be priced to sell at far less than the cost of materials to avoid them being taken away at the end of the show, incurring more damage.

For the layout owner, this makes them ideal as they're cheap. Some, such as this magnificent model of Stamford East station, are works of art that deserve a second life on a new lavout.

In the process of renovating the model, one of the biggest problems I'm facing is that over time glue

becomes brittle. Each time the station building is moved, an aged plastic joint seems to give way. Careful handling is a must, unless demolition is the aim.

This model building was constructed in the 1970s, but it can be easily improved using modern materials to upgrade some of the finishes. never has modelling been easier with so many different products on the market and I'll show you how simple this can be.

A great example is the shed roof which was covered in flat printed plastic slates. This was quicker than adding rows of plastic slates as used on the station building but doesn't

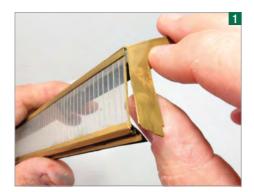
look as good. Using Redutex 3D moulded sheets takes just a matter of seconds and makes a noticeable improvement in appearance.

The period modelled, 1973, is much later than that which this building was intended for. I've replaced the wooden platform surface with paving slabs. A new printed station name on the canopy and suitable posters provide an indication of the period.

I used posters from Scalescenes and several include pictures of HSTs, which weren't launched until 1976. Not all signage was changed in 1969 when the new corporate look was introduced - a few stations obtained non-standard coloured signage. Market Harborough sported a new name board but maroon totem topped information boards in 1972, so a mixture is plausible.



The next time you look for model buildings, don't ignore the pile of pre-loved examples at the end of the club second hand stall.



After three decades, the biggest problem I'm facing is the old and brittle glue. I suspect most of the plastic was assembled with tube cement which doesn't last forever.



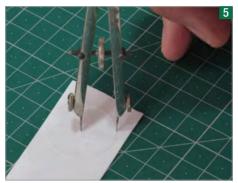
Where parts have been stressed, the plastic has hardened and snapped. A wash of solvent glue before pressing edges together solves the problem.



The embossed brick plastic sheet skins around the balsa wood cores of the walls have peeled. I'm pulling the layers apart and squirting in a solvent-free glue to fix.



Layers are clamped together whilst the glue dries. Spread the pressure with steel rules or strips of wood to avoid jaw dents in the wall surface.



The arches lack curved brickwork - called extrados around the top. With nothing available to suit, I start by cutting circles of thin plastic sheet with compasses.



Using a jig marked with 2mm spacings around the edge, verticals are scored with an Olfa cutter radiating from the centre. Circles are then split into arches.



Each arch is placed on the model and cut with a sharp knife. Once it fits, a wash of liquid solvent holds it in place, flush with the bricks.



A small clamp with the jaws rotated to act as a spreader supports the wall ends. Care like this saves time consuming repairs later.



The brick painting on the model might be OK if it was a building camouflaged during the war, but as far as I am aware, this didn't happen at Stamford East.

■ lask the expert

How was the detailed interior of Stamford East model station made visible through its small windows?

Given the lack of light shining inside the Abuilding, Stamford East is fitted with working lights inside the station building. At the time this was constructed, the only suitable bulbs were grain of wheat incandecents rather than the LEDs we use today. Their biggest flaw is that they eventually fail and need replacement - an impossible task when they're built into a model. To extend their life considerably, the trick is to run these 12V DC lights on 9v. The lower voltage keeps them cooler, producing a more realistic level of light.



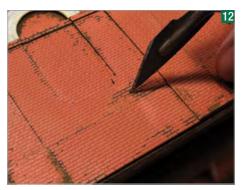


With all the arches fitted, the wall looks better. Scribing individual bricks would be better still but takes up too much time. An arch takes ten minutes to make and fit.

Expo tools paint stripper is safe for use on plastics and isn't drawn by capillary action. The old paint lifts after $10\,$ minutes exposure and a little scrubbing.



Not all paint is removed, but is loosened and can be extracted by running a sharp blade or fine screwdriver point along the



The brick arches are hollow on the prototype building, and filled with decorative cast iron grilles. Small holes are drilled through the walls to support.



After spraying the walls with mortar colour (Humbrol 121) they were coloured with red-brown pencil crayons rubbed over the surface of the bricks.



It's still worth using masking tape to protect other paintwork. A pencil eraser can be used to remove . mistakes.



I'm not sure a wooden platform surface would have survived into 1973, unless a reader knows otherwise, so a new paving slab version is scribed onto 5 thou plastic sheet.



Thin plastic can't be laminated with normal solvent as it'll buckle and warp. Limonene from Wizard Models is a much gentler solvent and won't damage the plastic.



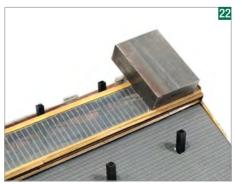
One of the vents from the smoke hoods was missing but a replacement is made from a U-shaped piece of plastic channel stuck to sheet, trimmed and sanded.



The smoke hoods are only detailed along the inner edges. An overlay from thin sheet is made for the outer sides.



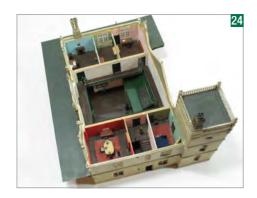
The trainshed side nearest the viewer has a roof made from black plastic sheet, to which self-adhesive Redutex slate sheet is glued.



With so few positive fixing points for in the roof, it relies on superglue to hold it together. Thick steel offcuts make excellent weights to hold things as the glue dries



Wire drainpipes are replaced with Ratio plastic moulded versions, along with the guttering from the same source.



A detailed interior came as a surprise by lifting the roof. A loose partition behind the main entrance was quickly fixed back in place - the only repair required.



On the prototype, the station building sits three foot higher than the shed. The baseboards will be level, so I've added 3mm thick foamboard foundations.



Alongside the shed should be a platform – for this, I'm using the classic ex-Airfix plastic kit now made by Dapol.



The kit shows its age with a raised edge to make painting a while line easier. This is sanded to make it flush with the surface of the paving slabs.



I can't find a photo showing the back edge of the platform, but I've modelled the slope in full and will cover some with ground cover later.



Signage is from the Scalescenes 1970s station signs and poster boards set. The clever software allows the modeller to edit the nameboard and print out as required.

red Shilton's EM gauge layout of Freshwater (IoW) station was entrusted by his family to the Stafford Railway Circle when he passed away recently. Our task was refurbish and complete it to exhibition standards.

The layout was designed as an approximation of the station area and to be a permanent fixture, mainly to display his collection of scratchbuilt locomotives, coaches and wagons. Extra baseboards and a new fiddleyard have been slowly constructed, re-wired and an additional scenic section has been created by SRC members. The layout is now portable and has started to attend exhibitions.

Freshwater station on the Isle of Wight opened in 1889. It was the largest station on the Freshwater Yarmouth & Newport Railway (FYNR) line with a single platform and a two-storey building at the end of a short approach road. As well as Freshwater, the station served surrounding areas of Alum Bay and Totland. Its main traffic was passengers and coal, with some goods and cattle.

It would seem that the Isle of Wight is on another planet, as research into the FYNR has proved difficult. Even now after talking to many people and accumulating books, maps and internet information we are still in conflict with just exactly what happened at Freshwater in 1925-35 - the time that Fred chose to model. His trackplan was based on various, somewhat conflicting, original plans and drawings. There was a single platform with a run-round loop and headshunt, two goods sidings and a cattle dock plus a coal unloading and storage shed.

Whilst this seems straightforward, we have found that between 1925 and 1928 the Southern Railway altered the station area. It removed locomotive and carriage sheds and a cross track, added and lifted sidings and points and moved the signalbox. The platform had up to four changes in length, but the dates at which they occurred are vague. Depending on the result of your research it could all have happened at once or over three, five or even seven years and in no particular

Early timetables show a service pattern of eight or nine trains a day of passenger, mixed and goods from opening right through the Southern years. We will run more than this in a running session!

CONFLICTING INFORMATION

We decided to keep approximately within Fred's chosen dates and retain the track as he laid it. Many said that work to amend the track layout may have started in 1924, with the changing of rail from flat-bottomed to bullhead type. We have maps from 1888, 1905 and showing the proposals in 1924 and some showing no change until 1927 plus photographs from 1892, 1906 and throughout the 1920s and 1930s. It seemed to have settled down after that and there were no further changes until the line closed on September 21 1953.

However, to save us lifting and relaying track and buildings we kept the signalbox and the formation in its original position. We changed the long building in the station yard from an unusual 'coal house' into a warehouse and turned it around to show a vehicle entrance door. An oil storage tank is now at the end of this building and much nearer to the road.

Some buildings at the junction of School Green Road,

Hooke Hill and Stroud Road near Bow Bridge have been added to give more character to the station area. They are scratchbuilt, based upon local architecture and although rotated by 90 degrees they are positioned mainly as buildings in the map for 1927.

The scenic section of the layout is 10ft 11in (3,330mm) and the fiddle 3ft 0in (914mm) long with the width varying between 2ft 6in (760mm) and 3ft 6in (1,066mm) wide at the station end. One major change we instigated is to have a road overbridge to the northeast of the station throat (right hand side) as we did not have sufficient room to do the road and level crossing some 800ft from the platform. This enabled us to cover the entrance to the fiddleyard - we don't like holes in the walls!

Fred built the layout to EM gauge with 'live frog' handbuilt points. We have modified the electrics and used the auxiliary switches of the H&M motors to indicate their position on the control panel and used

microswitches to alter the frog polarity. All the points are initiated via centre-off spring switches.

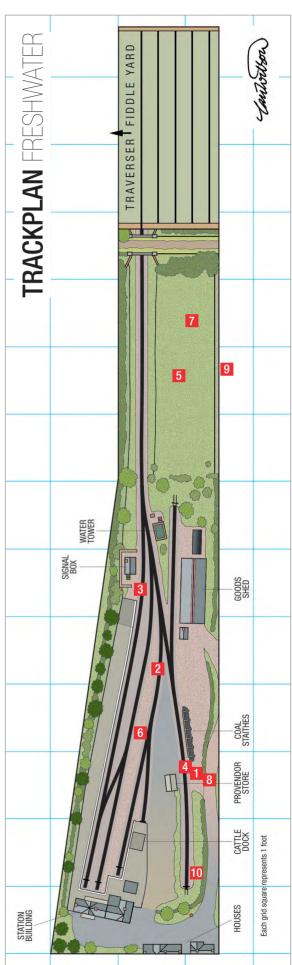
Analogue control is used throughout, with Gaugemaster model 'UD' panel-mounted twin controllers. There are six sections, all able to be driven by either controller. Dual-colour LEDs show which controller is driving which section.

Couplings are by Kadee with magnets fitted between the rails at strategic positions to allow for 'hands-free' shunting. Whilst they can take a considerable amount of fiddling to set up they seem to work well in practice.

Two Dapol operating signals are used, one as a Platform Starter and the other as Home by the station throat. Static ground signals have been fitted by the runround loop and the long siding. They are all of Southern Railway design.

The fiddleyard, hidden behind a backscene and front fascia is a sliding board with six tracks. Toggle bolts at the end of each track both secure their position and pass the electrical supply. The board around each track

II back story the Freshwater Yarmouth & Newport Railway

The first railway to be built on the Isle of Wight opened between Cowes and Newport in 1862. In 1868 there was a proposal to build a line from Newport to Freshwater at the western end of the island. This came to nothing but in 1880 the Freshwater, Yarmouth & Newport Railway Company was authorised by Act of Parliament to build a 12-mile single track line with three passing places from the Isle of Wight Central Railway at Newport to Freshwater.

Construction started at the western end in 1886 with the line reaching Yarmouth two years later. It opened to goods traffic on September 10 1888. There were some passenger excursions but the line didn't officially open to passenger traffic on 20th July 1889.

