

TYPES OF PEARLS

A favourite amongst beaders, the finest quality natural pearls have been highly prized as gemstones and objects of beauty for many centuries. Because of this the pearl has become a metaphor for something rare, fine, admirable and valuable. Some of the various types of pearls from around the world include: South Sea Pearls: The largest and rarest of pearls, South Sea Pearls are cultivated primarily in Australia, Myanmar, Indonesia and the islands of the South Pacific. Their rarity is due to the fact that growing larger pearls requires a great deal of time, during which oysters are increasingly prone to damage or death. Their most common colours are white, silver and gold. Akoya Pearls: The most lustrous of

all pearls, Akoya Pearls are the classic

cultured pearls of Japan. The pearl is either white or cream and can have yellow, pink or blue hues. The best pearls have clean surface quality and acceptable

Freshwater Pearls: The most popular and least expensive cultured pearl, Freshwater Pearls surprisingly rival the quality of their expensive natural pearl counterparts. The first cultured freshwater pearls originated in Japan.

Tahitian Pearls: The Black Tahitian pearl is produced by the Black Lipped oyster which is found in the waters of French Polynesia. These types of pearls are extremely rare, since only one out of 10,000 oysters contain a pearl. The shape, colour and lustre of these certified cultured Black Tahitian pearls are natural.



Jewellery TRENDS FOR 2017

The year is almost over which means there are a whole heap of new trends to keep your eye out on over the coming months. We're excited for the latest styles and techniques that are emerging in the beading and jewellery realm right now, we hope that they will inspire you into the New Year!

THE NEW YEAR WILL SEE plenty of current trends evolve as well as the introduction of styles we haven't seen in years. Trends tipped to be the most prominent this season include:

Costume jewellery: Just as beautiful as it is fun to create, costume jewellery made from metal, adornments with Swarovski crystals, holiday jewellery, Chinese adornments and magical accessories will become widespread in popularity. You can get really creative with this trend – think out of the box and don't hold back.

Renaissance: Jewellery inspired by the Renaissance period is headed to become popular once again next year. The predominate style of early Renaissance jewellery usually consists of a single large, coloured gem set on an elaborate gold piece. The focus was on the gold, the gem often played an accessory role to the precious metal which was usually enamelled or elaborately decorated. The pendant was a classic must have item in this era and will continue to be revived as the trend comes back into play. Bohemian: Although not a breakthrough trend, boho style will increase in popularity more than ever before! Think headbands with flowers, fabric rims, ribbons and various chains to make this fashionable style a crowd pleaser in 2017.

Larger than life rings: Massive rings adorned with animals and lots of stones are a trend to watch. Combined with boho colours such as blue, turquoise, red and silver, the motto this new year is the bigger the ring, the better! The main focus is on large and unusual geometric forms. Rings also styled in retro and vintage styles will be really popular.

Animalistic motif: Tied in with the large ring trend, the world of jewellery is also set to see more animalistic focused pieces. Snakes in particular will fashionably enhance necklaces. earrings and bracelets.

Collar necklaces: A wow piece that will soon hit the fashion scene, the sleek looking collar necklace is sure to gain 'it' neckwear status. The collar necklace is extremely versatile, sporting everything from lace and crystals to studs and leather!

Pearls: The pearl has been emerging from the cocoon of its rather staid and traditional image for the past few seasons. However, the new year will see pearls revisited in the form of ear cuffs and detailed choker necklaces. Layered necklaces: Chains will lengthen on talisman necklaces and charm pendants, making them perfect for layering in stacks. Layering necklaces is easy - go for a graduated effect and pair delicate shorter necklaces with slightly chunkier, longer necklaces. Alternatively, larger-than-life necklaces pair well with dainty chains or you can personalise your collection with a letter or zodiac pendant.

Raw stones: Crystals will become huge this season, with many raw stones featured in jewellery on catwalks around the world. Mythical stones are said to have untold powers, with many opting to wear them not just for aesthetic purposes but to help improve mood and wellbeing. Because of their stunning beauty, luminous stones pair well with almost every outfit. They can make a minimalistic statement worn solo or send a high-impact message when layered with other pieces.

TIPS FOR GIFTING **JEWELLERY**

Gifting jewellery can be a traditional affair and it can also be made contemporary by infusing some innovation. Buying or making jewellery for aifts is all about choosing the style. Here are some points to consider when gifting different types of jewellery:

• Earrings: Check that the materials used are of a high quality. Consider the shape of the respective persons face and whether the style will suit them. Will you pick hoops, studs, drop or an ornate chandelier style? Your giftee's personal preference matters. Gift them with a pair of earrings you know they will wear and consider the types of occasion the earrings will suit.

- Rings: There are endless styles of rings to choose from. Consider if your giftee would prefer a graceful, classic design or perhaps a more eccentric style. A certain ring can look great on one hand but not so much on another. It is always advisable to envisage the ring on the wearer. Picking the correct size can be very tricky. If you have a ring sizer you can always use this before making or purchasing a ring. You could also opt for a ring with an adjustable band depending on the look you are going for.
- Bracelets: Different types of bracelets will compliment people in varying ways. If you are considering a delicate chain or thin bangle you will have to think about whether this will suit the wearer. You might like to consider another option such as a wider bracelet design that accentuates the arms and wrists.





JEWELLERY WITH MEANING

If you're looking to gift someone special with a beautiful piece of jewellery, why not consider something that has a deeper meaning than you might think. Jewellery with meaning not only looks stunning but carries heartfelt significance as well. There are symbols and hidden meanings behind almost all types of pendants and charms. Here are some that you might easily recognise. Tree of life: The Tree of Life is one of the most popular symbols to be featured in jewellery. The symbol is actually associated with knowledge and wisdom. If you are seeking a symbol to remind you and keep you focused on your quest for awareness, knowledge and wisdom, then the Tree of Life will do just that.