Intermediate stations were at Carisbrooke, Calbourne, Ningwood and Yarmouth and in July 1889 a private station was opened at Watchingwell for Sir John Simeon of Swainston. Eventually this became a public station and it appeared in public timetables from August 1923.

From the start the service was provided by the Isle of Wight Central Railway (IWC) which provided staff and rolling stock while the FYN was responsible for maintaining the line. This did not prove to be a satisfactory arrangement and after bankruptcy in 1896



formation has been roughly painted brown and grey so that viewers do not see unpainted wood through the bridge, which can be distracting. The fascia boards are set so that viewers can see the operation of the fiddleyard, as we know they like to view the stock.

The table opposite lists the main items of locomotive and rolling stock at the time the line is set, all built by Fred. They have come from many varied sources, particularly the 'Terriers' (A1X) and 'O2s' which were typically used by the Southern Railway and its predecessors on the island. Unfortunately, the Southern and the FYN had a habit of renumbering and renaming their locomotives to the extent that different locomotives carried the same number!

Equally the coaches appeared on the island at various times and came from the constituent companies of the Southern Railway - the LSWR, LBSCR and SE&CR. In addition, we have other vehicles of Great Central, Manchester South Junction & Altrincham (MS&JA), North London and Metropolitan Railway design.

Stafford Railway Circle members hope that we have done justice to Fred Shilton's scratchbuilding skills. We'd like to take this opportunity to offer our thanks to his family for their trust in allowing us to research details and refurbish of this unique piece of railway history and, most of all, play trains on the Isle of Wight. ■

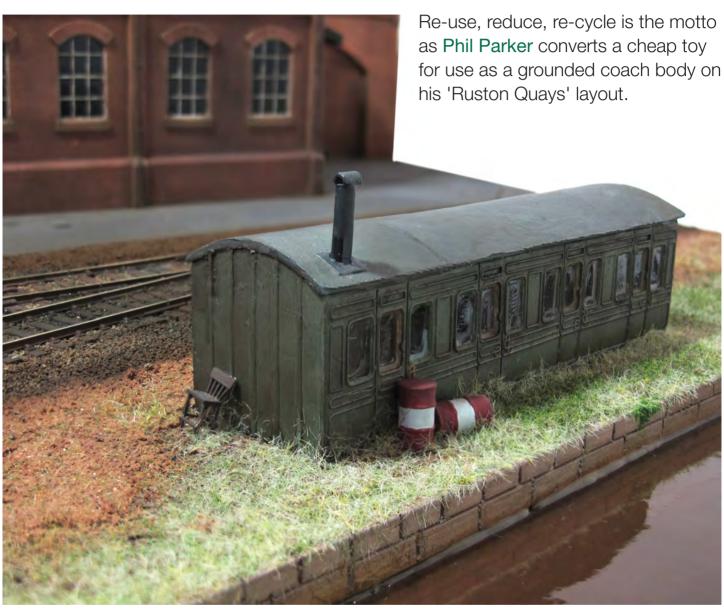
the partnership was eventually dissolved in 1913 when the FYN bought its own locomotives and rolling stock. The company also built its own station 200 yards west of the IWC station at Newport. Initially passengers had to walk between the two stations but by June 1914 trains were allowed to run between them.

The line was not financially successful with the company operating in bankruptcy until August 1923 when it was taken over by the Southern Railway as part of the Grouping of Britain's railway companies in to the 'Big Four'. Shortly after, the FYN station at Newport closed and all trains ran to the IWC station.

Improvements were made with some through trains running between Freshwater and Ventnor but following Nationalisation in 1948 the line's days were numbered. In 1952 it closure was proposed and, following a public inquiry, approved with the last train running on September 20 1953.

After closure the station bookstall was relocated to the town and is still in use. The signalbox, which was moved to Freshwater from Newport by the Southern around 1924/25, became a bus shelter and was relocated to Wootton on the IoW Steam Railway

essing around with secondhand models is a great chance to perfect modelling techniques without ruining anything of great value. This project produces an interesting scenic feature and if your workmanship isn't perfect, it won't matter.

Once coaches and vans reached the end of their working lives on the railway, many found new uses as buildings, especially in goods yards and sheds. Quite solid examples could still be found across the network into the late 1960s and

many survived long enough to be bought by preservation societies and restored to running order.

Hornby's four-wheel coach first arrived in 1976. Nearly 40 livery variations have appeared in the range so there's no shortage of them. Its bodysides owe their origins to the firm's bogie clerestory coach moulding and the chassis came from a brake van. This means the model is too short - prototype 4w coaches tend to have four compartments, not three.

The coach length can be corrected by 'cutting and shutting' two

models, hiding the joins along the edges of a door. It's possible to do this without sanding and filling.

For this project I'm not using a Hornby coach - the raw material came from a 'Thomas the Tank Engine' push-along range with red plastic wheels. I paid the princely sum of 50p per coach.

Grounded rolling stock is the perfect way to make use of old or battered models. While kits exist for grounded coach bodies, if you have an old wagon or coach lurking in a drawer, why not copy prototype practice and find it a new use?

A couple of push-along Hornby 'Clarabel' coaches. At first sight, these would be regarded as 'toys' and overlooked by most of us.



With the body easily removed, clips under the body that didn't break when removing the chassis are cut and removed with flush wire cutters.



Handrails and steps on the body end are removed with a chisel blade. Avoid scratching the rest of the surface. A little damage will look like wear and tear.



Both coaches are shortened by running a knife blade down the gaps beside the doors. Several careful passes are necessary to work through the plastic.



After cleaning up, the longer parts of each coach are glued together. Bracing with 0.5mm plastic sheet strips restores strength, but isn't essential.



Plastic sheet is used to add divisions between compartments. The inside of the body tapers towards the bottom so these aren't rectangular.



Cut the clear glazing from the roof with a fine saw. Sand the vents and rainstrips then fit both roof mouldings, staggering the joint with the sides.



A sheet of tissue paper placed on the roof and soaked with solvent looks like felt when dry. Work out as many creases as possible as you work. Cut to size when dry.



A chimney is made from the inner tube in a ballpoint pen. The roof canvas would be protected with cheap metal on the prototype, made from a square of plastic.



Spray the model with primer from a car aerosol. This provides a good base for paint but most importantly shows up imperfections on the body.



I assumed that the coach has been repainted from its original livery, so I've picked a suitably faded shade of green, weathered with a wash of Lifecolor sleeper grime.



Using a small screwdriver, blobs of Humbrol Clearfix are worked around the edges of each window until they fill the hole. Leave the coach on its side until dry.

MHAI (G()ES

In the second part of our look at railtour operations and how to model them, Pip Dunn focuses on the diesel and electric era and discovers some forgotten gems.

t's often said, "Railtours don't count"! I'm not sure why; maybe it's because they are perceived by some as simply being stage-managed. The adverts tell you you'll be having such and such type of locomotive over this route or that. So there's no challenge, is there? Well, that's not entirely the truth.

Railtours offer us the chance to do something different. They allow people to travel over lines that normally have no passenger traffic, enable freight locomotives to haul passenger trains which otherwise would be highly unlikely and they can take 'foreign' locomotives to new pastures.

DIESEL ORIGINS

The earliest locomotive-hauled diesel tour I can find in the UK was September 7 1958 - a Leeds to Farnborough trip via Basingstoke hauled by English Electric Type 4 (Class 40) D201. In reality, this was probably a day charter train and the traction was irrelevant - albeit very good, and over a rare route for a '40' - especially as it ran via the GCR's 'London Extension' (see BRM October 2016).

There could have been other uses of diesels on charters prior to this, of course. One diesel-hauled special worthy of mention was on July 9 1955 when Drewry 0-6-0DM No. 11101 hauled three brake vans on a tour of the Wisbech & Upwell Tramway!

In the late-1950s and early-1960s, however, diesel power would generally have been frowned on by enthusiasts, unless the tours in question were run to visit rare or endangered lines. DMUs were popular for such tours from their introduction in the mid-1950s.

After the end of BR steam in August 1968, the number of railtours briefly declined and the reasons for their operation changed. Many trains were promoted to traverse unusual, threatened or freight-only lines. The traction hauling them was neither here nor there to most on board. Widespread interest in diesels did not start until the early-1970s when enthusiasts finally came to terms with the loss of steam, and felt they had to rekindle their hobby with the traction they had hitherto despised.

NEW DAWN

On September 22 1973, BR ran a 'Hymek Swansong' tour, which took two of the few remaining Class 35s, 7001/28, on a circuitous trip from Paddington to Hereford via Severn Tunnel Junction, returning via Evesham, with ten Mk 1 coaches in tow. The tour was somewhat premature as the last handful of 'Hymeks' lingered for best part of another 18 months, although passenger use after this train was exceptionally rare, and usually unplanned and unexpected. It was one of the first examples of

diesel-hauled charter with requested traction.

On May 5 1973, the last 'Blue Pullman' set was used for a special charter, with power cars 60090/094 working from Paddington to Bristol via Coventry and Birmingham before heading to Swansea and then a direct run back to Paddington. Again this was a tour for which the traction - modern traction at that - was, it could be argued, a selling point. But so many other diesel types never had a farewell tour - the Class 22s, 29s, 42s and 53 all faded off the network with no

commemoration. Perhaps many were happy to see them go?

On October 19 1974, the 'Doncaster Rover' took a train over the Woodhead line behind 'EM1' 76048. The Manchester Piccadilly-Sheffield Victoria route had lost its passenger service east of Hadfield in January 1970, but those who wanted a run over the line usually had to keep their eyes open for diverted Hope Valley trains, or occasional football special to Wadsley Bridge from the Manchester direction.

Class 76 haulage, however, while not technically impossible, was very unlikely and as far as is known, the only time Class 76s hauled passenger trains after January 5 1970 was on railtours. That train, also featured a pair of Class 20s - also rare for passenger work (although the summer of 1974 had been the first season they made multiple visits to Skegness) and 20043/084 worked from Penistone to Doncaster, via Wath, and back to Tinsley Yard. This train had much appeal on all counts - great for spotters, passing depots and visiting Doncaster Works, haulage - the 20s, 40113 and the '76', and also rare track - passenger trains through Wath were exceptionally rare.

By 1975, the writing was on the wall for the Class 52 'Western' diesel-hydraulics; several tours ran that year and through to the final days of the class in February 1977. Many of the trains took 'Wizzos' over their classic lines, or routes close to their traditional operating sphere.

One notable train was on March 29 1975 when 1036 Western Emperor worked from Plymouth to Westbury, giving way to 1052 Western Viceroy for the leg to Derby via Toddington. The line from Cheltenham to Stratford was already doomed - it closed shortly afterwards after a derailment near Toddington in 1976 - but it was a rare chance to enjoy a 'Thousand' to Derby (although a handful had got there in the summer of 1971 on a booked Saturdays-only train).

WESTERN WANDERERS

Other 'Western' tours were more unusual. Most were worked by either 1013 Western Ranger or 1023 Western Fusilier, but other locomotives did appear. On October 20 1976, 1009 Western Invader joined 1023 for the 'Westerns South Western' trip from Paddington to Meldon while other notable trains took 1023 from King's Cross to York (November 20 1976), or 1023 from Plymouth to York on February 12 1977. The next day 1010 Western Campaigner visited Treherbert and

Merthyr Tydfil in the Welsh Valleys. The curtain came down on Class 52 operation on February 26 1977 when 1013/23 worked from Paddington to Swansea, on to Plymouth and back to Paddington. By then, however, railtours were seeing a revitalisation that had seemed wholly unexpected in 1968.