Anchor: Anchors symbolise hope. The object is derived from a Bible reference in Hebrews. Arrow and target: Most often associated with love, the arrow and target most commonly symbolises Cupid. It can also mean protection, defence, movement, force, swiftness, sureness, direction and power. Coiled snake: If the symbol features a snake which is coiled, this symbolises eternity. Crescent or New Moon: Jewellery which features a crescent or new moon signifies a new relationship – hopeful it will wax into matrimony.

Dove: A dove is a Christian religious symbol. It can also stand for peace, love and fidelity. Fern: Ferns signify a fascination. This stems from the popular Victorian hobby of fern

hunting. In mourning, ferns can also mean sincerity.

Figure 8: Popular in all forms of jewellery right now, the figure 8 or 'infinity' symbol is usually given to signify an eternity.

Horseshoe: Horseshoes have been used as symbols of luck for over a thousand years.

Key: The key symbol can signify importance, greatness, revelation, understanding and breakthrough. It can be the key to one's heart or to represent new beginnings as you open the door to new opportunities.

Oak: Pendants featuring oak signify strength. Snakes: Not to be confused with a coiled snake, snakes are an Ancient Greek and Roman symbol for guardian spirit and wisdom. A bracelet with a snake is said to mean everlasting love.

Four leaf clover: Pendants with this object are said to change your life for the better. A clover is not an ordinary symbol because it's a traditional symbol of good luck. Each leaf represents something; the first for your faith, the second for hope, the third for love and the fourth for luck.

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NECKLACE MATERIALS

12cm x 19ga silver wire (Half hard)

2 metres 22aa wire (Half hard)

Sterling silver clasp

2 x silver bead caps to fit the ends of the focal bead

1 Palm tree silver charm

1 mermaid silver charm

1 x 6mm OD closed jump rings

BEADS

1 x 5cm long squeezed focal beach related

2 x 3mm silver

68 x 4mm daisy spacers

34 x 6mm to 8mm etched glass to tone with focal

26 x 4mm sterling silver daisy spacers

TOOLS

Side cutting pliers

Round nose pliers

Chain nose pliers

Small needle file to smooth the ends

LENGTH 66 CM with an extra 10cm drop

This necklace has the look of Summer with its abstract beach scene and etched glass beads reminiscent of the glass which washes up on the beach.

DESIGN NOTE:

I used sterling silver for this set but you could use art wire if you wanted to.

Please read through all of the instructions before you start.

NECKLACE STEP ONE

Focal Bead Component

Using the round nose pliers make a loop 2.5cm from the end of the 19ga wire and slip the palm tree charm into it. Wrap the end around the length of the wire about 3 times and cut off any excess. Thread 3mm bead and the bead cap face upwards. Thread the focal bead. Thread the second bead cap. Thread on 3mm bead. Make a loop about 3mm from the small bead adding a jump ring onto it. Wrap the end of the wire back around the main wire towards the small silver bead to fill in the gap and to hold the component together securely. This should take 3 to 4 wraps.

Hint: I find that cutting each section of wire slightly longer than needed makes it easier to wrap the wire around itself.

STFP TWO

Bead components

The first side of the necklace, using the 22ga wire. Make a loop about 2cm from the end of the wire and thread one side of the clasp onto it. Wrap the end tightly around the main length of wire around 3 times and cut off any excess. Thread a daisy spacer onto the wire and an etched glass bead, another daisy spacer and cut the wire about 2.5 - 3cm from the daisy spacer. Make a loop about 3mm from the daisy spacer and wrap the end back towards the

daisy spacer to hold the component firmly together.

Hint: I used the various colours and sizes in the etched beads at random. If you don't want the neck lace as long as mine you can repeat step three less times. Adjust the length as working.

STEP THREE

Make a loop about 2cm from the end of the wire and thread it onto the second loop of the previous bead component. Wrap the end tightly around the main length of wire around 3 times and cut off any excess. Thread a daisy spacer onto the wire and an etched alass bead another daisy spacer and cut the wire about 2.5 - 3cm from the daisy spacer. Make a loop about 3mm from the daisy spacer and wrap the end back towards the daisy spacer to hold the component firmly together.



EARRINGS MATERIALS

2 x French hook ear wires

2 x seahorse charms

20 cm 22gauge wire

BEADS

6 x 4mm daisy spacers

2 x 3mm silver

2 larger etched glass beads, around 1cm diameter.

2 smaller etched glass beads around 6mm diameter.



STFP FOUR

Repeat step three 7 more times. (Nine beads in total.)

STFP FIVE

Repeat Step Three again but this time thread the eyelet on a silver charm onto the loop as well. (Ten beads in total.)

STFP SIX

Repeat Step Three 6 more times (16 beads in total.) check the desired length.

STEP SEVEN

Make a loop about 2cm from the end of the wire and thread it onto the second loop of the previous bead component. Wrap the end tightly around the main length of wire around 3 times and cut off any excess.

Thread a daisy spacer onto the wire and an etched glass bead another daisy spacer and cut the wire about 2.5 - 3cm from the daisy spacer. Make a loop about 3mm from the daisy spacer and loop the jump ring at the top of the focal bead component onto it. Wrap the end back towards the daisy spacer to hold the component firmly together.

STFP FIGHT

The second side of the necklace Make a loop about 2cm from the end of the wire and thread the other side of the clasp

onto it. Wrap the end tightly around the main lenath of wire around 3 times and cut off any excess. Thread a daisy spacer onto the wire and an etched glass bead another daisy spacer and cut the wire about 2.5 - 3cm from the daisy spacer. Make a loop about 3mm from the daisy spacer and wrap the end back towards the daisy spacer to hold the component firmly together.