After the end of the 'Westerns', and inspired by a whole new breed of modern traction enthusiasts, railtours took off again. The usual mix of rare routes and haulage by unusual traction, mixed in with passing depots crammed full of locomotives, was a potent cocktail for success. New promoters were founded - or expanded, and a vibrant railway enthusiast scene meant that there were rich pickings to be had - even if almost everything was painted BR blue.

Stock was also plentiful, and rakes of Mk 1 coaches, usually vacuum-braked and reliant on steam heating, were spare at weekends. BR was keen to accommodate enthusiast railtours and make greater use of these vehicles.

After the '52s' had gone, attention started to turn to other classes facing extinction and locomotives that had been hitherto restricted to freight. There were last trips for Class 44s, and to a lesser extent Class 24s and 84s. The Woodhead line, with its captive Class 76s, many of which had rarely hauled a passenger train, were a big draw - not to mention the route itself, which was scenic, freight-only and under threat of closure. Promoters were desperate to traverse it.

Freight locomotives such as Class 20s, 37s and 40s, especially those allocated to depots which had little or no passenger work, were also requested.

On August 13 1978, F&W Railtours ran one of the more unusual trains, the 'Tintern Totter'. This was just three Mk 1s, and the majority of the day was in the hands of a Tinsley Class 20, 20098, which worked from Severn Tunnel Junction to the freight-only branch at Tintern in the Forest of Dean, and then back to Worcester, via Birmingham which meant the little Type 1 tackled the Lickey incline. The Tintern branch was

cut back to Tidenham in December 1981 and closed completely in 1992.

In the 1970s, a series of tours visiting unusual and threatened lines in the south of England was run using Class 33/1 and '4-TC' combinations. These push-pull sets were ideal for itineraries featuring short freight branches, rare curves and lots of reversals.

DELTA | ADIFS

In 1978 the first two 'Deltics' were retired from traffic. and as HSTs started to take over some of their front-line duties, Class 55s which previously could not be spared for enthusiast specials were made available. That year, 55015 Tulyar worked to Skegness (on August 13) and to Great Yarmouth (September 3) while 55007 Pinza worked a Sheffield to Carnforth trip on July 10 1978 and 55003 Meld was used on a Chesterfield to Carlisle special via Settle on July 23 1978. 55007 worked the 'Man o' Kent' trip to March 26 1978 and 55003 also made it to Paignton (March 5 1978), 55018 Ballymoss to









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Cardiff (January 29 1978) and 55022 Royal Scots Grey to Tinsley on April 21 1979.

That was nothing to what occurred in 1981. The final day of the Class 55s had been set for January 2 1982, and in the six months prior, 'Deltics' visited all manner of places on charters including 55022 to Paddington, via Birmingham, 55016 Gordon Highlander to Exeter, 55002 The King's Own Yorkshire Light Infantry to Whitby and 55021 Argyll & Sutherland Highlander to Oban amongst others - not to mention the numerous other tours taking '55s' to places that they had regularly - or semi-regularly, visited in service.

Once again, the demise of popular class did not dampen the hunger for charter trains, and F&W, Hertfordshire Railtours and others continued to devise innovative and exciting itineraries.

PUSHING BOUNDARIES

On May 8 1982, F&W set off on a three-day traction and track tour to Scotland - a regular fixture of 1960s steam tours. F&W usually started from Plymouth, using Laira's rake of steam-heat Mk 1s which was retained for weekday relief trains. A lot of F&W's customer base was therefore in Devon, Somerset and the West Midlands, for whom trips to Scotland would have been a rare treat. The 'Skirl o' the Pipes' - the first of seven such trains - left Plymouth with two Class 37s and made its way overnight to Scotland before visiting

Inverness and Wick using local traction such as Class 26s, 27s and 37s.

Freight locomotives were also used, and a pair of '20s' was always diagrammed for the return leg at some stage. 'Skirl 1' used 20081/198 - although being two ex-Toton locomotives recently transferred north, they were not the hoped-for Eastfield, Haymarket or Motherwell locomotives. Later 'Skirls' had better choices such as 20100/101, 20110/154 and 20204/222.

The 'Skirls' were massive 16-coach trains and they were usually split into two portions in Scotland. The separate portions would either cover a scenic line, such as Kyle or Oban, and the other portion would visit freight lines such as Burghead or Methil. One year, in 1984, the train split at Mossend and one portion went to Mallaig and the other to Kyle, but participants swapped portions so each did a circular trip - using a ferry between Mallaig and Kyle, either clockwise or anti-clockwise!

On July 24 1977, 56008 worked the 'Melton Mowbray Pieman', and although advertised as being the first Class 56-hauled passenger train, by the time the train ran, that was no longer the case as 56004 had rescued the 1030 Penzance-Leeds from Sheffield on June 22. However, it was certainly the first Class 56-hauled railtour, and also meant BR had to source air-braked Mk 2 stock for the new breed of freight locomotives.

Thereafter '56s', and later '58s', were sought after

FIRSTS/LASTS

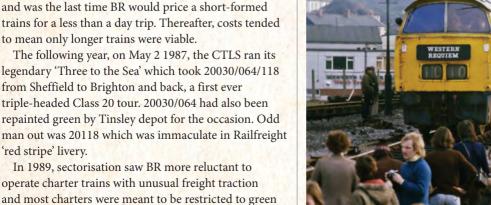
There has always been an attraction to railtours which use a locomotive type for the first time or, indeed, for the last time. Some classes had complete programmes of farewell tours, such as the Class 52s, 55s, 40s and then the 50s. Railtours provided the first passenger workings for Class 58, with 58002 working the '58 Pioneer' on September 18 1983, from Nuneaton to Matlock. Being passenger locomotives, there was no clamour for debut runs for the Class 90s or 91s, while the first passenger working for a Class 60 came when 60006 Great Gable rescued 47558 on 2M17, the 1047 Leeds-Carlisle when it failed at Horton in Ribblesdale and the '60' took the train to its destination. It was May 1991 before the type appeared on a charter train.

The Class 25s never got a farewell tour, the Class 27s did - just (May 9 1987, 27001/046 Glasgow Central to Inverness via Perth for 27055/063 back via Aberdeen) but the '40s' got a decent send off, mainly by virtue of BR keeping D200/40122 in traffic for three years after the rest of the fleet had been laid up. The end for D200 came on April 16 1988.

The Class 45s would have had a send off if 45106 had not caught fire and the Class 26 fleet was also set for a passenger train farewell in October 1993, only for the train to be cancelled at 48 hours notice after the promoter failed to pay BR. The five remaining Class 26s were duly condemned the following Monday. The Class 50s also got a programme of farewell trains with the curtain coming down on them on March 26 1994 with 50007/050 working Waterloo-Exeter St David's then on to Penzance and back to Paddington.

PRIVATE OPERATORS

The break up of the railways in 1994-97 opened new doors for charters, and nothing was more important





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than the end on the ban on preserved diesels. Despite expectations that 'Deltic' would be first, it was actually a Class 46, D172 *Ixion*, which broke the ban. Bankrolled by Pete Waterman, the '46' made its return on October 1 1994 and went on to work several charters in BR green livery. In 2003 it was repainted into BR blue, but by the end of the year its main line career was over for a second time.

In 1996 a 'Deltic' did return when D9000 *Royal Scots Grey* worked a charter on November 30. Sadly the locomotive failed at Berwick-upon-Tweed, where it caught fire, and it had to be repaired. It made a second return on January 2 1997 - 15 years to the day after the last BR Class 55 trip. It worked King's Cross to Hull, then to York and back to London - all classic 'Deltic' track. Over the years 55002/009/016/019 have all had spells back on the main line too.

On November 1 1997, 50031 *Hood* brought the sound of a Class 50 back to the main line and 50007/017/044/049/050 have all seen main line revivals, with 50008/026 possible candidates to follow suit. 'Peak' 45112 and D345 (40145) brought their respective classes back onto the national network, while preserved Class 20s, 33s, 37s, 86s and 87 have also made comebacks. Class 20s, 31s, 33s, 47s, 47s, 56s, 73s and 86s have also returned to main line use with spot hire companies and have all worked charters.

In recent times we have charters which would have been wholly unthinkable in BR days - such as 'Deltics' to Penzance and Mallaig, a 'Western' to Kyle of Lochalsh, Scarborough, Great Yarmouth and Liverpool, a '40' to Newquay and Fort William, '20s' to Lymington Pier - the list goes on and on...

The stock is also often different; for example, the sight of a maroon 'Western' hauling Virgin red Mk 2 'air-cons' to Canterbury might upset the purists but then, it can be argued that it's just another small chapter in the locomotive's history. Charter promoters face many challenges, and will continue to do so, but the fact remains, there is still the scope to take all sorts of locomotives to all sorts of destinations.

There have been 'first' trains for 66s, 67s, 68s and 70s, although in the case of the 67s, it was after a pair had rescued a failed Virgin train!

MODELLING CHARTERS

Over the years, railtour organisation has moved from being undertaken by private individuals or enthusiast groups to a smaller number of full-time businesses such as West Coast Railways, Vintage Trains, Pathfinder and Hertfordshire. However, there are still occasional examples of individuals putting in the enormous amount of time, planning and effort required to promote and operate such a train on the modern network. Tours fall into several categories, appealing to different interests from rare lines (track bashing) and unusual locomotives from the freight operating companies, to dining trains and tours hauled by preserved steam, diesel or electric locomotives.

Since the 1980s, there has been little or no spare rolling stock available for charter operations, so specialist companies have sprung up to cater for this market. Redundant rolling stock - usually ex-BR Mk 1s and Mk 2s - were formed into charter sets, initially by BR's InterCity Special Trains unit, and later by companies such as West Coast Railways, Riviera Trains and DB Schenker. Crews, traction and rolling stock are hired by promoters to work railtours.

Typically BR blue/grey Mk 1 stock was used in the 1970s and 1980s, and even into the 1990s. From the late-1980s, InterCity and Network SouthEast vehicles started to appear. The latter were used for many tours at the time as they were often spare at weekends. Bachmann and Graham Farish Mk 1s are ideal for railtour sets, formed into trains with minimal Second Class

accommodation for the 1970s/80s but with increasing First Class accommodation in recent years.

Mk 2 coaches were less common, as they were more intensively used but occasionally a rake of Mk 2 'air-cons' was used, especially if an air-braked only locomotive was diagrammed. Again, the liveries started to change in the second half of the 1980s.

Loads were typically long, between ten and 13 coaches, sometimes even more - 15 coaches were used for the last train to Torrington in 1982 and the aforementioned 'Skirl' tours usually loaded to 16 vehicles.

Shorter locomotive-hauled trains were not unknown. but rare mainly because the economics, and demand for tickets - favoured as many coaches as the infrastructure and locomotives could handle!

Other livery variations are worth a mention - Sealink red/blue Mk 1s (now available from Bachmann) appeared in 1984 and were occasionally used on charters. The Pilkington 'K' set of green/blue/red coaches appeared in 1988 while ScotRail green/cream and Provincial Services Mk 2a/b/c vehicles started to appear in the late-1980s. On October 29 1988, 50026 Indomitable and 50032 Courageous worked a circular tour that saw locomotives and Mk 2a/b/c stock all matching in NSE colours.

One of the more unusual trains combinations was on March 12 when D200/40122 in grey primer led ETHEL3 - in InterCity livery - and a mixed rake of InterCity and NSE coaches! Certainly the late-1980s and early-1990s were a good time to see mixed rakes, though many photographers did not enjoy them!

There are so many combinations and permutations of charter trains in the modern era, you could write a book on the subject. Now there's a thought... ■

BR in the immediate post-steam era is seldom modelled, especially in N, but Dave Forshaw's fascinating layout captures the variety that could still be seen in northern England at the start of the 1970s.

was born three days after the end of steam on BR, and in some ways I regret not being old enough to see it. Until this layout, I have always modelled the 1960s steam-diesel/electric transition period. Trainspotting as a kid in places like Preston and Crewe introduced me to the West Coast Main Line (WCML),

the powerful hum of electric locomotives and large diesel locomotives, as opposed to the rattling old Class 101 and 108 DMUs on my local line.

'Burshaw North Western' is a fictitious station on the WCML in North West England. The overhead wires are almost complete as part of the project to complete the WCML electrification from London to Scotland. It will be completed in the next couple of years, allowing electric working throughout. New four-aspect colour light signalling has recently been commissioned as part of the upgrade.

In Burshaw it is the early-1970s, steam has gone and is still banned from the main lines. The British Rail corporate blue-grey image is sweeping across the country, but its application is not yet complete. The Total Operations Processing System (TOPS) has yet to be implemented, so all locomotives still carry their original numbers. The 'D' and 'E' prefixes are disappearing as there are no longer any steam locomotive numbers for them to clash with.

Some machines are still in shabby BR green or electric blue, with varying amounts of yellow on the front ends. Whilst passenger coaches built by the 'Big Four' have all but disappeared, freight is carried by a mix of old

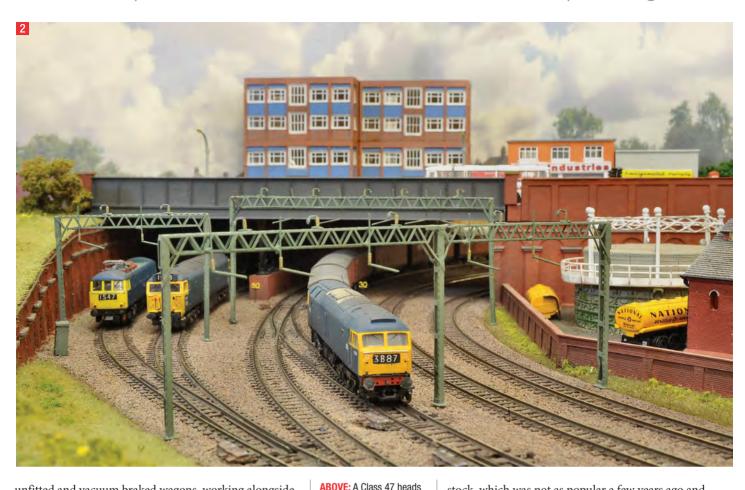
I still have my first N gauge locomotive, a Minitrix dock tank that I bought at the original Hatton's shop when I was 11, trading in some old 00 gauge train set bits. I've been an N gauge modeller ever since, and added O gauge modelling a few years ago. As an industrial pharmacist I have worked in different parts of the country, joining local clubs along the way, and building and exhibiting many club layouts. I'm currently with Liverpool Model Railway Society and the West Lancs O Gauge Group.

Given the massive improvement in rolling stock wheel standards in recent vears. I would like to see track catch up, FiNetrax Code 40 trackwork looks great, but it would be too time consuming to build for a large layout - Peco Ultrafine code 40 maybe?

unfitted and vacuum braked wagons, working alongside the new-fangled air braked vehicles.

BLUE PERIOD

About eight years ago, I was looking for an economical way of modelling a different period to my usual early-1960s steam-diesel transition. I thought, if I only move a few years forward I can still use some of the existing stock. By mixing it with pieces of BR blue corporate

stock, which was not as popular a few years ago and often going cheap, a new 1970s fleet could be created.

So what to model? I grew up in West Lancashire, so for me the real railway was the WCML at places like Preston and Crewe, and AC electrics. I already had some old bits of Lima Class 86s, Graham Farish produced an '87', which could easily be converted into an '86' as well, so I could 'bash' some of the locomotives. I remember the blue/grey period from childhood, but not the pre-TOPS

llask the expert

How did you achieve the right atmosphere for the period, with its evocative mix of steam age infrastructure and early BR diesels and electrics?

It's rare to find RTR BR blue locomotives in pre-TOPS Alivery, so almost all have been renumbered. I like to build stock that is not available RTR, so I use kits and modify stock, such as the prototype HST, 'Manchester Pullman', HS4000 Kestrel, unrefurbished Class 50s and 86s to fit the period.

For the period details, I used a mix of British Railways maroon and BR Corporate signage on buildings to show the transition happening here too. Period vehicles from Oxford and BT Models have been a welcome addition, along with advertising posters. These had me checking which years cars were launched and what films were showing at the cinema it's 'Carry on at your Convenience' by the way.

The industrial buildings to the left of the layout are all inspired by the Reggie Perrin series'; Sunshine Desserts, Amalgamated Aerosols and Grot, as a light-hearted 1970s period detail!





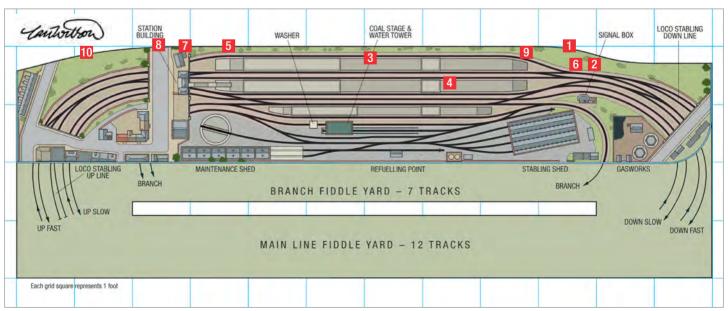
part. The fact that I had never seen this period modelled in N was also a challenge that needed to be addressed, and, with another rarely modelled feature - catenary, I hoped to create a pretty unusual and interesting layout!

At that time, I spent extended periods working away from home, and wanted a layout that would fit in a spare room, but still be capable of accommodating scale-length trains. Most of the 9mm ply baseboards (both frame and decking) were recycled from old projects, the station and Multiple units everywhere! A Class 310 EMU heads north from Platform 3, while a Cravens DMU sits in Platform 5 and a Metro-Cammell DMU is in Platform 6. The first two are built from old Farish shells with N-Train 3-D printed cabs and Electra Railway Graphics sides.

shed areas already had track and some wiring, which needed only minor changes. This resulted in a 12ft by 4ft layout, small enough to move in a large car.

Travelling on the WCML over the years I have seen effects of the 1960s modernisation in places such as Coventry, Stafford and Wigan North Western and I wanted to replicate this modernist style. 'Burshaw' is an amalgam of my home village, Burscough and my surname. It is the third of my layouts to use the Burshaw

name, with the 'North Western' being derived from the Wigan (London &) North Western station, which was one of those modernised, and provided some of the design cues for a typical 1960s brutalist rebuild.

WIRING QUANDARY

To wire, or not to wire, was the key question. Whilst I would not contemplate running overhead electrics without representing the catenary at all, the thorny decision of whether to model the contact wires had to be addressed. In the end I decided against it, mainly on the grounds of the difficulty of keeping the track clean without wrecking the wires.

When I looked at prototype photographs, the wires are practically invisible from normal exhibition viewing distances. All the catenary portals are produced from N Brass Locos etches (see October/November 2016 BRM), suitably modified to fit their locations. There are 30 portals, all folded and soldered together, with droppers and tensioners attached, plus Dapol masts.

More catenary portals were used as the basis of the signal gantries, using etched railings, also from N Brass, and bits of scrap brass to complete the structures.

The four-aspect signal heads are from CR Signals, including the working 'feather' junction indicators. They are linked to IRDOT IRDASC-4 modules, which use infra-red light to detect the train and set the signal to Danger as it passes, and then use timers to sequence through double yellow, yellow and green. Additional links to point motor switches force red on the reversible lines, and when the routes are set against a signal. Whilst not totally authentic or interlocked, it means that the signalling works automatically, and that's one less thing for operators to worry about - I prefer to run trains!

URBAN LANDSCAPE

The scenic part of the layout uses Peco finescale Code 55 track, ballasted with a mix of Woodland Scenics and Green Scene products. There isn't much greenery on the layout, but the few patches use a mix of flocks, static grass and sea moss trees.

The structural parts, such as retaining walls and bridges, are from the Hornby 'Lyddle End' and Knightwing or scratchbuilt from plastic and card. Buildings are 'Lyddle End' and Scenecraft items, kits from Peco, Metcalfe, Kestrel and Ratio or scratchbuilt. Many have been butchered to fit the scene; the former steam shed uses Peco sides with a scratchbuilt roof and the platform buildings are Kestrel kits with scratchbuilt canopies.

FLEET TRANSITION

Virtually every BR blue locomotive has been renumbered to remove its TOPS number and reinstate the original, often relocating the BR arrows, and returning the headcode boxes to use as well. The other major task has been 'unrefurbishing', as most models are tooled in their refurbished condition.

My main targets were nine D400s (Class 50s), as these were the primary traction for Anglo-Scottish trains north of Crewe until electrification was completed in 1974. The Graham Farish model portrays the locomotives in later life, so the plated-over roof sections were reinstated and high intensity headlamps removed prior to repainting and renumbering.

Dapol's 'AL6' (Class 86) was the other main target, and a great help in many respects as it is a much better model than a modified Farish Class 87. Again they are modified to original condition by removing the TDM and multiple working cables, headlights and reinstating the headcode





boxes. Bogie side frames were modified to remove the later Flexicoil suspension on most examples. All required a full repaint into electric blue or BR Rail blue, as sadly Dapol does not produce the earlier liveries. The original alloy numbers and totems are by Fox Transfers and BR arrows are BH Enterprises etches.

Bits of Lima Class 86s, Dapol '86s', Farish '87s' and plenty of Milliput have been used to create 'AL1' and 'AL5' electrics (Class 81 and 85), and other first generation electrics will follow.

A number of the diesel locomotives share chassis with their early-1960s green mates. I have a collected a number of spare bodies over the years from various kitbuilding projects requiring donor chassis. About a dozen of these resulting bodies have been painted, numbered and weathered to fit my new period, the chassis being 'borrowed' from plain green locomotives.

Many diesels remained in green at this time, with increasing amounts of yellow on the ends, well into the 1970s. Photographs from the same year show maroon enamel station signs still present in Wigan too!

MULTIPLE UNITS

So far, I have built Cravens Class 105 DMUs from old '101' bodies, Electra Graphics sides, N-Train ends, and a new Farish Class 108 chassis. My first 3-D printed kit, a Class 128 Diesel Parcels Unit, is propelled by a Dapol

Advertisements and signage help establish period atmosphere. How did you create yours for the early-1970s?

All the railway artwork was produced on my PC and printed on photo paper, or 'Crafty' transfer paper. Both the British Railways Gill Sans and corporate 'British Rail Light & Heavy' fonts can be downloaded from the internet for free. This technique was used to create the transfers used on the platform lamps, direction signs, station buildings, buses and many other items.

This was my first attempt at a photographic backscene; the quality is great - much better than the traditional watercolour style backscenes. Some of it is mounted a few millimetres in front of the main backscene to add a greater perspective and depth to the layout.

The only problem is that it is very easily damaged, and has been sprayed with acrylic matt varnish for protection, which also tones down the normally glossy images. Next time a tougher solution is needed, most likely using a matt finish laminate.

The period was also set using appropriate vehicles from Oxford & BT Models, all matt varnished so they blend in better. Sankey Scenics produces some lovely period posters that had me checking which year films were released and cars launched! This should make it easy to work out when and where the layout is set without a train in sight.

Class 121 railcar chassis. In an attempt to make this model more versatile, it's green on one side and blue on the other - a technique I'll use again on other models to make them fit two different periods.