STEP NINE

Make a loop about 2cm from the end of the wire and thread it onto the second loop of the previous bead component. Wrap the end tightly around the main length of wire around 3 times and cut off any excess. Thread a daisy spacer onto the wire and an etched glass bead another daisy spacer and cut the wire about 2.5 - 3cm from the daisy spacer. Make a loop about 3mm from the daisy spacer and wrap the end back towards the daisy spacer to hold the component firmly together.

STEP TEN

Repeat Step Nine 14 times. (16 beads total)

STEP FLEVEN

Repeat Step Seven.


FARRINGS STEP ONE

Make a loop about 2cm from the end of the wire and thread a seahorse charm onto it. Wrap the end tightly around the main length of wire around 3 times and cut off any excess. Thread a 3mm silver bead and a daisy spacer onto the wire and an etched glass bead another daisy spacer and cut the wire about 2.5 - 3cm from the daisy spacer. Make a loop about 3mm from the daisy spacer and depending on the type of earring wire you have, either wrap the end back towards the daisy spacer to hold the component firmly together, or loop onto the end of the ear wire first.

STEP TWO

Repeat step one for the other earring.

STEP ONE

Snow man

On one end of 15cm Tigertail add 1 x crimp, 1 x gold bead bring the Tigertail back through the crimp and flatten. Thread on 1 x bead cap, 16mm pearl, rondel, 10mm pearl, black disk, 8x5mm black bead, 10 x gold beads and 1 x crimp, thread the Tigertail through the 10mm split ring and back in the crimp and flatten crimp.

STEP TWO

Icicle

On 15cm tiger tail thread 1 x crimp and 4 x 3mm gold beads, 1 x icicle shape beads, 4 x 3mm gold beads take the Tigertail back through the crimp and flatten crimp to hold in place Thread on 1 x gold bead, 10mm bi-cone, 14mm clear bead, 10mm bi-cone, 3 x gold beads and 1 x crimp. Thread through 10mm split ring and back through crimp and flatten crimp.

STEP THREE

Add the split rings to the 20mm clasp the same way as you would add a key to a key ring. Cut of excess wire.

Sweet and charming memory wire bracelet for the Flower Girl.

STEP ONE

Using head pin thread with 4mm glass pearl, bead cap, frosted bellflower, larger bead cap, and large frosted flower. Cut off excess form a double loop to close and set aside.

STFP TWO

Form a double loop one side of the memory wire. Start by threading 3 x 8mm Czech crystal AB clear faceted, 8mm glass pearls baby pink, 8mm Czech crystal AB clear faceted, 10mm glass pearls baby pink, drilled cabochon flowers, 10mm glass pearls baby pink, 4mm glass pearl, add prepared flower.

STEP THREE

Follow sequence 4mm glass pearl, 10mm

glass pearls baby pink, drilled cabochon flowers, 10mm glass pearls baby pink, 8mm Czech crystal AB clear faceted, 8mm glass pearls baby pink, 3 x 8mm Czech crystal AB clear faceted, Form a double loop to close.

STEP FOUR

Using 6mm jump ring to attach each side of togale clasp to finish.

A stunning combination of turquoise and agate beads create this coiled jewellery set.

NECKLACE STEP ONE

Make the coiled bead sections using a coiling gizmo. Take about 2m of 24 gauge wire and using the smallest coil bar, make a coil about 12cm long (the whole length of the coil bar). Slide this coil onto a piece of 18ga wire 2cm longer than the coil, and form a loop at each end using round nose pliers. Take turquoise, and form the coil around the bead, with the loops flush against the bead near the hole at each end.

STEP TWO

Make 48 dangles in total, with 24ga wire, making a small swirl at one end. Add a double loops to ensure security on the Tigertail.

STEP THREE

Attach the toggle to the end of the Tigertail



using crimps. Thread on the 6° brass seed beads. Thread on a 10mm agate bead, 8 x dangles, the turquoise coiled bead (make sure the tigertail goes through the loops at the end of the coil). Plus 8 dangles and a 10mm agate.

STEP FOUR

Space the three beaded bead sections with more 6° seed beads. Finish with crimps and the other half of the magnetic clasp.

CUFF BRACELET STEP ONE

Take 2 x 20cm pieces of 18ga wire, and form swirls at both ends of each wire (start the swirls off with round nose pliers, continue with flat nose pliers).

STEP TWO

Connect the two wires together at one end near the swirls by wrapping the 24ga wire around 5 or 6 times, start adding beads.

STFP THRFF

Add just enough beads to fill each section of the cuff, add more (or larger beads) in the middle. Between each section of beads, wrap approx 8-10 times on edge.

STEP FOUR

Finish off by wrapping around both wires 5 or 6 times. Trim the extra wire at both ends and flatten slightly with flat nose pliers.



EARRINGS MATERIALS

18ga wire

24ga wire

earwires

BEADS

2 x 20mm turquoise beads

2 x 10mm fire agate beads

16 mix of blister pearls, coin pearls and 6mm fire agate beads



EARRINGS STEP ONE

Make the coiled bead section using a coiling gizmo. Take about 2m of 24 gauge wire and using the smallest coil bar, make a coil about 12cm long (the whole length of the coil bar). Slide this coil onto a piece of 18ga wire 2cm longer than the coil, and form a loop at each end using round nose pliers. Take turquoise, and form the coil around the bead, with the loops flush against the bead near the hole at each end.

STEP TWO

Take a piece of 18ga wire about 20cm long, and form a swirl at one end. Slide on the coiled turquoise bead, ensuring you put the wire through the loop on the coil section, through the bead, through the other loop.

STEP THREE

Make 16 dangles, in total with 24ga wire, making a small swirl at one end. Add a double loop to ensure they do not fall of the 18ga wire. Slide on 8 x dangles onto each earring followed by a 10mm agate bead, cut the 18ga wire and form a loop using round nose pliers. Attach to the earwire and close the loop.

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

BEADS

5 x 15mm red stars

24 x 4mm gold

30 x 4mm red bicones

TOOLS

chain nose pliers

wire cutters

Be a Star with this Christmas inspired bag clip

STEP ONE

Cut 20cm Tigertail thread on one end 1 x crimp and 1 x charm, take the Tigertail back thought the crimp and flatten crimp to hold charm. Thread 1 x red bicone, 1 x star bead, 1 x red bicone, 3 x gold beads, 1 x red bicone, 1 x crimp, thread Tigertail through 20mm ring going back through the crimp pull in firm and flatten crimp. Cut of excess Tigertail.

STEP TWO

Using other charms and beads repeat Step One making your own random pattern The finished length of beaded thread is 3cm, 6cm, 7cm, 9cm.

63 x 6mm glass pearls 1 x 15mm octagon crystal

STEP ONE

Starting with an eye pin thread on a 6mm glass pearl, form a loop but only partially close, thread the next eye pin on and close. Thread a 4mm daisy spacer, 6mm glass pearl, 4mm daisy spacer, form a loop but only partially close to add next eye pin, follow sequence using plain pearl, daisy spacer pearl and repeat 63 times or to desired length. Finishing both ends with the same bead.

STEP TWO

Attach each end to a 10mm jump ring and attach to the key eye, add 6mm jump ring to the swallow charm and close jump ring, add a second 6mm jump to attach octagon crystal. Attach a 6mm jump ring to the other side of octagon crystal and close jump ring finally add 10mm jump ring and attach drop crystal to the bottom of the key eye.

Second row

Thread through the first red, rice, red bead, add 2 x gold beads and thread through red, rice, red bead, add 2 x gold beads, red bead, rice bead, red bead, add 2 x gold beads, thread though red, rice, red bead add 2 x gold beads, pass again through first red, rice, red bead, exit between the two gold beads added.

STFP THRFF

Third row

Add 1 x gold bead and go back through gold bead, red, rice, red, exiting between two gold beads. Repeat 2 more times.



STEP FOUR

Add star

Bring the thread to top, exit the gold bead from Step One add 1 x gold bead, 1 x star bead and 1 x gold bead bring the thread back through the star bead and circle around the gold beads this should take you to the top of beaded earring triangle tie a knot at the end. Add a jump ring through top gold bead, add a little alue to the knot. Thread ear hook on to the jumpring. Repeat for the other earring

First, make the coiled bead section using a coiling gizmo. Take about 2m of 24ga wire and using the smallest coil bar, make a coil about 8cm long.

STFP TWO

At the end of the coil, coil back on the coil for about 5 wraps, now add the beads. Thread on (in this order) approx. $20 \times 8^{\circ}$ seed beads, approx. 30 random pearls and crystals (keep the biggest ones toward the middle), then 20 x 8° seed beads. Wrap five times around the end of the coil. Remove the beaded bead from the gizmo.

STEP THREE

Take a piece of 18ga wire about 30cm long. Make a swirl at one end using flat nose pliers. Hammer it slightly to give a finished look.

STFP FOUR

Slide beaded bead onto the 18ga wire, and cut the wire about 1cm from the top of the beaded bead. Form a loop using round nose pliers.

STFP FIVE

Attach to the keyring.

CHOKER STEP ONE

Make the coiled bead section first using a coiling gizmo. Take about 3m of 24ga wire and using the smallest coil bar, make a coil about 15cm long.

STEP TWO

At the end of the coil, coil back on the coil for about 5 wraps, now add the beads. Thread on (in this order) approx. 20 x 8° seed beads, approx. 60 random pearls and crystals (keep the biggest ones toward the middle), then 20 x 8° seed beads. Wrap about five times around the end of the coil. Remove the beaded bead from the aizmo.

STFP THRFF

Thread the beaded bead onto the neckwire.

Make the headpin danales using approx. 80 headpins, use more for a larger bigger bracelet. Add a double loops, for security on the Tigertail. Cut approx. 1.5cm above the bead and form a loop with round nose pliers (wrap the wire around the smallest part of the round nose plier twice).

STEP TWO

Take Tigertail and attach a crimp and clamshell to one end. Add approx. 20 danales between each black nugget beads, with 10 dangles either side the clasp. Thread on all the dangles and nugget beads, attach second crimp and clamshell at the other end.

STEP THREE

Attach the lobster clasp to one of the clamshells, and the 8mm split ring to the other clamshell. Option: add an extension chain to make it longer.

EARRINGS STEP ONE

Make the headpin dangles. These dangles have been made with a double loops, for security on the eyepins. Cut approx. 1.5cm above the bead and form a loop with round nose pliers (wrap the wire around the smallest part of the round nose plier twice).

STFP TWO

Take an eyepin, add to the loop at the bottom 3 dangles. Onto the eyepin, slide 1x 3mm gold spacer, 1 x black glass nugget, 1 x 3mm



Cut the eyepin about 1cm above the spacer and form a loop using round nose pliers. Attach to the earwire using this loop.

DANGLE NECKLACE STEP ONE

Make the 30 headpin danales. Take the headpin, slide on the 1 x bead, 1 x 3mm spacer. Cut about 8mm above the spacer and form a loop using round nose pliers.

STEP TWO

This necklace is long enough to slip over your head, and has no clasp. Take chain, and cut 2 x 10cm long sections, and 1 x 40cm long section. Open the links on the chain to attach to the rhinestone connectors.