Both WCML 25kV EMU classes of the period have been built; the 'AM4' (Class 304) unit uses cut-and-shut etched brass sides from a BH Enterprises 'Bubble Car' kit, with whitemetal ends bent to create the sloping front and filled to achieve the correct window layout. It is also powered by a Dapol '121' chassis, and is in Regional Railways livery on the reverse side. The later 'AM10' (Class 310) utilises Farish Mk 2 coach shells, with sides and ends from Electra, and a Class 150 'Sprinter' chassis for power. The pantograph & insulators came from a spare Class 87 body.

ROLLING STOCK

The London Midland Region (LMR) had just taken delivery of its first air-conditioned stock (Mark 2d) in 1972, but most of my trains are formed from Mk 1, Mk 2a and Mk 2c stock, gradually being cascaded as the new designs take over the primary trains, including 'The Royal Scot', which is usually in the hands of a pair of English Electric Type 4 Co-Cos (later Class 50).

'Burshaw NW' is designed to perform the diesel/ electric changeover that used to happen at Crewe, and later Preston. Just as I finished building Mk 2a and Mk 2c stock from Farish Mk 2f models using Electra sides with additional roof vents and corrected underframe detail, Farish announced Mk 2a coaches! One Mk 2 variant I guess they won't produce is the Pullman vehicles. My eight-coach 'Manchester Pullman' is more

old Farish bodies with Electra sides. One oddball is the 'Nightcap Bar' (ex- Mk1 Pullman Car 'Hadrian Bar'), which featured in WCML sleeper trains in the 1970s. Graham Farish's superb Mk 1 stock is also widely used.

BR's freight operation is also in transition, as the traditional short wheelbase wagons start to give way to new air-braked stock. The Freightliner brand was a Beeching era success story, and container trains were introduced on the WCML from the late-1960s. This period also saw block train operation become more established, alongside Merry-Go-Round (MGR) coal trains, and oil trains formed of TEA 100 tonne bogie tanks.

The prototypes seen on 'Burshaw NW' point to the future of diesel traction. The first 125mph British diesel locomotive, HS4000 Kestrel, can be seen hauling coal hoppers. By the early 1970s, BR favoured the solution of two lightweight diesels with a streamlined nose on each end (a concept actually first tested on a Class 86), rather than conventional locomotive haulage for Inter-City services. The prototype HST power cars and Mk 3 coaches first appeared in 1972, and are seen on early test runs from Crewe Works. Finally, the first 5,000hp Class 87 'Electric Scot' has just arrived, ready to take over Anglo-Scottish expresses from the '50s' in 1974.

I'm now working on models so that I can run the layout in 1990s guise, complete with push-pull InterCity trains and Class 323 EMUs - which should allow me even more variety when operating at exhibitions.

is above ground nearby, so vary the detailing accordingly. Perhaps chunks of rock have fallen off, in which case you should make these with the rocks so they are ready to add when doing the groundwork. If there is a large amount of vegetation nearby, and a water source, then you will often find large accumulations of moss. Taking these factors into consideration will allow you to produce a harmonious landscape without any jarring inconsistencies. For example, on the ground beneath these larch trees, I scattered on static grass (without an applicator) and tea leaves to represent fallen needles and cones respectively.

Check your Pollyfilla for peaks, troughs and ridges. These are difficult to avoid when the mixture is wet, but you can easily adjust now using filler to level the surface.



Paint the surface with an emulsion paint base. I like to use a similar colour to any features, such as rocks, so that accidental splashes of paint don't stand out.



Add some dried up puddles. Place masking tape down and cut around it to form the desired shape. Remove trimmings with tweezers. You can also use masking fluid.



Coat the base with 'Mod Podge' glue avoiding all the areas you wish to avoid coating with earth, such as rocks.



Sprinkle on tile grout as evenly as possible. Brush off any that lands where you don't want it, such as on your rocks.



Now spray with a wetting agent and repeat using a watered down 'Mod Podge' mix. Leave to dry completely - preferably overnight.



Add a layer of groundwork using sifted soil, silver sand and tea leaves to add texture and colour. Seal as before: add wetting agent and repeat with a spray of glue.



I piled up tea leaves between the rocks, and up against the rocks to represent wind-blown leaves. For items like this, add the glue mixture to the feature using a pipette.



Now remove the masks from the puddles and paint with a dark brown colour - I used burnt umber. Leave to dry overnight.



Add Citadel Agrellan Earth to the puddles applied with a brush, but using a dabbing action. When dry, this should crackle to produce a dried mud effect.



To represent boggy ground, add grass clumps to represent reed grass. These are self adhesive, which is useful for test positioning, but fix them with glue.



Add fresh grass by spattering the ground with dilute 'Mod Podge' glue. Use a sprayer or a toothbrush for this and avoid getting it on surfaces where you don't want grass.

LECTION PROTECTION



In a bid to protect you from the worst happening to your model collection, Howard Smith offers useful advice, backed by model railway insurance experts.

ave you ever thought what the value of your models is worth? Do your home contents insurers understand the value of your collection? Are you insured if you take your models to an event, exhibition or local group? Is there a limit or clause on your home contents policy, which could mean you're not fully covered?

A recent **RMweb** survey revealed that 43% of people had either inadequate, or no insurance on their model railway collection. Protecting your layout, model collection or club rooms against theft, fire or damage never features at the top of our 'bucket-list' of priorities, but it's reassuring knowing that you're covered should the worst happen. We can also look at reducing the chances of theft too.

Home layout owners aren't the only ones who should feel concerned - it could be argued that those who attend exhibitions nationwide put themselves at higher risk. Should the transporting vehicle be involved in an accident, the layout damaged during setup or takedown, or theft of your rolling stock take place during a show, how easily would you come to terms with your loss? The unthinkable is worth thinking about, even if it does seem a little far fetched at times.



II ask **the expert**

What should you look for in a policy? Is there any difference between standard and specialist policies?

good policy should cover you on an 'all-risks' basis, including accidental damage and theft. It should offer you cover in your home and away from the home if you visit friends or attend exhibitions.

Specialist stand-alone policies will often include extra cover so that items which have increased in value because they're no longer produced or would cost more to make now are better protected. If items are repaired following damage, we will also pay for loss in value. Typically, specialist policies such as ours won't have special anit-theft requirements like special locks or alarms, although there would need to be a break-in for a claim to be valid. Standard policies rarely have these benefits.

MINIMISING RISK

The proverb 'prevention is better than cure' is always relevant. There are simple measures you can take to significantly reduce risk of theft, all of which can be cost-effective in the long run. Let's take the example of 'Black Country Blues', an EM gauge exhibition layout. Following a spate of thefts from shows in the North-West area in the autumn, Mark Forrest took the precaution of fitting a CCTV system to the layout to protect the fiddleyards at each end. Normally each end of the layout is manned but if an operator is distracted or needed elsewhere it provides an opportunity for theft. A CCTV camera is positioned at each end of the layout, feeding to a hard drive which records the fiddleyards in full-colour high definition. Without such equipment it would be hard to pin down when something was stolen, let alone identify a suspect. The system is easily obtainable via Amazon for less than £120 -the average price of an RTR locomotive. Through the use of video extension leads the system could be easily installed to an outbuilding with the hard drive remaining inside the house. Many exhibition layouts now use CCTV systems.

Layouts housed in sheds are particularly at risk as they're easier to break into. Usually sited away from the house, an inadequately protected shed is a crime scene in waiting. Let's look at a few simple steps to add extra protection.

EXTERNAL SECURITY

A belt and braces bolt latch secured with a good lock is only a pair of bolt croppers away from redundancy. Modern electronic keypads are a better solution because if tampered with, or a code isn't entered fast enough, an alarm will activate. Better still, putting off a trespasser before reaching the outbuilding is a wise move, preventing damage to your property.

A floodlight with motion sensor that shines toward the house (ideally a bedroom window) will make you aware of potential suspicious activity in the night. Unfortunately, because of the bright light you'll see very little. A floodlight shining from the house towards the shed gives a better view of what might be happening, but you might never wake to see it as light won't pour through the house windows. The first solution is better unless you have CCTV cameras fitted.

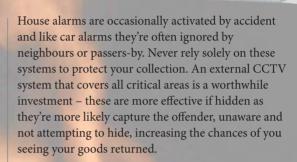


- Inform the police if a tracker is fitted to your collection you can transfer details
- Ask neighbours or potential witnesses
- If the item(s) were at home, avoid touching the scene - fingerprints might be left
- Look out for items on popular online auction websites
- Post a thread on RMweb to alert others
- If you witness a theft at a show, inform exhibition staff

INTERNAL SECURITY

READY TO ARM

A passive infra-red (P.I.R) sensor is a discreet way of creating a custom alarm to notify of movement inside a shed, room, or if positioned inside a room to face out of a window, activity both inside and around the immediate vicinity. These detectors can be connected to an alarm system or siren. Many house alarm systems can now be configured to dial the police automatically if you're on holiday or away from home.

Simple and effective low-cost wire loop alarms can be fed through stock boxes or strategically placed around items of higher value making their removal more awkward. This solution is useful at model shows where numerous items are left exposed, placing the wires through the wheels of rolling stock.

Layouts in the loft are easier to protect - they're usually only accessible through a hatch or stairs. Protecting its entrance with an alarm is a more costeffective solution.

KEEPING TRACK

When was the last time you itemised every item of rolling stock, made a note of its current condition and valued it? We're always changing our collections - adding to them, selling items surplus

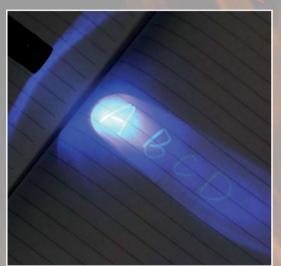

to requirements or repainting models. Should you lose your collection, would you be able to remember every item? Moreover, how could you prove you ever owned said items in the first place? If you wanted to track items down at a later date, what do they look like? A good spreadsheet keeping track of rolling stock accompanied by photographs is a must. Keep this in a secure location out of the house, not on a computer or laptop that could also be stolen or burnt in the event of a fire - an online cloud drive, remotely accessible is a good option. Once the list is made, update it at least every year noting repaints, modifications or other details that'll help to identify your items in the crowd.

DISTINGUISHABLE FEATURES

Proving ownership of a standard RTR model can be difficult once the item is lost. A small pyrography tool that uses heat to burn marks into objects can be used to write your name, initials, or an identifying feature on the underside of models. They work well on plastic models in N and OO gauge, but for larger scales where brass is often used an engravers tool is a better option. Better still, for these larger scales, a discreet GPS tracker can be purchased and carefully hidden inside a locomotive tender or diesel bodyshell. When used in conjunction with many phone apps, should the model or collection be stolen, its location can be pin-pointed to within an accuracy of three metres, which if given to the police soon after the theft occurs, will help recover your stolen goods.

How much should you expect to pay for model insurance and what is the value of the average policy?

Most of our premiums start from around £66.00 cover is provided on an 'all-risks' basis including accidental damage, theft, flood, fire cover in the UK, including in transit.

If sums insured greater than £13,000 are required, then expect to pay an additional £5 per extra £1,000. The value of the average collection is around £20,000, which seems surprising until you do the maths. With our policies, there's little owners can do to minimise premiums, but our pricing is competitive because of our buying power.

RISK VS. REWARD

To establish a sufficient level of protection it's worth putting yourself in the shoes of a 'would be' thief. Most thieves are opportunists. With this in mind, out of sight is out of mind, so if you have display cabinets, think about extra protection. Keeping collections hidden in lockable storage boxes is best - in hidden rooms or cabinets better still. At model shows, goods yards and fiddleyards are more susceptible to theft as they have more rolling stock on show, so if you choose one area to position a small CCTV camera on a layout, make it here.

Let's wise up and get ahead of the game when it comes to protecting our collection. Stay protected against potential mishaps or those seeking to outdo us by ensuring your collection has adequate insurance and security, it's better to get cover today than tomorrow - you just never know what's around the corner.