STFP THRFF

Attach dangles to the smaller sections of chain in a random fashion.

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2 x earring hooks

26ga wire

2 x 40mm Earring hoops

BEADS

26 x 6x 4 rondel red crystal

Wire a delightful Christmas tree.

STEP ONE

Cut wire in 4 x 25cm length and gather the wires together and fold in half, wrap wire once around the bottom centre of hoop, twist all wire together to form tree trunk about 1cm.

STFP TWO

Take 2 wires and separate them one on the left and one on the right, add 4 x crystals to the left and 4 x crystals to the right, wrap the wire around the hoop once and back through the crystals bringing the wire back to the centre of the tree. Do not cut off wire, we will need it to finish later.

STEP THREE

Twist the next 6 wires together once, this is only to hold the wire in place, separate 2 wires one to the left and one on the right add 4 x crystals on each wire, wrap the wire around the hoop and through the crystal, do not cut wire.

STEP FOUR

Take 2 wires one on the left and one on the right add 3 x crystals on each wire wrap wire around hoop and back through crystals, do not cut wire.





STEP FIVE

Take the last 2 wires add 2 x crystals to each wire and wrap around hoop and back through the crystals, do not cut wire.

STEP SIX

Lay the wire along the trunk of the tree and twist wire starting from the top picking up wires as you work down the tree trunk to the first tree branch then wrap the wire around the tree trunk twice. Separate the wires in to 2 groups of 4, take one group and twist together and wrap around the hoop and do the same on the other side, this will make it look like the tree roots. Cut of excess wire if needed.

STFP SEVEN

Add earring hook and repeat all steps for the second earring.

Design note: add a little nail polish to the wire ends to smooth out the ends of the wires.

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






Thread first 1 x gold bead 1 x rondel on head pin and fold the pin to form an open hook, repeat 11 more times. Matching 8mm





rondels with 8mm gold bead and 6mm rondels with 6mm red and Green crystals.



Add each beaded pin randomly to the loops on the ring shank and close the open hook to secure head pins and beads, by placing two beaded pins on same loops this will give it a fuller look.

Cut ribbon in 2 x 1 metre lengths for each thong, take one length of ribbon and tie the middle of ribbon to the toe on the thong separate the two ends of ribbon and starting with the left side wrap ribbon on straps of thong left side over and right side under and the right ribbon wrap right side over and under left side under do this 3 times its should look like a V pattern, now take the ribbons and on each side of thong continue to wrap with ribbon all the way to the end, leaving about 5 cm length to fold over and stitch in place cut of excess ribbon.

STEP TWO

Thread needle with beading cotton and start in the middle front, stitch a 18mm

gold bead on first then one by one stitch pearls around the 18mm bead stitch one by one 10mm gold bi-cone around the pearls

Stitch 4 x 8mm gold beads on the outside of the thong straps and use the 4mm clear beads to fill in gaps between the larger beads continue to add the clear 4mm beads around the larger beads to fill all gaps.

STEP THREE

Repeat step One and step Two for the other thong

DESIGN TIPS TO REMEMBER WHEN **WORKING WITH WIRE**

If you are too hard with your tools you can damage your wire so use a loose grip when working with wire.

Your wire will harden as you use it, don't try to fiddle too much once you have finished your work as you risk your wire snapping.

Wire has a memory, so think before you add a kink or twist to the wire, it will not like to be re-straightened this can damage your wire. But the memory of the wire means it will stay attached to your frame once it's wrapped on. If you can feel a sharp end on your work it will scratch you later so deal with it now.

STEP ONE

Cut 8 x 50cm each. Fold each wire in half at the centre point, pinch the centre point. (Photos 1 and 2).





STEP TWO

With all the wires in a tight bundle (with all pinched centres at the bottom) hold 3cm from the bottom, twist all wires together for 2-3cm. (Photo 3). The 8 looped sections are your roots at the bottom of the tree, the 16 wires are the branch of your tree

Design note: holding with chain nose pliers can help at this point. Each tree is individual so the amount twisted will vary for each tree less is best, it is easier to add an extra twist later than try to undo a twist.

STEP THREE

Photo 4

Split 16 wires into 2 or 3 sections to form branches, twist about 1cm each (Photo 4). Each design will be different, put it into frame to get an estimate of what you want as you do this step, splitting one of these branches off into a smaller double branch also looks good.













STFP FOUR

To attach the wire to frame, starting at the roots. Place tree against frame separate roots, there should be 8 double wires, one strand at a time each wire is wrapped around ring frame, use round nose pliers for this and we leave it as the double wire so there is no sharp ends to deal with. (Photo 5).

STEP FIVE

Add some small half twists with round nose pliers to add movement to root system, this also tightens up your work onto fame.

STEP SIX

Now tree is attached to the frame allocate where branches will sit in finished piece, make any twists or add movement into wire at his point, add that extra twist to the branch using round nose tool to add a curve to a branch. Design notes: The 16 strands of wire will be used to add the stone chips and beads too, each strand will be finished onto the ring, don't worry if you snap a wire, just finish it off onto

the next cluster of chips add more wire later if you need too, if you don't want to use all 16 wires use what you want to then finish off the wires once you have the design you like

STEP SEVEN

One strand at a time add 2 or 3 chips, wrap it twice onto the frame, (do not cut the wire off as we will be using it) move onto the next wire in the section, working and repeat adding a few chips at a time and wrap off onto the frame. Once the branch are filled in the section being worked, using loose wire and round nose pliers go back into work and weave in extra chips and beads to fill in any gaps within tree area, this is where to add dimension, fill any gaps or stack beads/chips on top of each other for raised sections. To finish off the wire take to the top of the ring, add a few chips double over and twist wrapping the end of the wire around the ring to stabilize the finish, make sure to trim off any excess from the front of the work otherwise there will be sharp ends at the back of work, using round nose pliers, blend ends into work, give it







a little wrap onto the closest wire. Repeat with all wires until happy. (Photo 6)

Design option: Finish off wire ends by adding a curl to the wire and have it showing at the front of work.