HOW TO...

MODERNISE A BACHMANN

Andrew Donnelly transforms the popular OO gauge LMS District Engineers' Inspection Saloon into a well-known Scottish vehicle of the 1980s.

> achmann's LMS observation saloon was released in 2014, largely to critical acclaim. It is undoubtedly a very nice model of an unusual and interesting prototype. That said, the versions produced so far reflect the vehicles in their largely original condition and as such, are only applicable for liveries up to the BR blue/grey era. This presented me with a challenge as I wanted one in ScotRail livery, as carried by DM 45020 from 1986 onwards. This vehicle featured a number of detail alterations, not least the exchanging of the original LMS bogies for 100mph B4s. This coach, along with many others of the same type, appear to have undergone many changes during their often long careers, so pinning down a specific vehicle during a specific period is suggested. Undaunted, an LMS maroon livery donor was obtained and the challenge taken up!

BODY CONVERSION

As ever, the first task was to strip the original model down to individual components, which required some trickery even to remove the bodyshell from the underframe. The bodyshell and glazing is held on to the underframe using a series of locating clips, which do not come apart easily. Rather than risk the effects of brute force, pieces of thin plastic or a knife blade were slid between the underframe and body to release each clip along one side, then repeated along the other, to gently allow the bodyshell to come free. Note that prior to this, the central handrails, which are attached to bodyshell and underframe steps, should be removed. Once done, all parts were removed from the bodyshell,

including the drain pipes running over the roof and ends of the vehicle, glazing, interior, roof and boxes on the front end, below the centre windows.

The initial task was to modify the front, centre windows at each end, filling in the slight recess around the window frame using Milliput. With a small amount of filler rolled into fine threads on a glass work surface, four sections were carefully placed around the window frame recess, ensuring that enough filler and pressure was added to ensure a good bond to the bodyshell. The surface of the filler was then gently smoothed using a wetted finger, with a little extra filler added in each corner of the window frame.

After this, the non-serrated section of a small round file was run gently around the inside of the frame to clean it, thus maintaining the existing vertical and horizontal lines. In each corner, the round file was used to more or less shape the filler to the required curve. An exact match was not essential, but an approximation was useful in eventually reducing the amount of filler sanding required. Finally, a little dab of superglue was run around the inside of the window frame to help the filler adhere to the bodyshell, and avoid it coming loose once sanding was underway.

Whilst the filler was out, the door handles and hinges of the doors to be removed on either side were cut away and the door recess filled with Milliput. Note that the doors to be removed are at the same end, closest to the vehicle ends and with the shortest section of roof-mounted pipes.

As I was using an LMS maroon model, removal of the small box and cutting away of the moulded pipes on the front ends of the vehicle had

left a recess, hence this was duly filled with Milliput. As is usual, the bodyshell was left for at least two days whilst the filler set thoroughly, allowing for shrinkage.

When work recommenced, the first task was to enlarge the new bodyside windows in the former door positions. The existing door windows were slowly filed out width-wise to line up with the former doorframe recesses, then height-wise to match the adjacent saloon windows. The corners were filed to shape using a small, round file to match the curvature of the adjacent windows, after which the bodyshell was smoothed flush with wet-and-dry paper to sand down the filler applied around the door recess.

On the vehicle ends, wet-and-dry was used to slowly sand the filler applied around the central window flush to the bodyshell, taking care not to dislodge any of the filler. Once this was complete, the inside edges of the window were tidied up, with extra attention given to the corners to ensure a regular and consistent finish. The rest of the front end below the windows was also sanded flush, prior to the twin inverted 'L' shaped pipes being added on each end, along with replacement lamp irons, a trio of windscreen wipers and Electric Train Heating (ETH) receptacles.

The slightly curved beading across the top of the windows was added using Microstrip, after which an application of grey primer was applied to check that a sufficiently good finish had been achieved, followed by a thin coat of white primer.

SECTOR COLOURS

Painting of the bodyshell was rather simpler than the conversion work. I used my standard method of

back story ScotRail saloon 45020



The history of the LMS 50ft District Inspectors Saloons is a well-covered subject, hence only a short reminder is needed to note that 13 examples were built in 1940-47 at Wolverton. Dating from 1944, DM 45020 was one of five built with inset door handles to reduce the overall width, with Nos. 45021/026/035/036 being the others. It appears to have been allocated to Scotland for most of its career, but in 1986 it was refurbished with several modifications being made, along with a repaint into ScotRail livery. The aim of this exercise was to replicate the vehicle during the 1986-92 period. Note that the coach was subject to a

more extensive refurbishment in 1993, when the original windows and frames were replaced with toughened glass versions with hopper ventilators, external heating vents added and large cab-end spotlights fitted, as well as a repaint into Regional Railways livery.

In this guise, it operated for the Scottish Infrastructure division, before becoming an EWS asset at privatisation and subsequently gaining EWS livery for use as an MoD escort coach. In 2006, it was returned to lined maroon, before entering preservation in 2011, eventually being moved to the Scottish Industrial Railway Centre.

painting the lining, starting with the white, followed by Provincial blue, before the executive light grey was added, each colour being masked off prior to the next, naturally. Executive dark grey duly followed, then finally warning panel yellow over the vehicle ends.

In between this, the roof had been fitted with a pair of turned brass air horns at each end, positioned between the cable run housings, a few millimetres back from the ends. Duly undercoated, the orange line was added along the very edge of the roof then masked, prior to the roof grey being applied. All colours were from the Railmatch range, applied with an airbrush, with Replica Railways transfers used. A coat of satin varnish finished the painting process.

The final steps on the bodyshell were to re-install the glazing, and fabricate two new side windows using 1mm acetate sheet. The cab front window sections were separated into three individual windows, with the outer pair able to be fitted without alteration. The centre window however. required the squared corners to

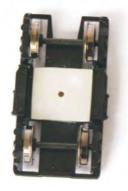


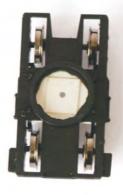
be rounded off to meet the profile of the modified window frames at each end. This was done with some careful use of a thin file to slowly round off each corner, checking as filing was done to ensure a neat match with the corresponding frame. When testing the window into the frame, take great care not to dislodge any of the filler around the formerly recessed window frame.

Once done, curtains were added to most of the saloon windows, using nothing more sophisticated than folded up sections of orange paper, held in place with strong tape above the sight line through the windows. Re-mounting the roof back on to the bodyshell allowed the original wire piping to be re-fitted to the vehicle ends and roof.

UNDERFLOOR MODIFICATIONS

For the conversion work, a set of Bachmann B4 bogies was obtained; I noted that these had a differing method of attachment to the underframe. It was easier to modify the bogies as opposed to the underframe, hence the entire centre circular mounting plate of the bogie was cut out using a mini

drill, leaving just the outer circle moulding in place (see above).

Once tidied up, each bogie was turned upside down and a 18mm by 15mm section of 1mm plastic card sheet glued in place over the central hole. Turning the bogie over again, another section of 1mm plastic card sheet, approximately 8mm square, was added in the centre hole, being attached to the upper side of the first plastic card section.

Finally, a 1.5mm diameter hole was drilled through the plastic card sections in the absolute dead centre of the bogie to allow the original

screw holding the bogie in place to be used again to attach it to the underframe. In addition, steps were attached to both sides of the inner end of the main bogie side frame, positioned more or less underneath the outmost doors on the bodyshell, prior to a coat of matt black paint being applied.

Moving on to the underframe, the main modifications to make are to the sideframes either side of the bogie mounting pivots. These

BOB WOOLNOUGH/COURTESY RAILWAY HERALD IMAGE LIBRARY sideframes appear to have section of the lower horizontal beam removed to accommodate the B4 bogies on which DM 45020 rides, with a significant, external strengthening plate added over each of the cutaway sections.

Therefore on the model, an 18mm long section of each sideframe was removed using a scalpel and file to a depth of around 2mm, being centred on the bogic mounting screw hole. At the same time, the stepboards on the sideframes, positioned under the sealed over door on the bodyshell, were also removed, again with a scalpel and then wet-and-dry paper to sand flush.

The new strengthening plates were made from 1mm plastic card sheet, with four 22mm by 3mm sections cut to shape. These four sections were then held together in one black by a piece of tape wrapped around them horizontally. This allowed the distinctive 'U' shaped cut-outs in each end of the sections to be filed away using a thin file.

By securing all four sections together, a uniform profile can be obtained on all pieces. Once tidied up with some wet-and-dry paper, the exercise was repeated but with the sections held together by small pieces of tape at the ends and centre, thus permitting the two distinctive cut-outs in each section to be formed using a file.

Not having been able to obtain any precise dimensions for these

sections, a 'best-guess' approach was taken with efforts made to match the section shape as closely as possible based on available photographs.

Other work on the underframe involved adding standard bufferbeam details, including brake pipes, Smith's screw link couplings and ETH connections (using Heljan Class 47 spares), along with the small electrical connection boxes on the sideframes. Once done, the whole underframe was repainted matt black, with all the small details picked out as necessary, including the distinctive red screw couplings and yellow unfolding steps in the centre of the vehicle.

During all this work, the interior had been treated to a coat of medium grey undercoat to lighten up the interior, with seats and tables highlighted in dark brown. A driver was added in each cab end, along with a few VIPs around the saloon meeting tables.

With the work on all the sections completed, the bogies were remounted on the underframe, which was then in turn reunited back together with the bodyshell, taking care not to disturb any of the interior curtains or dislodge any of the internal figures. A very light coat of weathering using track colours and matt black was dusted over the saloon bringing to a conclusion what has turned out to be a very satisfying conversion job.

DM 45020 is a welcome addition to my mid-1980s fleet for 'Airthrey Park' and will no doubt see much action being pushed and pulled by any number of Sulzer Type 2s!

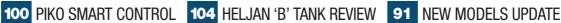

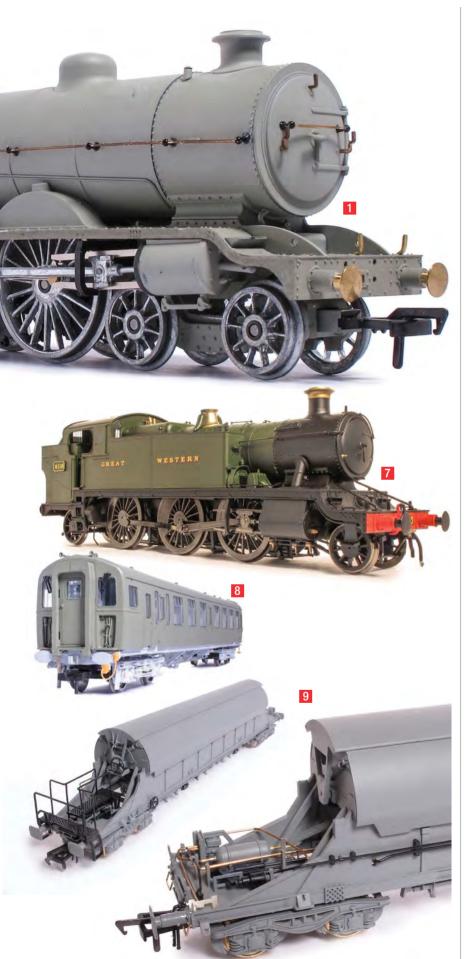

TURN OVER FOR MORE NEWS FROM WARLEY 2016 - AND BEYOND...



After the success of its Class 143/144 railbuses, RealTrack Models has confirmed that it is working with Rapido Trains on new OO gauge models of the popular Class 156 'Super Sprinter' and Class 142 'Pacer' railbus.