NECKLACE

Follow the same method for the solid necklace with only a slight change to the roots

STEP ONE

Cut wire

STEP TWO

Fold at centre

STEP THREE

Add twists and branches

STEP FOUR

Using round nose pliers twist roots and curl sitting out decoratively from base. (Photo 7).



STEP FIVE

Separate top branches, add chips or beads secure up onto wire neck frame, fill until happy, trim off at front. (Photo 8, 9 and 10).

On one end of the 50cm Tigertail, thread 1 x gold crimp and 1 x teal drop bead and take the Tigertail around the drop bead and back into the crimp (make sure the drop bead is straight and you only have 1 cm excess through the crimp leaving the other end long enough to thread on the rest of beads) flatten crimp with chain nose pliers, thread in order 1 x teal seed beads, 1 x gold cap, 1 x 8mm brown bead, 1 x bead cap, 1 x teal diamond bead, tuck the 1 cm piece of Tigertail through the beads (hiding the excess), thread on 34 x brown seed bead add flower charm (this may move around but will be secure later) add 34 x teal seed beads, 34 x brown seed beads, 48 x teal seed beads. Add a bead stopper on the end and place aside till later.

STFP THRFF


Using one end of the 1 meter Tigertail, thread on 1 x crimp take the Tigertail through the loop on the toggle ring and back through crimp and flatten crimp to hold. Thread on 1 x teal seed bead, 1 x brown seed bead, 1 x teal seed bead, 1 x diamond shape bead, 1 x teal seed bead, 10 x brown seed bead, 18 x teal seed beads, 5 x brown seed beads, 5 x teal seed beads, 1 x brown seed bead, 1 x diamond shape bead, 1 x teal seed bead, 1 x bead cap 1 x brown 8mm bead, 1 x diamond shape bead, 1 x crimp 1 x teal drop bead, thread the Tigertail back through all the beads to the last 10 brown seed beads pass through to the fifth brown seed beads and pull the Tigertail through, thread 2 x teal seed beads, go through the loop on the flower charm, thread 1 x diamond shape bead, 3 x teal seed beads.



STFP FOUR

Continue on the same Tigertail thread 1 x bead cap, 1 x brown 8mm bead, 1 x bead cap, 1 x diamond shape bead, 1 x teal drop, 1 x brown seed bead, 1 x diamond shape bead, 1 x teal seed bead, (repeat 2 more times). Thread 12 x brown seed bead, 1 x diamond shape bead, 26 x teal seed beads, 1 x crimp (do not flatten crimp) 1 x teal seed bead, 1 x diamond shape bead, 1 x crimp (do not flatten crimp) Now take the beaded 50 cm piece of Tigertail made in Step Two and thread the Tigertail through the crimp and seed bead, diamond shape bead, seed bead, and crimp once you are happy with look flatten both crimp.







STEP FIVE

Continue threading 19 x teal seed beads, 35 x brown seed beads, 1 x diamond shape bead, 35 x teal seed beads, 1 x diamond shape bead, 15 x brown seed beads, 1 x drop bead, 1 x diamond shape bead,

STEP SIX

Continue threading 1 x bead cap, 1 x brown 8mm bead, 1 x bead cap, 1 x diamond shape beads repeat 2 more times add 3 x teal seed beads, 1 x crimp thread Tigertail through the loop on the togale bar and back through the crimp and pass through some beads flatten crimp, cut of excess Tigertail.

STEP SEVEN

On one end of the 25cm Tigertail, thread 1 x gold crimp and 1 x teal drop bead. Take the Tigertail around the drop bead and back into the crimp (make sure the drop beads

is straight with only 1 cm excess though the crimp leaving the other end long enough to thread on the rest of beads) flatten crimp with chain nose pliers, thread in order 1 x teal diamond bead, 1 x teal seed bead, 1 x brown seed bead, 1 x bead cap, 1 x brown 8mm bead, 1 x bead cap, 1 x teal seed bead, 1 x teal diamond bead, 1 x brown seed bead, 1 x gold cap, 1 x brown 8mm bead, 1 x bead cap 1 x teal diamond shape bead, 1 x drop bead, 1 x brown seed bead, 1 x teal diamond shape, 13 x teal seed beads, 13 x brown seed beads, 9 x teal seed beads, 1 x crimp thread pass through the loop on the flower charm and going through the loop on the toggle ring back through the crimp flatten crimp cut off excess Tigertail.

Basics and 'all that other stuff' you need to know ... eventually by Annlee Butler

I AM ALWAYS AMAZED at how many talented beaders and wire workers we have in Australia. Again this year our Inspiration Beading book is filled with projects to fuel your creativity. The diagrams and techniques described here will provide you with a general guide to complete the projects in this book and have been developed by trial and error over many years of beading and teaching. Sometimes it is the smallest things that can make your beading time more enjoyable – like being able to thread a beading needle first go, or rolling neat loops, or being confident that your knots will not come undone. Even if you are an experienced beader I hope that this information is helpful to you.

Price verses Quality: Remember, the same is true in beading as in all aspects of product purchasing.

As a general rule, if it's 'cheaper' it is because the quality is not as good or as consistent as a comparable more 'expensive' item. If your project does not require uniform beads or you do not use wire tools very often, try to get the best you can in quality for the price you are willing to pay.

TOOLS

The most important thing ... make sure your tools are comfortable to hold. I like my tool handles to come past the end of my thumb muscle. I once turned 700 eye pins in one day and used a shorter handled pair of tools. The bruise in the palm of my hand was a spectacular blue and black for a week.