HORNBY LNER/BR 'B12/3' 4-6-0



As this issue of **BRM** went to press, the latest incarnation of a famous Hornby product was about to arrive in UK shops. First introduced by Tri-ang in 1963, it was a real indication of things to come, featuring innovations such as

'Magnadhesion', a separately supplied footplate crew and, from 1964, an optional smoke generator unit. From 1970 it also featured an early attempt at steam sound with the 'chuff chuff' device mounted on one of the tender axles.

Having disappeared from the range in the 1980s, it was selected as one of the first items to be shipped out to China for production in the mid-1990s and returned in 1996, appearing regularly until 2010. Since then, there has been constant speculation about a replacement to modern standards and the wishes of many modellers were finally granted in 2015.

Reviewed here is No. 61533 in BR mixed traffic lined black with the pre-1956 early emblem - one of three of new models now arriving with Hornby stockists. Also in the first batch are LNER apple green No. 8573 and BR late crest lined black No. 61580. It's perhaps a surprise that Hornby has chosen not to include the unique survivor in this initial trio, either in LNER green as No. 8572 or as the wandering No. 61572, which was famously retained for railtours and visited many obscure parts of the railway in 1960/61.

As before, Hornby has chosen to model this Holden 4-6-0 - originally Great Eastern Railway 'S69' class - in rebuilt 'B12/3' guise with the larger round-topped boiler, larger superheater and Stephenson piston valves. As built, the 71 locomotives built in eight batches between 1911 and 1928 had smaller diameter boilers with square-topped Belpaire fireboxes. Their combination of power, low axle loading and short wheelbase - dictated by the limitations of GER infrastructure - made them extremely useful machines. Between 1931 and 1942, 31 'B12/1s' were reallocated to the former Great North of Scotland (GNSR) section of the LNER for routes radiating from Aberdeen and after D-Day in 1944, a number were

While the previous Hornby 'B12/3' could not hide its early-1960s origins, this new tooling is very much up to 21st century standards. We've had a series of excellent Great Eastern themed models from Hornby in recent years, and the 'B12/3' has been produced to the same high standards as the 'B17', 'Claud' and 'J15'.

While the model is improved in all respects, my first impression is how much better the character of the front end and 'face' has been captured on this new version. It compares much more favourably with the original thanks to a superior treatment of the boiler, smokebox and frontend arrangement. Other highlights include the superb wheels and a representation of the inside motion in the 'daylight' between the frames.

Unlike the old 'B12', the models also feature numerous detail variations according to livery and period. For example LNER apple green No. 8573 and early emblem No. 61533 retain their GER standard Westinghouse air pumps. No. 8573 has an outside steam pipe housing on the left hand side of the smokebox - omitted on the BR

locomotives. On the subject of detail, there's a real

finesse about the model thanks to the quality of the design and parts. Separate components include wire handrails, a superbly rendered boiler backhead and cab interior, injector pipework beneath the footplate, bufferbeammounted guard irons on the BR locomotives and fluted coupling rods.

The short GER style tender is well-detailed and features various fine details such as two toolboxes, twin water tank filler hatches and, on dual-braked locomotives, both air and vacuum brake hoses. NEM





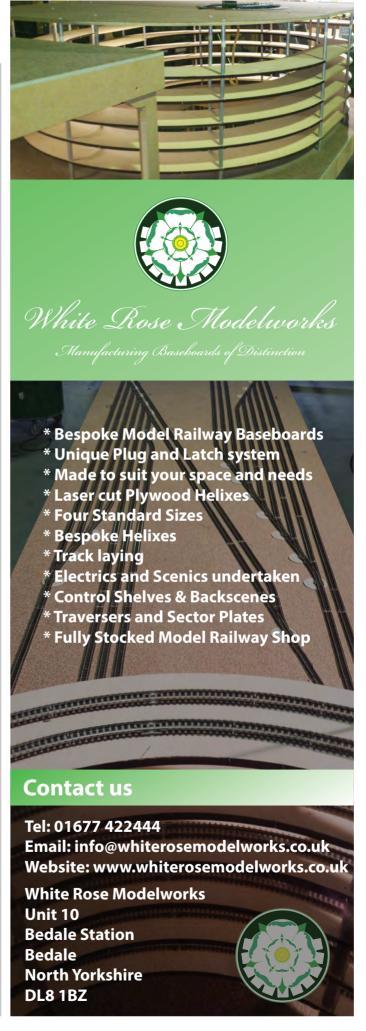
coupler pockets are fitted on the rear of the tender and on the front bogie and sprung metal buffers are fitted front and rear. Provision is made inside the tender for a downward-facing speaker, suggesting that a 'Twin Track Sound' version may be an option later.

Other features include an eight-pin DCC interface in the tender, connected to the motor via semi-permanent leads visible beneath the tender coupling bar. Wiper pick-ups are provided on all six driving wheels and all tender wheels. These provide current for the sealed motor, which has two flywheels and drives to the middle driving axle. Performance is smooth and quiet thanks to that proven mechanism.

Turning finally to the decoration, both LNER and BR liveries are beautifully applied, complete with fine lining, multi-colour BR emblems and crisply shaded LNER lettering/numerals. No. 61533 is in 1950s condition and has an Ipswich (32B) shedplate printed on the smokebox door, placing it in one of three spells in the Suffolk town -July-October 1952, January-April 1954 and August 1955-November 1957. At other times this nomadic locomotive was allocated to Stratford, South Lynn, Yarmouth South Town, Norwich Thorpe and Yarmouth Beach before finally being withdrawn from Cambridge in November 1959.

As you might have guessed by now, this is another impressive addition to the ranks of Great Eastern steam locomotives. With fine looks, superb detail and excellent performance it should delight GE Area modellers - just don't go looking for the 'chuff chuff' sound device on the tender. We checked, and there isn't one!

MINERVA KERR, STUART 'VICTORY' 0-6-0T

Minerva's second RTR locomotive captures a small class of powerful industrial tanks with a long and varied service history ranging from the docks of France to the end of British steam.



A small class of ten industrial locomotives may seem a niche choice of prototype for a ready-to-run manufacturer but Minerva Model Railways' Kerr, Stuart 'Victory' portrays a class which started life

under the Railway Operating Department (ROD) during the First World War and ended in the late-1960s at South Wales collieries.

Kerr, Stuart built the locomotives in 1917 at its California works in Stoke-on-Trent for the Inland Waterways & Docks Department. Intended to shunt at docks on the south coast of England as part of the war effort, ROD No. 608 (at least) also worked at Dieppe on the French side of the Channel. After the war the locomotives were sold to a variety of operators including the Alexandra (Newport & South Wales) Docks & Railway, Brecon & Merthyr Railway, East Kent Light Railway (EKLR) and other private users including collieries. Three were absorbed by the Great Western

Railway, of which two passed to British Railways (BR), surviving until 1954 and 1955. The EKLR's locomotive entered Southern Railway ownership and finished its life with BR, though it was scrapped in 1949 and never carried its allocated number of No. 30948. Seven locomotives ended up with the National Coal Board with the last examples being scrapped in 1969.

Minerva's model is initially available in three liveries, lined red (as reviewed) and lined green or unlined black. The satin paint finish is of good depth with fine and flawless lining. The design is simple and functional but captures everything that can be seen in photographs or drawings, Sprung drawgear with three-link couplings means the model is ready for service and the lightlysprung metal buffers give a pleasing compression when edging up to rolling stock.

The void beneath the boiler would benefit from some representation of inside motion, which is something for the keen modeller to investigate. The cab interior is delightfully captured with individual etched handwheels. The excellent accessory pack includes lamp brackets and a selection of toolboxes and sandboxes which are painted, where necessary, to match the livery of the locomotive.

Beneath the die-cast footplate there is limited chassis detail but the finish to the wheels is excellent and the rods and motion are in unfinished steel. Brake gear and sanding pipes are present with a representation of the springing behind the driving wheels. The accessory pack also includes cylinder drain cocks, optional front steps, optional tank vents and the smokebox door dart.





The model is a weighty 963g, giving smooth and quiet performance and a very respectable haulage capacity. Electrical pick-up is via all six wheels with a high-torque flywheel-equipped motor which drives the rear axle through a 40:1 gearbox giving slow, smooth running.

It is recommended that the ready-lubricated model be run for 30 minutes in each direction on DC before use. To access the eight-pin decoder socket, unclip the brake rodding and remove four screws at the outermost ends of the chassis and lift the plastic body off the chassis. The decoder socket is positioned to the rear of the motor. Standard decoders are recommended by Minerva and the model includes a moulding to accept a 25mm circular speaker in the boiler for those fitting sound, with space in



the side tanks for additional speakers if desired.

Minerva's products offer great value for money and a good quality product, contributing to the current resurgence of O gauge as a popular scale for modellers. Its 'Victory' tank adds a purposeful and accurate model of a larger industrial tank locomotive to the stable. Thoroughly recommended.

HORNBY 'KING' WITH TTS SOUND



One of two all-new OO gauge 'Kings' announced in 2014, the re-tooled Hornby model made its debut last year and is now on to its second production run. New in this batch is a 'Twin Track Sound' (TTS) option, delivered as

BR late crest green No. 6006 *King George I*. It's a fine looking machine that captures the bulk and power of the GWR's premier express passenger locomotive to a 'tee'.

Produced in late-1950s form with the post-1956 crest and double chimney, but without later additions such as AWS equipment and electrification warning flashes, No. 6006 was the first 'King' to be withdrawn, in February 1962. It was based at Wolverhampton (Stafford Road) depot for its entire BR career and an 84A shedplate is correctly printed on the smokebox door. The model closely matches a February 1958 photograph of the locomotive in Portraits of Kings by Bryan Holden and Kenneth H Leech (Fraser Stewart, 1990), displaying fine attention to detail such as the additional strengthening pieces welded to the bogie frames around 1956, diamond pattern step plates welded between the front frame extensions to provide a better foothold for crews, sliding cab roof vents, modified outside steam pipes and later mechanical lubricator position. Correctly for this locomotive, tapered front buffer stocks are retained with the parallel type fitted to the tender.

Optional detailing parts include a set of cabside numberplates (plastic, rather than etched), cylinder drain cocks and brake rigging for the locomotive and tender.

If you're looking for a more cost-effective way into DCC sound, there are some bargains to be had already with this TTS 'King'. Although the RRP is £209.99, as this issue went to press certain retailers were offering discounts of almost 50% - a bargain by any standards.

Sound can be an emotive subject, and modellers are constantly seeking ways to achieve a more realistic experience. For this reviewer, the TTS system didn't entirely capture the full four-cylinder effect of a 'King' at work, but for the price it delivers steam locomotive sound that will satisfy most buyers. There are more sophisticated sound decoders on the market if you

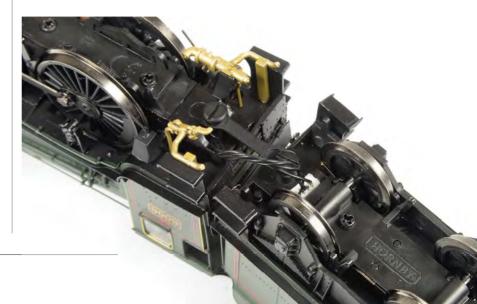

A total of 15 sound functions includes background steam/exhaust/coasting (F1), four different whistles, wheel slip, coal shovelling, injectors, blower on/off and even the fireman's breakfast sizzling. A comprehensive instruction sheet is provided to guide you through the many functions and it's worth reading this thoroughly before you let the model loose on your layout. A useful section includes tips for 'driving' the model to achieve a more realistic experience.





BACHMANN NBL 'WARSHIP' RETURNS



Bachmann Branchline introduced the North British-built Class 43 diesel-hydraulic in 2015 to positive reviews. Our latest review model -D841 Roebuck - depicts the class in its earliest form with no warning

panel or electrification flashes. D841 was delivered to Plymouth Laira in November 1960 and ran until April 1962 without the electrification flashes. Yellow warning panels were added in August 1962. It was transferred to Newton Abbot in June 1962. A Laira (83D) shedplate is beautifully printed on the bufferbeam at each end.