These are the tools I would recommend as a general kit:

Chain nose pliers: These pliers are available straight or bent and have a flat surface in the middle and a rounded outside edge. They are ideal for opening and closing jump rings, pulling a needle through beadwork, and are the first step in forming any loops. See diagrams.



Crimping pliers: Have two shaped holes specifically designed to achieve a folded crimp.



Wire cutters: Come in two forms – flush cutters or side cutters. Flush cutters are useful for cutting straight lines and side cutters form a point on the wire end ... a lot of cutters have both these cuts. Look closely – if one side is straight and the other forms a 90 degree angle, you will be able to use both by just turning the tool to the side you wish to use.



Cutter for memory wire: Memory wire will ruin your good cutters so I recommend you purchase an inexpensive pair from a hardware store.

Round nose pliers: Have two round cone shaped jaws and are used for second steps in forming loops.



Nylon jaw pliers: Have two jaws that are made of nylon and are used for tensioning wire or work that requires special care to leave no marks.



THREADS

Silimides: C-lon, S-lon, and Nymo have a one way warp. What does that mean? Just like materials, if it is threaded the wrong way to the warp it will be difficult to use; it will constantly spiral into a knotted mess. If you are not sure if your thread has a warp or not, thread it as if it does and you can't go wrong.

To make sure you thread correctly: Pull 10cm of thread off the bobbin and thread your needle on this 10cm; now pull off the rest of the thread of the bobbin and cut the thread. This is a good practice to get into. If you have to answer the telephone, you will know which end is the correct working end as your needle will already be on.

Fireline: Use this thread if you are working with crystals or bugles. I definitely recommend it for strength and durability.

Glues: Please do not use superglues, they crack and will break threads and knots when they crack. The best glues are ones that are safe to wear on the skin, such

as Hypo-cement, E6000 and just plain clear nail polish for spotting knots.

OTHER TOOLS

Beading needles: Come in a variety of sizes and lengths. As a general rule, if you are working with size 11 to size 6 beads, a size 12 will pass easily through a couple of times with thread. If you are working with size 15 beads, a size 13 is more comfortable but will bend much quicker; keep a few on hand and think about changing sizes while you work if you find a size 13 slower to work with.

Fine pointed scissors: A fine pointed pair of scissors such as patchworkers or embroiderers use are really great – they usually have a cover and the small pointed ends allow you to get tight up to the bead work to trim thread.

Awl, for pearl knots and others: This small device allows you slip your knot into place before tightening. I have found the best awl is an extra large paper clip – pull one end of the paper clip wire straight, the remaining bent section is a good finger-holding size and the wire diameter is perfect.

HOW MANY BEADS?

How many is enough? Stupid question ... never enough. I once made a lamp shade fringe with size 11 seed beads, and not really knowing how many beads I needed to make it, I purchased two kilograms of the main colour and 500 grams of the other colours combined. Now, how many should I have bought?

There were 525 drops of 15cm each, so using the chart below I could have calculated this way:

1cm = 7 beads. 15cm x 7 beads = 105 beads per drop.

105 beads x 525 drops = 55,125 beads. 55,125 beads divided by 110 beads per gram = 501.1 grams. Just a little less than the 2.5 kilograms I bought.


To get a square area, multiply width by height. So, if I had a loom amulet bag that was 5×6 cm for one side, I would go: 5×6 cm = 30cm 30 cm $\times 2$ sides = 60

Using cylinder beads:

 $60 \times 42 = 2520$ beads divided by 200 average 12.6 grams needed – so I would most likely purchase 15 grams.

By the way, I am still using up the rest of the leftover two kilograms of beads I bought for the lamp.

BRICK STITCH



After forming ladder to start.


Begin each brick stitch row with 2 begds go under thread between the second and third bead on the ladder, go up through the second bead added, then down the first. Come back up the second bead. Continue by adding one bead and passing the needle under the next loop of thread on the row below.

CRIMPS




Position crimp and wire in pliers cup shaped hole. This is usually closest to handle. Squash crimp. Move squashed crimp to circle shaped hole at front of pliers, with cup facing sideways like a back to front "C" gently compress to form a ball. Test to ensure crimp is secure.

STOPPER BEADS



A stopper bead is used to temporarily secure beads at the start or finish of work, Choose a different colour bead than your work unless it is to stay in bead work. Leave approx 10 - 15cm of thread and go back through bead in the same direction a couple of times for tension. To remove after work is finished roll bead in your hand and loosen with your needle.


WRAPPED LOOPS




Using roundnose pliers grip wire above bead press with fingers to right angle. Place pliers in upright position and pull wire over top of pliers and back to right to form neat round loop. The size of your loop will vary on where you place the pliers on the wire.

So when wrapping a number of loops that you require the same size, draw a line across your pliers with a ink marker at the point you wish to wrap at. Move pliers to hold loop just formed. Pull wire firmly up to bottom of circle and wrap wire in tight circle motion around wire above bead, cut and trim excess wire.

LOOP TURNING AND TRIMING





Cut head or eyepin leaving approx 1 cm of wire above bead (or as project instruction). Bend to right angle. Grip tip of wire with roundnose pliers and curl inwards to bead hole moving slowly place downward pressure to get a rounded shape that sits directly above bead hole.

OPFNING AND



To open a jumpring grasp the open ring either side of the opening with flat or chainnose pliers. Bring one pair of pliers toward you and push the other away.

To close a jumpring reverse this movement. Apply slight pressure inwards on rings that are widely opened. Never pull rings apart outwards as this will distort shape and weaken iumprina.

FLAT EVEN COUNT PEYOTE

Thread on an even number of beads. This forms 1st and 2nd row. This can be done with any number of beads as long as it is an even number.



Pick up 1 bead and thread back through 2nd bead from needle in opposite direction this is the 3rd row. Pick up 1 beads and skipping 1 bead go through next bead. Pick up 1 bead, skip next bead and go through last bead.




Next, and all following rows, pick up 1 bead and going into the first high bead. Pick up 1 bead and go through next high bead, continue across row to complete.


HOW TO MAKE A LOOP FYFPIN OR WRAPPFD FYFPIN



Cut a section of wire at least 3 cm longer than the bead/s you wish to use, turn a simple loop on one end, thread bead/s complete with a simple loop for the second end. To wrap eyepin cut wire 4 cm longer than the bead/s to be used, turn a wrapped loop on one end of wire, thread bead/s, complete with a wrapped loop for the second end, do not forget to add next link or clasp before completeing.

BRICK STITCH





After forming ladder to start.

Begin each brick stitch row with 2 beads go under thread between the second and third bead on the ladder, go up through the second bead added, then down the first. Come back up the second bead. Continue by adding one bead and passing the needle under the next loop of thread on the row below.

FLATTENED CRIMP



Position crimp gently with chainnose pliers, making sure that wires are tensioned correctly gently flatten crimp using pliers, so it remains in alignment with wire in a neat square shape. Test to ensure crimp is secure before proceeding.


BFAD CONFS



Create a wrapped loop as in diagram, on one end of wire. A "wrapped loop" is better than a loop as this will stop stringing from slipping out. Place stringing onto loop, attach using knots or crimps as per your necklace design.

Slip wire and stringing into cone as high as possible. Create a second wrapped loop on the top of the cone using wrapped loop instructions, do not forget to add clasp if needed before completing wrap.

KNOTS




Square knot: bring left-hand thread over the right-hand thread and around. Cross right over left and go through the loop. Spot glue all knots.




Surgeon's knot: bring left-hand thread over the right hand thread and around. Form a loop and go through the loop. Go through again. Move knot to exact spot you require it before tightening, this knot is very secure and will not undo easily. Spot glue all knots.

SQUARE STITCH BASICS


String the required number of beads for the first row. String 1st bead of row 2. Go through the last bead of row 1 in a circular direction going also through 1st bead of row 2. This bead will sit on top of the last bead of the 1st row.



Continue picking up 1 bead and in circular direction pick bead up from row below. Continue until the end of the row.



At the end of the row simple turn your work over and complete diagram 1 and diagram 2 for the next row. It is important to turn your work as this will give you correct tension and your work will not have a sideways slope.



At the end of each third row run your thread through the row below where you finished and the row you are on now back to the same position.

CHARLOTTES





Thread tiger tail or thread through charlotte hole. Place a flattened crimp on tiger tail or knot thread so that it sits in the cup area. Trim excess. Using chain nose pliers fold cups sections together.

WIRE GUARD

These are a fairly new invention and are great to use with Tigertail and crimp finishing. They are 'U' shaped with a channel that the Tigertail threads through and are added into the clasp loop to stop wear on the Tigertail. To use, thread a crimp, thread Tigertail through the left side channel, hook through the clasp loop, thread Tigertail through clasp loop, take Tigertail back down the right side channel and through crimp. Lastly, fold or flatten crimp.

COIL ENDS

1. Double the end of your cord. (Optional: add a dab of glue.)



- 2. Twist the cord slightly as you push it all the way into the coil end. Since cord width varies, so does the ease of this step.
- 3. Using a regular pair of jewellery pliers, crimp down the last half coil, securing the coil end.



FRENCH WIRE



French Wire has many names it is also known as bullion or gimp, it is a fine coil of wire that was mainly used in the past for protecting silk while stringing pearls but is now being used on other wires and threads as a protector, it has no strength to hold, so you still need to add a crimp or a knot, while it is fiddley to use, as it will quickly unravel to look just like a fine piece of wire, it is well worth the effort to give work a professional finish. To use: cut a small section with very sharp cutters, thread a crimp or a seed beads to hide knot on to work, string French wire onto threading material, and finding being used, pass back through crimp or bead and pull gently until French wire is firm in a loop through finding. A word of caution you only get one go at this process tension gently before crimping or knotting.


The issues glossary takes a peak at different uses of Sterling Silver in Jewellery making. The number of components and findings is endless so we have selected a few, that you will enjoy using in your next project.

Headpins/ Eye pins
Eye pin: A length of wire that has a loop at one end, used to thread beads on.
Headpin: A length of wire with a flat or decorative end, used to thread beads on.













Ear Wires/ Hoops/ Chandeliers

Chandeliers: Chandeliers are most often used for earrings, with a decorative drop added to the rings so that they dangle like a chandelier.













Bails/ Enhancers

Bails: Bails are used with headpins to make your own Pendants.









Enhancers: Enhancers are like bails and can be opened to fit over a strand of beads and then locked closed.






Connector/Linking beads

A decorative component used to connect, enhance or lengthen a designed piece of jewellery.













An ornament designed to be attached or suspended from a chain, earring or necklace.









Chain/Wire Sterling Silver wire is used instead of eyepins as it a cheaper and less wasteful alternative.





Jump/Split Rings
Jump Ring: A wire ring, usually round or oval in shape, can be soldered closed, used for attaching jewellery parts together.
Split ring: A round ring which the wire spirals inside of used to attach charms or ornaments with added security.







Caps are placed on a bead to accentuate the beads







Clasps A fastening device used to hold two or more bead strands together.













Tube Bead: Is used to separate beads and can also have rings to attach other beads.













Spacer Beads Spacer Beads are placed in between beads to enhance or separate.













Beads

Beads: Are used as a focal or strung with others in a sequence.