The detail pack includes roof panel lifting eyes and roof air vents along with a complete bufferbeam detailing pack. I think the manufacturer realises that many customers won't fit these delightful extras but they are there for those who might. Care should be taken when fitting the tiny panel eyes which have a ring diameter of around a millimetre; my suggestion is to hold the eye down on your cutting mat and cut the sprue away from the required part. Each sprue of the air vents includes closed and open variations so you can bring a little individuality to your model. The valance beneath the bufferbeam includes representations of the horn vents, a nice touch even though they will usually be obscured behind the pipework. Once the body is removed a 21-pin decoder can be easily fitted and there is provision for a DCC sound speaker.

Bachmann is also releasing D838 Rapid in maroon with full yellow ends, received in September 1968 and carried until withdrawal in March 1971, and BR Blue D836 Powerful, as carried from April 1968 to withdrawal in May 1971.

Suitable for use with Bachmann Mk 1s in BR Western Region chocolate/cream or maroon, parcels/mail vans and fitted goods wagons, the NBL 'Warship' is an excellent model that complements other early-1960s WR machines, both steam and diesel. Recommended.

It seems that no matter where you are, the mobile phone is ever present with an increasing number of applications. There's an app to measure angles and check levels and an app to predict meteorological conditions. No sense

of direction? There's an app for that too. Whatever your opinion about them, they've become man's current tool with, it seems, an app for just about everything, even controlling model railways.

We experienced first-hand the benefits of Roco's Z21 wireless DCC system in 2013 when, it seemed, technology had reached a pinnacle within the hobby. Here was a system that used an app, installed on your mobile phone or tablet to connect to its Z21 interface unit so that you could control your entire layout. If you wanted to expand, all you needed was another user with a mobile phone. We'd seen everything - or so it seemed.

Piko has recently produced a DCC controller handset that runs an Android operating system - the same operating system that is used by over 87% of mobile phone users. Announced at the Nuremberg Toy Fair in 2015, its SmartControl is very similar in external appearance to ESU's Mobile Control II - coincidence?

Powered by Android 4.1.1, with this system, there's nothing to stop you browsing the internet on the same device that is a dedicated model railway controller. Piko's problem with using a standard mobile telephone to control a layout is that battery life isn't that great and when the battery runs out - and it will, eventually - you've lost the use of your mobile telephone too.

SmartControl looks and feels like a chunky elongated mobile telephone handset on top of which is a fixed throttle wheel which makes for a nifty device that sits well in the hand. The lines are very clean with just an on/off and four function buttons - all of the latter are programmable, but by default on startup are used as an emergency stop, volume up/down and default shortcut button. To its underside is a 3.5mm audio jack output and USB port. Simplicity it seems is key.

The brain of this system is the SmartBox - again, the same external appearance to ESU's ECoSBoost and Bachmann's Dynamis Command Station and ProBox. The handheld SmartController communicates with the SmartBox via wireless LAN (Local Area Network). With a 5A output, the system is orientated towards N, OO and smaller O gauge layouts. Piko's dedicated app once launched on screen detects the SmartBox and the wireless



exchange of data between the two devices commences.

It's worth noting that only one Piko SmartBox can be used within the same Wi-Fi range, using two requires a change of default parameters - this shouldn't be a problem at home - but keep this in mind if operating at a show or clubrooms if another layout uses the same system. To the rear of the Smartbox is its power input, output to programming and main tracks, a Loconet port, plus DIN sockets to expand to an ECoSLink. LAN and a USB ports are also provided to connect to a PC if required - perfect!

On screen, each locomotive equipped with a RailComPlus decoder will automatically register its name, address and functions so that you know which virtual button to tap to get decoder functions working seamlessly, not by trial and error.

Additional boosters and occupancy detectors can be connected to the system at a later date if your layout expands. If you decide to run layout control software, provision is given for that too, either by wireless LAN or an Ethernet port to the rear of the Smartbox.

Should none of your locomotives be equipped with RailComPlus decoders, you can enter locomotives manually into your system. The system makes this a simple process by entering address type, choosing an image and toggling switches to attribute functions found on the decoder. The system is fully compatible with 28 function decoders and a ludicrously high number of up to 16,384 locomotives can be controlled.

The problem with mobile telephone control via app has been the accuracy of accelerating and decelerating locomotives using on-screen sliders. Fingers and thumbs are a little clumsy and eye contact is mostly made with the telephone rather than the model, ensuring your fingers don't accidently slip to press something like a horn.

With this system, the two are separated, giving you the feel of a traditional controller with the benefits of an ABOVE LEFT: A stereo jack output and USB port feature discreetly at the bottom of the handset. A loop hole for a lanyard is included.

ABOVE RIGHT: Launching Piko's SmartControl software is simple - just tap the on screen 'app' icon.

intuitive method of controlling turnouts and locomotive functions in a confined space. It's far from a gimmick. The Wi-Fi signal emitted by the system is sufficient

for the average layout. I tested ours

from a distance of eight metres which proved fine until the controller was taken around the corner of a wall and its signal was lost. Admittedly, this situation is hard to replicate and it's clearly a more reliable form of communication than infra-red as used by some older walkabout DCC systems.

Its operating system is a benefit as there's no learning process. Android users will already be familiar with how

to change the screen brightness and Wi-Fi settings. If not, the manual is clearly illustrated with screen grab pictures and will guide the novice from start to finish.

During set-up, decoder functions can be configured from permanent, to momentary or inverted - that's functions that are activated by default. When a locomotive is selected, its functions appear on screen illustrated not by the traditional but vague alphanumerical 'F0- F27',

but vague alphanumerical 'I but by an icon that you've previously allocated to each such as a cab light or interior light. This is useful as many of us have locomotives wired differently, often with no two functions found by pressing the same

button.

Unlike some of the DCC systems we've encountered, Piko's new system is very accessible from an operational perspective and updating it due to its nature is very simple too. Who knows what control opportunities could be opened in the future with just a

simple app update on the device?

A classic steam/diesel transition era wagon, these late-1950s oil tank wagons are best known to OO modellers as the subject of the Airfix/ Dapol kit. Having released them in 7mm scale in 2015, Heljan has taken

the welcome decision to add both the Class A and Class B variants to its OO gauge wagon fleet.

Based on a design introduced by Charles Roberts in 1957, the models are being released with two lengths of tank barrel and numerous detail variations to suit different liveries and periods. Reviewed here is a black 'B' tank with 'Regent' branding, one of 150 built for the company in 1960/61 and used to distribute fuel oil from storage depots at Avonmouth and in South Wales. Also shown is a former Class A tank converted as a water carrier for the Chipmans weedkilling train and carrying 1980s green livery.

As well as increasing the payload - and efficiency - over traditional short-wheelbase tanks, the Roberts design of 1955/56 introduced an all-new 15ft wheelbase underframe, which increased stability and permitted the wagons to run at higher speeds. Several hundred were eventually built by Roberts, Powell Duffryn and Hurst Nelson.

Heljan's models are available in no fewer than 17 versions, plus a four-wagon pack of water tanks in Chipmans green/black. 'B Tanks' are offered in the classic 'Esso' 1960s black (as seen on the Airfix kit), a slightly later 'Esso' livery without lettering, BR departmental black, 'Regent' black, 'Charringtons' red, 'Mobil' red and 'United Molasses' red. For collectors, there's also a special run of 200 red/blue wagons celebrating Heljan's 60th anniversary in 2017.

For Class A products there are five 'Esso' silver/grey wagons covering the late-1950s to the 1980s.

Immediately evident is the underframe detail, which

> depiction of the bracing gear between the brake shoes and either side of the axles. Externally, the underframe looks good too with good relief to the axlebox and suspension detail.

Also fitted are sprung buffers with metal heads. NEM pockets are fixed but have a little side-to-side flexibility.

> Our samples were free-running thanks to metal pin-point axles and metal wheels, and

enough weight to make them stable even when running in heavier trains.

Separate plastic mesh catwalks, loading hatches and ladders are fitted and correctly

differ between the 'A' and 'B' tanks. The walkways and ladders aren't as fine as they would be if made from etched metal, and we'd be tempted to change the latter if an after-market replacement became available. However, the overall look and character of the wagon has been well captured.

Decoration was neatly applied on our samples. On certain wagons, the company branding is applied on a raised plate. Particularly good is the printing of builders' plates and vehicle information on the solebars.

With an RRP of £24.95, these tanks are a little more expensive than Bachmann's 45t TTA and 14t anchormounted tanks, but feature a greater number of separate components and fill an important gap between steam and diesel era tank wagons. Whether used individually in or in block trains modellers of the railway between the late-1950s and 1980s should be able to find a place for some of these characterful wagons.

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OPINION I INDUSTRY INSIDER

Industry Insider questions the value of 'limited edition' promotions in this era of reduced production runs.



Has anyone else noticed that your favourite chocolate bar or even a simple packet of biscuits now face the scourge of the 'Limited Edition' label? I fully appreciate that marketing people have to make a living and that primarily involves thinking up ideas to increase sales, but I honestly believe enough is enough where model railways are concerned.

My first recollection of a model railway-related Limited Edition was the Hornby 'Lord of the Isles' train pack in 1981, of which 5,000 were produced. A limited edition of Stephenson's Rocket followed it, again with a 5,000 production run and since then Hornby has regularly used such marketing and sales initiatives, although it will be noticed that the production quantities have dropped considerably over the decades.

Apart from its collectors club specials, Bachmann has resisted the limited edition sales approach, although the same cannot be said for those who have commissioned exclusive models direct from Barwell. However, the worst offender in recent years was the old Lima brand with its numerous 'specials' of 500. In many cases these runs were more than those featured in its main range.

Now I do not have a real problem with those who feel the need to produce 'special' models complete with certificates because the consumer 'pays their money and takes their choice' but like most things, if you overdo it, eventually such sales ploys will lose their credibility. There are, in some cases, justifiable reasons for such limited production runs but you do not have to look too far to see those who are continually guilty of such a tedious sales trick.

Recently I purchased a model of APT-E and, guess what, it was a limited edition. Why I wondered?

Did the fact that production was limited make it more desirable? No, not at all and I would not mind betting that I am not alone in my thinking, certainly in respect of this particular model judging by the increased demand for the unit after the sales book had been closed.

I have to wonder whether by making the model a Limited Edition the originators have scuppered their chances of producing another batch. Shortsighted sales and marketing or what?

And if they think that they can produce more of the same model at a later date then I can see their credibility being damaged, even before we consider the ethics of such an action.

There is definitely a place for limited editions but each one does need to have a raison d'être, a relevant reason to be, such as celebrating a particular occurrence or anniversary. In many cases that is well established but too many limited editons lack that 'special' premise.

For example, the last days of the 'Big Four' prior to 1948 were more or less covered in 1998 by Hornby but I can confidently predict that such an anniversary will

> be too much of a temptation for certain parties in 2017. What on earth can make four limited edition 'Big Four' locomotives that unique?

I suspect the collection will include individual locomotives representing each of the 'Big Four' but so what? We have all seen a GWR 'King' or an LNER 'A3' before and

probably have one of each so why would anyone buy such models, even if they are in special packaging, include a certificate and have a different name?

All I see is a rather casual way of trying to squeeze extra sales from over-exposed models. On top of that I wonder if such a collection will

increase in value? I doubt it, rather the opposite, especially when the

models start to appear on the advertisement pages of BRM and other model magazines at bargain

Please, I implore those who commission and produce such models to be more creative rather than relying on a fancy box and certificate. If nothing else it will help to restore some credibility and purpose to such releases, which at the moment is sadly lacking.
